Texas was administered as a Foreign Mission from 1838 to 1845, being visited by Bishop Polk of Louisiana and Bishop Freeman of Arkansas. When Texas became a state of the union in 1845, it continued under the care of Bishop Freeman.

The Diocese of Texas was organized in 1849 and continued under Bishop Freeman's care until Bishop Gregg was consecrated. The original diocese, comprising the whole state, was divided in 1874. Since that time, the Diocese of Texas has been made up of the 57 counties of southeast and east Texas, viz: that portion of the State of Texas lying south of the northern line of the counties of Lampasas, Coryell, McLennan, Limestone, Freestone, Anderson, Smith, Gregg, and Marion, and east of the western line of the counties of Matagorda, Colorado, Fayette, Bastrop, Travis, Burnet, and Lampasas.

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INTRODUCTION

The greatest among you will be your servant.

Matthew 23:11

Five years ago, newly elected Bishop Andy Doyle held 14 town hall meetings to listen to members of the Diocese of Texas, to learn their dreams and desires for ministry, to improve and expand the relationship between his office and church members, and to help discern a five-year strategic plan for the initial part of his episcopacy.

Now, we take a critical look at our accomplishments and refocus our planning for the next five years. This document outlines our remarkable history, the context of our mutual ministry and includes information from a recent survey of diocesan staff, board members and diocesan lay leaders and clergy.





GREETING FROM BISHOP ANDY DOYLE



In 2010, when I first addressed Council as Bishop Diocesan, I challenged us to become the leaders that God intends us to be. I offered a vision of a diocese whose very nature has always been to venture forth into new missionary territories, exemplifying the characteristics of creativity and entrepreneurship.

I quoted Sir Francis Drake, an adventurer and a friend of Queen Elizabeth and a strong Anglican. Optimistic and courageous, he withstood storms of every kind as he circumnavigated the world. I challenged the Diocese with a prayer attributed to Drake from 1577:

Disturb us, Lord, when
We are too well pleased with ourselves,
When our dreams have come true
Because we have dreamed too little,
When we arrived safely
Because we sailed too close to the shore.

Disturb us, Lord, when
With the abundance of things we possess
We have lost our thirst
For the waters of life;
Having fallen in love with life,
We have ceased to dream of eternity
And in our efforts to build a new earth,
We have allowed our vision
Of the new Heaven to dim.

Disturb us, Lord, to dare more boldly, To venture on wider seas Where storms will show your mastery; Where losing sight of land, We shall find the stars.

We ask You to push back
The horizons of our hopes;
And to push into the future
In strength, courage, hope, and love.

As you well remember, the Diocese undertook a vision and mission project whereby we developed a clear understanding of who we are and where we are going. In my first year I met with more than 1,200 people in a variety of town hall meetings to hear directly what work we needed to undertake as a diocese. I asked what was working well and what needed improvement.

In the fall of 2013, I engaged the Diocese again in a series of conversations and surveys to see how well we are doing. Are we dreaming big? Are we sailing away from the safe shoreline? Are we giving abundantly? Are we envisioning and building nothing less than the kingdom of God? Or have we become comfortable? I have been intentional in order that we might continually be disturbed to undertake the mission of God's reconciliation in this world. I desire nothing less than to be a faithful bishop leading a faithful diocese towards God's loving kingdom.

I believe that the results of our work over the first five years of ministry together are extraordinarily positive. We have excelled in some areas. In still others we may not have reached our goal, but we have built a solid foundation upon which I believe these areas may come to shine in the next five years.

I will again hold town hall meetings across the Diocese in the Fall of 2014 in order to engage the people of our churches. We need to clearly mark the path taken thus far, and we need to examine the territory that lies ahead.

I am grateful for everyone who has participated in this project; for Reb Scarborough, who has helped me organize the effort; and for Carol Barnwell, who has helped gather our history and work on the graphic design and publication of our findings.
























PART I

A Snapshot of 176 Years

Disturb us, Lord, when

We are too well pleased with ourselves,

When our dreams have come true

Because we have dreamed too little,

When we arrived safely

The Episcopal Diocese of Texas is made up of 150 congregations, numerous schools, foundations and institutions, overseen by a bishop diocesan with offices in Houston, Austin and Tyler. The Diocese covers more than 47,000 square miles and includes 57 counties in the eastern and southeastern quadrant of Texas.

The Diocese of Texas is one of 110 domestic dioceses in The Episcopal Church (TEC) with additional members in Colombia, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Austria, Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Haiti, Honduras, Micronesia, Puerto Rico, Taiwan, Venezuela and the Virgin Islands. The Episcopal Church is a member of the worldwide Anglican Communion with more than 70 million members globally.

Dioceses operate independently within TEC and form the primary unit within the denominational structure, each overseen by a diocesan bishop. The Rt. Rev. C. Andrew Doyle is the ninth bishop diocesan of Texas, elected by congregational representatives and clergy in 2008.


THE BEGINNINGS OF MINISTRY

From 1838 to 1845 the Episcopal Church existed in the Republic of Texas as a foreign missionary district, administered by Leonidas Polk, Bishop of Louisiana, and later George Washington Freeman, Bishop of Arkansas, until Texas was admitted to the Union.

The Rev. Caleb Ives held the first Holy Communion service in Matagorda on Christmas 1838 in the Masonic Lodge building. In 1839, Christ Church, Matagorda, was the first Episcopal Church founded in the Republic. The Rev. R. S. Chapman began conducting services in the Capitol, located in Houston, and on occasion in Galveston, Velasco and Quintana. Later in 1839, Christ Church, Houston, became the second congregation founded in Texas. It became the Diocese's cathedral a century later.

As Missionary Bishop of the Southwest, Polk made his first visit to Galveston, Houston and Matagorda, which left him impressed with the work of both missionary priests and the opportunities that existed for the Church in Texas. The Rev. Benjamin Eaton, an Irish native from Wisconsin, arrived in 1841 and concentrated his evangelism efforts in the Galveston area, founding Trinity, Galveston, in 1841. Its building, completed in 1842, was almost immediately destroyed by a hurricane. Newly graduated from Virginia Theological Seminary, Charles Gillett was appointed to Houston and, after fundraising in the East, arrived with enough money to rebuild Trinity, Galveston. Christ Church, Houston, purchased their present site and moved a disused school building onto the property until the congregation could afford to build a permanent structure. Ives, in the meantime, raised enough money to purchase a "ready-cut" church, shipped to Matagorda and, at length, put together on donated land. The building has been wrecked by several storms, moved once, but always rebuilt on the same plan.

The Church's General Convention elected Freeman, a Delaware native, as



missionary bishop in 1844, and in spite of his responsibility for Arkansas, the Indian Territory and Mississippi, he helped to establish the Diocese of Texas in 1849, just three years after becoming a "domestic" missionary field. Organizing parishes included Christ Church, Matagorda; St. John's, Brazoria; Christ Church, Houston; Trinity, Galveston; Christ Church, Nacogdoches; and Christ Church, San Augustine. Within a few years, there were worshipping congregations established in Brenham, Independence and La Grange, Marshall, Washington-on-the-Brazos, Chappell Hill, Brownsville, Austin and San Antonio, Anderson, Huntsville, Cold Spring, Lockhart, Seguin and Gonzales, Columbus, Corsicana, Dallas and Richmond.

The need for a resident bishop increased as the Diocese grew and Freeman was urged to accept the position. He declined in order not to lose his salary from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society (DFMS), as the Episcopal Church was sometimes known. Three other bishops declined as well because promises of financial support from the fledgling, though immense, Diocese of Texas were "fragile" and could not be assured.

Alexander Gregg was completely surprised by his election and did not feel he could reject it in view of the previous refusals. He was a man of private means who had served his first and only parish for 10 years. He was consecrated during the General Convention in 1859 and was in Texas by December, settling in Austin. He soon began systematic visitations "from house to house, town to town and farm to farm, nurturing and extending the Church."

During the Civil War, Gregg traveled constantly. The Diocese "aligned with the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Confederate States of America during the war but immediately returned to the Church in the United States" following the war's conclusion.

Growth in the state was so rapid that the Church's General Convention of 1874 created two new districts from the Diocese of Texas (now reduced to its current 57 counties). Weakened by the separation, the Diocese still continued to grow because Gregg "exploited the building of railroads to establish churches in new areas, followed lumber companies into sawmill communities and founded mission congregations in remote areas." He also strategically reached out to black people in Galveston, Tyler and Houston.

By 1891, much diminished from his strenuous work schedule, Gregg asked for an assistant bishop, but it was not until after two elections of local clergy were declined that the Council elected George Herbert Kinsolving from Philadelphia. Kinsolving accepted and moved to Austin. Gregg died soon after in 1893.

Kinsolving supported programs for women's education at the University of Texas, Sam Houston Normal School in Huntsville, Mary Hardin–Baylor, and Rice, Houston. Kinsolving was very mission-driven and started work in all new communities. Many of his church plants along the Gulf Coast were destroyed by the Hurricane of 1900, which also devastated the financial structure of the Diocese. Generous support from churches in the East enabled recovery and reconstruction, which was followed by the discovery of oil in 1901. This discovery not only changed the Texas economy, but led to the continued growth of the Church.

A growing number of military establishments in Texas at the outbreak of World War I, and the increasing need to minister to servicemen, caused Kinsolving to call for a coadjutor. But it was not until 1918 that Clinton S. Quin, rector of Trinity,

Houston, was elected. By then, Kinsolving was too ill to attend Quin's consecration.

Quin, 35 at the time of his election, remained in Houston and was given oversight of mission work. He used the Diocese's annual Council to draw crowds of people to gain support for the program of the Diocese. An event that had previously attracted fewer than 50 or 60 people saw more than 1,000 in 1920 in Galveston and in ensuing years. He became known for his support of laity, bringing hundreds of men together for teaching and preaching missions, resulting in their deeper dedication to the work of the Church. He did the same with young people, drawing them together at the summer home of Rosa Allen on Sylvan Beach. As this program grew, Allen donated money to purchase a campsite on Trinity Bay, where summer camp was held for many years. This later evolved into present day Camp Allen, 1000 acres near Navasota.

During his 10 years as coadjutor, the Diocese grew in "numbers, strength and dedication." Kinsolving died in 1928 and Quin continued a vigorous pace as bishop through World War II, when the increased demands on his time caused him to call for the election of a coadjutor bishop, elected to succeed the diocesan bishop upon his retirement. John Hines, then rector of Christ Church, Houston, was elected in 1945 and, like Quin, assisted for 10 years before becoming Bishop of Texas. During that decade, three institutions of the Diocese were founded: St. Luke's Hospital; St. Stephen's School, Austin; and the Episcopal Theological Seminary of the Southwest, Austin. Christ Church, Houston, became the Cathedral or official "see" of the bishop in 1949.

The character of the Diocese changed dramatically as a result of the population growth during the second world war and postwar period. So many congregations were founded that the Diocese became one of the largest in the country. Two suffragan bishops were elected to help with visitations and ministry over the Diocese's 49,000 square miles.

In 1964, Hines was elected Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church and resigned as Bishop of Texas. For the first time since Gregg's election in 1859, the Diocese had to elect a diocesan bishop. A vigorous campaign ensued before Milton Richardson won election. Richardson continued with new mission sites at a slower pace in order to focus on paying off debts of the Diocese and its institutions left from Hines' aggressive building and planting strategy. After an arduous 15 years as bishop, Richardson's health declined to the point that the Standing Committee had to assume jurisdiction until a special session of Council elected Maurice Benitez bishop.

Benitez had been rector of St. John the Divine, Houston, and was known for his passion for evangelism. A graduate of West Point and a fighter pilot before attending seminary, he brought a focus on the changing demographics of Texas to the Diocese. He coped with the recession in the late 1980s, the collapse of the oil business and a resulting banking crisis.

During his tenure, strain increased between many churches in the Diocese and the "National Church" over issues about traditional and historical Anglicanism and biblical teaching, as well as the inclusion of gays in ordained ministry and the blessing of same-gender couples. In contrast to Richardson's stance towards The Episcopal Church, Benitez initiated the "freedom of choice" action of Council, by which the Diocese's commitment to financially support the Church nationally was replaced by optional support from each parish.

Additionally, Texas has had ten bishops suffragan and six assistant bishops since becoming a diocese. F. Percy Goddard; James P. Clements; Roger H. Cilley; Scott Field Bailey; Gordon T. Charlton; William E. Sterling, Sr.; Leopoldo J. Alard; and Rayford B. High, Jr. have served as bishops suffragan (elected to assist the diocesan bishop without right of succession). Jeff Fisher and Dena A. Harrison are currently serving as bishops suffragan. Bishops Anselmo Carral, William J. Cox, John Hines, James B. Brown, Ted Daniels and John Buchanan have served as assistants (previously elected as bishops, serving on a contractual basis).

Former Bishops Show Strategic Growth Trajectory Engaging New Communities and Engaging in Ministry

PREVIOUS TO FOUNDING OF DIOCESE

Leonidas Polk was the first "missionary bishop" sent by the Episcopal Church to the Republic of Texas, shortly after Texas' independence. In the 1840s, Polk traveled throughout the Republic by horse and wagon, consecrating the first church at Matagorda and confirming people along the way. Polk, later the first Bishop of Louisiana, was a principal founder of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. He was the only Episcopal bishop ever to command an army and was killed in action while serving as a brigadier general in the Civil War. Polk's ministry reminds us that our diocese is the result of Christians' commitment to mission and evangelism.

After Texas joined the United States, George Washington Freeman followed Polk as Missionary Bishop of the Southwest, traveling over Arkansas, "the Indian Territory" (Oklahoma) and the new state of Texas. Freeman ordained the first priest in Texas, worked to encourage the few struggling congregations and, in 1849, presided over the formation of the Diocese of Texas. The new diocese had a grand total of six parishes, four of which were named Christ Church—Matagorda, Houston, San Augustine and Nacogdoches—plus Trinity in Galveston and St. John's, Brazoria. Almost a decade had passed before the Diocese of Texas was strong enough to support the work of a bishop of its own.

I. **Alexander Gregg** was the first elected bishop of the Diocese of Texas in 1859. The Diocese then covered the entire state of Texas. As Texas was still much of a wild frontier, traveling through the Diocese meant dodging Comanche and bandits. Gregg presided through the difficult days of the Civil War and Reconstruction, and gave leadership as Texas became a more settled community. He was a supporter of the separation of the South from the North and he owned slaves. He once disciplined a priest for preaching against slavery. Yet when the war was over, he was the first to pay his fine and to begin to support Reconstruction.

Texas prospered and the number of churches grew from six to sixty, and in 1874, toward the end of his episcopate, Gregg presided over the division of the Diocese of Texas into three dioceses—two new missionary districts of West Texas and one of North Texas. The Diocese of Texas retained the name of the original diocese with our present boundaries. Today there are a total of six dioceses in the state: Texas, West Texas, Dallas, Fort Worth, Northwest Texas and the Rio Grande (which includes part of New Mexico).

II. **George Herbert Kinsolving** was elected bishop coadjutor to succeed Gregg, which he did in 1893 upon Gregg's death, and served until his own death in 1928. "Texas" George Kinsolving's tenure included the disastrous Galveston hurricane that leveled Texas' most elegant city and the gusher at Spindletop that brought in the age of big oil. The parishes and missions of the Diocese continued to set down roots, during a time of steady but gradual growth. People who were confirmed by Kinsolving spoke of the physical presence and sheer size of the


man, remembering how his hands entirely covered the heads of those he was confirming. In Kinsolving's era, the work of a bishop was still limited to supervising the preparation of those being ordained, confirmation visitations, chairing annual meetings and dealing with occasional crises in clergy leadership. The Bishop had one part-time secretary. Like Gregg before him, Kinsolving struggled to stretch the meager financial resources of a mostly rural diocese of small parishes in order to support and grow the Church's mission.

Perhaps the most farsighted developments happened on the campuses of Texas' new universities, the work of the Rev. Harris Masterson. He founded Episcopal "chapels" at the gates of both the University of Texas in Austin and Rice University in Houston, which evolved into the parishes of All Saints', Austin, and Palmer Memorial Church, Houston, and began the tradition of aggressive college ministry in the Diocese. Kinsolving Hall, on the campus of the University of Texas, is named for the Bishop, and Autry House at Rice University became the second "diocesan institution," devoted to campus work.

Kinsolving was known across The Episcopal Church for his missionary preaching and support of the mission to African-Americans. Like most bishops and clergy of his day, Kinsolving died in office. Only in the time of his successor would the establishment of the Church Pension Fund permit the luxury of retirement; for the last decade of his life, Kinsolving's bishop coadjutor was the energizing force in the Diocese.

III. Clinton Simon Quin was, for generations of Texans, simply "The Bishop," a state-wide celebrity known far beyond the community of the Church. Quin had distinguished himself as a dynamic rector of Trinity, Houston, from which he was elected as Kinsolving's coadjutor in 1918. At 35, he was the youngest bishop in the Episcopal Church and he remains the youngest Bishop of Texas ever. In 1928 he became the third Bishop of Texas and served until 1955. His tenure saw the contrasts of the Texas oil boom, the Great Depression and the Second World War. He was bishop to a church that knew both crisis and immense prosperity. During his first decade as bishop, more than a dozen new missions were planted and another dozen missions became self-sustaining parishes. Quin established many of the customs and organizations the Diocese now takes for granted: annual clergy conferences, Daughters of the King, and an endowment program that became the Quin Foundation. He also brought the first chapter of Alcoholics Anonymous to the state.

Quin was most noted for his commitment to youth. He founded a diocesan Young People's Service League from which our contemporary youth work has evolved. He recruited generations of native Texans to be ordained clergy, many serving into the 1990s, including Tom and Charles Sumners, longtime rectors of St. John the Divine, Houston, and St. David's, Austin; and Tom Bagby, founder of both St. James', Houston, and St. Martin's, Houston, now the largest congregation in the United States. One of Quin's most influential accomplishments for the Diocese was his energetic support of Camp Allen, with a vision of all that youth camping would mean to the future. His greatest gift to the Diocese and to the people who live within its borders was the project of his last years: St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital, later St. Luke's Episcopal Health System. The June 2013 sale of the Health System for more than \$1 billion established one of the country's









most well-financed foundations dedicated to research and improving health for the underserved within the Diocese's 57 counties. The sale also secured the 60-year legacy that Quin founded with an additional guarantee of one billion dollars to improve and update the current St. Luke's Hospital by the purchaser, Catholic Health Initiatives.

Quin governed the Diocese with a firm, indeed commanding hand, but he retained the affection and loyalty of the clergy whom he treated as "his boys" with the mix of authority and support that such paternalism implies. He was immensely popular with the laity as pastor and friend to generations of families.

IV. **John Elbridge Hines** was consecrated bishop coadjutor in 1945, becoming the fourth Bishop of Texas in 1956, upon Quin's retirement. Hines laid out an ambitious program for the Diocese, emphasizing education and social work. He integrated the Diocese's summer camping program in the early years of the Civil Rights movement, established a diocesan policy of integrated Episcopal day schools and called for the racial integration of all other diocesan institutions. Like Quin, Hines was elected young, while serving as rector of Christ Church Cathedral, Houston. Hines is remembered as an eloquent and powerful preacher. His episcopate saw the dramatic postwar expansion of the economy, the rise of the suburbs and decline of small towns, and the dramatic first decade of the Civil Rights era across the South.

As bishop, Hines believed in prophetic leadership, often stepping out ahead of public opinion on social issues, and extending the work of the Church to the limits of its resources. He planted missions in the new suburbs of Houston and Austin and in other growth areas, many of which are now greater parishes of the Diocese. Fifty new churches were planted during his time as bishop.

Hines founded Seminary of the Southwest in Austin, a departure from the exclusively Virginia Seminary tradition for diocesan clergy during Quin's years. He also founded St. Stephen's Episcopal School in Austin and generously supported college ministry on all major campuses in the Diocese. He supported the start of St. James House, a retirement community in Baytown, and St. Vincent's House, a social service agency in Galveston.

Hines found the demands of travel and growing number of parishes required more time and energy than any one bishop could supply, so he was the first diocesan bishop to request the assistance of bishops suffragan. Texas has had a ministry of either suffragan or "assisting" bishops since Hines' tenure.

In 1964, the larger Episcopal Church elected Hines to become Presiding Bishop at the Church's triennial General Convention, where he continued his ministry of prophetic preaching and social vision through the turbulent Vietnam era.

III. V. J. Milton Richardson was consecrated fifth Bishop of Texas in 1965. He had come to the Diocese from Atlanta, and was Dean of Christ Church Cathedral at the time of his election. Like Hines, he was a great preacher, noted for a thoughtful and restrained style, yet emotionally moving. His priority was to pay the debts of the Diocese and its institutions, which he saw as a threat to the health of the Diocese.

Richardson was bishop during a decade of conflict and crisis for the nation

and in The Episcopal Church. He led the Diocese through the dramatic changes of the late sixties and seventies, which included the assassinations of John and Robert Kennedy, Martin Luther King and Medgar Evers; the Vietnam War; innercity riots; soaring drug use; and Richard Nixon's resignation. These years saw the beginning of the decline of the Protestant establishment nationally, growth of the first mega churches, charismatic renewal and the beginnings of an "evangelical awakening," all barely noticed at the time, but a challenge to the Church in the future. Additionally, during Richardson's time in office, there were challenges of the modern liturgical movement with the introduction of the 1979 Prayer Book and the debate over women's ordination.

Even under Hines, life in the Episcopal Church had not much changed from the times of Samuel Seabury, consecrated in 1784 as the Episcopal Church's first bishop. *The Book of Common Prayer* remained the foundation of identity and uniformity. General Conventions, diocesan councils and parish life were all conducted on an intimate scale, and a sedate Anglican tone persisted.

Richardson had to cope with financial instability and indebtedness of most diocesan institutions, which approached a crisis point at the time of his succession. He struggled to stabilize the life of the Diocese and worked to heal much unhappiness with positions adopted by the Presiding Bishop and General Convention. He maintained a strong commitment to support fully our obligations to The Episcopal Church. Although he was instinctively conservative in both his personal style and churchmanship, he tolerated the development of Houston's Church of the Redeemer as a national center of charismatic renewal and liturgical innovation. Also, Richardson worked on the introduction of the Cursillo movement into the mainstream of diocesan life and encouraged the first steps toward the ordination of women. He was a firm supporter of clergy in conflict situations and famously generous to clergy families in any crisis.

Richardson led with clear purpose and a strong hand. During a period of conflict in the wider Episcopal Church, the Diocese of Texas was a rare oasis of calm under his leadership. He restored the financial soundness of diocesan administration, saved St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital as a solvent institution of the Diocese, raised up a new generation of clergy and continued to plant missions in expanding urban areas. He launched the first systematic campaign to fund diocesan work and led the national board of the Church Pension Fund to reorganize, which was a lasting gift to all clergy of the American Church.

His most visible work was to relocate Camp Allen nearer the center of the Diocese and more accessible to most of the churches. He licensed the first woman priest to serve in the diocese—the Rev. Helen Havens. He became the first Diocese of Texas bishop to ordain a woman priest, when on June 8, 1979, he ordained the Rev. Elizabeth Simmons Masquelette.

His life was cut short by illness and he died in 1980 while serving as bishop. Richardson is remembered for his majestic presence at the altar, as a grand preacher and as the "second founder" of Camp Allen.

VI. **Maurice "Ben" Benitez** succeeded Richardson as sixth Bishop of Texas in 1980. He had served in Florida and San Antonio, and as rector of St. John the Divine, Houston, where he was serving when elected. He was of the post-World War II generation and searched for new ways to grow the Church. Benitez

coped with the recession in the late 1980s, the collapse of the oil business and the resulting banking crisis, during which one flourishing suburban parish had 11 of its 15 vestry members either declare bankruptcy or move away, an example typical of many parishes in the Diocese.

Benitez laid the foundations for Spanish-speaking ministry in the Diocese, opening the first Hispanic missions, recruiting Spanish-speaking clergy and appointing the first Hispanic missioner for the Diocese. He also managed a change in leadership at several parishes in neighborhoods that had shifted to a Spanish-speaking population. He responded to the increasing Hispanic populations' needs with the establishment of El Buen Samaritano, a social service agency in Austin.

Benitez was widely regarded as a friend of the popular renewal movement and supported Faith Alive and Cursillo for congregations in the Diocese. Early in his episcopacy, he conducted a Venture in Mission campaign, a concept of The Episcopal Church, to support domestic and world mission of the Church. Benitez founded Episcopal High School in Houston and moved a growing diocesan staff to larger quarters in Houston. Benitez provided strong leadership in the nascent years of the Episcopal Foundation and helped guide the Quin Foundation to more than double its value during his tenure. During those years, Camp Allen added a third campsite, a lake and the outdoor chapel.

VII. **Claude E. Payne** was consecrated bishop in 1993, succeeding Benitez as seventh Bishop of Texas in 1995. Originally ordained in West Texas, Payne served as rector of St. Mark's, Beaumont, and St. Martin's, Houston. Educated as an engineer, his ministry as bishop focused on an orderly and systematic reorganization of the Diocese, and in raising the levels of commitment and enthusiasm of both clergy and laity for the mission of the Church. His episcopate was a time of steady growth for the Diocese as a whole. The theme of his ministry highlighted moving congregations from a "maintenance" to "mission" mindset, and he held "miraculous expectations" for these goals, which he reinforced in every sermon and address.

Payne instituted a system of funding mission work that encouraged more parish involvement and commitment to support outreach and ministry. He reorganized diocesan finances to create resources for new mission work and initiated church plants with stronger diocesan support and oversight. Payne began to use non-stipendiary, trained "lay vicars" to support mission churches in areas where declining populations made it difficult for congregations to pay full-time clergy.

As chair of the board of St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital, Payne directed the financial reorganization of the hospital and the establishment of the St. Luke's Health Charity Fund for outreach and human service in the Diocese. The Health Charities made more than \$80 million in grants in its 15-year history.

Payne expanded facilities of Camp Allen substantially, rebuilding the conference center, adding an 80-acre lake, private cabins, and a 1,500-seat chapel with conference facilities. He also hired a professional executive to run the camp and conference center. He can be counted as the "third founder" of Camp Allen, along with Quin and Richardson.

Payne's example serves as a model for many bishops in how to restructure and renew their own dioceses. He was known nationally in the life of the Church and internationally in the Anglican Communion for his sense of vision and purpose and as a calm voice during a time of increasing disharmony in the Church. He served

beyond the Diocese as a personal consultant to the Archbishop of Canterbury and founded the Compass Rose Society, to help support the work of the Anglican Communion Office and ministry around the globe.

In his retirement he continues to seek the best and brightest young clergy, inviting them to the gathering of leaders, which meets several times annually to share least practices and network

VIII. **Don A. Wimberly** became widely known throughout the Diocese while serving as an assistant bishop in East Texas. He had previously served as Bishop of Lexington and was elected to succeed Payne as coadjutor. He became the eighth Bishop of Texas in 2003. Wimberly oversaw expansion of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System's several suburban hospitals. He instituted the ministry of the diaconate and oversaw formation of the Iona Center—a school without walls—which was established to provide education for bi-vocational clergy and deacons and to serve as a continuing education program for the new clergy of the Diocese.

Wimberly continued the work begun by Payne in Safe Church ministries to provide training for clergy and laity to guard against sexual abuse, harassment and exploitation for all of God's children.

During Wimberly's tenure, additional ministry positions in congregational development, multicultural ministries and mission funding were added to the diocesan staff. Two suffragan elections were held to place bishops in the Austin and Tyler regions of the Diocese. Wimberly built a new Diocesan Center in Downtown Houston opposite Christ Church Cathedral and returned the bishop's office nearer its original location.

As one of the three senior bishops in the House of Bishops, Wimberly worked diligently to try to bring about a sense of reconciliation in the midst of escalating distrust within the Anglican Communion and The Episcopal Church over the blessing of same-gender couples. Both he and Payne managed to make unity in the Diocese of Texas a priority when many parishes were leaving The Episcopal Church over the issue of homosexuality and marriage, even though several clergy and partial congregations in the Diocese did vacate their churches during this time.

PRESENT

IX. Charles Andrew (Andy) Doyle was elected bishop coadjutor and consecrated in 2008 and seated as the ninth Bishop of Texas on June 7, 2009, at Christ Church Cathedral, Houston, following Wimberly's retirement.

Born in 1966 in Carbondale, Illinois, and raised in Houston, Doyle served five years as Wimberly's canon to the ordinary prior to his election as bishop. Doyle holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the University of North Texas and served at St. Stephen's Episcopal School, Austin, before receiving a Master in Divinity from Virginia Theological Seminary. He was ordained deacon in 1995 and priest the following year. He was awarded a Doctor of Divinity from VTS and the University of the South's School of Theology in Sewanee, Tennessee. He served at Christ

Church, Temple, and St. Francis, College Station, prior to his appointment as canon.

Doyle, 47, is tech savvy and actively engages in using social media to form relationships within and beyond the Church. He speaks Spanish and is heavily invested in immigration reform as Houston and the rest of the country continue to become more diverse. Doyle's dynamic leadership has helped attract younger clergy to the Diocese. His strong teaching and preaching skills have helped to identify leadership dedicated to creative ministry beyond the church campus and to growth, both in numbers and spiritual depth.

Immediately following his election as bishop, Doyle reached out to church members and clergy through 14 town hall meetings, online surveys and innumerable personal encounters to enhance his interactive and responsive leadership style. He has continued to encourage new and talented members to make themselves available to serve the larger Church through boards or ministry initiatives, while encouraging clergy to try new methods of reaching into the community.


Doyle's white paper, *Unity in Mission*, helped move the Diocese's congregations through the decision of the Church's General Convention in 2012 to allow blessings of same-gender couples. The plan allowed some churches to offer blessings while not forcing any congregations who were opposed, to do so. The plan has been studied across The Episcopal Church and in places like South Africa, New Zealand, and Canada as a beginning point for discussions where the rest of the Church addresses similar issues around marriage and sexuality.


Following Hurricane Ike, on the eve of his ordination to the episcopate, Bishop Doyle led the Diocese in a massive rebuilding project, which enabled the restoration of more than 90 homes in Galveston. When wild fires struck the town of Bastrop, the Diocese responded similarly, helping the city to recover. Because of the expertise gained through these disaster relief efforts, the Diocese now supports recovery ministries across the country.

Episcopal High School expanded facilities, raising more than \$25 million during the first phase of its capital funds campaign, which included a new academic building. A second phase is underway. Camp Allen, too, engaged in a \$4 million capital campaign that helped build a health center and a new ropes course, contributed to other property improvements and added to the Camp's endowment.

The 2013 sale of St. Luke's Health System established the Episcopal Health Foundation (\$1 billion+) and the Great Commission Foundation (\$100 million). The Health Foundation will allow the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Texas to provide a diversity of health care initiatives to the underserved throughout the Diocese's 57 counties, and the Great Commission Foundation will support new church plants. Today, Doyle chairs five foundations for the Diocese: Episcopal Health Foundation, The Great Commission Foundation, The Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Church Corporation and The Bishop Quin Foundation.

Locally, under Doyle's leadership, the Missionary (voluntary) and Assessment (required) Budgets of the Diocese were unified, which resulted in more money remaining at the congregational level. The formula for assessments remains unchanged, although the top bracket has been lowered to 10 percent instead of





17 percent. The lowest bracket is at six percent and covers churches that have an income of less than \$200,000. The Missionary Budget, or "Asking," helped to support cooperative outreach; the Assessment covered operations and insurance. Nearly \$5 million in health insurance premiums has been underwritten by a grant from the new Episcopal Health Foundation, which further helps to reduce the budget.

At the same time, diocesan giving to The Episcopal Church continues to increase, as does the Diocese's support of programs and ministries throughout the Anglican Communion.

Doyle has a global presence through his association with the Compass Rose Society (founded by Bishop Claude E. Payne), which supports the work of the Anglican Communion and is now officed in the Houston Diocesan Center. Doyle is president-elect of the group. He is active nationally through his long association with General Convention as both an elected deputy and as a bishop. He currently serves on the special task force to reimagine the workings of the Episcopal Church to prepare it for mission in the 21st century.

TWO BISHOPS SUFFRAGAN

Dena A. Harrison became the ninth bishop suffragan of the Diocese of Texas in 2006. She holds a Bachelor of Business Administration degree from The University of Texas at Austin, and Master and Doctor of Divinity degrees from the Seminary of the Southwest. A former commercial mortgage broker, Harrison's ordained ministry includes service as assistant rector of All Saints', Austin; rector of St. James', La Grange, and St. James the Apostle, Conroe. Each of these congregations experienced significant growth and development during her tenure. As Canon to the Ordinary and then Archdeacon of the Diocese of Texas, Harrison ushered in the Safeguarding God's Children training program throughout the Diocese and began the development of parish processes for calling new clergy.

As executive for the central region of the Diocese, she has oversight of churches in the Austin, Northwest, Central and Southwest convocations and oversees the Commission on Ministry and World Mission Board. Nationally, Harrison serves as a board member of Episcopal Relief and Development and as a member of the Disciplinary Board for Bishops. In the Diocese, she serves as board chair for Seminary of the Southwest, St. Stephen's Episcopal School and El Buen Samaritano in Austin.

During her time as chair at St. Stephen's, the campus' center has been redeveloped with a dormitory, faculty residences, student center and dining hall. Harrison led the Seminary of the Southwest in a restructuring its board and a \$15.9

million capital campaign and under her leadership El Buen Samaritano has doubled in size, serving the health and wellness needs of the uninsured and underserved in the Austin area. Harrison also served as chair of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System for five years, through the sale of the system in June 2013.

In partnership with the Seminary of the Southwest and the Iona School for Ministry, Harrison leads the development of the Iona Initiative, which provides education and formation for deacons and bi-vocational priests at the local level. This program is now in use in twelve dioceses around The Episcopal Church. As Executive for Ministry, she is devoted to the formation, development and support of leaders for the Church's mission.

Jeff W. Fisher serves as the regional bishop of the east region of the Diocese. He was elected bishop suffragan and consecrated in 2012. In addition to his visitations to parishes and missions, Fisher serves as executive for pastoral ministries, including clergy and their families. He serves on numerous boards and institutions, including the Episcopal Church Women, Daughters of the King, Altar Guild, the Little Church Club, All Saints' Episcopal School in Tyler, St. Vincent's House in Galveston and St. James House, the diocesan retirement community in Baytown.

Fisher is known for his compelling preaching, his focus on evangelism and his encouragement of the laity. He teaches homiletics at the Iona School for Ministry. A graduate of The University of Texas, Austin, Fisher was previously CFO for Hand Benefits & Trust, Inc., Houston. He received a Master in Divinity in 2004 and was awarded a Doctor of Divinity in 2013, both from Virginia Theological Seminary. Ordained in 2004, Fisher served as curate at St. Mary's, Cypress, before being called as rector at St. Alban's, Waco, where he ushered in a time of unprecedented growth.



ORGANIZATION OVERVIEW




ORGANIZATION AND BUDGET

The Diocese of Texas is organized into 10 deaneries or convocations, each with a clergy representative named as dean. Additionally, the two bishops suffragan are responsible for different geographic areas of the Diocese with the diocesan bishop having ultimate oversight of the entire Diocese. This is roughly delineated into Northeast and East/Central and Houston/South areas of the Diocese. There are 150 congregations within the Diocese, 16 college ministries, five foundations, nine institutions and 67 schools.

Budget changes approved by the Executive Board in September 2013 resulted in a unified budget, organized around outreach, evangelism, formation, congregational development and administration. The diocesan mission statement emphasizes unity as One Church, a call to engage in ministry beyond the congregations and for members to be witnesses of the love of Christ. All the diocesan core values support the call to be a missionary diocese.

"Mission Statement—We are One Church, reconciled by Jesus Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, called by God through worship, witness and ministry, building the kingdom of God together.

Our core values are grounded in our response to the Baptismal Covenant and Great Commission. They include the aforementioned missionary emphasis, educating all to be effective agents of transformation, meeting human needs in our communities, taking responsible care of our abundant resources, and doing all this with a standard of excellence 'driven by miraculous expectation.' Further, we strive to reach youth and young adults and to increase our multicultural dimension to better reflect the communities in which we live and serve."



FOUNDATIONS

The Diocese of Texas has five foundations that help support the ministry of the Church.

The Episcopal Foundation of Texas was established with a gift from the H. H. Coffield estate for the support of institutions of the Diocese and for grants, loans or advances to the Bishop Quin Foundation. These include: Camp Allen; St. James House, Baytown; St. Vincent's House, Galveston; El Buen Samaritano, Austin; Bishop Quin Foundation; St. Stephen's Episcopal School, Austin; and Seminary of the Southwest, Austin. Since 1982, the Diocese has received nearly \$35 million from the Coffield estate. The Episcopal Foundation has given away more than \$50 million in grants and retains a corpus of more than \$50 million. The Foundation annually grants a tithe gift outside of the Diocese.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas, commonly known as the **Church Corporation**, holds title to the properties of the Diocese. The Church Corporation reviews proposals from parishes and other diocesan entities for capital improvements, administers funds and properties given to the Diocese, and acts as a trustee for funds for the use and benefit of the churches in the Diocese. Cash and property assets total \$300 million dollars.

The Bishop Quin Foundation, established in 1943 to honor Bishop Clinton S. Quin and valued at more than \$34 million, focuses on new development grants for parishes that are redeveloping and restarting churches to help build the Church. In addition to making loans, the Bishop Quin Foundation also supports sabbatical grants for clergy, curate placement grants and Strategic Mission Grants to parishes in collaboration with the Episcopal Foundation of Texas.

The Episcopal Health Foundation was funded in 2013 with the proceeds from the sale of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System. The corpus of the foundation is more than \$1 billion, providing the opportunity to grant more than \$30–35 million in health initiatives annually. The goal of the Foundation will be to help the Church serve its communities in the 57-county Diocese through health ministries, frequently in collaboration with other groups. In addition, EHF will provide funding for research to help guide the grants that are made.

The Great Commission Foundation, founded with a tithe from the sale of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System, was established to fund new church starts. With a corpus of more than \$110 million the Foundation will focus on church planting, purchase of real estate and all new church initiatives.

Within the Episcopal Health Foundation and the Great Commission Fund, there are service and evangelism. At times, all of the foundations work in cooperation to maximize their support of ministries of the Diocese in order to amplify their impact.

LOCAL GOVERNANCE

The Diocese is governed by the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, as well as a diocesan Constitution and Canons. Authority for the Church in the Diocese of Texas rests with the Bishop, annual Council of clergy and elected delegates and the Standing Committee.

Each year, the Diocese gathers all clergy and lay delegates from each congregation to conduct the business of the Diocese. During a two-day meeting, **Diocesan Council** reviews the major activities that have occurred in the Diocese; welcomes new parishes into the Diocese and votes on the diocesan budget, amendments to the diocesan Constitution and Canons; considers resolutions; and elects representatives to boards and commissions within the Diocese and for service at Provincial Synod and General Convention. A highlight of each Council is the address given by the Bishop. The Diocese may also be called into special session for other special business such as the election of a bishop.

The Executive Board, whose 15 members are elected at Council, meets during the year to carry out the work of Council between annual meetings and to propose a budget and other resolutions to the forthcoming Council.


The Standing Committee has six members who are also elected at Council. The Standing Committee provides the ecclesiastical authority for all purposes in the administration of the Diocese in the absence of the Bishop. It also serves as an advisor to the Bishop when required by canon and at the Bishop's request.

GOVERNANCE NATIONALLY

General Convention is the governing body of The Episcopal Church that meets every three years. The Convention is a bicameral legislature with the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops. Deputies and bishops representing each diocese carry out the work at Convention. During its triennial meeting deputies and bishops consider a wide range of important matters facing the Church. **Executive Council**—elected from deputies and bishops at General Convention—meets regularly to carry out the business of General Convention between triennial meetings.












HOW OUR DIOCESE FUNCTIONS

CHRISTIAN FORMATION

There has been a tremendous shift in the past five years in the use of the term "formation." The word refers to more than "Sunday school." It is more than programs of "Christian education." In broader terms, "formation" is a lifelong process of learning, change, growth and spiritual transformation that God longs for in God's people. Formation is about people engaging in this lifelong process of personal transformation through worship, study, service and prayer. It is about growing in the knowledge and love of Jesus Christ and about growing in Episcopal identity.

There is no "formation in a box" or magic bullet that the Diocese can provide to parishes. The diocesan formation team's purpose is to come alongside the people of the Diocese and serve them in such a way that each parish, person and diocesan entity is encouraged to articulate a vision for discipleship that fits their unique context and that each is given the practical tools they need to live into their vision. The diocesan staff provides encouragement and coaching as opposed to "study in a box." The diocesan formation team helps to connect people and congregations with creative resources and best practices to one another.

The formation team holds two values in tension in this work: proactive presence and availability. On the one hand, every member of the formation team travels extensively throughout the Diocese to listen, learn, connect and teach, as well as to respond to the needs and concerns of congregations and leaders. The team is available to work on collaborative initiatives with the diocesan staff and is available to church members, as it is they who work on the front lines of ministry. This includes specific work towards multicultural ministry, youth, young adults and older adults in addition to ongoing work of the formation team.













SERVICE

The Diocese's current approach to service and outreach is to encourage and continue with traditional ministries like food pantries, feeding the homeless, support of Meals on Wheels, eldercare ministries and many other outreach ministries. With the unified budget in 2013, a number of congregations realized increased funding at their local level due to lower assessments. They used these monies to begin new outreach ministries or to enhance existing outreach. More local mission work now focuses on strategically discerning a particular need or needs in the local communities and responding to that need. The diaconate will be instrumental in encouraging this approach more broadly. Deacons are being trained in community organizing techniques that enable them to both do and teach others this work of assessment and discernment. In this way, when a community need arises, people will look to the Church for help in addressing/mediating/solving community issues and providing needed services.


EVANGELISM

Evangelism is primarily grassroots ministry. The work of sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ is foundational to the vitality and transformation of individuals and congregations. It is integral to the missionary emphasis of the Diocese and undergirds all of our work. The Diocese encourages congregations and provides resources to support the work of evangelism.

The Newcomer Ministry Project—INVITE, WELCOME, CONNECT—was developed in 2011 to provide training and resources for congregations. It has helped to establish networks for individuals who oversee evangelism in their respective congregations. This project has a three-prong approach of invitation, welcome and connection, which comprehensively addresses not only evangelism, but how congregations welcome and incorporate new persons into the life of the Church. Coaches have been trained and materials created to assist churches with assessment and development of these evangelism efforts. There has been measurable growth and retention of visitors where the ministry has been put into place, especially in churches that have hired newcomer ministry coordinators. The Strategic Mission Grant Committee of the Diocese helps support churches financially to assist these evangelism efforts.

There are a number of additional resources offered by the Diocese to encourage evangelism. Some of them include THE Conference—held annually—which features outstanding evangelism speakers; Invitation Sunday, an appointed Sunday in September to encourage people in the pews to invite someone they know to church; the Greenfield Commission, a group of diocesan clergy who mentor one another to encourage evangelism; and Sharing Faith Dinners, a diocesan event held one night a year where persons share a meal and their personal stories of faith in homes and churches throughout the Diocese. In 2014, the Dioceses of West Texas, Northwest Texas, Ft. Worth and North Carolina will join the Diocese of Texas for the Sharing Faith evening. Other resources include the LOGOS Project, a series of 15-minute videos by authors and experts in various church fields, which can be used by individuals or in groups for educational purposes. Small group questions are included with each video.

Diocesan professionals make themselves available throughout the Diocese to answer needs of churches, schools and institutions. Each department provides extensive consultation and resources for every facet of congregational life including: communications strategy, website development, branding and media training, formation assessment and training, safe church training, development and investment assistance, outreach and emergency response as well as congregational development.



LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

One of the core values of the Diocese is "Education and Leadership," forming disciples, both lay and clergy, to be effective agents of transformation. There is an expectation that clergy in the Diocese of Texas will take advantage of the multiple formative opportunities available to them for support and education.


Immediately upon ordination, seminary-trained clergy in the Diocese participate in five overnight sessions at Camp Allen called Curate Camp, to help build a close-knit community of fellow clergy, to expose them to relevant topics and gifted teachers, and to provide a safe place for sharing challenges and peer learning.

The Redevelopers—a group of clergy who are rectors and vicars in churches that are re-starting, or are in decline or have been through splits or other traumatic events—meet five times a year for mutual support, networking and congregational development education. Other regular meetings for deacons and for clergy who are first-time rectors present this leadership with effective tools and stimulating speakers for their continuing education. All clergy have access to regional meetings that are professionally facilitated to help them maximize their time together.

Finally, the Diocese has an outstanding Clergy Conference that draws a cadre of top speakers to lead plenaries, teach seminars and hold workshops for this annual three-day gathering in October to provide the most robust continuing education and opportunity for interaction among clergy

The lona School for Ministry educates, forms and trains bi-vocational clergy and diaconate candidates. Classes meet monthly, 10 times annually for three years at Camp Allen. Fieldwork is integrated throughout the curriculum and is taught by a highly qualified faculty. The diaconate track focuses on human-needs ministries, primarily outside the context of a congregation. The bi-vocational priesthood track focuses on small, family-sized congregational leadership and includes fieldwork as the head of a congregation. The School has attracted students from five additional dioceses and works closely with the Executive for Ministry and Commission on Ministry in the formation and evaluation of students. The Diocese subsidizes the cost of fuition.

The School was the vision of Bishop Don Wimberly in 2003, and has graduated 34 priests, 31 deacons and one lay professional, who are all serving in active ministry. Twenty-seven students are currently enrolled.







DIOCESAN INSTITUTIONS

El Buen Samaritano Episcopal Mission (El Buen) provides health-care, education and economic-stability services to families in Central Texas. In 2012, El Buen served more than 12,000 individuals. The Wallace Mallory Clinic saw 6,508 patients, referred 299 patients to an Integrated Behavioral Health program and 445 to El Buen's Nutrition Counseling Program. A total of 1,387 individuals went through the Adult Education Program, and the food pantry left its mark with more than 5,000 visits.

St. Vincent's began in 1954 as a small outreach ministry of St. Augustine of Hippo Episcopal Church in Galveston to low-income youth and residents. Today, St. Vincent's is an urban mission of the Diocese and a recognized Jubilee Ministry serving the vulnerable and at-risk populations of Galveston through an affordable day care and preschool that encourages strong literacy preparation and cultural enrichment. St. Vincent's free clinic and food pantry provide food and services to their underserved neighbors, including emergency assistance and referrals, transportation services and Meals on Wheels.

St. James House was founded in 1960 to provide a home for senior adults of all faiths. Today, St. James offers full nursing care and rehabilitation services to more than 100 residents. Additionally, St. James House includes a 40-unit independent living apartment complex on its 10-acre campus. St. James House is 30 minutes east of downtown Houston, in Baytown.

Camp Allen's camping program began in 1921 at the summer home of Rosa Allen on Sylvan Beach, in La Porte, and grew rapidly. Allen's financial support helped purchase a 35-acre tract on Trinity Bay, which ultimately provided a camping experience for more than 10,000 campers, but industrial development in the area forced the camp to relocate in 1968. Today, Camp Allen sits on more than 1,000 acres near Navasota, an hour northwest of Houston, in a more central part of the Diocese. It is a year-round facility that annually welcomes more than 50,000 guests.

The Camp and Conference Center, located in a beautiful pine forest with rolling hills and two lakes, offer facilities for both faith-based and corporate meetings. Three campsites host more than 1,800 summer campers, 8–18 years of age, each summer in addition to church groups during the year. Cabins and a small conference center offer additional meeting and retreat facilities. An experienced management team welcomes guests with a passion for service and Christian hospitality, making Camp Allen a leader in the camp, conference and retreat center ministry.


Seminary of the Southwest in Austin forms creative leaders for the mission fields of the changing world. SSW offers a rich intellectual environment and stimulating and challenging community for learning and formation. The Very Rev. Cynthia Briggs Kittredge, ThD, is the eighth dean and president of this institution, the second youngest Episcopal seminary, founded in 1952.

The Seminary provides excellent residential formation for ordained ministry, offers master's degrees to a range of lay professionals in a range of faith traditions, and serves the Church through innovative models for local formation and ongoing training.

A total of 102 students enrolled at Seminary of the Southwest in Fall 2013. The 37 ordination track students are from 21 dioceses. A Hispanic Church Studies concentration is available to Master of Divinity students who plan a ministry with
















Spanish-speaking and bilingual congregations. Sixty percent of students receive financial aid through the Seminary's scholarship aid and work programs. The average scholarship is \$7,533 annually. Graduates of SSW do God's work in parishes, dioceses, hospitals, nonprofit organizations and in the armed forces and beyond. More than 1,200 graduates serve in 23 countries around the world. Eighteen are bishops in the Episcopal Church and in the Anglican Communion.

University of the South, Sewanee, TN The bishops who founded the University of the South included theological education as an essential part of their dream for a great university. The first priest from Sewanee was ordained in 1872, and by 1878, the Episcopal Church formally opened a seminary at the University of the South. It is the only university in the country owned and governed by dioceses of the Episcopal Church (specifically the 28 dioceses of the southeastern United States). With historic roots in the Anglican ecclesiastical and academic traditions, Sewanee welcomes people of all faiths and offers a lively environment for active worship in the Episcopal tradition.

St. Stephen's Episcopal School in Austin broke ground in 1949, and today, the dedicated faculty and staff are tenacious and constant in their commitment to providing an academically challenging experience for students, within the context of a balanced program in academics, athletics and the arts. The diverse student body of 685 students comes from more than 27 Texas cities, five states and 15 countries, including Thailand, China, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Saudi Arabia, Mexico and Korea. St. Stephens has both day and boarding students, 75 full-time faculty, 40 of whom are residential. The school welcomes students, faculty and staff from many religious backgrounds and practices, and is a member of the National Association of Episcopal Schools (NAES).


The William Temple Episcopal Center, Galveston, or "Willie T's" as it is known on the Island, is a ministry to UTMB's students and staff as well as to students of Texas A&M's Galveston campus. It is located on the campus of Trinity Episcopal Church. The Center hosts weekly meals for students and provides a safe, comfortable space to study and recreate. Willie T's also provides students with opportunities to engage in theological reflection, helping to connect future vocations in the healing arts with greater theological understanding. At present, opportunities include a bimonthly theological discussion called Theology on Tap at the a local coffee house and the sanctuary of Trinity Church, which is made available for contemplative prayer.



PARTNERSHIPS

Southern Malawi, Costa Rica and North Dakota The formal relationship between the Diocese of Texas and Southern Malawi, established in 2010, reflects the long relationship that Texas enjoy with Bishop James Tengatenga, former Bishop of Southern Malawi. Tengatenga, president of the Anglican Consultative Council, attended and graduated from Seminary of the Southwest 25 years ago as a result of a previous diocesan partnership. The current partnership is a mutually beneficial relationship in which both dioceses gain from a deeper understanding of one another through the support of seminarians, pilgrimages and programs in churches throughout each diocese.

Diocesan Council approved formal partnership with the dioceses of North Dakota and Costa Rica at its meeting February 8, 2014. Several inagural mission trips to these areas are now being planned.



ASSESSMENT OF LAST STRATEGIC PLANNING EFFORTS

(2009-2013)

PURPOSE

In November 2013, the diocesan staff participated in an assessment of the 2009 Strategic Plan. The outcome of the assessment gauges progress in areas that were important to the Diocese when the plan was produced. It provides feedback on what worked and didn't work, what was accomplished and what was not accomplished and hopefully, insight from the staff about needs and challenges for the future.

BACKGROUND

In 2009, The Episcopal Diocese of Texas completed work on a five-year strategic plan. A vision document (mission statement, core values, and five vision areas) was approved by the Executive Board, and a set of 24 goals, objectives and expected results with assignments were developed to realize that vision. This plan formed the basis of Bishop Doyle's initial work as the ninth Bishop of the Diocese of Texas.

Bishop Doyle has since articulated this plan in two dimensions: Mission Focus and Vision Pillars. The three mission foci are evangelism, service and stewardship. The three vision pillars are formation, leadership and connection. The Strategic Plan is aligned to these two dimensions, resulting in nine intersections (see goal area grid below). Each goal has an associated mission focus and vision pillar intersection. This assessment is built on that association and attempts to evaluate how well the Diocese has done in the last five years to reach the goals. The primary responsibility for achieving these goals has been given to the ministry staff of the diocesan office.

MISSION FOCUS

EVANGELISM

We will see realized potential based upon our individual missionary context. We are making progress when evangelism and service become the hallmarks of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas. We are making progress on evangelism when we see more people connecting to Jesus Christ through our churches. Average Sunday Attendance will increase in the Diocese of Texas. Baptisms, confirmations and receptions will increase in the Diocese of Texas. We are making progress when the median age of the membership of our church decreases to reflect our mission context. We are making progress when our leadership (clergy and laity) becomes younger and more diverse—reflecting our mission context. We are making progress when existing congregations take the initiative for planting new congregations and when the Diocese has many new communities (fellowships, missions, parishes) annually.

SERVICE

We are making progress when we see our congregations throughout the Diocese reaching out and serving in new ways, improving the lives of their neighbors. We are making progress when our institutions are all evangelism—and service—focused; when we see our institutions show growth in numbers, finances and in community impact; when our institutions manifest in their corporate identity the unique Episcopal witness to Jesus Christ and impart that at every level of their organization.

STEWARDSHIP

We are making progress when all our organizations are involved in healthy stewardship; we have an intentional diocesan-wide planned giving ministry focused on the local congregation or ministry; the work of the foundations of the Diocese is clearly and strategically focused on the diocesan mission; the foundations' own corpora grow and the funding available to the Diocese for strategic mission increases; our congregations and the Diocese, where appropriate, willingly fund and support emerging and new initiatives; we see more churches, more emerging communities, more schools, more clinics, more outreach ministries and centers. We will know we are making progress when we have three new funds: Leadership Development Fund—which builds leadership formation and capacity throughout the congregations of the Diocese; Great Commission Fund—which underwrites and supports new congregations; Clergy Wellness Fund—which supports the health care cost and wellness initiatives for clergy and their families. We will know we are making progress when we grow the capacity of Episcopal Health Charities to be a partner for the service ministries of the Diocese.

VISION PILLARS

Formation We form people to know their vocation and to act out of a centered Anglican perspective, which is uniquely and unabashedly Episcopalian; we form people who know and understand God as Trinity; we form people who know and practice a healthy spiritual life; we form people who invite, welcome and build community; we form people who care about the world in which they live and are integrated into the life of their community; we form people who make a difference.

Leadership We form people to understand their unique leadership vocation within God's creation; we form leaders who are clergy and who are laity; we form leaders to: identify the adaptive challenge and to see a creative opportunity; keep the level of change within a tolerable range for doing transformative work, focus attention on ripening issues and not on anxiety or stress-reducing distractions, and give the work to people—we are a community of the baptized but at a rate where they can participate and be successful, protect the healthy voices of leadership and make a difference in their congregation and in their community.

Connection We are the body of Christ. Therefore, we know that in everything we do we are building up the body of Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit. We connect people with people. We build healthy networks for mission. We build healthy networks that support our individual vocations. We build healthy networks between institutions and congregations. We connect people with resources that change their lives. We connect people with resources that change the communities in which we serve.

RESULTS OF 12 MARKS OF HEALTHY DIOCESAN BEHAVIOR ASSESSMENT (DECEMBER 2013)

The 12 Marks of Healthy Diocesan Behavior were developed by Bishop Andy Doyle during the summer of 2013 in preparation of a re-visioning process for the Diocese of Texas. Participants included diocesan staff, bishops, clergy and members of the various diocesan boards.

The 12 Marks of Healthy Diocesan Behavior are designed for the following purposes:

- · to raise awareness of diocesan leaders as to healthy diocesan behaviors
- to identify areas of diocesan life that are strong and those that may need improving
- to establish a sense of urgency before strategic visioning, planning and goal setting
- to provide an objective way to quickly assess the status quo of diocesanrelated healthy behaviors
- to be used as a quick assessment of a diocese to inform bishops, diocesan institutions, staff and leaders
- to be used as an annual progress report that allow results to be compiled and compared from one year to the next







MISSION, VISION, AND CORE VALUES

The Episcopal Diocese of Texas has not changed its core understanding about who it is or what it is to be about. We are clear. We are one Church reconciled by Jesus Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, called by God to build the kingdom of God together. We passionately hold these values to be true about ourselves. We are missionary; we undertake God's mission of reconciliation in all that we do. Our mission is lived out primarily through evangelism, which is sharing the Good News of Salvation with others, and by serving our neighbor, which is putting the Gospel of words into action. We believe in excellence as an adjective to describe our work in these two areas. We value formation and leadership and believe that we are to disciple others and help them understand their apostolic work of becoming agents of transformation in the world.

In the Diocese of Texas we will continue to bring the abundant resources of our common life in order to strengthen these values. Yet we understand intimately that it is stewardship—our response to God's creative act and forgiveness—that underwrites the daily work we are given to do.

While the Diocese of Texas is made up of diverse followers of God in Christ Jesus, we are One Church within the global Anglican Communion and The Episcopal Church. We embrace all people with a mutual love and respect. This is our vision of who we are and how we are known by the broader church and world.

We are all ages and we are multiethnic. We believe in lifelong formation to come to a deeper understanding of our own relationship with God, growing and learning. And, we are eager to join others on their pilgrimage to God's loving embrace.

The world recognizes us as Jesus' followers because we love one another as Christ loves us, and we work together to bring about the transformation of God's world.

We will continue to use the 12 Marks of a Healthy Diocese to gauge this process in tandem with the specific strategic goals.

In a diocese, just as in a parish, we will know we are making progress when we see results in the geographic areas where our churches are located, specifically, assessed needs that are met within each congregation's individual context. Below you will find each marker for success and a short reflection on where I believe we are in our process, given the feedback and reports over the last five years.

We will know we are making progress when evangelism (the proclamation of the good news of salvation and the unique story of Jesus Christ) and caring for others become the hallmarks of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas.

And, we will know we are making progress when we see more people connecting to Jesus Christ through our churches.

I believe that the Diocese of Texas has a reputation as an exemplary diocese focused on evangelism. We are known for providing resources throughout the church in this area, and we are known for having clergy that are truly outstanding leaders in mission.

However, by the numbers we have not fared as well. We have grown in membership and in average attendance but not consistently. We are now growing in numbers of members and I believe a strategic focus on our "Invite, Welcome and Connect" ministries will increase these numbers. We, in fact, had more baptisms and confirmations in the last two years than we have had in previous years. So in this area we are making a difference and beginning to show the signs of a healthy diocese.

I also believe that new communities and new churches will help to increase the number of people whose lives are touched by the Episcopal Church and the Gospel of Christ.

We will know we are making progress when the median age of the membership of our church decreases to reflecting our mission context.

I believe this is a difficult marker to know given the way in which we report our data. I do believe, by the power of observation only, that we remain a church that, on average, is older than the community that surrounds us. We are also less diverse than our mission context. I do believe that our recent focus in multicultural ministry is helping us make strides in this area.

We will know we are making progress when our leadership (clergy and laity) is younger and more diverse ethnically, reflecting our mission context.

We have increased the age diversity of our clergy in the Diocese. In 2003 less than seven percent of our active clergy were under the age of 40; today, 20 percent are under 40, bringing our total for those under 50 to 45 percent. Women now make up 31 percent of our active clergy, a 72 percent increase from 18 percent in 2003.

The ethnic diversity of our clergy has grown by one percent in the last four years. However, that means only four percent of active clergy would claim a different ethnicity or national background. Although we may be proud of moving our median age towards the target median age, we are not changing the ethnic diversity of our leadership at the same rate. Diverse leadership is an essential key to diverse and thriving multicultural congregations. We have a long way to go on this front, and it will take parish and diocesan leadership to help us reach this goal. As we know from the recent census data, the Diocese of Texas looks something like the graph.

A transformation of our culture will be required to achieve these metrics. This will only come with discernment and prayer.

We will know we are making progress when existing congregations take the initiative for planting new congregations. And, the Diocese will establish many new communities (fellowships, missions, parishes) annually.

In 2014 we will have five congregations doing this work (either in conversation or actually planting). This number needs to multiply exponentially in order to meet the needs of a growing mission field.

- St. Mark's, Houston, Between the Bayous
- Good Shepherd, Austin, East Austin, Trinity site
- All Saint's, Austin, South Congress, Front Porch
- Christ Church, Tyler, South Tyler
- St. Andrew's, Pearland, West Pearland Mosaic

We have launched a Bee Cave church start and have plans for multiple sites over the next five years.

I believe the creation of the Great Commission Foundation will help us focus our attention on new congregations and communities throughout our Diocese. The \$100 million foundation will help us grow new congregations. This frees up dollars for the Quin Foundation to focus its annual dollars on redevelopments and the growth of existing congregations through the Strategic Mission Grant program it funds with the Episcopal Foundation of Texas.

We will know we are making progress when we see our congregations throughout the Diocese reaching out each year with new ways to improve the lives of their neighbors—in body, mind, and spirit.

I believe this area has suffered from a lack of communication and cohesion often supported by a dedicated diocesan staff position. That being said, it has not lacked for attention on the ground and throughout the Diocese.

Over the last five years we redeveloped more than 90 homes on Galveston Island. We helped with cleanup efforts and home **restoration in Bastrop** after the wild fires. We were on the ground in West after the chemical plant explosion, and through a cooperative effort with St. Paul's, Waco, we are doing a home build there.

The Diocese also has deployed a large number of deacons to lead the Church out into the world. Deacons help guide people into a diverse set of ministries. Furthermore, the congregations of the Diocese (where service truly integrates into community life) are at work with more than 1,400 service ministries, from prison ministry to nursing home care, food services and health clinics, summer feeding programs for children who normally receive their primary nutrients at school,

community gardens, immigration services with ESL classes and helping with paths to citizenship.

We are making connections in the world. We are a diocese that is reaching out. We are a community of believers who are seeking to make the world a better place by sharing God's mercy and kindness. Here are just a few stories from our website on how congregations are reaching out:

We will know we are making progress when our leadership (clergy and laity) is younger and more diverse ethnically, reflecting our mission context.

Our diocesan institutions are undertaking incredible outreach in the world. They are clear about their Episcopal identity and are growing and building their presence through development and expanded services.

Schools have regular Episcopal chapel and Episcopal clergy on staff. Moreover, they have service as a key ingredient to their ministry. Here are just three stories about how our schools are making a difference:

Outreach institutions focused on serving our communities also have clear Episcopal identities and understand that when we serve others, we serve Christ. Our institutions involve many of the local congregations in their hands-on approach to ministry. They raise money and are building core services based upon meeting the needs of, and dealing with, the social determinants of health. St. Vincent's House in Galveston and El Buen Samaritano set an incredible example, along with Episcopal health centers, of how we can reach out and serve as a missionary institution.

Our institutions are growing in numbers, finances and in community impact.

We will know we are making progress when our leadership (clergy and laity) is younger and more diverse ethnically, reflecting our mission context.

When we began our stewardship work five years ago, the Diocese primarily focused its attention on the annual Stewardship Conference and fall stewardship campaigns. Despite many attempts to curb decreasing attendance, we finally came to the conclusion that we needed to rethink stewardship from a diocesan perspective.

I shaped our strategic plan and goals to focus on the reality that stewardship is our human response to God's creative act and God's merciful reconciliation brought by Jesus Christ. I also began to undergird every other part of our work with a conversation about stewardship. We hosted the annual TENS conference (the Episcopal Church's national conference) and then set about to rethink our work. We have built a new stewardship committee and challenged them to think intentionally and creatively about our common work.

We began with the stewardship of time as we combined the former stewardship conference with the formation and evangelism conference so that congregations could send teams of leaders to just one very strategic conference and return home with synergy around the content to make a real difference locally. We underwrite this conference substantially to make it more affordable as well. You can find information here about THE Conference and our efforts to help congregations become more intentional on evangelism, service and stewardship.

Our staff is on the road along with specially-trained consultants from around the Diocese to support local efforts. We are coaching more and developing an even broader network of local specialists who can help. We continue to enhance a suite of resources available online. And, we have sent the very best leaders in to help rectors and vestries focus their work through individual coaching efforts.

We even helped to sponsor a convocational stewardship conference at Emmanuel, Houston. It had the same number of participants as our previous annual conference.

Our stewardship has grown as a diocese and our average pledge has increased. Yet there is still a great deal more for us to explore and accomplish in the future.

We recognize that stewardship is also about our care for creation. We developed Earth Day curricula, and we are seeing churches begin to think about how they can improve their environmental footprint.

We recognize that giving and the tools by which people give are changing. Stewardship leaders are beginning to ask new questions about how to deal with these changes. Churches like St. David's in Austin are on the cutting edge and have installed a **Giving Kiosk**, which is much more in tune with popular behaviors around money. These trends, and how the church enables people to give, will become more pressing as we navigate a culture less dependent upon cash—with regular giving patterns set in online banking rather than in pledge envelopes.

We will know when the work of the foundations of the Diocese is clearly and strategically focused on the diocesan mission. We will know when the foundations' own corpora grow and the funding available to the Diocese for strategic mission is increasing. And, we will know when we have an intentional diocesan wide planned giving ministry focused on the local congregation or ministry.

Over the last five years, we have intentionally moved all of the foundations

of the Diocese into conversation together with the intention of building a strong synchronicity between them that would be focused on evangelism and service. These foundations have grown. We have two new ones that fulfill our goal around service and evangelism. Today, the five foundations continue their work to provide planned giving resources and growing their corpora in an effort to increase available funds to the mission of God in the Diocese of Texas.

We have set up a new Strategic Mission Grant program that is focused on evangelism through second-site campuses or newcomer initiatives. Grants support redevelopments of existing congregations in demographically shifting neighborhoods and we are showing a spike in attendance and new membership as a result. We are funding and supporting emerging and new initiatives. They are also focused on recruitment of the brightest and best new clergy and have helped us increase the youth and diversity of our clergy by providing finances to make second-chair leadership positions sprout up in a church that has very few of these opportunities available.

CONCLUSION

I believe we have done a great deal in the first five years. Each area has been strengthened. If anything, perhaps we have judged ourselves too harshly, given the tremendous strides that we have taken to become a healthy and vibrant diocese. I am truly amazed at the leadership of the Diocese (both lay and ordained) and the sacrificial work undertaken in order to build God's kingdom. We have neither dreamed small nor ventured too near the shore. We have certainly traveled through stormy seas together and we have arrived five years later in a time of blessing. We are fortunate for the opportunities that God has given us.

Yet we cannot rest on our laurels for the kingdom has not yet come. There is more yet to accomplish. With clarity of purpose, strength of prayer, and intentionality, we must dream about our next five years together.

As we look forward, we must look for realized potential in the following areas.

In the first section are areas that we believed needed improvement in 2008 and today we have made some headway. Nevertheless, our success in other areas is dependent upon this work in a unique way to build bedrock for our ministry. These are our goals:

| 1. Campus Mission: In 2009 Campus ministry was a great concern |

Diocese. Today, we have been reorganizing the structure of funding for College Mission. We have strong leaders who have worked to accomplish a connection with parishes and communities across the Diocese, even holding open houses in churches to introduce local seniors to our Episcopal Campus Mission. That is now done and it is time to expand this ministry on existing campuses and on campuses where we do not have an official presence.

- In 2020 we will see more campus missions.
- In 2020 we will see more students involved in campus missions.
- 2. Christian Formation: was a concern in the last review. We have completely rebuilt this area of this diocesan ministry with great success. We are on the road and working in this area with on-the-ground support to parish leadership. We will need to continue to explore new ways of engaging formation practices for the new mission era.
 - In 2020 we will see more formation opportunities for every age throughout the week.
 - In 2020 we will see more exploring technology and new ways of presenting material in multimedia formats.
 - In 2020 we will see a growth in multilingual resources for a growing multi-ethnic diocese.
- 3. Young Adult Leadership: This area was tied into the Christian Formation area and remains a concern today. Youth and young adult programs have all been revived and restructured and are thriving, even to the point of having a waiting list for many programs. Yet there is more work to do to encourage and raise up younger leadership. This leadership will need to be given opportunities across the ministry spectrum in order to support our work as a Church. Formation and gifts discernment will be especially important.
 - In 2020 we will continue to see a younger, diverse and multilingual lay and clergy leadership in the Diocese.
- 4. Leadership: We are working to develop clergy leaders through a variety of clergy groups. Participation in the Gathering of Leaders outside the Diocese is creating a national network for innovation and creativity. Inside the Diocese, we gather in like groups to share common learning, best practices and innovative thinking.

Of course, clergy leadership does not have the broad-based impact we need in transforming the Diocese. Therefore, we have assessed our conferences and have combined them into The Conference where we can train and create space for leadership development of teams from congregations. We continue with our Vestry and Wardens conferences on a revised schedule. Our main emphasis is on local coaching and training local trainers (as in our Invite, Welcome, Connect classes).

We also have created the ability for lay ministers to enroll in the lona program so that they can become trained in the Episcopal tradition and learn about ministry. For information on enrollment, please go here.

We have come a long way from 2009 in providing specialized, broad, collaborative and local opportunities. In the future we will see the following leadership areas developed:

- In 2020 we will see more lay leadership being formed through local and convocational gatherings.
- In 2020 we will see more coaching in the local congregations.
- In 2020 we will see a diversity of clergy gathering and forming organically around areas of needed development.
- Online resources like the LOGOS project, which provides video programs for leadership, will grow in use.
- In 2020 our capacity for leaders to train and support leaders will multiply exponentially.
- 5. Becoming a Multicultural Church: In many ways we are a multicultural, multiethnic and socially layered diocese. In fact, we like to say we are truly an intercultural diocese. However, we have not achieved the goals we desired—which are to reflect the family of God and reflect the context in which we serve. Our goal over the next five years is to continue to grow into our identity as a multicultural church. We are currently helping congregations hire and transition as their neighborhoods change in ethnicity. We see growth at three of these congregations, specifically: San Pablo, Houston; San Pedro, Pasadena; and St. Timothy's, Houston.

We have developed a program, led by staff member Denise Trevino, that helps congregations become friendly and open to cultural and ethnic diversity. Here are a few articles of interest.



- In 2020 we will have more clergy who represent our diverse cultural context.
- In 2020 we will publish—online and through our multiple















communication tools, materials, resources, and news—in a diversity of languages

- In 2020 we will more closely reflect the culture that is our context.
- 6. Foundations: We must continue to press the foundations of the Diocese into the service of the mission with stronger ties to one another, better communication, more collaboration, synchronicity and clarity of purpose. Specifically, we will need to build the new foundation community as we add the Great Commission Foundation and the Episcopal Health Foundation boards. The horizon of possibilities has changed, and we must be intentional about our common work of supporting God's mission.

We will need to spend some time with the Episcopal Foundation in looking at how the EHF will change its future giving and how it can then strategically use its funds for capital campaign support of institutions.

We will need to work to build the strategies with both GCF and EHF as new foundations. Therefore, our goals are:

- In 2020 we will have a stronger foundation community with improved communication, collaboration, synchronicity, and clarity of purpose.
- In 2020 all foundations will have reviewed their giving in light of the two new foundations with an eye to strategic synchronicity for the mission of the Diocese.
- In 2020 EFT will have accomplished a review of its giving and created new strategies around capital support of institutions.
- In 2020 EHF will have found a location and hired a staff, and will be fully operational.
- In 2020 EHF will have solidified its relationship with the congregations of the Diocese and institutions by hiring a staff person to specifically work with and coordinate our service/ outreach efforts across all the regions of the Diocese.
- 7. Unified Evangelism Strategy: We need to continue to develop our Invite, Welcome, Connect activities. We need to further develop strategies around formation discipleship/apostleship who help to close the back door of our congregations so that as we grow, we are not also losing membership.

We need to improve our deployment bench strength around church planters. We need to continue to improve our diversity, especially around the various ethnicities, so that we can accomplish congregational growth that reflects our mission field.

By 2016 we will need to review this and create new planting goals to launch in 2020 with 20 new satellites and emerging Initiatives.

In 2020 we will have accomplished the following goals:

- We will have planted 15 new communities (second sites and new churches).
- We will have more diversity within our congregations.
- We will have grown our Latino church footprint, begun a mission to Asians and restarted our efforts with the African population in our Diocese.
- We will have changed the of planting communities, bringing down the cost from its previously much higher cost.
- We will have diversified our types of communities and in so doing will have dealt with our canons, creating a vision of congregational/community life that fits the new millennium.

- We will have more churches growing than shrinking.
 Our existing congregations will lead our growth with new evangelism strategies and in their Christian formation practices.
- 8. Vocations: In order to increase our evangelism efforts we need to review and rethink how we talk about and raise up the vocations of all the baptized. We will need to look at The Episcopal Church Canons and our own and understand how we can better enable people to be raised up in ministry for the church.

We need to unlock the potential of our greatest resource—God's people—and enable them to start Episcopal communities.

Therefore, by 2020 we will have accomplished these goals:

- Lay people will have planted new Episcopal communities (second sites and new churches)
- We will complete a review and new policies around the deployment of bi-vocational clergy with a new plan for how bivocational clergy can be used to support our missionary efforts
- We will have created a stronger and more diverse leadership core for the Diocese.
- We will have developed internal discernment processes for laity to help them find their own call into service in God's kingdom.
- 9. How We Gather: It was clear in 2008 that we needed to deal with how we come together. There was a desire for more fellowship and a desire for connecting people at the local level. Therefore, we will achieve the following goals by 2020:
 - We will continue to make headway connecting people at the local level. This will be achieved by increasing the number of one-onones and small group gatherings for every area of our common life: formation, leadership, stewardship, evangelism and service areas.
 - We will make changes to our diocesan council to accomplish our business in an up-to-date format, using best practices in technology and meeting strategies to accomplish the goal of better representing God and his family when we gather. This may include the exploration of biennial council with proposals by 2016.
- 10. Strengthen Anglican Communion and Episcopal Church Ties: In 2008, we were still very wounded as a Diocese, and believing we could remain a diverse diocese together, unified in mission, still felt far away from us. We stressed in that time of visioning that we would remain in both the Anglican Communion and the Episcopal Church. We have accomplished this.

I have continued to strengthen both my personal ties with the Archbishop of Canterbury and other Anglican primates and bishops. I

have continued to give time and energy to The Episcopal Church. Along with my efforts, many others have joined me. We provide leadership across the Church, in the continental U.S. and globally. We, as a Diocese, continue to expand our road map of connections.

While in 2008, we did this out of a desire to hold our Church together and navigate the culture wars; today, we must do this for the sake of mission.

There once was a time when clergy and lay leaders from the Diocese of Texas were part of the greater work of our Church. It is time again that we begin to connect and offer our support for the mission of God's kingdom across the Anglican Communion. We must strengthen already strong ties as we must bind new ones. We more closely reflect the kingdom when we are in conversation with other people in other mission contexts who are healthy, creative and entrepreneurial. We must move out of any leftover isolationism and connect with others who also labor for the Gospel, in near and far-off places.

Therefore, we will see the following goals accomplished in 2020:

- The clergy and lay leaders of our Diocese will engage and actively seek out leadership positions across our Church.
- We will have more congregations involved in global mission.
- We will increase our strength of giving to The Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion, and we will increase the time that we as a diocese give to projects and gatherings outside of Texas that help us become a better and more able missionary church locally.
- 11. Communications: In 2008 we had a paper newspaper and a static presence on the Internet with little use of social media. Today, we are a model of an engaged church communicating across a diverse spectrum of media. We lead in resourcing and sharing our stories. Yet the reality is that the world of communications continues to change, emerge and shift.

Therefore, we must take a good look at our current media strategy and set out our next five-year strategy. We must face the fact that as a nonprofit we do not have the competing dollars to build the communication team needed for an organization whose primary purpose is communicating. Therefore, we must investigate how we can develop this strategy through increased support, outsourcing and multiplying our web of communicators across the Diocese.

Therefore, by 2020 we will have accomplished the following:

- Comprehensive review and revision of current communication plan – OS2. This will include an evaluation of how we as an Episcopal diocese may use our current network, and build a broader network, to reach our market.
- Increased our spending on communications to an appropriate level for an organization of our size and with our footprint.

Epilogue: What Is Next in the Process

- Expanded our web of communications and communicators.
- 12. Reconciliation: I believe that we need to continue to work on reconciliation. This key word runs throughout our identity as the Diocese of Texas. We say that we are reconciled to God through the work of Jesus Christ. And, we say that we are reconciled to one another in Christ. We are still recovering from the past culture wars. We still are fighting some. We are not at our best when we are divided and yet who can say that all have not already given so much—on every side. How much longer must we fight? How much longer must we wait? These are the cries from so many from so many parts of the Diocese. I believe it shows that we still have much work to do in order to be reconciled one to another through Christ Jesus and to God.

Our life truly reveals an important ingredient to the success of all evangelism efforts. If we are not truly reconciled to God and to one another, then offering reconciliation to others will never be truly effective. Therefore, by 2020:

- We will have come to a conclusion on our debate on Canon 43.
- We will, as a diocese, be reconciled to God and one another and yoked together as God's friends, unified in our mission and committed to remain together as a diocese.
- We will no longer punish one another with our giving but will instead recognize that our giving is to God for the sake of God's mission and not our own political agendas.
- We will model for the world what it means for friends with differing views to come together for the sake of the Gospel and to work to build the kingdom of God.
- We, as the Diocese of Texas, will be known globally as a church who is who we say we are: "...One Church reconciled by Jesus Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, called by God through to build the kingdom of God together."

PART I – THE 165th COUNCIL

PROCEEDINGS OF THE 165th COUNCIL

The 165th Annual Council of the Diocese of Texas opened on Friday evening, February 7, 2014, at six o'clock, with a celebration of the Holy Eucharist in the Exhibit Hall of the Galveston Island Convention Center, Galveston, Texas. The Right Reverend C. Andrew Doyle, Bishop of Texas, was the celebrant of the liturgy. The preacher for the liturgy was the Right Reverend Dena A. Harrison, Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Texas. Assisting Bishop Doyle in the Holy Eucharist were Bishop Harrison, the Right Reverend Jeff Fisher, Bishop Suffragan of Texas; the Right Reverend Alinafe Kalemba, Bishop of Southern Malawi; the Right Reverend Michael G. Smith, Bishop of North Dakota; and the Right Reverend Hector Monterroso, Bishop of Costa Rica. Also assisting were the Reverend Russell Oechsel, Archdeacon and the Reverend Victoria Anne Mason, Deacon. The Bishops were assisted in the administration of the Holy Communion by the diocesan canons and diocesan clergy.

FIRST SESSION Saturday, February 8, 2014

At 8:35 on Saturday morning, in the Exhibit Hall of the Galveston Island Convention Center, Galveston, Texas, the 165th Annual Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas was called to order by the Bishop, the Right Reverend C. Andrew Doyle. After placing a copy of the Bible opened to the Book of Hebrews on the rostrum in view of the delegates, the Bishop read Hebrews 12:12–15. The Bishop announced that the Reverend Elizabeth Holden had been appointed as chaplain to the 165th Council. The Chaplain led the Council in a prayer for the 165th Council following which there was a period of table "Sharing Faith" stories.

Bishop Doyle announced that on Thursday, May 15, 2014, there would be opportunity to hold Sharing of Faith dinners throughout the Diocese. This year, the following dioceses would be holding Sharing of Faith Dinners at the same time: Fort Worth, Northwest Texas, West Texas, Toronto, and North Carolina.

The Secretary announced that as of 7:30, 232 clergy and 459 lay delegates had registered. In order to establish a quorum, the Secretary first asked one delegate from each congregation to stand. All the clergy were asked to stand. The Secretary then certified that a quorum was present.

Beginning the report concerning Credentials, the Secretary announced that there were no congregations in arrears to the Church Pension Fund. The Secretary then moved that all licensed clergy who function as heads of congregations and those who are licensed to serve as assisting clergy or on the staff of diocesan congregations be admitted to Council with seat and voice but without vote. The motion was seconded. There being no objection, the Bishop declared the motion adopted.

The Secretary announced that there were two congregations that had failed to complete the payment of their Diocesan Assessment (and, as such, by canon would not be entitled to representation in Council): Holy Cross, Sugar Land and Saint Paul's/San Pablo, Houston.

Bishop Doyle asked the Council to make an exception in the case of these two congregations (both of whom were in the process of recovery): The motion to remit their unpaid assessments and to seat these two congregations with voice and vote was made on behalf of the Finance Committee of the Executive Board. There being no objection, the motion was adopted.

The Secretary announced that all Parochial Reports had been submitted.

Bishop Doyle appointed the following College delegates to the 165th Council: Sam Houston State University, Trent Hale (D), Mary Catherine Bennett (A); Baylor University, Melissa Hollis (D); Rice University, Emily Statham (D); University of Texas (Austin), Parkes Ousley (D), Lindsey Limbaugh (A); Texas A&M University, Erin Orozco (D), Brian Champagne (A).

The Bishop appointed the following youth delegates from the ten convocations to have seat and voice but without vote: Northeast, Marie Nickle; Galveston, Sean Peterson; Northwest, Taylor Romig; Southwest, Anna Clark; Southeast, Drew Dugger; East Harris, Brian Bourgeois; San Jacinto, Hunter Kolon; Austin, Oliver Chapin-Eiserloh; West Harris, Anna Thomas; Central, Allen Roberts.

The Bishop announced that the 165th Council was now organized for business. The Bishop then announced that he had appointed Dennis Clark as Parliamentarian for the 165th Council and that David Harvin was present as Chancellor of the Diocese.

The chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business presented the Special Rules of Procedure as printed in the Order of Business booklet and moved their adoption. There being no discussion, the motion was ruled adopted by a two-thirds standing vote. The committee chair then moved the adoption of the Council's Order of Business as also printed in the Order of Business booklet. There being no objections, the motion was adopted.

The Secretary announced that there was no unfinished business from the 164th Council and certified the minutes of the 164th Council as published in Volume II of the *Journal* of the 164th Council to be a true and accurate record of the proceedings of that Council. The Bishop attested to the validity of the minutes of the 164th Council as a true and accurate record of the proceedings of that Council.

The Bishop announced the following to fill vacancies on Regular Council Committees: Committee for Nominations, Reappointing Pedro Lopez (to 2017) and appointing Bertie Pearson (to 2016).

Mary MacGregor, chair of the Committee on New Parishes and Missions, made the following report.

Right Reverend Sir, clergy and delegates, on behalf of the Committee on Missions and Parishes, I want to report on the congregational development work completed in 2013, some plans that are underway for 2014, and the official change in status of seven of our churches including the petition of one church to be accepted as a parish.

Our diocesan mission is a shared mission. We proclaim to be One Church, reconciled by Jesus Christ, Empowered by the Holy Spirit, called by God through worship, witness and ministry, building the Kingdom of God together.

Your diocesan congregational development team includes Bishop Doyle, bishops Harrison and Fisher, canons Normand and Ryan, Bob Biehl our treasurer, David Fisher, the director of foundations, Bob Schorr Coordinator for Strategic Development and Church Plants, and myself along with our administrative assistants Julie Heath and Rebecca Nelson Gomez. However, the essential members of our congregational development team are you, our 151 congregations of the Diocese of Texas. For it is the work that you do to respond to our shared mission as One Church, building the Kingdom of God together, that is at the heart of our ability to thrive as the Episcopal Church in this corner of Texas.

Our sole reason for existence is to be responsive to you, to resource you, to listen and assist where able, and to encourage and challenge you because the mission we have been called to do together is Holy and deserves our best efforts. Before I report official changes in status of some of our churches I would like to account for a portion of our activity with you.

Bob Schorr and I have met face to face, and participated in leadership meetings and scheduled phone consultations with clergy, vestries, search committees, and specific lay leaders from 76 congregations in 2013. This work was to listen, assess, resource, advise, speak and sometimes train, often returning multiple times to the same congregations. These 210 visits have shown us the tremendous ministries your congregations are engaged in and the desire you have to do what you do well. It is our joy to work with you!

We also work closely with clergy who are involved in a number of specialized groups including the Commission on Hispanic Ministry, Redevelopers, Curate Camp, Greenfield Commission, the Stewardship Commission, bi-vocational clericus, church planters, and a special new group for education and networking called First Time in Charge – a new six-module training to help equip second year curates, new vicars and rectors with the

organizational, administrative, and leadership skills as well as the financial perspective required to lead a congregation.

And we are so proud to be overseeing the work of the lona School for Ministry which was started in 2004 and has graduated 29 priests to serve in small congregations and 29 deacons to serve across the breadth of this diocese. The lona School has not only attracted students from 4 other dioceses, but is now partnered with the Seminary of the Southwest and 11 other dioceses in the lona Initiative, a local formation program for priests and deacons that is based on our lona School. This program has captured the attention of dioceses around the country who are calling me almost every week. This is an exciting development for the Episcopal Church and we can take great pride that it all started here in the Diocese of Texas.

My brothers and sisters in Christ, evangelism is at the heart of the life transforming work Jesus calls us to do and we are unabashedly enthusiastic about it! So much so, that a special bell has been cast to celebrate the creation of new congregations and to be rung on other special occasions. This bell is a visible and audible example of our commitment to the Great Commission. It will travel and be rung around the diocese as new congregations are formed. You will actually hear it ring in just a few moments by representatives of some of our churches which are seeking permission from you as they change their status.

I would like to report that we have a new diocesan plant in the Southwest Travis County - Bee Caves area of Austin. Our planter is the Rev. Paul Johnson who has recently joined us, coming from Richmond, Virginia where he successfully planted a large congregation. We are so pleased to have Paul with us. He hit the ground running and is already familiar with a number of our Austin churches and clergy as he seeks to network and establish this new congregation.

The diocese is also purchasing land to support St. Mary Magdalene near Manor, Tx which is being led by the Rev. Alex Montes. In addition, the diocese is working closely and consulting with a few of our congregations to envision possible moves or the rebuilding of current facilities.

But the diocese can only do so much. The real work of evangelism happens on the ground, right where you live and minister as faith communities.

I want to repeat a challenge I made to you last year. And that challenge is, where is God calling your congregation to have fresh expressions of evangelism and in what ways? How are you thinking creatively? What risks for the sake of the Gospel are you taking?

Your congregational development team is pleased to support your efforts through a number of activities. First, diocesan foundations have come together to support your congregational evangelism efforts through Strategic Mission Grants. This money has supported the addition of newcomer ministry coordinators in 27 of our congregations. Mary Parmer spoke to you at last year's council with updates of the Newcomer Ministry Project in the Diocese of Texas. 184 persons took advantage of her informative and challenging training sessions in Houston, Austin, Beaumont and Tyler in 2013. We know that the newcomer ministry coordinators now in a number of our churches have found this training to be essential and a great way to network with others doing the same.

To Invite, Welcome and Connect new persons into our Episcopal communities is life giving, life changing activity. We believe every one of our congregations should focus energy in these areas. To that end in 2014 we will offer 4 trainings around the diocese. The next two are this March 10th at Christ Church Cathedral in Houston and March 12th at the Seminary of the Southwest in Austin. If you are curious, if you have received a

recent grant, if you just want to know what this is all about call Mary Parmer and bring a team from your church to one of these trainings.

Michael Harvey from England was featured at our spring Warden's and Vestry conferences to encourage us to get over our reservations for inviting others to church and to participate in Back to Church Sunday on Sept. 15. 71 of our congregations reported that they promoted that special day in unique and encouraging ways. Many of these same congregations noted a significant increase in attendance on that day. So we will once again participate in what we are calling Invitation Sunday which will be September 21, 2014. Our communications department will resource you with materials you can download from our epicenter.org website to support your congregation in this effort.

We are very pleased to report that St. Andrew's Pearland has committed to develop a second campus just to the west of 288, south of Houston. We also have another congregation that is seriously investigating starting a second campus. They join Grace, Georgetown, which was the first congregation in the Diocese of Tx to establish a second site in recent years. We want to encourage all of you to discern if God is calling your congregation to do the same. We are so supportive of this effort that we will be holding a Second Campus Workshop on Saturday, September 13 in Houston. Watch for details in the Diolog.

The Greenfield Commission, a group of clergy who are passionate about evangelism and desire to resource you, are sponsoring cluster groupings of congregations who are geographically close, to bring 6-15 people from select congregations to come together to share stories of evangelism initiatives and resources with each other. The first meeting of 4 congregations in NW Houston will meet on March 29 and will serve as the pilot for these cluster evangelism workshops. We plan to have these groupings across the diocese for the next few years. We will be creating these clusters and begin to roll out 3 more of these meetings in 2014. We will contact your congregation to let you know which cluster you are in and when and where your meeting will be held.

In addition we are in strategic conversations with a number of your congregations as you seek to master plan and rehab or newly develop facilities for your existing sites.

Some of our traditional offerings are taking a hiatus in an effort to make room for new ways of working with you. The wardens and vestry conference is one of them. We will create a similar conference on a three year rotation starting in 2015. However, resources are being developed and are on the horizon for first year vestry members and senior wardens. So be looking for these resources and opportunities as they are promoted through the Diolog.

Let's work together, pray together and seek to build a strong, vibrant and growing Episcopal Church in Texas so that people may come to know and be reconciled with our Lord Jesus in transforming ways.

At this time, Bishop and members of Council, I would like to report on a change of status for a number of our congregations.

On behalf of the Bishop Diocesan, and in accordance with Section 8.5A of the Canons, I am reporting to this Council, with no action required on your part, that Bishop Doyle has accepted the petitions of the following Parishes to be remitted to Mission Status: Resurrection, Austin; St. John's, Columbus; St. Paul's, Kilgore

The change in status for these congregations creates important opportunities for them to work with our team to discern next steps in strategic redevelopment for each of these churches. I am also reporting to this Council on behalf of the Bishop Diocesan, and in accordance with Article 6, Section 2 of the Constitution of the Diocese, I move that this 165th Council dissolve St. Luke's, Belton. This recommendation comes following extensive communication and work with the remaining leaders of this congregation. I so move. (There being no objection, the Bishop declared the motion adopted).

There is good news. New life has been born of St. Luke's, Belton, in the form of its parochial mission, St. Joseph's Salado, which seeks your acceptance as a mission of the Diocese of Texas.

On behalf of the Bishop diocesan I have submitted their application for mission status and the bishop's certificate of approval as prescribed in Section 12.5 of Canon 12 and hereby ask Council to consent to St. Joseph Episcopal Church, Salado, Texas, to be accepted as a mission of the Diocese of Texas. I so move. (There being no objection, the Bishop declared the motion adopted)

I invite at this time representatives from St. Joseph's to ring the Great Commission bell. (A small group from St. Joseph's rang the bell)

The Rev. Alex Montes-Vela has ably led a poly-cultural fellowship in Manor, TX since 2008. We are pleased that they are now seeking your approval to become a mission.

On behalf of the Bishop diocesan I have submitted the application for mission status and the bishop's certificate of approval as prescribed in Section 12.5 of Canon 12, and hereby ask Council to consent to St. Mary Magdalene Episcopal Church, Manor, TX, to be accepted as a mission of the Diocese of Texas. I so move. (There being no objection the Bishop declared the motion adopted) A small group from St. Mary Magdalene rang the bell.

And finally, it is with great joy that I report on behalf of the Bishop diocesan and the vicar, The Rev. Les Carpenter, the Bishop's Committee and the congregation of St. Aidan's Episcopal Church and in accordance with Canon 8.4, I petition Council to admit St. Aidan's Episcopal Church, Cypress, Texas, as a parish to this 165th Diocesan Council, having exemplified their ability to meet all the financial obligations of a parish, as well as its quota and assessment. I so move. (There being no objection the Bishop declared the motion adopted) A small group from St. Aidan's was presented and rang the bell.

We will have an opportunity to celebrate with this congregation later today at this Council.

Bishop Doyle then made his address to the 165th Annual Council (a printed copy of which can be found elsewhere in this volume).

Concluding his address at 10:40, the Bishop declared a short break. When Council reconvened, the Bishop called for the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Maria Boyce, chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented the initial report of that committee with the following proposed amendments to Article 10.1–10.2 and Article 11.1–11.5 of the Constitution for a second reading; Article 9.1–9.2 and Article 10.1 of the Constitution for a first reading; Canon 2.1–2.7, Canon 4.9, Canon 5.2–5.3, Canon 27.1–27.4, Canon 43.1–43.2 (two proposals); and Canon 49 and Canon 50 (two new canons).

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

(Presented for second reading requiring 2/3rds majority approval from each Order)

Article 10 AMENDING CANONS

EXISTING:

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided (1) a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the first business session of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor, and (2) the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be altered, amended, or repealed by an Annual Council or a Special Session of Council, and any one or more of the provisions of the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed by unanimous written consent of the Bishop, the full membership of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System, and the full membership of the voting membership of the Executive Board. At an Annual Council, the report of the Committee shall be made at least one session before the case can be acted upon, unless unanimous consent be given to take it up earlier, in which case, the record shall show the unanimous consent in recording the action of the Council upon the motion to take up the Committee's report upon the proposed Canon.

Section 10.2 Copies to be Printed

Any change in any Canon adopted in Council shall be printed in full in the *Journal* with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall have printed sufficient copies of the new Canon, properly annotated, or reprints from the *Journal* record, to be made available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of the Council, and others interested.

PROPOSED:

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Section 10.2 Copies to be Printed Publication of Amendments

Any change in any Canon adopted in Council shall be printed published in full in the Journal with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall have printed sufficient copies of the new Canon, properly annotated, or reprints from the Journal record, to be made post the Journal record reflecting the action by Council and the wording of the new Canon on the Diocesan website or otherwise make it available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of the Council, and others interested.

IF AMENDED:

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided (1) a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor, and (2) the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be altered, amended, or repealed by an Annual Council or a Special Session of Council, and any one or more of the provisions of the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed by unanimous written consent of the Bishop, the full membership of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System, and the full membership of the voting membership of the Executive Board.

Section 10.2 Publication of Amendments

Any change in any Canon adopted in Council shall be published in full in the *Journal* with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall post the *Journal* record reflecting the action by Council and the wording of the new Canon on the Diocesan website or

otherwise make it available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of the Council, and others interested.

SUBMITTED BY: The Rev. William Fowler, Holy Spirit Episcopal Church, Houston

RATIONALE (by Rev. Fowler): Our current Constitution and Canons envision a multiday Annual Council that relies on paper and mailing for both announcement of its agenda, nominations, and proposals for Council consideration and publication of the results. This is the first of several proposed amendments to make our Constitution and Canons reflect the efforts of the Diocese to operate efficiently in an era of modern word processing and communications technology and to utilize efficiently our time together at Council.

This proposed amendment eliminates the requirement that the *Journal*, reflecting action by Council on proposed Constitutional and Canonical amendments, be "printed" and "copied" for distribution. It reflects current practice that the *Journal* is prepared on a word processor and posted on the Diocesan website where it is available to all interested parties. Not only is this cost-efficient, but it also results in the *Journal* being available to many more people than when it was printed and mailed only to Clergy and Council delegates.

The proposed amendment also eliminates the requirement that the report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons be given "at least one session before" Council takes action on any proposed amendments. Because Council members have the proposed amendments available to them well in advance of Council and in view of Council members' responsibility to familiarize themselves with the proposals, it is not a good use of Council's time to have to listen to the report twice. If this proposed amendment is approved, a companion amendment to Canon 2 will be proposed at the next Annual Council also eliminating this redundancy.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS THIS PROPOSAL FOR A SECOND READING.

Article 11 AMENDING CONSTITUTION

EXISTING:

Section 11.1 Authority for Procedure

Any proposition to amend this Constitution shall be submitted in writing to an Annual Council, when by consent it shall be printed in the *Journal*; provided that a two-thirds vote shall be required to consent, unless a copy of the proposed amendment is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the first business session of Annual Council, but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor. At the next Annual Council it may be considered, and if passed by a two-thirds majority of the members of each order, voting concurrently, in the form as printed or as same may be amended by unanimous consent, it shall be incorporated into the Constitution as a part thereof.

Section 11.2 Amendments to be Written in Full

No part of the Constitution or Canons shall be amended by reference to its number, or by merely striking out or inserting words, but the article or section sought to be amended or altered shall be written out in full and presented as it is intended it shall read when amended.

Section 11.3 Amendments to be Printed

Any change in any article of the Constitution adopted in Council shall be printed in full in the *Journal* with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change.

Section 11.4 Printed Copies to be Distributed

The Secretary of the Diocese shall have printed sufficient copies of the new article, properly annotated, or reprints made from the *Journal* record, to be made available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of the Council, and others interested.

Section 11.5 Effective Date

Each duly adopted provision of this Constitution or any duly adopted alteration, amendment, addition, or repeal of an existing provision of this Constitution shall become effective on the day following the date of adjournment of the Diocesan Council Meeting at which it is adopted.

PROPOSED:

Section 11.1 Authority for Procedure

Any proposition to amend this Constitution shall be submitted in writing to an Annual Council, when by consent it shall be printed published in the Journal; provided that a two-thirds vote shall be required to consent, unless a copy of the proposed amendment is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the first business session date of Annual Council, but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor. At the next Annual Council it may be considered, and if passed by a two-thirds majority of the members of each order, voting concurrently, in the form as printed published or as the same may be amended by unanimous consent, it shall be incorporated into the Constitution as a part thereof.

Section 11.2 Amendments to be Written in Full

No part of the Constitution or Canons shall be amended by reference to its number, or by merely striking out or inserting words, but the article or section sought to be amended or altered shall be written out in full and presented as it is intended it shall read when amended.

Section 11.3 Publication of Amendments to be Printed

Any change in any article of the Constitution adopted in Council shall be printed published in full in the Journal with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall post the Journal record reflecting the action of Council and the wording of the amendment on the Diocesan website or otherwise make it available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of Council, and others interested.

Section 11.4 Printed Copies to be Distributed

The Secretary of the Diocese shall have printed sufficient copies of the new article, properly annotated, or reprints made from the *Journal* record, to be made available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of the Council, and others interested.

Section 11.511.4 Effective Date

Each duly adopted provision of this Constitution or any duly adopted alteration, amendment, addition, or repeal of an existing provision of this Constitution shall become effective on the day following the date of adjournment of the Diocesan Council Meeting at which it is adopted.

IF AMENDED:

Section 11.1 Authority for Procedure

Any proposition to amend this Constitution shall be submitted in writing to an Annual Council, when by consent it shall be published in the *Journal*; provided that a two-thirds vote shall be required to consent, unless a copy of the proposed amendment is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of Annual Council, but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor. At the next Annual Council it may be considered, and if passed by a two-thirds majority of the members of each order, voting concurrently, in the form as published or as the same may be amended by unanimous consent, it shall be incorporated into the Constitution as a part thereof.

Section 11.2 Amendments to be Written in Full

No part of the Constitution or Canons shall be amended by reference to its number, or by merely striking out or inserting words, but the article or section sought to be amended or altered shall be written out in full and presented as it is intended it shall read when amended.

Section 11.3 Publication of Amendments

Any change in any article of the Constitution adopted in Council shall be published in full in the *Journal* with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall post the

Journal record reflecting the action of Council and the wording of the amendment on the Diocesan website or otherwise make it available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of Council, and others interested.

Section 11.4 Effective Date

Each duly adopted provision of this Constitution or any duly adopted alteration, amendment, addition, or repeal of an existing provision of this Constitution shall become effective on the day following the date of adjournment of the Diocesan Council Meeting at which it is adopted.

SUBMITTED BY: The Rev. William Fowler, Holy Spirit Episcopal Church, Houston

RATIONALE (by Rev. Fowler): Our current Constitution and Canons envision a multiday Annual Council that relies on paper and mailing for both announcement of its agenda, nominations, and proposals for Council consideration and publication of the results. This is the second of several proposed amendments to make our Constitution and Canons reflect the efforts of the Diocese to operate efficiently in an era of modern word processing and communications technology and to utilize efficiently our time together at Council.

This proposed amendment eliminates the requirement that the *Journal*, reflecting action by Council on proposed Constitutional and Canonical amendments, be "printed" and "copied" for distribution. It reflects current practice that the *Journal* is prepared on a word processor and posted on the Diocesan website where it is available to all interested parties. Not only is this cost-efficient, but it also results in the *Journal* being available to many more people than when it was printed and mailed only to Clergy and Council delegates.

The proposed amendment also eliminates the requirement that the report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons be given "at least one session before" Council takes action on any proposed amendments. Because Council members have the proposed amendments available to them well in advance of Council and in view of Council members' responsibility to familiarize themselves with the proposals, it is not a good use of Council's time to have to listen to the report twice. If this proposed amendment is approved, a companion amendment to Canon 2 will be proposed at the next Annual Council also eliminating this redundancy.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS THIS PROPOSAL FOR A SECOND READING.

Subject to the foregoing, all such property hereafter acquired for use of the Church in the Diocese, including Parishes and Missions, shall be vested in the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas.

Section 9.2 Diocesan Property

Except as otherwise provided in Section 9.1, all property belonging to the Diocese, as such, shall be held in the name of the Church Corporation known as "Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas"; and no conveyance or encumbrance of any kind or character, unless it relates to property vested in the name of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas or The Bishop Quin Foundation, shall be valid unless executed by such corporation and as may otherwise be provided by the Canons of the Diocese. SUBMITTED BY: Bishop C. Andrew Doyle, the Executive Board, and the Directors of the Episcopal Health Foundation and the Great Commission Foundation.

RATIONALE (by the Chancellor on behalf of the Submitters): In 2013, St. Luke's Episcopal Health System was sold to Catholic Health Initiatives, and the proceeds of the sale were used to establish the Episcopal Health Foundation and the Great Commission Foundation. The purposes of this proposed amendment are (i) to delete the references to St. Luke's that are no longer needed and (ii) to add the Episcopal Health Foundation and the Great Commission Foundation to the list of diocesan foundations that may enter into real property transactions without the consent of the Church Corporation and also manage their own investments.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS THIS PROPOSAL FOR A FIRST READING.

Article 10 AMENDING CANONS

EXISTING:

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided (1) a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the

Council floor, and (2) the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be altered, amended, or repealed by an Annual Council or a Special Session of Council, and any one or more of the provisions of the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed by unanimous written consent of the Bishop, the full membership of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System, and the full membership of the voting membership of the Executive Board.

PROPOSED:

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided (1)that a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor, and (2) the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be altered, amended, or repealed by an Annual Council or a Special Session of Council, and any one or more of the provisions of the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed by unanimous written consent of the Bishop, the full membership of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System, and the full membership of the voting membership of the Executive Board.

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided that a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor.

SUBMITTED BY: Bishop C. Andrew Doyle and the Executive Board

RATIONALE (by the Chancellor on behalf of the Submitters): The purpose of this amendment is to delete the provision relating to the St. Luke's Canon. With the transfer of St. Luke's to Catholic Health Initiatives, the St. Luke's Canon is no longer necessary, and a proposal to repeal it and replace it with a new canon relating to the Episcopal Health Foundation is also being submitted to Council. Thus the existing language in

Article 10 relating to the St. Luke's Canon is no longer needed. Please note that this proposed amendment would amend the version of Article 10 that passed Council on the first reading in 2013 and is back before Council this year for final consideration.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS THIS PROPOSAL FOR A FIRST READING.

CANONICAL AMENDMENTS

Canon 2 THE DISPATCH OF BUSINESS FOR COUNCIL

EXISTING:

Section 2.1 The Dispatch of Business

- (a) Council shall open with Divine service.
- (b) All business of Council shall be presented by or through any officer of the Diocese, any member of the Executive Board, any of the regular committees of Council, or as specified by this Canon.
- (c) The regular committees of Council shall be the following, and such other regular committees as the Council may hereafter create by Canon:
 - (1) Dispatch of Business
 - (2) Constitution and Canons
 - (3) Bishop's Address
 - (4) Nominations
 - (5) Supervisors and Tellers
 - (6) Resolutions
 - (7) Council Management
- (d) All regular committees appointed shall hold office from the close of the Annual Council at which their appointment is made until the close of the next Annual Council.
- (e) The Committee for Dispatch of Business shall consist of one member of the Clergy and three (3) lay persons. This Committee shall present a printed report outlining the procedure of Council, with a copy of the Canon entitled *The Dispatch of Business for Council*. This report may include changes in the procedure of Council set forth in this Canon, when considered advisable in order to facilitate the business of the Council. Such report, if approved by Council, shall be recognized in conducting the business of Council.
- (f) The Committee for Constitution and Canons shall consist of two members of the Clergy, two lay persons, and the chancellor, who shall be an *ex-officio* member. It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive every proposed change, alteration, or new Article of the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese, submitted to the secretary

or chair of the Committee for Constitution and Canons by November 15th prior to the first business session of the Annual Council. It shall be the duty of this Committee to change the wording of such proposals to conform to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese. It shall be the privilege of the Committee to evaluate these proposals and recommend their adoption or rejection. The action of this Committee will be printed in Volume I of the *Journal*.

- (g) The Committee for the Bishop's Address shall consist of two members of the Clergy and two lay persons. It shall be the duty of this Committee to implement and set in motion the suggestions and directions contained in the Bishop's Address. Those matters which come within the purview of jurisdiction of any particular Committee of Council shall be referred to the appropriate Committee for action.
- (h) The Committee for Nominations shall consist of seven members of the clergy and seven lay persons whose selection and duties are outlined in the Canons of the Diocese, and the Chancellor of the Diocese, or in the event of the Chancellor's inability to serve, a Vice-Chancellor of the Diocese.
- (i) The Committee for Supervisors and Tellers shall consist of two members of the Clergy and three lay persons. It shall be the duty of this Committee to secure such additional help from members of Council or responsible persons not members of Council to distribute, collect, and count the ballots or to supervise the voting in case voting machines are used.
- (i) The Committee for Resolutions shall consist of two members of the Clergy and two lay persons. It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive resolutions presented to it by any member of the forthcoming or last preceding Council, or by any committee or board not responsible for the dispatch of business of Council, provided these resolutions are typed with the original signed, and three copies. Unless the Bishop of the Diocese grants an exception, all resolutions must be submitted to the Committee not later than November 15 preceding the next Annual Council: but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such resolution from the Council floor. The Committee may require all resolutions to be submitted in a standardized format and shall make such change of wording as is necessary for such resolutions to conform to proper usage and understanding. The Committee will inform the mover of any changes made. The Committee shall have the right to evaluate all resolutions and to recommend their adoption or rejection. Committee shall have the right to rank the resolutions in an order of importance as determined by the Committee and present them to Council in that order. Committee may request discharge from consideration by Council of resolutions which would seek similar action to that of a resolution previously considered. A two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt any resolutions submitted to Council pursuant to an exception granted by the Bishop of the Diocese.
- (k) The Committee for Council Management shall consist of one member of the Clergy, two lay persons, a member of the Diocesan Staff, and the following *ex-officio* members: the General Chairs of the host committee for the current and the immediately preceding Councils, and Chair of the Committee for the Dispatch of Business. It shall be the duty of the Committee to assist the Bishop in: (1) developing and maintaining a Council Manual, consisting of detailed descriptions of

each principal activity of Council, to serve as guidance for future Council Host Committees; (2) developing record keeping requirements and formats for Council Host Committees; and (3) making recommendations to the Executive Board and Committee for Dispatch of Business concerning changes in the organization of Council that would better facilitate the business of Council.

Section 2.2 Other Council Duties

- (a) Other Council duties will be carried out as follows:
 - (1) Credentials
 - (2) New Parishes and Missions
 - (3) Finance
 - (4) Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes
- (b) The Secretary of the Diocese will be responsible for certifying the credentials of the officers and delegates present. Before any business is dispatched during any Council, a satisfactory report from the Secretary shall be made and the President shall declare that Council is organized for business. Before any further business is dispatched during any Session, a quorum shall be established.
- (c) The Executive Board Department of Diocesan Missions will be responsible for recommending to Council the admission of new Parishes and Missions. This Committee shall be ready to report at the opening of Council.
- (d) The Executive Board Division of Finance shall recommend to Council the use of any Offerings taken during Council meetings, and to study the cost of Council with such recommendations as seem advisable.
- (e) The Secretary of the Diocese shall prepare the minutes of Council which minutes shall be attested by the Bishop. It shall also be the duty of the Secretary to see that every committee, board, or person whose duty it is to report to Council does report. It is further the duty of the Secretary to see that every action of Council requiring a report be satisfied or held over to the next session of Council.

Section 2.3 First Session of Council

- (a) The Order for The Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion.
- (b) After Divine Service, the Bishop, or in the Bishop's absence, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, otherwise the Bishop Suffragan having seniority if there be one, otherwise the oldest canonically senior member of the Clergy present shall preside. The presiding officer of Council shall be known as the President of Council.
- (c) The address of the Bishop, if not presented at the opening service of Council before the First Session, shall be given preference whenever presented. The address of the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, or the Bishop Suffragan, shall be given preference whenever presented, or may be presented by title and printed in the *Journal*.

- (d) The President shall appoint new members for the regular committees of Council to fill any vacancies on said committees appointed at the preceding Council.
- (e) The following reports shall be received during the first session:
 - (1) Report of the Committee for Dispatch of Business
 - (2) Report of the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes
 - (3) Report of the Executive Board Department of Mission on New Parishes and Missions
 - (4) Report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons
 - (5) Report of the Treasurer of the Diocese and Treasurer of the Executive Board
- (f) The following reports may be received during the first session or at any other session according to the accepted order of business:
 - (1) Officers of the Diocese
 - (2) The Standing Committee
 - (3) The Executive Board and its departments
 - (4) The Regular Committees of Council not otherwise designated
 - (5) Delegates to General Convention and/or Provincial Synod
 - (6) Deans of Convocations
 - (7) Operating Committees
 - (8) Administering Boards
 - (9) Special Commissions

Section 2.4 Second Session of Council

- (a) The report of the Nominating Committee shall have preference.
- (b) The elections shall follow nominations.
- (c) The following business shall be transacted during this Session:
 - (1) Report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons
 - (2) Report of the Committee for Resolutions

Section 2.5 Third Session and Subsequent Sessions

- (a) If there be no third session, this business shall be transacted during the second session.
- (b) The report of the Department of Finance of the Executive Board, presenting the Diocesan budget and the Executive Board budget, shall have preference.
- (c) The following business must be transacted before adjournment:
 - (1) Report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons
 - (2) Report of the Committee for Resolutions
 - (3) Elections on appointment of the Bishop

- (4) Appointment of members to the Regular Committees for the next Council
- (5) Report of the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes.
- (d) Council shall adjourn by motion and with the Doxology and Benediction.

Section 2.6 Special Sessions of Council

- (a) The following procedure shall open the Special Session:
 - (1) Roll Call by the Secretary
 - (2) Declaration of Quorum present
 - (3) Report of the Secretary on Credentials
 - (4) Declaration that the Session is ready for business
 - (5) Report of the Committee for Dispatch of Business
 - (6) Report of the Committee for the Special Session
- (b) The business conducted during this Session shall follow the direction of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas.
- (c) The following procedure shall close the Special Session:
 - (1) Report of the Committee for Resolutions
 - (2) Report of the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes
 - (3) Motion, Adjournment, Doxology, and Benediction

Section 2.7 General Rules for Order and Procedure

- (a) Each morning, afternoon, or evening during the meeting of the Council shall constitute one Session, during which the Council may take recess at its option.
- (b) Members of Council, officers of the Diocese, and representatives of the news media are the only ones to be admitted to the Council Floor. Boundaries of the Council Floor shall be clearly defined. All visitors may sit outside of this boundary as the space will permit.
- (c) Members desiring to speak shall rise, respectfully address the Chair, identify themselves by name and parish or mission, and confine themselves to the subject under discussion. They are to avoid personalities, irreverences, personal feelings, and experiences. Members shall not speak more than twice on the same proposition.
- (d) When a report is submitted, it shall be typed with the original signed, and one copy, and accompanied by resolution when action by the Council is recommended.
 - (1) All reports to Council shall be given to the Secretary of the Diocese and shall become the property of the Diocese. When directed by the Executive Board, reports shall be sent by the Chair of each Committee, Commission, Board, or person responsible for preparing same to the Secretary of the Diocese, on or before a date not less than forty-five days prior to the next regular meeting of the

Council, such date to be specified in a written notice which shall be mailed by the Secretary of the Diocese to each such person. These reports shall be printed in a pre-Council booklet and copies mailed, at least two weeks before the opening of Council, to all Members of the Clergy, Officers of the Diocese, and a sufficient number to each Parish and Mission for use by the Clergy and Delegates and Alternates who are to attend the next regular meeting of the Council. All such reports having been so printed and distributed shall be presented to the Council by title. Any member of Council shall have the privilege of questioning the person responsible for such report.

 - (1) Any motion or resolution, withdrawn without action thereon by the Council, need not be noted on the record. The Council may exclude from the record any motion or resolution which has been negatived by the Council or which has been ruled out of order.
 - (2) A motion to adjourn shall always be in order when no member is speaking, and shall be decided without debate; but if negatived, it shall not be renewed until some other business has intervened.
- (f) When a proposition is under consideration, no motion shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone, to commit, to amend, or to divide said motions taking precedence in the order named. The motion to lay on the table is not debatable.
 - (1) A proposition once decided or indefinitely postponed shall not be considered by the same Council unless a motion to reconsider is made by a delegate who voted on the prevailing side and can show the same by three witnesses, and provided a quorum is present. If adopted, the vote must be by two-thirds of the members present.
- (g) Subject to the foregoing, the Rules of Order of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, where applicable, shall obtain in all deliberations of the

Council, and shall be enforced by the President without debate, subject to an appeal from the President's decision to the Council.

- (h) Additional matters may be presented to the Council at such time as determined by the Committee for Dispatch of Business, consistent with the other provisions of this Canon. The Committee may limit the time for consideration of such matters. It shall be the privilege of this Committee to evaluate these matters and recommend the acceptance or rejection of them in the order of Business.
- (i) Any of these rules may be suspended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SUBMITTED BY: Bishop C. Andrew Doyle and the Executive Board

RATIONALE (by the Chancellor on behalf of the Submitters): The current Canon 2 envisions a multi-day Annual Council divided into multiple "sessions," which of course is not our current practice. The purposes of this amendment are (1) to reflect the current practice of a single-day Annual Council by eliminating the references to separate "sessions" of Council, (2) to provide flexibility and efficiency in the conduct of Council proceedings, and (3) to eliminate references to "printing," "typing," and "mailing" that are outdated in an era of modern wordprocessing and communications technology.

Specifically, the proposed amendment gives the responsibility for resolutions arising out of the Bishop's address to the Committee on Resolutions and does away with the Committee for the Bishop's Address, eliminates the requirement that the Committee for Constitution and Canons give two reports at Council, and allows flexibility in the order of Council proceedings.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS ADOPTION OF THIS PROPOSAL.

Canon 4 DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS OF THE DIOCESE

Section 4.9 Certain Bishop Delegations

Canon 5 THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE DIOCESE

EXISTING:

Section 5.2 *Powers – Authority*

The Executive Board shall exercise all powers of the Diocesan Council, between meetings thereof, in connection with the unification, long range planning, development, and prosecution of the work of Missions, Church Growth, Christian Formation, the Church and the Community, Communication, and the Church Pension Fund; and in supervision and direction of the acts of the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church Council in the Diocese of Texas, the Trustees of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, and the Trustees of The Bishop Quin Foundation for the performance of such work as may be committed to such diocesan institutions by the Council; and in the initiation and development of such new work between said meetings as the Executive Board may deem necessary; subject, however, to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, and other directions of the Council.

Section 5.3 Membership – Elections – Vacancies

- (a) The Executive Board shall be composed of the following persons:
 - (1) The Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chair.
 - (2) The following persons will serve, ex-officio:
 - (a) The Coadjutor Bishop, if there be one.
 - (b) The Suffragan Bishops, if there be any.
 - (c) The Assistant Bishop, if there be one.
 - (d) The President of the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas.
 - (e) The Treasurer of the Diocese.

- (4) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Executive Board with voice, but without vote if either be elected from outside the elected membership of the Board, as hereinafter provided in Section 5.3(a)(3).
- (b) In addition to the members, the following persons shall attend the meetings of the Executive Board from time to time, as the Board shall require and for such purpose as the Board shall specify: the Convocational Deans, the Division Chairs, the Chancellor, the President of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, the President of The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Canon to the Ordinary, the Canon for Missions and Program, and the Canon for Hispanic Ministry.

RATIONALE (by the Chancellor on behalf of the Submitters): The purposes of this amendment are (i) to add the Episcopal Health Foundation and the Great Commission Foundation to the list of diocesan foundations subject to the oversight of the Executive Board for the performance of any new work entrusted to them by either Council or the Executive Board and (ii) to add the Executive Chair of the Episcopal Health Foundation and the President of the Great Commission Foundation to the list of diocesan officers who from time to time may be required to attend Executive Board meetings.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS ADOPTION OF THIS PROPOSAL.

Canon 27 ST. LUKE'S EPISCOPAL HEALTH SYSTEM

EXISTING:

Section 27.1 Purpose

The purpose of the entity known as St. Luke's Episcopal Health System Corporation, a Texas non-profit corporation (the "Health System"), is to conduct a health delivery system and to serve as the health ministry of the Diocese through its components, which may include, without limitation, one or more hospitals, outpatient treatment facilities, clinics, health maintenance organizations, preferred provider organizations, physician organizations and insurance companies, with any and all appropriate adjuncts incident thereto. The Health System shall be a benevolent, charitable, educational, research, and religious institution and shall have full power and authority to erect, equip, manage, and operate its assets on its own financial responsibility in accordance with its charter, its bylaws, which its Board of Directors shall adopt, and the Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided that neither the Health System nor St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital (the "Hospital") shall (1) merge or consolidate with any legal entity if effectuation of the merger or consolidation would result in any issuance by the Health System or the Hospital of any membership interest to any person or entity other than

the Diocese, (2) enter into any transaction that will result in a sale or lease of any interest in either such entity or all or substantially all of its assets or a material change in the control of its operations, (3) provide for a change in the number or process of nomination or election or selection of its Board of Directors, provided, with respect to the Hospital, such changes may be made by the Health System Board with the consent of the Bishop of the Diocese of Texas, or (4) enter into any transaction that has the effect of any of the foregoing, without, in any such case, approval in principle by an Annual Council or a Special Session of Council.

Section 27.2 Directors

- (a) Governance of the affairs of the Health System shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of up to twenty-one (21) elected members, three (3) of whom shall be members of the Clergy, plus ex-officio members (with full voice and, with certain exceptions, as stated below, vote) consisting of: 1) the Bishop of the Diocese of Texas (who shall be Chair of the Board of Directors); 2) either the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, or any Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese designated by the Bishop; 3) the Chair of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Episcopal Health Charities; and 4) the Chief Executive Officer of the Health System. Each Member of the Board of Directors, including both elected and ex-officio Members, is referred to herein as a "Director."
- (b) After consultation between the Chair of the Board of Directors of the Health System and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of THI regarding such selection, the THI shall have the right to select one (1) person who shall be a member of the Board of Trustees of THI to serve as a non-voting ex-officio member of the Board of Directors of the Health System, and such person shall have all of the other rights afforded to the other members of the Board of Directors of the Health System-provided, that the Health System shall have the right, after consultation between the Chair of the Board of Directors of the Health System and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of THI regarding such nomination, to nominate one (1) person who shall be a member of the Board of Directors of the Health System, to serve as a non-voting member of the Board of Trustees of THI, and the Board of Trustees of THI shall take such action as shall be necessary to cause such person, and, in the event of a vacancy, the successor designated by the Health System, to be elected to the Board of Trustees of THI with all of the rights afforded to other members of the Board of Trustees of THI other than voting.

Section 27.3 Elections – Vacancies

At each Annual Council, up to one-third of the elected members of the Board of Directors of the Health System (plus vacancies, if any) shall be elected, including one member of the Clergy, to serve for a term of three years and until their successors are duly elected and qualified. Election at an Annual Council shall be from nominations made by the Bishop. Except for the *ex-officio* Directors and as provided below, no Director shall be eligible for renomination after serving three (3) consecutive complete three (3) year terms until standing off the Board for one (1) full year; provided that at the discretion of the Bishop no more than two (2) Directors (in order of consecutive seniority) whose three (3) year terms are expiring and who have served three (3) or

more consecutive three (3) year terms shall be ineligible for renomination. The Board of Directors of the Health System may fill any vacancies which occur in the elected membership during the year to serve until the following Annual Council, when the vacancy shall be filled by election at such Annual Council. The Directors of all subsidiaries and affiliates of the Health System shall be elected by the Board of Directors of the Health System from nominations by the Bishop.

Section 27.4 Chapels

The Bishop is authorized to establish chapels to serve the Health System, which shall include, without limitation, a chapel facility in St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital. All chapels shall be in union with the Council and under the authority of the Bishop, or the Bishop's designee. All chapels shall maintain all of the usual records, make such parochial reports as may be required by the Bishop, or the Bishop's designee, and shall be represented in the Council by their Chaplains.

PROPOSED:

Canon 27 ST. LUKE'SEPISCOPAL HEALTH SYSTEMFOUNDATION

Section 27.1 Purpose An Instrumentality of the Diocese

The purpose of the entity known as St. Luke's Episcopal Health System Corporation, a Texas non-profit corporation (the "Health System"), is to conduct a health delivery system and to serve as the health ministry of the Diocese through its components, which may include, without limitation, one or more hospitals, outpatient treatment facilities, clinics, health maintenance organizations, preferred provider organizations, physician organizations and insurance companies, with any and all appropriate adjuncts incident thereto. The Health System shall be a benevolent, charitable, educational, research, and religious institution and shall have full power and authority to erect, equip, manage, and operate its assets on its own financial responsibility in accordance with its charter, its bylaws, which its Board of Directors shall adopt, and the Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided that neither the Health System nor St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital (the "Hospital") shall (1) merge or consolidate with any legal entity if effectuation of the merger or consolidation would result in any issuance by the Health System or the Hospital of any membership interest to any person or entity other than the Diocese, (2) enter into any transaction that will result in a sale or lease of any interest in either such entity or all or substantially all of its assets or a material change in the control of its operations, (3) provide for a change in the number or process of nomination or election or selection of its Board of Directors, provided, with respect to the Hospital, such changes may be made by the Health System Board with the consent of the Bishop of the Diocese of Texas, or (4) enter into any transaction that has the effect of any of the foregoing, without, in any such case, approval in principle by an Annual Council or a Special Session of Council.

The Episcopal Health Foundation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Foundation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to promote human health (including, without limitation, complete physical, mental, and social well-being and not just merely the

absence of disease and infirmity), healthcare excellence, advances in health science, and improvements in community health services, all of the foregoing to benefit the areas served by the healing and healthcare ministries of the Diocese of Texas.

Section 27.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

(a) Governance of the affairs of the Health System shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of up to twenty-one (21) elected members, three (3) of whom shall be members of the Clergy, plus ex-officio members (with full voice and, with certain exceptions, as stated below, vote) consisting of: 1) the Bishop of the Diocese of Texas (who shall be Chair of the Board of Directors); 2) either the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, or any Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese designated by the Bishop; 3) the Chair of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Episcopal Health Charities; and 4) the Chief Executive Officer of the Health System. Each Member of the Board of Directors, including both elected and ex-officio Members, is referred to herein as a "Director."

(b) After consultation between the Chair of the Board of Directors of the Health System and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of THI regarding such selection, the THI shall have the right to select one (1) person who shall be a member of the Board of Trustees of THI to serve as a non-voting ex-officio member of the Board of Directors of the Health System, and such person shall have all of the other rights afforded to the other members of the Board of Directors of the Health System-provided, that the Health System shall have the right, after consultation between the Chair of the Board of Directors of the Health System and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of THI regarding such nomination, to nominate one (1) person who shall be a member of the Board of Directors of the Health System, to serve as a non-voting member of the Board of Trustees of THI, and the Board of Trustees of THI shall take such action as shall be necessary to cause such person, and, in the event of a vacancy, the successor designated by the Health System, to be elected to the Board of Trustees of THI with all of the rights afforded to other members of the Board of Trustees of THI other than voting.

The management of the affairs of the Foundation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and fourteen other Directors, at least three of whom shall be Episcopal clergy canonically resident and in good standing in the Diocese. At least two-thirds of the remaining Directors shall be lay persons at least eighteen years of age and confirmed communicants in good standing of some Parish or Mission of the Diocese. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Foundation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Foundation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Foundation's Certificate of Formation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Foundation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Foundation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Foundation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Foundation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

Section 27.3 Elections – Vacancies Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

At each Annual Council, up to one-third of the elected members of the Board of Directors of the Health System (plus vacancies, if any) shall be elected, including one member of the Clergy, to The terms of office of the elected Board members shall be staggered so that one-third of the elected members shall be elected at each Annual Council. All elections shall be upon nomination by the Bishop. Reasonable effort shall be made to ensure that the Board includes reasonable representation from each of the West, East and South regions of the Diocese. Except as set forth below for the initial full Board, each elected Director shall serve for a term of three years and until their successors are duly elected and qualified. Election at an Annual Council shall be from nominations made by the Bishop. Except for the ex-officio Directors and as provided below, no Director shall be eligible for renomination after serving three (3) consecutive complete three (3) year terms until standing off the Board for one (1) full year; provided that at the discretion of the Bishop no more than two (2) Directors (in order of consecutive seniority) whose three (3) year terms are expiring and who have served three (3) or more consecutive three (3) year terms shall be ineligible for renomination. The Board of Directors of the Health System may fill any vacancies which occur in the elected membership during the year to serve until the following Annual Council, when the vacancy shall be filled by election at such Annual Council. The Directors of all subsidiaries and affiliates of the Health System shall be elected by the Board of Directors of the Health System from nominations by the Bishop., and may serve for two successive three-year terms, after which a person shall not be allowed to serve as an elected Director until such person has been off the Board for one full year. At the first Annual Council following the organization of the Foundation, three Directors each shall be elected to serve for initial terms of one year, two years, and three years. Persons elected to initial terms of one year and two years or thereafter appointed to fill an unexpired term may be elected to serve up to two consecutive additional terms of three years each, after which they shall not be renominated until after they have been off the Board for one full year. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term by appointment by the Bishop with the concurrence of the Board.

Section 27.4 Chapels Bylaws and Officers

The Bishop is authorized to establish chapels to serve the Health System, which shall include, without limitation, a chapel facility in St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital. All chapels shall be in union with the Council and under the authority of the Bishop, or the Bishop's designee. All chapels shall maintain all of the usual records, make such parochial reports as may be required by the Bishop, or the Bishop's designee, and shall be represented in the Council by their Chaplains.

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Foundation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Chair shall appoint from the members of the Board who are Episcopalians an Executive Chair, whose duties and responsibilities shall be as set forth in the Bylaws. The Board shall also elect an Executive Director, who shall be the president and chief executive officer of the Foundation, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as the Foundation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers, other than the Chair, shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 27.5 Properties and Funds

The Foundation shall establish an endowment fund, which shall be held, preserved, managed, and invested for the sole use and benefit of the Foundation in carrying out its purposes. Such endowment shall consist of all assets, properties, income, and appreciation in value that may be contributed to the Foundation with the direction that the same be, or with the agreement or upon the representation that the same will be, placed in such an endowment fund. The Board of Directors may disburse funds from the endowment in accordance with such spending policy as the Board may establish from time to time consistent with the long term mission of the Foundation. All property and funds received by the Foundation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Foundation.

Section 27.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Foundation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Foundation.

IF AMENDED:

Canon 27 EPISCOPAL HEALTH FOUNDATION

Section 27.1 An Instrumentality of the Diocese

The Episcopal Health Foundation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Foundation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to promote human health (including, without limitation, complete physical, mental, and social well-being and not just merely the absence of disease and infirmity), healthcare excellence, advances in health science, and improvements in community health services, all of the foregoing to benefit the areas served by the healing and healthcare ministries of the Diocese of Texas.

Section 27.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

The management of the affairs of the Foundation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and fourteen other Directors, at least three of whom shall be Episcopal clergy canonically resident and in good standing in the Diocese. At least two-thirds of the remaining Directors shall be lay persons at least eighteen years of age and confirmed communicants in good standing of some Parish or Mission of the Diocese. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Foundation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Foundation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Foundation's Certificate of Formation

and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Foundation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Foundation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Foundation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Foundation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

Section 27.3 Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

The terms of office of the elected Board members shall be staggered so that onethird of the elected members shall be elected at each Annual Council. All elections shall be upon nomination by the Bishop. Reasonable effort shall be made to ensure that the Board includes reasonable representation from each of the West, East and South regions of the Diocese. Except as set forth below for the initial full Board, each elected Director shall serve for a term of three years, and may serve for two successive three-year terms, after which a person shall not be allowed to serve as an elected Director until such person has been off the Board for one full year. At the first Annual Council following the organization of the Foundation, three Directors each shall be elected to serve for initial terms of one year, two years, and three years. Persons elected to initial terms of one year and two years or thereafter appointed to fill an unexpired term may be elected to serve up to two consecutive additional terms of three years each, after which they shall not be renominated until after they have been off the Board for one full year. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term by appointment by the Bishop with the concurrence of the Board.

Section 27.4 Bylaws and Officers

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Foundation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Chair shall appoint from the members of the Board who are Episcopalians an Executive Chair, whose duties and responsibilities shall be as set forth in the Bylaws. The Board shall also elect an Executive Director, who shall be the president and chief executive officer of the Foundation, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as the Foundation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers, other than the Chair, shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 27.5 Properties and Funds

The Foundation shall establish an endowment fund, which shall be held, preserved, managed, and invested for the sole use and benefit of the Foundation in carrying out its purposes. Such endowment shall consist of all assets, properties, income, and appreciation in value that may be contributed to the Foundation with the direction that the same be, or with the agreement or upon the representation that the same will be, placed in such an endowment fund. The Board of Directors may disburse funds from the endowment in accordance with such spending policy as the Board may establish from time to time consistent with the long term mission of the Foundation. All property and funds received by the Foundation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Foundation.

Section 27.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Foundation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Foundation.

SUBMITTED BY: Bishop C. Andrew Doyle, the Executive Board, and the Directors of the Episcopal Health Foundation

RATIONALE (By the Chancellor on behalf of the Submitters): The Episcopal Health Foundation was created as a Texas non-profit corporation to receive the proceeds from the sale of the St. Luke's Episcopal Health System. The Episcopal Health Foundation holds, manages, and invests those funds as an endowment to support the healing and healthcare ministries of the Diocese. As the sole Member of the non-profit corporation, the Diocese has the statutory rights of an "owner," including the right to elect the board of directors and to approve certain corporate actions. The purpose of this new canon is to recognize the Foundation as an instrumentality of the Diocese and to provide by canon the means by which the Diocese will exercise those rights.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS ADOPTION OF THIS PROPOSAL.

CANON 43 MORAL DISCIPLINE

EXISTING:

Section 43.1 Obligation

All members of the clergy, having subscribed to the Declaration required by Article VIII of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church, shall be under obligation to model in their own lives the received teaching of the Church that all of its members are to abstain from sexual relations outside Holy Matrimony.

Section 43.2 *Definitions*

As used in this Diocese, Holy Matrimony shall mean the physical and spiritual union of a man and a woman, entered into within the community of faith, by mutual consent of the heart, mind, and will, and with intent that it be lifelong; and the moral qualifications of a person, as that term is used in the Canons of the Episcopal Church, shall include conformity to the obligation set forth in Section 43.1 hereof.

PROPOSED:

Section 43.1 Obligation

All members of the clergy, having subscribed to the Declaration required by Article VIII of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church, shall be under obligation to model in their own lives the received teaching of the Church that all of its members are to abstain from sexual relations outside Holy Matrimony.

Section 43.2 Definitions Moral Qualifications

As used in this Diocese, Holy Matrimony shall mean the physical and spiritual union of a man and a woman, entered into within the community of faith, by mutual consent of the heart, mind, and will, and with intent that it be lifelong; and the The moral qualifications of a person, as that term is used in the Canons of the Episcopal Church, shall include conformity to the obligation set forth in Section 43.1 hereof.

IF AMENDED:

Section 43.1 Obligation

All members of the clergy, having subscribed to the Declaration required by Article VIII of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church, shall be under obligation to model in their own lives the received teaching of the Church that all of its members are to abstain from sexual relations outside Holy Matrimony.

Section 43.2 Moral Qualifications

The moral qualifications of a person, as that term is used in the Canons of the Episcopal Church, shall include conformity to the obligation set forth in Section 43.1 hereof.

RATIONALE: The proscription in Section One of the canon, titled *Obligation*, appropriately requires that married clergy in the diocese observe and honor their vows of marital fidelity. There is wide agreement that the violation of marriage vows hurts the spiritual well-being of persons directly involved in the sin of adultery along with the spouses and children of those involved. Rightly so, then, fidelity to marriage vows among diocesan clergy is identified by Section One, *Obligations*, as a value especially important to the Diocese of Texas.

The problem arises in Section Two, titled *Definitions*. The canon's definition of the sacrament of Holy Matrimony itself is not the problem, since it is wholly consistent with definitions of Holy Matrimony referenced in scripture and found in both the Book of Common Prayer and the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church. The problem resides in the claiming of a diocesan definition of a sacrament. Because the sacraments of the Church are defined by the Church as a whole, for the Church as a

whole, it is inappropriate and contrary to the Episcopal Church's polity and practice for our diocese to claim our own localized definition of this sacrament or of any sacrament of the Church. Thus, Section Two, *Definitions*, needs to be modified.

Discussion and debate around Canon 43 may historically have included debate around controversies of same-sex unions and gay or lesbian clergy; however, these matters are not inherently related to the problem identified here. For this reason this proposal addresses nothing related to those topics or to any other separate topic. This proposal concerns exclusively the claiming of a localized definition of a sacrament as something that stands in contradiction to Episcopal Church polity. Therefore, the author of this proposal believes that, if discussion and debate are able to proceed at this year's Council without distraction or abbreviation, this year's Council may well resolve dispute around Canon 43 once for all. With the adoption of this proposal, those parts of Canon 43 are preserved around which there is no dispute and only wide agreement.

Section 43.1 *Obligation*

All members of the clergy, having subscribed to the Declaration required by Article VIII of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church, shall be under obligation to model in their own lives the received teaching of the Church that all of its members are to abstain from sexual relations outside Holy Matrimony have stated at their ordinations they will solemnly engage to conform to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Episcopal Church and they will obey their Bishop and other ministers who may have authority over them and their work. In matters of discipline, this Diocese accedes to the authority

of the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, including but not limited to Title IV of the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Section 43.2 Definitions Standards of Conduct

As used in this Diocese, Holy Matrimony shall mean the physical and spiritual union of a man and a woman, entered into within the community of faith, by mutual consent of the heart, mind, and will, and with intent that it be lifelong, and the moral qualifications of a person, as that term is used in the Canons of the Episcopal Church, shall include conformity to the obligation set forth in Section 43.1 hereof. In exercising his or her ministry, a member of the clergy shall abide by the standards of conduct enumerated in Title IV.4 of the Canons of the Episcopal Church and, among other prohibited acts, shall refrain from any act of Sexual Misconduct and any Conduct Unbecoming a Member of the Clergy, as those terms are defined in Title IV.2 of the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Section 43.3 Accountability

A member of the clergy shall be held accountable and made subject to disciplinary proceedings under the inherent powers held by the Bishop of this Diocese, in addition to any act that is expressly subject to disciplinary proceedings under Title IV of the Canons of the Episcopal Church. Under no circumstances shall a member of the clergy be subject to discipline because of his or her race, color, ethnic origin, national origin, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, disabilities or age, except as otherwise specified by Canons.

IF AMENDED:

Section 43.1 Obligation

All members of the clergy, having subscribed to the Declaration required by Article VIII of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church, have stated at their ordinations they will solemnly engage to conform to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Episcopal Church and they will obey their Bishop and other ministers who may have authority over them and their work. In matters of discipline, this Diocese accedes to the authority of the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, including but not limited to Title IV of the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Section 43.2 Standards of Conduct

In exercising his or her ministry, a member of the clergy shall abide by the standards of conduct enumerated in Title IV.4 of the Canons of the Episcopal Church and, among other prohibited acts, shall refrain from any act of Sexual Misconduct and any Conduct Unbecoming a Member of the Clergy, as those terms are defined in Title IV.2 of the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Section 43.3 Accountability

A member of the clergy shall be held accountable and made subject to disciplinary proceedings under the inherent powers held by the Bishop of this Diocese, in addition to any act that is expressly subject to disciplinary proceedings under Title IV of the Canons of the Episcopal Church. Under no circumstances shall a member of the clergy be subject to discipline because of his or her race, color, ethnic origin, national origin, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, disabilities or age, except as otherwise specified by Canons.

RATIONALE:

Because of the sensitive subject matter of this amendment, the vote to amend Canon 43 should be taken by written ballot to preserve the privacy of the delegates' votes and to allow the will of Diocesan Council to be more accurately expressed.

1 Canonical reasons for amending Canon 43

Canon 44 states "In all matters of ecclesiastical discipline...the Diocese shall follow and be governed by Title IV of the Canons of the Episcopal Church...." Therefore, the

subject matter of Canon 43 is governed by Title IV of the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

The amended language clarifies the standards of conduct to which clergy are held and the sources of those standards under the disciplinary Canons of the Episcopal Church, to which this Diocese accedes. The amendment makes clear that clergy not only must conduct themselves according to these standards, but that they will be held accountable for violating them. The Bishop holds inherent authority and powers of oversight over the clergy of this Diocese, in addition to authority conferred by the Canons of the Episcopal Church and the Canons of this Diocese.

2. Scriptural and theological reasons for amending Canon 43

Canon 43 should be amended because in its present form it applies historic biblical standards to a minority group while exempting a majority from those standards. Historically, the Church condemned the use of artificial birth control and remarriage after divorce, especially for clergy, on biblical grounds. Pastoral considerations led the Episcopal Church to make accommodations for these matters. These accommodations are implicitly incorporated into Canon 43. Selective accommodations are outside biblical understanding and the Episcopal tradition. Biblical justice counsels God's universal love and mercy, a fact long recognized by the Church in its pastoral approach, specifically to the issues mentioned above. This approach is commended and passionately urged in Scripture throughout: the Torah, the Prophets, the Wisdom writings, and the Gospel all encourage this very approach which our Church has long maintained. The theology of Paul is rife with references to it, and even the Apocryphal writers maintain God's mercy and love, and humankind's reflection of it, as paramount in our pastoral dealings with God's people. The Canon in its present form generates undue confusion as to the Church's mission and impedes evangelism. The Gospel tradition acknowledges our need for God's love and grace encountered in Jesus Christ. The proposed amendment of Canon 43 knits together biblical and pastoral understanding with the wider tradition of the Diocese and the Episcopal Church.

3. Protection of privacy and cultural relevance of the Church

Current Canon 43 does not include guidelines on enforcement and therefore may allow erroneous conclusions about the private lives of clergy. The possibility of unfounded accusation and resultant intrusion into a clergy person's privacy leaves Canon 43 as written needlessly vague, offensive, and dangerous to many and possibly damaging to the morale of the clergy and all those who care about them. As the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled, citizens "are entitled to respect for their private lives...It is a promise of the Constitution that there is a realm of personal liberty which the government should not enter." Lawrence v. Texas, 539 U.S. 558, 578 (2003). Likewise, the Church should not enter that realm, or even threaten to do so, without clear guidelines and justification for its activity. Current Canon 43 is deficient because it does not contain those safeguards. The amendment offered removes the vague and risky nature of Canon 43 by referring to the concrete terms of the Episcopal Canons.

Canon 49 [New] THE GREAT COMMISSION FOUNDATION

The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Foundation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Foundation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Foundation's Certificate of Formation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Foundation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Foundation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Foundation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Foundation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

All property and funds received by the Foundation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Foundation.

Section 49.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Foundation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Foundation.

SUBMITTED BY: Bishop C. Andrew Doyle, the Executive Board, and the Directors of the Great Commission Foundation

RATIONALE (By the Chancellor on behalf of the Submitters): The Great Commission Foundation was created as a Texas non-profit corporation to receive a "tithe" portion of the proceeds from the sale of the St. Luke's Episcopal Health System. The Great Commission Foundation holds, manages, and invests those funds as an endowment to further the missionary and church-planting strategy of the Diocese. As the sole Member of the non-profit corporation, the Diocese has the statutory rights of an "owner," including the right to elect the board of directors and to approve certain corporate actions. The purpose of this new canon is to recognize the Foundation as an instrumentality of the Diocese and to provide by canon the means by which the Diocese will exercise those rights.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS ADOPTION OF THIS PROPOSAL.

Canon 50 [New] EDOT FINANCIAL SERVICES CORPORATION

Section 50.1 An Instrumentality of the Diocese

EDOT Financial Services Corporation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Corporation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to provide the Diocese and its foundations with accounting, financial, administrative, and investment management services support.

Section 50.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

The management of the affairs of the Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and five other Directors. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Corporation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Corporation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Corporation's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Corporation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Corporation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Corporation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Corporation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

Section 50.3 Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

The Directors, in addition to the Bishop, shall be the Presidents of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas, and the Great Commission Foundation and the Executive Chair of the Episcopal Health Foundation. Each such Director shall serve for so long as that person is the incumbent of the office that entitles that person to serve as a Director. Any vacancy occurring in any of these Director positions shall be filled automatically by the successor incumbent of the office that entitled the person vacating the position to serve as a Director of the Corporation. At their option these Directors may designate another member of their respective foundation boards to take their places as Directors of the Corporation. Such delegation shall expire at the end of each calendar year.

Section 50.4 Bylaws and Officers

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Corporation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Board shall elect a President, a Secretary, and such other officers as the Corporation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers other than the Chair shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 50.5 Administration and Use of Funds

The Directors shall have full charge of the administration and use of all funds received by the Corporation. All funds received by the Corporation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Corporation.

Section 50.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Corporation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Corporation. The books and records of the Corporation shall at all times be open for examination and inspection by the Executive Board or its designee.

SUBMITTED BY: Robert J. Biehl, Treasurer of the Diocese

RATIONALE (By Mr. Biehl) EDOT Financial Services Corporation was created as a Texas non-profit corporation to assist the foundations of the Diocese with their administrative, financial, accounting, and investment management work. The Corporation will provide staff to the foundations, assist in the day to day management of the affairs of the foundations, and assure that the assets entrusted to the foundations are held and invested in compliance with all Diocesan policies and internal controls. The foundations will benefit economically by sharing the costs of these services, and the Diocese will benefit by removing these expenses and the corresponding revenues from the Diocesan budget. The purpose of this new canon is to recognize the Corporation as an instrumentality of the Diocese and to provide by canon for the composition of its Board of Directors and for Diocesan oversight of its activities.

THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS ADOPTION OF THIS PROPOSAL.

Chris Duncan, chair of the Committee on Nominations, began the presentation of the report of that committee by placing in nomination the name of John A. Logan, Jr. for Secretary of the Diocese. There being no further nominations, the motion was adopted on a voice vote that Canon Logan be elected.

Nominated by the Committee for Treasurer of the Diocese was Robert J. Biehl. There being no further nominations, the motion was adopted on a voice vote that Robert J. Biehl be elected.

Nominated by the Committee for the Standing Committee (lay order), Rebecca Brindley and Gregory Vincent. Nominated from the floor was Ellen Mallay. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

Nominated by the Committee for the Standing Committee (clergy order) were Bert Baetz and Pedro Lopez. Nominated from the floor was Michael Wyckoff. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

Nominated by the Committee for the Executive Board (lay order) were Samuel Dodson, Caroline Jones, Wayne Mathis, Carol Pinkett, Rob Scholl, and David Vineyard. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

Nominated by the Committee for the Executive Board (clergy order) were Jimmy Abbott, Robert Goolsby, Ralph Morgan, and Matt Wise. Nominated from the floor was Nick Novak. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

Nominated by the Committee for trustee of the Church Corporation were Peter Boyd, Mark Browning, and Corky Moore. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

Nominated by the Committee for trustee of the University of the South were John Garland III and Chuck Treadwell. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

Nominated by the Committee for General Convention Deputy (lay order) were Laurie Eiserloh, David Harvin, Junior Higgins, Lisa Martin, Mary Parmer, Linda Patterson, Carole Pinkett, and Trey Yarbrough. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

Nominated by the Committee for General Convention Deputy (clergy order) were Miles Brandon, Mark Crawford, Janet Dantone, Christine Faulstich, Susan Kennard, Patrick Miller, Rhoda Montgomery, Uriel Osnaya-Jimenez, Kevin Schubert, Stuart Shelby, Chuck Treadwell, and Matt Wise. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

Nominated by the Committee for Provincial Synod (lay order) were Sandra Alonso, Bill Beare, Carol Brown, Gwendolyn Chance, Mark Duncan, Harold Frauli, Annanelle Hay, and Mary Sturdevant. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed

Nominated by the Committee for Provincial Synod (clergy order) were Hannah Atkins, Frederick Clarkson, Geoffrey Gwynne, Meredith Holt, Mitch Tollett, Erin Warde, Francene Young, and Aaron Zimmerman. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed.

The election procedure was then explained. Before the first ballot was taken, the Chaplain led the Council in prayer.

Bob Biehl, treasurer, presented the 2013 financial report of the diocese (see elsewhere for details). The Diocese had ended the year in good financial condition. The motion to accept the report was made and adopted on a voice vote.

The recommended 2014 Unified Balanced Budget (see elsewhere for details) of \$8,147,077 (this does not include \$1,375,000 moved to Great Commission Fund expenses

and \$5,000,000 moved to Episcopal Health Foundation expenses) was then presented and moved for adoption by the Finance Committee. There being no discussion, the budget was adopted on a voice vote. It was noted that a "clean" audit report had been received.

The Chaplain led Council in Noon Day prayers and prayers for those lay persons and clergy who had served the Diocese in past years and had departed this life since the 164th Council (the complete list may be found elsewhere in this *Journal*).

John Newton presented a report on Christian Formation with special attention on Youth Ministry. The Youth Delegates at the 165 Council were presented. Drew Dugger and Anna Thomas were introduced to report on the \$2,000 Grants of the Trading Talents Project. A video presentation accompanied their report.

The Chaplain offered prayers before the results of Ballot #1 were announced. For the Standing Committee, lay order, Greg Vincent was elected. For Standing Committee, clergy order, there would be a run-off between Bert Baetz and Pedro Lopez. Elected to the Executive Board, lay order, were Samuel Dodson, David Vineyard, and Carole Pinkett. Elected to the Executive Board, clergy order, was Jimmy Abbott. There would be a run-off between Ralph Morgan and Matt Wise. Elected to the Church Corporation was Peter Boyd. Elected as a Trustee for The University of the South was Chuck Treadwell. Elected as Provincial Synod Delegates, lay order, were Carol Brown, Gwendolyn Chance, Mark Duncan, and Mary Sturdevant. Elected as Provincial Synod Delegates, clergy order, were Hannah Atkins, Meredith Holt, Francene Young, and Aaron Zimmerman. Elected as Deputies to General Convention, lay order, were David Harvin, Junior Higgins, Mary Parmer, and Trey Yarbrough. Elected as Deputy to General Convention, clergy order, was Mark Crawford. There would be a run-off between Miles Brandon, Janet Dantone, Susan Kennard, Patrick Miller, Uriel Osnaya-Jimenez, and Chuck Treadwell.

Ballot #2 was taken, followed by a recess for lunch.

SECOND SESSION

Members of Saint Aidan's Church, the newest Parish congregation in the Diocese were introduced and welcomed. Remarks by the new Senior Warden and the new Rector followed.

Bishop Fisher introduced Wes Bard, new Executive Director of Saint James' House, Baytown. Bishop Harrison introduced Cynthia Kittredge, Dean of the Seminary of the Southwest. Bishop Doyle introduced Elena Marks, President and C.E.O. of the Episcopal Health Foundation, who spoke briefly to Council.

Keith Giblin, chair of the Committee on Resolutions, began the report of that Committee by presenting Resolution #1, submitted by the World Mission Board of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas.

A COVENANT OF COMPANION RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF NORTH DAKOTA AND THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF TEXAS

Whereas, the Diocese of Texas joined the Companion Diocese program of the Anglican Communion when the program was founded and has been richly blessed by this relationship; and

Whereas, God has given the Church in our two Dioceses a variety of complementary gifts for the glory of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and it is an honor for Christians to assist one another in God's work; and

Whereas, both Dioceses share a missionary vision including expansion through church planting, ministry to the vulnerable, a deep respect for the variety of cultural heritages of our people, an openness to learn from one another, a heart for joining with one another in Christian testimony through service, and a hope to develop a mutually transformative relationship between our people;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Diocese of Texas adopt a Covenant of Companion Relationship between the Episcopal Diocese of North Dakota and the Episcopal Diocese of Texas.

The Committee recommended the resolution and moved its adoption. There being no discussion, the resolution was adopted on a voice vote.

The Committee presented Resolution #2.

A COVENANT OF COMPANION RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF COSTA RICA, ANGLICAN CHURCH OF CENTRAL AMERICAN REGION AND THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF TEXAS

Whereas, the Diocese of Texas joined the Companion Diocese program of the Anglican Communion when the program was founded and has been richly blessed by this relationship; and

Whereas, God has given the Church in our two Dioceses a variety of complementary gifts for the glory of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and it is an honor for Christians to assist one another in God's work; and

Whereas, both Dioceses share a missionary vision including expansion through church planting, ministry to the vulnerable, theological reflection and Christian education, a desire to minister more fully in the languages of our people, a heart for our respective immigrants, a focus on Christian testimony through service, and a hope to have a mutually transformative relationship that is first and foremost based on *amistad*, friendship;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Diocese of Texas adopt a Covenant of Companion Relationship between the Episcopal Diocese of Costa Rica, Anglican Church of Central American Region, and the Episcopal Diocese of Texas.

The Committee recommended the resolution and moved its adoption. There being no discussion, the resolution was adopted on a voice vote.

Bishop Doyle, Bishop Harrison, and Meredith Holt (chair of the Companion Relationship Committee of the World Mission Board who introduced and welcomed the bishops of the new companion dioceses) welcomed the bishops of the new companion dioceses, North Dakota and Costa Rica: Bishop Michael G. Smith of the Diocese of North Dakota and Bishop Hector Monterroso of the Diocese of Costa Rica. Also present was Bishop Alinafe Kalemba, Diocese of Southern Malawi. The Companion Relationship documents were then signed, and the two bishops each spoke briefly to Council. Bishop Doyle then asked Bishop Kalemba to also speak briefly to Council. Gifts were then presented by Bishop Doyle to the three bishops.

Election results of the second ballot were announced: For Standing Committee, clergy order, Bert Baetz was elected. For Executive Board, clergy order, Matt Wise was elected. For General Convention Deputy, clergy order, Susan Kennard and Chuck Treadwell were elected. There will be another run-off between Patrick Miller and Uriel Osnaya-Jimenez. The Chaplain led the Council in prayer before Ballot #3 was taken.

Following a brief period of Table Talk, Maria Boyce, chair of the Committee on Constitution & Canons, began the report of the Committee by recommending and moving the adoption of amendments to Article 10.1–10.2 of the Constitution.

Article 10 AMENDING CANONS

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided (1) a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor, and (2) the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be altered, amended, or repealed by an Annual Council or a Special Session of Council, and any one or more of the provisions of the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed by unanimous written consent of the Bishop, the full membership of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System, and the full membership of the voting membership of the Executive Board.

Section 10.2 Publication of Amendments

Any change in any Canon adopted in Council shall be published in full in the *Journal* with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall post the *Journal* record reflecting the action by Council and the wording of the new Canon on the Diocesan website or

otherwise make it available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of the Council, and others interested.

Following a standing 2/3 vote, the motion to amend was adopted.

The Committee recommended and moved the adoption of amendments to Article 11.1–11.5 of the Constitution.

Article 11 AMENDING CONSTITUTION

Section 11.1 Authority for Procedure

Any proposition to amend this Constitution shall be submitted in writing to an Annual Council, when by consent it shall be published in the *Journal*; provided that a two-thirds vote shall be required to consent, unless a copy of the proposed amendment is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of Annual Council, but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor. At the next Annual Council it may be considered, and if passed by a two-thirds majority of the members of each order, voting concurrently, in the form as published or as the same may be amended by unanimous consent, it shall be incorporated into the Constitution as a part thereof.

Section 11.2 Amendments to be Written in Full

No part of the Constitution or Canons shall be amended by reference to its number, or by merely striking out or inserting words, but the article or section sought to be amended or altered shall be written out in full and presented as it is intended it shall read when amended.

Section 11.3 Publication of Amendments

Any change in any article of the Constitution adopted in Council shall be published in full in the *Journal* with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall post the *Journal* record reflecting the action of Council and the wording of the amendment on the Diocesan website or otherwise make it available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of Council, and others interested.

Section 11.4 Effective Date

Each duly adopted provision of this Constitution or any duly adopted alteration, amendment, addition, or repeal of an existing provision of this Constitution shall become effective on the day following the date of adjournment of the Diocesan Council Meeting at which it is adopted.

There being no objection, the motion to adopt Article 11 was passed by a 2/3 voice vote.

The Committee recommended and moved the adoption for a first reading of the amendment to Article 9.1–9.2 of the Constitution.

Article 9 PROPERTY

Section 9.1 Title to Real Property

The title to all real estate acquired for use of the Church in this diocese, including Parishes and Missions, as well as institutions of a diocesan character, shall be held subject to control of the Church in the Diocese of Texas acting by and through the Church Corporation known as "Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas"; provided, that (a) with consent of the Bishop, the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Episcopal Health Foundation, and the Great Commission Foundation may each hold title to real property and may control, convey, and encumber such property without the consent, approval, or joinder of the Church Corporation, and (b) title to certain real property and related improvements, fixtures, appurtenances, and contract rights, as determined by the Church Corporation with the consent of the Bishop, may be held by and subject to the control of one or more separate Texas nonprofit corporations to be formed by the Diocese of Texas. Subject to the foregoing, all such property hereafter acquired for use of the Church in the Diocese, including Parishes and Missions, shall be vested in the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas.

Section 9.2 Diocesan Property

Except as otherwise provided in Section 9.1, all property belonging to the Diocese, as such, shall be held in the name of the Church Corporation known as "Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas"; and no conveyance or encumbrance of any kind or character, unless it relates to property vested in the name of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Episcopal Health Foundation, or the Great Commission Foundation shall be valid unless executed by such corporation and as may otherwise be provided by the Canons of the Diocese. All permanent funds of the Diocese, except those funds held by the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Episcopal Health Foundation, and the Great Commission Foundation shall be held and invested by the "Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas."

There being no objection, the proposed constitutional amendment was adopted by a voice vote for a first reading and for printing in the *Journal*.

The Committee recommended and moved the adoption for a first reading of the amendment to Article 10.1 of the Constitution.

Article 10 AMENDING CANONS

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided that a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor.

There being no objection, the proposed amendment was adopted by a voice vote for a first reading and for printing in the *Journal*.

Beginning the consideration of proposed canonical changes, the request was made and granted to pull the proposed Canon 2 for discussion. After both proposals to Canon 43 were withdrawn, the remaining proposed canonical amendments were moved for adoption in a block.

Canon 4 DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS OF THE DIOCESE

Section 4.9 Certain Bishop Delegations

With respect to the Diocesan entities identified below, the Bishop shall have the power and authority to designate the Bishop Coadjutor or any Bishop Suffragan or Assistant Bishop to be an ex-officio member of the Board of such entity, to take the Bishop's place as Chair of such entity, and to exercise all rights and powers of such Chair. Such delegation shall expire at the end of each calendar year subject to the Bishop's right to terminate such delegated authority prior thereto or to extend such delegated authority for successive one-year periods. In the event of any such delegation of authority, the Bishop may elect to continue or to discontinue serving on such Board during the period of such delegation.

The Diocesan entities to which this Canon applies are: The Bishop Quin Foundation, St. Stephen's Episcopal School, Episcopal Health Foundation, Great Commission Foundation, Episcopal High School, El Buen Samaritano Episcopal Mission, Community of the Streets Outreach Corporation, and such other Diocesan entities as may provide for such delegation of authority by reference to this Canon. If any inconsistency between this Canon and the Canon establishing any of the above referenced Diocesan entities exists, this Canon shall control.

Canon 5 THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE DIOCESE

Section 5.2 *Powers – Authority*

The Executive Board shall exercise all powers of the Diocesan Council, between meetings thereof, in connection with the unification, long range planning, development, and prosecution of the work of Missions, Church Growth, Christian Formation, the Church and the Community, Communication, and the Church Pension Fund; and in supervision and direction of the acts of the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church Council in the Diocese of Texas, the Trustees of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, the Trustees of The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Directors of the Episcopal Health Foundation, and the Directors of the Great Commission Foundation for the performance of such work as may be committed to such diocesan institutions by the Council; and in the initiation and development of such new work between said meetings as the Executive Board may deem necessary; subject, however, to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, and other directions of the Council.

Section 5.3 *Membership – Elections – Vacancies*

- (a) The Executive Board shall be comprised of the following persons:
 - (1) The Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chair.
 - (2) The following persons will serve, ex-officio:
 - (a) The Coadjutor Bishop, if there be one.
 - (b) The Suffragan Bishops, if there be any.
 - (c) The Assistant Bishop, if there be one.
 - (d) The President of the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas.
 - (e) The Treasurer of the Diocese.
 - (f) The President of the Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Texas, with voice but without vote unless an elected member of the Executive Board as defined in Section 5.3(a)(3).
 - (3) Fifteen elected members, of whom six shall be members of the Clergy and nine shall be lay persons who are at least 18 years of age and are confirmed communicants in good standing of the Church in this Diocese. At each Annual Council there shall be elected five members, who shall serve for a term of three years thereafter. Two of the members so elected shall be members of the Clergy and the remaining three shall be lay persons; no retiring members elected by Council or by the Executive Board, either for a full term or to fill an unexpired term, shall be eligible for re-election until a period of one year shall have elapsed.
 - (4) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Executive Board with voice, but without vote if either be elected from outside the elected membership of the Board, as hereinafter provided in Section 5.3(a)(3).

- (b) In addition to the members, the following persons shall attend the meetings of the Executive Board from time to time, as the Board shall require and for such purpose as the Board shall specify: the Convocational Deans, the Division Chairs, the Chancellor, the President of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, the President of The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Executive Chair of the Episcopal Health Foundation, the President of the Great Commission Foundation, the Canon to the Ordinary, the Canon for Missions and Program, and the Canon for Hispanic Ministry.
- (c) The members of the Board shall remain in office until their successors are duly elected. Provided, however, that should a member of the Board fail to attend one-half of the meetings of the Board in a calendar year, a vacancy shall be declared to exist and the vacancy shall be filled by the Board. The Board shall have the power to fill such other vacancy in its membership that may occur through death, resignation, or removal of any member elected by the Council.

Canon 27 EPISCOPAL HEALTH FOUNDATION

Section 27.1 An Instrumentality of the Diocese

The Episcopal Health Foundation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Foundation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to promote human health (including, without limitation, complete physical, mental, and social well-being and not just merely the absence of disease and infirmity), healthcare excellence, advances in health science, and improvements in community health services, all of the foregoing to benefit the areas served by the healing and healthcare ministries of the Diocese of Texas.

Section 27.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

The management of the affairs of the Foundation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and fourteen other Directors, at least three of whom shall be Episcopal clergy canonically resident and in good standing in the Diocese. At least two-thirds of the remaining Directors shall be lay persons at least eighteen years of age and confirmed communicants in good standing of some Parish or Mission of the Diocese. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Foundation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Foundation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Foundation's Certificate of Formation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Foundation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Foundation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Foundation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Foundation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the **Executive Board.**

Section 27.3 Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

The terms of office of the elected Board members shall be staggered so that onethird of the elected members shall be elected at each Annual Council. All elections shall be upon nomination by the Bishop. Reasonable effort shall be made to ensure that the Board includes reasonable representation from each of the West, East and South regions of the Diocese. Except as set forth below for the initial full Board, each elected Director shall serve for a term of three years, and may serve for two successive three-vear terms, after which a person shall not be allowed to serve as an elected Director until such person has been off the Board for one full year. At the first Annual Council following the organization of the Foundation, three Directors each shall be elected to serve for initial terms of one year, two years, and three years. Persons elected to initial terms of one year and two years or thereafter appointed to fill an unexpired term may be elected to serve up to two consecutive additional terms of three years each, after which they shall not be renominated until after they have been off the Board for one full year. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term by appointment by the Bishop with the concurrence of the Board.

Section 27.4 Bylaws and Officers

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Foundation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Chair shall appoint from the members of the Board who are Episcopalians an Executive Chair, whose duties and responsibilities shall be as set forth in the Bylaws. The Board shall also elect an Executive Director, who shall be the president and chief executive officer of the Foundation, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as the Foundation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers, other than the Chair, shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 27.5 Properties and Funds

The Foundation shall establish an endowment fund, which shall be held, preserved, managed, and invested for the sole use and benefit of the Foundation in carrying out its purposes. Such endowment shall consist of all assets, properties, income, and appreciation in value that may be contributed to the Foundation with the direction that the same be, or with the agreement or upon the representation that the same will be, placed in such an endowment fund. The Board of Directors may disburse funds from the endowment in accordance with such spending policy as the Board may establish from time to time consistent with the long term mission of the Foundation. All property and funds received by the Foundation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Foundation.

Section 27.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Foundation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as

may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Foundation.

Canon 49 THE GREAT COMMISSION FOUNDATION

Section 49.1 An Instrumentality of the Diocese

The Great Commission Foundation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Foundation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to support the missionary and church-planting strategy of the Diocese.

Section 49.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

The management of the affairs of the Foundation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and nine other Directors, at least three of whom shall be Episcopal clergy canonically resident and in good standing in the Diocese and the remainder shall be lay persons at least eighteen years of age and confirmed communicants in good standing of some Parish or Mission of the Diocese. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Foundation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Foundation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Foundation's Certificate of Formation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Foundation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Foundation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Foundation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Foundation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

Section 49.3 Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

The terms of office of the elected Board members shall be staggered so that one-third of the elected members shall be elected at each Annual Council. All elections shall be upon nomination by the Bishop. Except as set forth below for the initial full Board, each elected Director shall serve for a term of three years, and may serve for two successive three-year terms, after which a person shall not be allowed to serve as an elected Director until such person has been off the Board for one full year. At the first Annual Council following the organization of the Foundation, three Directors each shall be elected to serve for initial terms of one year, two years, and three years. Persons elected to initial terms of one year and two years or thereafter appointed to fill an unexpired term may be elected to serve up to two consecutive additional terms of three years each, after which they shall not be renominated until after they have been off the Board for one full year. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term by appointment by the Bishop.

Section 49.4 Bylaws and Officers

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Foundation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Board shall elect a President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as the Foundation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers, other than the Chair, shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 49.5 Properties and Funds

The Foundation shall establish an endowment fund, which shall be held, preserved, managed and invested for the long term use and benefit of the Foundation in carrying out its purposes. Such endowment shall consist of all funds, income, and appreciation in value that may be contributed to the Foundation with the direction that the same be, or with the agreement or upon the representation that the same will be, placed in such an endowment fund. The Board of Directors may disburse funds from the endowment in accordance with such spending policy as the Board may establish from time to time consistent with the long term mission of the Foundation. The Foundation shall also have the authority to acquire, sell, or trade real property; provided, however, that at the time any real property is turned over to a mission or parish for its use title to the real property shall be transferred to, and held in the name of, the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas as provided in Article 9 of the Constitution. All property and funds received by the Foundation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Foundation.

Section 49.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Foundation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Foundation.

Canon 50 EDOT FINANCIAL SERVICES CORPORATION

Section 50.1 An Instrumentality of the Diocese

EDOT Financial Services Corporation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Corporation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to provide the Diocese and its foundations with accounting, financial, administrative, and investment management services support.

Section 50.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

The management of the affairs of the Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and five other Directors. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by

amending the Corporation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Corporation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Corporation's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Corporation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Corporation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Corporation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Corporation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

Section 50.3 Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

The Directors, in addition to the Bishop, shall be the Presidents of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas, and the Great Commission Foundation and the Executive Chair of the Episcopal Health Foundation. Each such Director shall serve for so long as that person is the incumbent of the office that entitles that person to serve as a Director. Any vacancy occurring in any of these Director positions shall be filled automatically by the successor incumbent of the office that entitled the person vacating the position to serve as a Director of the Corporation. At their option these Directors may designate another member of their respective foundation boards to take their places as Directors of the Corporation. Such delegation shall expire at the end of each calendar year.

Section 50.4 Bylaws and Officers

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Corporation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Board shall elect a President, a Secretary, and such other officers as the Corporation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers other than the Chair shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 50.5 Administration and Use of Funds

The Directors shall have full charge of the administration and use of all funds received by the Corporation. All funds received by the Corporation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Corporation.

Section 50.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Corporation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Corporation. The books and records of the Corporation shall at all times be open for examination and inspection by the Executive Board or its designee.

Canon 2 having been pulled for discussion and both proposals to amend Canon 43 having been withdrawn, and there being no objection, the remaining proposed amendments were jointly adopted on a voice vote.

Concerning the proposal to amend Canon 2, the Committee moved that the amendment be adopted. It was then moved, seconded, and, following brief discussion, adopted, that the original wording in Canon 2.1(a) "Council shall open with Divine service." be retained.

Canon 2 THE DISPATCH OF BUSINESS FOR COUNCILS

Section 2.1 The Dispatch of Business

- (a) Council shall open with Divine service.
- (b) All business of Council shall be presented by or through any officer of the Diocese, any member of the Executive Board, any of the regular committees of Council, or as specified by this Canon.
- (c) The regular committees of Council shall be the following, and such other regular committees as the Council may hereafter create by Canon:
 - (1) Dispatch of Business
 - (2) Constitution and Canons
 - (3) Nominations
 - (4) Supervisors and Tellers
 - (5) Resolutions
 - (6) Council Management
- (d) All regular committees appointed shall hold office from the close of the Annual Council at which their appointment is made until the close of the next Annual Council.
- (e) The Committee for Dispatch of Business shall consist of one member of the Clergy and three (3) lay persons. This Committee shall present a report outlining the procedure of Council, with a copy of the Canon entitled *The Dispatch of Business for Council*. This report may include changes in the procedure of Council set forth in this Canon, when considered advisable in order to facilitate the business of the Council. Such report, if approved by Council, shall be recognized in conducting the business of Council.
- (f) The Committee for Constitution and Canons shall consist of two members of the Clergy, two lay persons, and the Chancellor, who shall be an *ex-officio* member. It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive every proposed change, alteration, or new Article of the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese, submitted to the secretary or chair of the Committee for Constitution and Canons by November 15th prior to the next Annual Council. It shall be the duty of this Committee to change the wording of such proposals to conform to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese. It shall be

the privilege of the Committee to evaluate these proposals and recommend their adoption or rejection. The action of this Committee will be published in Volume I of the *Journal*.

- (g) The Committee for Nominations shall consist of seven members of the clergy and seven lay persons whose selection and duties are outlined in the Canons of the Diocese, and the Chancellor of the Diocese, or in the event of the Chancellor's inability to serve, a Vice-Chancellor of the Diocese.
- (h) The Committee for Supervisors and Tellers shall consist of two members of the Clergy and three lay persons. It shall be the duty of this Committee to secure such additional help from members of Council or responsible persons not members of Council to distribute, collect, and count the ballots or to supervise the voting in case voting machines are used.
- (i) The Committee for Resolutions shall consist of two members of the Clergy and two lay persons. It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive resolutions presented to it in writing by any member of the forthcoming or last preceding Council, or by any committee or board not responsible for the dispatch of business of Council, provided these resolutions, along with any explanation of the rationale for the proposed resolutions, are mailed or attached to emails directed to the Chair of the Committee. Unless the Bishop of the Diocese grants an exception, all resolutions must be submitted to the Committee not later than November 15 preceding the next Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such resolution from the Council floor. The Committee may require all resolutions to be submitted in a standardized format and shall make such change of wording as is necessary for such resolutions to conform to proper usage and understanding. The Committee will inform the mover of any changes made. The Committee shall have the right to evaluate all resolutions and to recommend their adoption or rejection. The Committee shall have the right to rank the resolutions in an order of importance as determined by the Committee and present them to Council in that order. The Committee may request discharge from consideration by Council of resolutions which would seek similar action to that of a resolution previously considered. A two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt any resolutions submitted to Council pursuant to an exception granted by the Bishop of the Diocese. The action of this Committee will be published in Volume I of the Journal. It shall also be the duty of this Committee to implement and set in motion the suggestions and directions contained in the Bishop's Address to Council. Those matters which come within the purview of jurisdiction of any particular Committee of Council shall be referred to the appropriate Committee for action.
- (j) The Committee for Council Management shall consist of one member of the Clergy, two lay persons, a member of the Diocesan Staff, and the following ex-officio members: the General Chairs of the host committee for the current and the immediately preceding Councils, and Chair of the Committee for the Dispatch of Business. It shall be the duty of the Committee to assist the Bishop in: (1) developing and maintaining a Council Manual, consisting of detailed descriptions of each principal activity of Council, to serve as guidance for future Council Host Committees; (2) developing record keeping requirements and formats for Council Host Committees; (3) locating and securing appropriate sites for Council; and (4)

making recommendations to the Executive Board and Committee for Dispatch of Business concerning changes in the organization of Council that would better facilitate the business of Council.

Section 2.2 Other Council Duties

- (a) Other Council duties will be carried out as follows:
 - (1) Credentials
 - (2) New Parishes and Missions
 - (3) Finance
 - (4) Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes
- (b) The Secretary of the Diocese will be responsible for certifying the credentials of the officers and delegates present. Before any business is dispatched during any Council, a satisfactory report from the Secretary shall be made and the President shall declare that Council is organized for business. Before any further business is dispatched during any Session, a quorum shall be established.
- (c) A designee of the Bishop, or, if the office of Bishop is vacant, of the Standing Committee will be responsible for recommending to Council the admission of new Parishes and Missions. The Bishop's designee shall be ready to report at the opening of Council.
- (d) The Executive Board Division of Finance shall recommend to Council the use of any Offerings taken during Council meetings, and to study the cost of Council with such recommendations as seem advisable.
- (e) The Secretary of the Diocese shall prepare the minutes of Council which minutes shall be attested by the Bishop. It shall also be the duty of the Secretary to see that every committee, board, or person whose duty it is to report to Council does report. It is further the duty of the Secretary to see that every action of Council requiring a report be satisfied or held over to the next session of Council.
- (f) The Bishop, or in the Bishop's absence, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, otherwise the Bishop Suffragan having seniority if there be one, otherwise the oldest canonically senior member of the Clergy present shall preside at all Council meetings. The presiding officer of Council shall be known as the President of Council.

Section 2.3 Annual Council Proceedings

- (a) Subject to such changes recommended by the Committee for Dispatch of Business and approved by Council, the business of each Annual Council shall include the following:
 - (1) The Order for The Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion
 - (2) Opening Prayer and Reading of Scripture

- (3) Declaration of a Quorum and Certification of Credentials by the Secretary
- (4) Declaration that the Council is organized for business and Appointment of a Parliamentarian
- (5) Report of the Committee for Dispatch of Business
- (6) Report by the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of the Minutes
- (7) The President shall appoint new members for the regular committees of Council to fill any vacancies on said committees appointed at the preceding Council
- (8) Report of the Department of Evangelism and Congregational Development
- (9) The address of the Bishop, if not presented at the opening service of Council before the First Session, shall be given preference whenever presented. The address of the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, or the Bishop Suffragan, shall be given preference whenever presented, or may be presented by title and printed in the *Journal*.
- (10) Report of the Nominating Committee and elections
- (11) Report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons
- (12) Report of the Committee for Resolutions
- (13) Report of the Treasurer of the Diocese and Treasurer of the Executive Board
- (14) Additional Reports may be received at any time during Council that the Committee on Dispatch of Business and the President determine convenient and appropriate.
- (b) The following business must be transacted before adjournment:
 - (1) Report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons
 - (2) Report of the Committee for Resolutions
 - (3) Elections on appointment of the Bishop
 - (4) Appointment of members to the Regular Committees for the next Council
 - (5) Report of the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes.
- (c) Council shall adjourn by motion and with the Doxology and Benediction.

Section 2.4 Special Sessions of Council

- (a) The following procedure shall open the Special Session:
 - (1) Roll Call by the Secretary
 - (2) Declaration of Quorum present
 - (3) Report of the Secretary on Credentials

- (4) Declaration that the Session is ready for business
- (5) Report of the Committee for Dispatch of Business
- (6) Report of the Committee for the Special Session
- (b) The business conducted during this Session shall follow the direction of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas.
- (c) The following procedure shall close the Special Session:
 - (1) Report of the Committee for Resolutions
 - (2) Report of the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes
 - (3) Motion, Adjournment, Doxology, and Benediction

Section 2.5 General Rules for Order and Procedure

- (a) At all Council meetings the Council may take recess at its option.
- (b) Members of Council, officers of the Diocese, and representatives of the news media are the only ones to be admitted to the Council Floor. Boundaries of the Council Floor shall be clearly defined. All visitors may sit outside of this boundary as the space will permit.
- (c) Members desiring to speak shall rise, respectfully address the Chair, identify themselves by name and parish or mission, and confine themselves to the subject under discussion. They are to avoid personalities, irreverences, personal feelings, and experiences. Members shall not speak more than twice on the same proposition.
- (d) Written reports shall be submitted with a signed original, and one copy and accompanied by resolution when action by the Council is recommended.
 - (1) All reports to Council shall be given to the Secretary of the Diocese and shall become the property of the Diocese. When directed by the Executive Board, reports shall be sent by the Chair of each Committee, Commission, Board, or person responsible for preparing same to the Secretary of the Diocese, on or before a date not less than forty-five days prior to the next regular meeting of the Council, such date to be specified in a written notice which shall be given by the Secretary of the Diocese to each such person. These reports shall be published in a pre-Council booklet and copies made available, at least two weeks before the opening of Council, to all Members of the Clergy, Officers of the Diocese, and Delegates and Alternates who are to attend the next regular meeting of the Council. All such reports having been so published shall be presented to the Council by title. Any member of Council shall have the privilege of questioning the person responsible for such report.
- (e) Every motion or resolution shall be seconded and stated by the Chair or the Secretary before it can be considered, and if required by the Chair, it shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover.
 - (1) Any motion or resolution, withdrawn without action thereon by the Council, need not be noted on the record. The Council may exclude from the record any

motion or resolution which has been negatived by the Council or which has been ruled out of order.

- (2) A motion to adjourn shall always be in order when no member is speaking, and shall be decided without debate; but if negatived, it shall not be renewed until some other business has intervened.
- (f) When a proposition is under consideration, no motion shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone, to commit, to amend, or to divide said motions taking precedence in the order named. The motion to lay on the table is not debatable.
 - (1) A proposition once decided or indefinitely postponed shall not be considered by the same Council unless a motion to reconsider is made by a delegate who voted on the prevailing side and can show the same by three witnesses, and provided a quorum is present. If adopted, the vote must be by two-thirds of the members present.
- (g) Subject to the foregoing, the Rules of Order of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, where applicable, shall obtain in all deliberations of the Council, and shall be enforced by the President without debate, subject to an appeal from the President's decision to the Council.
- (h) Additional matters may be presented to the Council at such time as determined by the Committee for Dispatch of Business, consistent with the other provisions of this Canon. The Committee may limit the time for consideration of such matters. It shall be the privilege of this Committee to evaluate these matters and recommend the acceptance or rejection of them in the order of Business.
- (i) Any of these rules may be suspended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Canon 2, as so amended, was then adopted on a voice vote.

People are often confused and believe that tenacity is the same as persistence. Persistence is doing something again and again until it works. Tenacity is using new data to make new decisions to find new pathways to find new ways to achieve a goal when the old ways don't work. Tenacious means having the quality of tenacity and determination.

"Tenacious D" is a basketball term used by commentators to describe robust defensive positioning in basketball.

Then there is the very earthy Tenacious D rock band with Jack Black and Kyle Gass.

It's safe to say that Thomas Edison tried over 1,000 times and failed before he reached the happy invention of a functioning light bulb. Louis Shakleton's South Pole expedition was a tenacious effort following the wreck of their ship The Endurance. Louis and Clark's westward exploration in all its forms to find a Westward portage was tenacious. Martin Luther King working to end terror against Blacks in the south in speeches, marches, challenges, leadership, endurance, and dreams was tenacious. Winston Churchill and his battle to save Britannia was tenacious. Desmond Tutu and Nelson Mandela's long journey to end apartheid and then their work in reconciliation was certainly tenacious.



Each one of these individuals shows to us an example of what it means to have a tenacious spirit. I believe that we have a tenacious God as well. We have a God who wants to be with, to dwell with, to walk within his creation and with his creatures. God has, from the very beginning of time, called us to be present with Him. This God has sent prophets and sages. This God has sought to gather His people underneath His wing. God's tenacious one-way love is for us, and we are a tenacious church because we have a tenacious God.

Staying tenacious, though, is as important as being tenacious—can anybody be tenacious for just a moment? Staying tenacious requires clear goals and having a clear vision and understanding where we're going and who we are. It requires a little bit of competition to motivate us--to inspire us, but also to form and clarify our own and unique mission. It requires that we surround ourselves with tenacious people who have that same vision, who keep us going when we need reinvigoration. It requires that we be honest about our fears and the challenges before us and that we take up the banner to face them. It requires that we not be afraid to fail. And as I have said before that we should, then as a tenacious diocese, fail gloriously in our attempt to bring about the kingdom of God in our context.

We must, finally, always be aware of what we have—to be grateful and to have gratitude, because it can always be tempting and it's so easy—so easy—to drift into conversations about how hard it is and

what we don't have. We have tremendous resources and a tenacious opportunity to use the resources that are before us.



Therefore, I submit that we are a tenacious diocese. Over the past 5 years, you have traveled with me on a road to grow and thrive in an era when churches and denominations are supposed to be shrinking. We are in our fourth year of membership growth. In a time when we are supposed to be ashamed of being Episcopalians, you have claimed it and are sharing the good news of our church. In a time when Episcopalians are not supposed to invite people to church, you're inviting people to church. In a time when we're supposed to have poor

stewardship and not enough money, we continue to outperform our giving. In a time when we're supposed to give up on starting new congregations because that's just not in fashion anymore, we are multiplying and increasing our efforts. In a time when the church is supposed to be an ineffective partner in serving the community and our neighbors, we are becoming stronger and more able to do this.

In a time when liberals and conservatives are not supposed to work together on anything, and especially not for a common cause, you are willing to raise the banner of God in Christ Jesus and spread the good news of His of salvation far and wide. I'll tell you I had a young couple in my office this last week—they came to me and we're recruiting them to come to the <u>Diocese of Texas</u>. What they said to me was: "In our time, we had lost hope that there was a diocese such as this where people are united for the sake of Jesus Christ."

You are tenacious. Not just simply because you are a collaborative of willing people, but because you're willing to collaborate and being creative and entrepreneurial and trying different things in order to help usher in a new age of mission. And I will tell you after 5 years of serving as your bishop diocesan, I wouldn't have any other diocese or any other group of leaders and individuals to move forward with. So I want to say, thank you.

Let me thank the faithful parishes that have upped their giving despite difficult economic times, showing faith in our mission. I want to thank those of you who have dug gardens and fed homeless people, who have furnished apartments for people needing to stay in the medical center, who have comforted a friend in need, for actively living into your baptismal promise, I want to thank those of you who have visited people in the nursing homes and who have visited people who are shut in.

I want to thank the ones of you who have welcomed a visitor into our congregations warmly, who have actually scooted out of that chair which you know is yours (that pew that has your name on it), and moved to that space in the middle to leave room for that newcomer. I want to thank all of you who have actually invited somebody to church because you believe that what we have going is worth inviting somebody to.

Thank you for your creativity and your new imagination that is taking form in new ministries and new church services. I want to thank the clergy who have thought and acted creatively, who have invested their lives in those who God has given them, who have urged and prodded some of us who are less willing, who have answered the phone in the middle of the night and gone to the hospital because you needed them. We have an incredible group of clergy in this diocese, and I am grateful.

It is one thing to have vision and to be able to catch the vision; it is another thing to have leaders like you in the diocese and who serve on various boards who catch that vision of what we can be together, how we can reshape our organizations, how we can build new foundations and have given extra hours deep into the night to make things happen, to create opportunities for ministry and to give generously once they have the power and authority in those foundations to urge our congregations forward.

Life is difficult. It is trying and even hard at times for all of us. But you all have caught the vision of the kingdom of God and have been willing to serve the broader church when it is sometimes a hassle to fit it into your life. I am grateful because you are making this endeavor a priority. I cannot do this job alone, and I am grateful for your diocesan staff.

I don't know if you noticed that when we started 5 years ago, I asked my staff to see how many parishes they were in. I think they did about 35, 40 parishes. I don't know if you've noticed that they were working with more than 75 different congregations with over 200 one-on-ones with you. That is an incredible increase. They are on the road, and we never even see each other because they are out there in the field so much.

And the 2 bishops suffragan--we are blessed to have them. We could not have pulled this off without <u>Bishop Harrison</u> and her work and negotiations. I hope you'll stand up right now and show your appreciation. The 2 of them are an incredible asset to our diocesan team and our shared Episcopal ministry in this diocese.

We are a tenacious diocese that against all odds, proclaims this tenacious God. Our God has a mission of reconciliation through Christ Jesus to His creation. In Christ Jesus, we claim boldly that we are reconciled to Christ and that we are reconciled to one another. And we believe that the Episcopal Church and Diocese of Texas is the church for God's mission, and we are proud of that fact. It's okay to give a round of applause because we're doing the work.



We are a diocese that believes in evangelism that knows who we are and moves forward based on our identity, which fosters a learning culture for leaders, which is eager to transform people lives and have our own life transformed. We are a healthy, growing church that is translating the gospel of Jesus Christ across the boundaries of culture. We are encouraging significant communication, both personally and digitally.

We are growing numerically and planting new churches. We want to be excellent in our service ministry, our revealing God's mission through service to our neighbors by transforming and restoring and changing the world around us. We care—we care—and we want to support our communities. We want to help make them better places. We want to make them well communities. We seek excellence in the stewardship, which is not just the stewardship of our gifts financially, but the stewardship of vocations as individuals.

This last year we undertook a 360° review of the Diocese of Texas. We had over 200 individuals and leaders of the diocese who were surveyed and then the staff took a separate survey. The results indicate that the overall health of the Diocese of Texas with an average score of 7.56 out of 10. And I will tell you that is a huge moment there. There's a lot of momentum and a sense that we are

accomplishing what we are setting out to do. Every area still needs work. The results tell us that what is working is our communication strategy, the offerings that we have a diocesan office to help you do your work, our support of clergy that the diocesan staff is out and among the people, and that the way in which we are beginning to envision service is making huge strides.



We have to work on—the survey said—we have to work on keeping up with communications. We have to

work on better support for our people, our clergy, and laity on the ground. We have to work to get it to the congregations and be present with them. We need to continue to take the next steps in improving our outreach and service and that we have a long way to go and our inclusivity.

We are, therefore, clear about what is before us. We have a unified evangelism strategy. It's taken us about 5 years, but we believe that we're going to make progress and we'll know we're making progress when existing congregations take the initiative for planting new congregations. Today, as of right now, we have 6 congregations that have started new communities or new congregations—<u>St. Mark's, Houston</u>; <u>Good Shepherd, Austin</u>; <u>All Saints', Austin</u>; <u>Christ Church, Tyler</u>; <u>St. Andrew's, Pearland</u>; and <u>St. Matthew's, Austin</u> are all taking the initiative of moving outside of their campus and trying to create new spaces as missionaries out in the world. (<u>St. David's</u> announced a new launch on South Congress in Austin following the address.)

We have watched, as Mary MacGregor said, a Bee Cave church start and have plans for multiple sites over the next 5 years.

I want to tell you a story. <u>Mike Wyckoff</u> there at <u>St. Luke's on the Lake</u> introduced Paul Johnson to some people in Lakeway, and people in Lakeway introduced him to a co-pastor of a non-denominational church. Paul was invited to go meet with this non-denominational church. They took up a collection for Paul's new ministry and new church start. They raised \$2500, which they gave to them.

And then the senior pastor got up and said to Paul, "Paul, now you're an Episcopal priest." Paul said, "Yes." And he said to his congregation—this is the non-denominational pastor—said to his congregation, "If there are any of you who are Episcopalians or have the Episcopal church in your background or like this kind of worship, I want to encourage you to join Paul in his new church start." Now I will tell you if non-denominational churches can do that, the Diocese of Texas can do that for our other church starts as well. Incredible story.



I believe the creation of <u>The Great Commission Foundation</u> with over \$110 million in it will help us focus our attention on new congregations and new communities. The Great Commission Foundation will free up dollars in the <u>Quin Foundation</u> so that they may focus on the redevelopment and the growth of existing congregations more that way. Through the <u>Strategic Mission Grant</u> program it funds along with the <u>Episcopal Foundation of</u>

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<u>Texas</u>, there are 27 grants now from the Strategic Mission Grant, which is a huge number—more than we've ever given away in the past. But here's the amazing thing—of the 27 congregations that have received Strategic Mission grants, 17 of those congregations have an attendance increase of over 10% this last year.

We need to continue to develop our <u>Invite and Welcome and Connect</u> activities. We need to further develop strategies around formation and discipleship. I believe that God certainly invites us to be disciples, but as far as I read in the scriptures, God is never satisfied with disciples. He turned every one of them into an apostle and sent them out into the world to proclaim the gospel.

We've been doing a lot of following and we're getting good on the discipleship stuff, but it is time now for us to become apostles of gospel of Jesus Christ in the state of Texas.

We have plans that are ready for action and new congregation starts. We have opportunity to expand our congregation in Pflugerville. We are on the eve of purchasing land for that new <u>St. Mary Magdalene</u>. We are ready at Bridgeland and Grand Parkway on 290 and Northwest Houston. We are ready at 288 in the Beltway South. Exxon headquarters in the Spring Woodlands area. Southern Smith County in South Tyler, which is underway in a discussion. Bee Cave in Austin, underway. North I-45 and 59 Corridor, north of 610 Houston, possibly for a multicultural start. East Houston, East Austin under consideration right now by an Austin Congregation. <u>St. Julian of Norwich</u> is going to need a bigger space because they are growing. And, San Francisco are growing.

On the horizon, Formula One area, south Austin tollway 130. Generation Park, Northeast Houston at Beltway 8. Lake Waco, South College Station, Lumberton, and we have to review the Copperas Cove area. By 2016 we plan to have accomplished over 15 new church starts and have a new plan for another 20 by 2020. Now you're all saying, "Those are pretty close to me." I am telling you there are enough people in Texas to plant more than these churches. So keep calm and plant on.

By 2020 we will have planted those churches; we will have more diversity in congregations we will have grown our Latino church footprint; we will have changed the economic equation of planting new churches, bringing the cost down. We will have diversified our types of communities. We will have more churches growing than shrinking. That is our goal.

In order to achieve that, there are some things that must come around it. And one of the goals is <u>Campus Mission</u>. In 2008 you all said that we were concerned about the strength of our campus ministries, and that became a focus for these first 5 years. And it is a key place for evangelism. Today we have been reorganizing and have reorganized the structure of funding for college mission. With our

unity and mission budget, we will fully fund the existing programs and have room to fund a new start in 2014 on the campus of the University of Houston.

We have strong leaders who have worked to accomplish what you said was important, which is connection with parishes and communities across the diocese, even holding open houses in churches



to introduce local seniors to our Episcopal Campus Mission. Having fulfilled all of our Campus Mission objectives, it's time to expand that ministry on existing campuses. So by 2020 we will see our current 16 campus missions multiply and increase across the diocese. In 2020 we will see more students involved in campus missions than we have today, and in 2020 we will

have a maturing campus mission program on our community college campuses across the diocese. That is our next goal.

Five years ago you said to me, "We want to reflect the people in our missionary contacts. We want to look like the people outside of our doors. We want to be a more multicultural, intercultural, polycultural church. In many ways we already are multicultural and multiethnic and a socially layered diocese. In fact we like to say that we are intercultural already. However, we have not achieved the goals that we desire, which are to reflect the family of God outside of our walls. Our goal over the next 5 years is to continue to grow into our identity as that church.

We are currently helping congregations hire and transition as their neighborhoods change in ethnicity. We see growth at 3 of these congregations in the last year—San Pablo of Houston, San Pedro, Pasadena, and St. Timothy's Austin. Those are brave congregations who have stepped forward with a vision of becoming the church that God is making them. And they deserve a round of applause for that.



As of this year, we're actually going to track how these congregations are doing and how they're growing. But when we look at just 3 congregations from last year that are predominately Spanish speaking congregations, they had together over 27% growth—27%.

I went to one of these congregations of—some of you now know—of having open baptism where I invite people who believe they've heard the gospel of Jesus Christ and God's love for them and if they are not baptized, they can come forward for baptism. Now sometimes all I hear is crickets, but I've gotten used to just allowing that to happen because in several congregations over the last year, individuals have come forward. In fact last Sunday at St. James, Austin, we had an individual who had been worshipping with them for several weeks who came forward and was baptized. It's an amazing thing.

At San Mateo I thought I was in for a *cricket* moment. I offered and was questioning my Spanish. And then this gentleman stood up and he came forward to the altar. The font was right there at the front of

the altar. We're standing around it. It's kind of low where he came and he just plopped down on his knees and I said, "Do you want to be baptized?" And he said, "But I am a sinner." I said to him, "I am a sinner, too." I embraced him and we baptized him. It was an amazing moment. I looked up and there was a line to the back of the church. We baptized over 30 individuals on that day.

We have to have diversity in our leadership as well, especially in our clergy leadership. So we have over the last 10 years moved from 1%-6% and our goal is 10%. I'd like to suggest by 2020, we have 20% of our clergy who identify with a different ethnicity than white, male, English speaker.

By 2020 we will be publishing online and through our multiple communication tools, materials, resources in a diversity of languages to help with our mission efforts in this area, and that we will more closely reflect the Texas that we live in.

In our first 5 years, we focused on our vocations building 3 strong commissions on ministry and have done an excellent job with that. In order to increase our evangelism efforts, though, we need to review and rethink how we raise up ministers as lay pastors, lay preachers, lay evangelists who can go out and start new congregations. It's not just dependent upon clergy. If we do this well, we'll be able to multiply our church and plant new communities across the diocese beyond our current capacity.

We'll need to look at the Episcopal Church canons, of course, on our own and understand how we can better enable people to be raised up for a ministry in the church. We've already begun that and gone a long way by raising up bi-vocational clergy, and I'd like to ask those 27 or so bi-vocational clergy to stand up right now. These people have gone out and have steadily built the capacity of our church. Thanks to their efforts our small congregations are vibrant places of evangelism and service – transforming the communities in which they find themselves.



If you believe you're called to ministry, I want to encourage you to seek one of them out and talk to them about the life-changing work that they are doing.

By 2020 we will have accomplished this review. I want lay people to be planting new Episcopal churches. We will complete a review of our policies around deployment and bi-vocational clergy to enable that to be used more effectively for evangelism in mission.

We will have created a strong and more diverse leadership core for the diocese that is connected in sharing across the mission field, and we will have developed internal discernment processes and resources for laity in the congregations.

Leadership is the next thing. We're working to develop clergy leaders in a variety of clergy groups and participating with them on the ground to help you - as clergy understand what your challenges are; and, then for us to help you find resources to meet those challenges. But we also need to work on our lay leadership, so we have begun to develop and create. We'll have our second one The Conference,

which puts evangelism and stewardship and service all together under one roof where you all as laity can come together and generate assignment for the mission that is before you.

We have come a long way since 2008 in providing specialized, broad, collaborative, and local opportunities to raise up leaders. But by 2020 we're going to have to see more lay leadership pushing us forward and being formed through local convocational gatherings. In 2020 we'll see more coaching in local congregations. We'll see a diversity of clergy gathering and forming organically around areas of needed development. We will develop our online resources more fully. The LOGOS Project, the video project like TED Talks, which provides video programs for leadership will continue to grow in its usage. And our capacity for leaders to train and support our mission will multiply exponentially.

Five years ago Christian formation was a concern. Today we have completely rebuilt this area of our diocesan ministry with great success, revisiting Sunday morning, how to pray at home. Our youth conferences have waiting lists on them. We will need to continue to explore the new ways of engaging this way. Our goal has to be to instill in our people the story of God and Christ Jesus so that they are vessels of His grace and mercy and love and forgiveness to every person in their life, so that the people in our congregations believe that they are the vessels chosen by God to spread the gospel. In 2020 we are going to see more formation opportunities, but more on the ground and one-on-ones with people.

Service is the next area. We have evangelism and service. Five years ago we set a goal to see congregations throughout the diocese reach out each year with new ways to improve the lives of their neighbors. Over the last five years we redeveloped more than 90 homes in Galveston after the hurricane. We were present in Bastrop after the fires. We have been on the ground in West—we are now invited to help dioceses throughout The Episcopal Church after disasters.




We are leading in so many ways around our service area. Our deacons are out and leading our churches into the world and guiding people into new, diverse ministry settings. The congregations of the Diocese of Texas today have service ministries, outreach ministries numbering over 1400, from prison ministries to nursing home care, food services and health clinics. Some are feeding programs for children who normally receive their primary nutrients at school—community gardens, immigration services and ESL classes. We are helping people to gain their citizenship. We are making a difference in the world around us.

Despite our huge impact and our excellent work, I believe this area continues to suffer, in some ways because of a lack of communication and cohesion. Our goal has to be to use the sale of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System and the new Episcopal Health Foundation to motivate us and to move us out into the world. The health foundation, with its \$1 billion corpus, will help lead our churches to greater collaborative work, multiplying our dollars and our community impact. Together with the Episcopal Health Foundation, we will be able to provide a diversity of healthcare initiatives to the underserved

throughout the diocese—57 counties. The corpus will provide interest revenue of \$30-\$35 million a year for this initiative.

Our mission is to advance the kingdom of God with a specific focus on health and wellness through

grants, research, and initiatives to support the mission of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas. But it's not just health or healthcare that we're after, because we have adopted a definition that says that health is a state of complete physical, mental, and social wellbeing; not merely the absence of disease or infirmity. In the near future, the Episcopal diocese will be able to offer access to healthcare for many who have none. Tomorrow we'll be able to offer hope to those who may have lost theirs. We'll be able to do this because of the sale of the hospital. And in my role as bishop, we will continue to put all of the mountainmoving powers of faith and prayer and human skill, which we can bring to bear on individuals in need.



We have in place our new CEO and president, <u>Elena Marks</u>, who we'll introduce later. We have been in the process of doing the work around investment. We will spend the rest of the year designing the way the grants will work. By the fall Elena will be visiting with the diocese in a variety of forms to talk about how we're going to begin to move that money through the foundation and into the field to work with congregations and other NGOs across the 57 counties. So you'll be hearing more about that. We will not be able to fully fund in the first year, but we'll begin to ramp up in 2015, and this is going to completely change the way that we do our service ministry.

It also is going to change the way we operate as a diocese in our foundations. We are building a new synchronicity with the foundations of the diocese so that we can multiply our investment in these dollars.



I also want to say that we must be attentive to how we gather. It is clear that in 2008 and 2009 that we need to deal with how we come together. And we made some progress on this floor of Council around being able to have conversations, to pray together, and to be one church.

But we still have opportunities to move into the future, to make headway where we can connect

people in this place using the best and most up-to-date business format. For the most part we still do things like we done them for eighty or a hundred years—I mean you name it, we are doing council the same way over and over again and it is time for us to take a closer look at how we do council and how we gather. Do we want to consider a bi-annual council?

Council needs to be a piece of our gathering, so as we gather in more locally we also need to have our community when we gather reflect that diversity across the diocese.

Our communications work continues. And as our goals, we will make a comprehensive review and begin to look at ways in which we can do our communications better and multiply your communication efforts into the future.







You said in 2008 that you wanted to be an Episcopal and Anglican diocese. In 2003 we had suffered under the strain of wanting to be part of the Episcopal Church and the Anglican









Communion. And in 2008 that concern and anxiety was cast into vision to strengthen our Anglican Communion and Episcopal Church ties. In 2008 I have to say we were still pretty wounded as a diocese. But we took a risk and I believe that we can remain a diverse diocese together, unified in mission. And I believe that we have accomplished this.

I have continued to strengthen both our personal ties with the Archbishop of Canterbury, other in the Anglican Communion, and the Episcopal Church. Our expansion into 3 companion dioceses across the globe does this work. In 2008 we did this out of a desire to hold our church together and to navigate the culture wars. But today we have the privilege of doing it because we know we are stronger and we are better by our diverse voices that globally connect us to the worldwide Anglican Communion. We have relationships with 75 dioceses across the global communion, and we provide resources and support in mission and ministry across the Episcopal Church.

There once was a time in this church when the leaders of the Diocese of Texas were not isolated, but when they took their place in the councils of the wider church, when we sat with our brothers and sisters and worked for the common good and the mission of the Episcopal Church. That time has passed and we have become isolated. It is time for a new era ... It is time for a new era.

You will say, "Why are we giving money to the Episcopal Church in this unified budget?" I'll tell you it's because we don't vote with our money. We don't believe that this Episcopal Church belongs to any one individual, but we believe that this is God's church and mission and God needs resources to do this work and the Diocese of Texas has resources, and we are to ante up and take our place in leadership with the rest of our brothers and sisters. It is time. You are too good a diocese—too good.

I am proud to announce that they are eager for this reconciliation and that they have chosen us to host <u>General Convention</u> in 2018 in Austin, Texas. The Executive Council approved it unanimously, and it's going to be all kinds of crazy and weird in Austin, I'll tell ya. But we're ready. What's going to happen there is that we will open ourselves up to see what is happening in the wider church, and they are opening up themselves to see what incredible things you, the people of the Diocese of Texas, are doing in this place and in this context. And I am proud to be your bishop, and I am excited about 2018.



<u>Justin Welby</u> has made reconciliation the cornerstone of his ministry. He said the key theological concept for Christian faith is reconciliation with God and the breaking down of barriers between people. And therefore for me, I have this sense that part of the church's role is to be reconciled reconcilers. We have made this [reconciliation] our diocesan vision about who we are. These key words run through every part of our core values. Yes, we are still wounded and recovering from the past culture wars. And there will be others. But we are less divided today.

The key theological concept for Christian faith: Reconciliation with God and the breaking down of barriers between people. And therefore for me, I have this sense that part of the church's role is to be reconciled reconcilers.

People ask, "How much longer must we fight? And how much longer must we wait?" Those are the cries that I hear. Our life in this diocese truly reveals an important ingredient into the success of all evangelism. Because if we are not truly reconciled to God and if we are not reconciled with one another, then offering reconciliation to other people just doesn't work.

I believe as a diocese in the next 5 years, we have more work to do. But I believe it is within our capacity to be known globally as the church—as one church, and the Diocese of Texas that is reconciled by Jesus Christ and empowered by the Holy Spirit and called by God to build the kingdom.

I want to talk to you for a moment about <u>Canon 43</u>. I've really struggled with what to do. I was advised by some people to go down and talk in a microphone during the debate. I don't think that you hear me differently whether I'm standing here or there. And that would be exercise. So we're just going to do this.

Every year that I have been in ministry, we have debated Canon 43. Every year. Every one of my councils as a priest in this diocese and now bishop has been devoted to Canon 43. It has been filled with anxiety and fear and frustration and anger. The problems are many. And each one of you actually has a different idea of what should happen. But I think something important is happening, and I think as your bishop I need to tell you the truth about this.

Canon 43 has become the identified patient of our diocese. An identified patient is a term used in a clinical setting to describe the person in a dysfunctional family who has been unconsciously selected to act out the family's inner conflicts as a diversion. That is what we have done with Canon 43. We have diverted the hard work of actually sitting with one another and talking to one another. We have taken that energy and we have placed it into this room. I was a young priest and we met at <u>Camp Allen</u> that year. I don't remember what year it was. It was a while ago.



There were 2 great leaders at that meeting who modeled this idea that we should sit and talk. It actually had been gathering people, parishioners from the 2 divergent churches together and having common meals and talking with one another about how they didn't agree on sexuality. They were praying together. And those 2 people gave me a vision of what life could be like when we have great division and what we could do.

Now I have to say when they asked for support from the diocesan leadership to expand that program to begin to share what they had learned and to nurture conversations across the dioceses, they were told *no*. I believe today that the leaders were right. They were right and we were wrong.

One of the real problems is that Canon 43 on the one hand reveals the very highest virtue of fidelity in holy matrimony. But it has some baggage. When I started the <u>Unity in Mission</u> project, <u>Secretary James Baker</u> told me we have to deal with Canon 43, and I told him no. It was the only piece of advice I didn't follow.

It's time for me to lead again on this. I'm ready to do that. I'm going to need some help. But I believe that that dream of people sitting together, having a conversation, is actually what we need to do. I'm going on sabbatical so I'm just going to make my case. I'd like you not move 43 on the floor today. I've already talked to everybody about this. As part of that, I've made my feelings clear about it. I'd like the time to spend on sabbatical and to come back after my 3 months away and to deal with this.

You trusted me with Unity in Mission, and that was a trust that I am proud to have received. It has modeled for at least 17 other dioceses a way forward and 2 provinces in the Anglican Communion. We did something that people said we couldn't do; we faced our fear and we walked in and we challenged ourselves to deal with it. I'd like us to do that again, but it takes all of us to do that. And it takes us committing to truly be as God is with us—impartial with our love in this moment and to allow me some space.



We are going to continue this conversation with the goals and everything after my sabbatical. I will be holding town hall meetings across the diocese. The staff will review all of this and begin to do our work. But we have a great deal of work yet to do. 2013 was a reset year. In our fifth year together it was a reset year—fourth consecutive year of membership growth, fifth year of consecutive stewardship growth. Unity in Mission went into effect. The health system transition was accomplished. The Great Commission Foundation with \$110 million was

created; the creation of the Episcopal Health Foundation with over \$1 billion; the unity budget; the underwriting of the insurance budget, which dropped our assessment from 17% to 10%.

We expanded the <u>lona School</u>. We expanded our Invite, Welcome, Connect project and it is being published by <u>Forward Movement</u>. We have held our first Invitation Sunday. We have another one this September 21 this year. We are a healthy diocese of 150 congregations and 5 second sites and 16 college ministries and 5 foundations and 67 schools and 1400 service ministries. It has been an incredible 5 years, and we are together because we all did this. We set our future trajectory. We are riding on our history now.

People are going to look back at this point, and they will talk about what we did here. What did they do when all of that happened? Were they faithful? Were they faithful to the call of spreading the good news of God and Christ and reaching out. We are going to tell that story through our struggles and through our successes, and I believe they'll see that we were faithful people. I believe that they will be proud of us in this moment.

Five years ago I stood before you and I said to you and quoted from Sir Francis Drake, "Disturb us, Lord, when we are too well pleased with ourselves, when our dreams have come true because we dreamed too little, when we arrived safely because we sailed too close to the shore." We ask you to push back the horizons of our hopes and to push into the future in strength, courage, hope, and in love.

This is a great prayer. To take our next steps, to venture forth towards a far horizon, to be courageous no matter how afraid we are—that's what we have. It's right here. It's for each of us. The potential is huge. It's huge because we are tenacious in our faith.

I want to end by saying that this has been a particularly difficult year in my family. But you all have been incredible. You've been incredible to me, and JoAnne and I are grateful to you. I don't want to go anywhere else. I don't want to serve with anybody else. Our future is here with you, and I am grateful for you and I am proud to be the bishop of the Diocese of Texas. Thank you.

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CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS ADOPTED

Article 10 AMENDING CANONS

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided (1) a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor, and (2) the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be altered, amended, or repealed by an Annual Council or a Special Session of Council, and any one or more of the provisions of the Canon relating to St. Luke's Episcopal Health System may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed by unanimous written consent of the Bishop, the full membership of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Episcopal Health System, and the full membership of the voting membership of the Executive Board.

Section 10.2 Publication of Amendments

Any change in any Canon adopted in Council shall be published in full in the *Journal* with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall post the *Journal* record reflecting the action by Council and the wording of the new Canon on the Diocesan website or otherwise make it available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of the Council, and others interested.

Article 11 AMENDING CONSTITUTION

Section 11.1 Authority for Procedure

Any proposition to amend this Constitution shall be submitted in writing to an Annual Council, when by consent it shall be published in the *Journal*; provided that a two-thirds vote shall be required to consent, unless a copy of the proposed amendment is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of Annual Council, but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor. At the next Annual Council it may be considered, and if passed by a two-thirds majority of the members of each order, voting concurrently, in the form as published or as the same may be amended by unanimous consent, it shall be incorporated into the Constitution as a part thereof.

Section 11.2 Amendments to be Written in Full

No part of the Constitution or Canons shall be amended by reference to its number, or by merely striking out or inserting words, but the article or section sought to be amended or altered shall be written out in full and presented as it is intended it shall read when amended.

Section 11.3 Publication of Amendments

Any change in any article of the Constitution adopted in Council shall be published in full in the *Journal* with proper notations of title, number, and section, with a brief statement of the nature of the change. The Secretary of the Diocese shall post the *Journal* record reflecting the action of Council and the wording of the amendment on the Diocesan website or otherwise make it available to Clergy of the Diocese, members of the Council, and others interested.

Section 11.4 Effective Date

Each duly adopted provision of this Constitution or any duly adopted alteration, amendment, addition, or repeal of an existing provision of this Constitution shall become effective on the day following the date of adjournment of the Diocesan Council Meeting at which it is adopted.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (Passed for Printing on First Reading)

Article 9 PROPERTY

Section 9.1 Title to Real Property

The title to all real estate acquired for use of the Church in this diocese, including Parishes and Missions, as well as institutions of a diocesan character, shall be held subject to control of the Church in the Diocese of Texas acting by and through the Church Corporation known as "Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas"; provided, that (a) with consent of the Bishop, the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Episcopal Health Foundation, and the Great Commission Foundation may each hold title to real property and may control, convey, and encumber such property without the consent, approval, or joinder of the Church Corporation, and (b) title to certain real property and related improvements, fixtures, appurtenances, and contract rights, as determined by the Church Corporation with the consent of the Bishop, may be held by and subject to the control of one or more separate Texas nonprofit corporations to be formed by the Diocese of Texas. Subject to the foregoing, all such property hereafter acquired for use of the Church in the Diocese, including Parishes and Missions, shall be vested in the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas.

Section 9.2 Diocesan Property

Except as otherwise provided in Section 9.1, all property belonging to the Diocese, as such, shall be held in the name of the Church Corporation known as "Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas"; and no conveyance or encumbrance of any kind or character, unless it relates to property vested in the name of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Episcopal Health Foundation, or the Great Commission Foundation shall be valid unless executed by such corporation and as may otherwise be provided by the Canons of the Diocese. All permanent funds of the Diocese, except those funds held by the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Episcopal Health Foundation, and the Great Commission Foundation shall be held and invested by the "Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas."

Article 10 AMENDING CANONS

Section 10.1 Authority for Procedure

Canons may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Council meeting by a majority vote, unless a vote by orders be called for, whereupon a majority vote of both orders, voting concurrently, shall be necessary for adoption: provided that a two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal any Canon, unless a copy of the proposed change to adopt, alter, amend, or repeal the Canon is first presented in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese or Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons not later than November 15 prior to the date of the Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such proposal from the Council floor.

CANONICAL AMENDMENTS ADOPTED

Canon 2 THE DISPATCH OF BUSINESS FOR COUNCIL

Section 2.1 The Dispatch of Business

- (a) Council shall open with Divine service.
- (b) All business of Council shall be presented by or through any officer of the Diocese, any member of the Executive Board, any of the regular committees of Council, or as specified by this Canon.
- (c) The regular committees of Council shall be the following, and such other regular committees as the Council may hereafter create by Canon:
 - (1) Dispatch of Business
 - (2) Constitution and Canons

- (3) Nominations
- (4) Supervisors and Tellers
- (5) Resolutions
- (6) Council Management
- (d) All regular committees appointed shall hold office from the close of the Annual Council at which their appointment is made until the close of the next Annual Council.
- (e) The Committee for Dispatch of Business shall consist of one member of the Clergy and three (3) lay persons. This Committee shall present a report outlining the procedure of Council, with a copy of the Canon entitled *The Dispatch of Business for Council*. This report may include changes in the procedure of Council set forth in this Canon, when considered advisable in order to facilitate the business of the Council. Such report, if approved by Council, shall be recognized in conducting the business of Council.
- (f) The Committee for Constitution and Canons shall consist of two members of the Clergy, two lay persons, and the Chancellor, who shall be an *ex-officio* member. It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive every proposed change, alteration, or new Article of the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese, submitted to the secretary or chair of the Committee for Constitution and Canons by November 15th prior to the next Annual Council. It shall be the duty of this Committee to change the wording of such proposals to conform to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese. It shall be the privilege of the Committee to evaluate these proposals and recommend their adoption or rejection. The action of this Committee will be published in Volume I of the *Journal*.
- (g) The Committee for Nominations shall consist of seven members of the clergy and seven lay persons whose selection and duties are outlined in the Canons of the Diocese, and the Chancellor of the Diocese, or in the event of the Chancellor's inability to serve, a Vice-Chancellor of the Diocese.
- (h) The Committee for Supervisors and Tellers shall consist of two members of the Clergy and three lay persons. It shall be the duty of this Committee to secure such additional help from members of Council or responsible persons not members of Council to distribute, collect, and count the ballots or to supervise the voting in case voting machines are used.
- (i) The Committee for Resolutions shall consist of two members of the Clergy and two lay persons. It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive resolutions presented to it in writing by any member of the forthcoming or last preceding Council, or by any committee or board not responsible for the dispatch of business of Council, provided these resolutions, along with any explanation of the rationale for the proposed resolutions, are mailed or attached to emails directed to the Chair of the Committee. Unless the Bishop of the Diocese grants an exception, all resolutions must be submitted to the Committee not later than November 15 preceding the next Annual Council; but this shall not limit relevant amendments to any such resolution from the Council floor. The Committee may require all resolutions to be submitted in a standardized format and shall make such change of

wording as is necessary for such resolutions to conform to proper usage and understanding. The Committee will inform the mover of any changes made. The Committee shall have the right to evaluate all resolutions and to recommend their adoption or rejection. The Committee shall have the right to rank the resolutions in an order of importance as determined by the Committee and present them to Council in that order. The Committee may request discharge from consideration by Council of resolutions which would seek similar action to that of a resolution previously considered. A two-thirds vote shall be required to adopt any resolutions submitted to Council pursuant to an exception granted by the Bishop of the Diocese. The action of this Committee will be published in Volume I of the *Journal*. It shall also be the duty of this Committee to implement and set in motion the suggestions and directions contained in the Bishop's Address to Council. Those matters which come within the purview of jurisdiction of any particular Committee of Council shall be referred to the appropriate Committee for action.

(j) The Committee for Council Management shall consist of one member of the Clergy, two lay persons, a member of the Diocesan Staff, and the following ex-officio members: the General Chairs of the host committee for the current and the immediately preceding Councils, and Chair of the Committee for the Dispatch of Business. It shall be the duty of the Committee to assist the Bishop in: (1) developing and maintaining a Council Manual, consisting of detailed descriptions of each principal activity of Council, to serve as guidance for future Council Host Committees; (2) developing record keeping requirements and formats for Council Host Committees; (3) locating and securing appropriate sites for Council; and (4) making recommendations to the Executive Board and Committee for Dispatch of Business concerning changes in the organization of Council that would better facilitate the business of Council.

Section 2.2 Other Council Duties

- (a) Other Council duties will be carried out as follows:
 - (1) Credentials
 - (2) New Parishes and Missions
 - (3) Finance
 - (4) Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes
- (b) The Secretary of the Diocese will be responsible for certifying the credentials of the officers and delegates present. Before any business is dispatched during any Council, a satisfactory report from the Secretary shall be made and the President shall declare that Council is organized for business. Before any further business is dispatched during any Session, a quorum shall be established.
- (c) A designee of the Bishop, or, if the office of Bishop is vacant, of the Standing Committee will be responsible for recommending to Council the admission of new Parishes and Missions. The Bishop's designee shall be ready to report at the opening of Council.

- (d) The Executive Board Division of Finance shall recommend to Council the use of any Offerings taken during Council meetings, and to study the cost of Council with such recommendations as seem advisable.
- (e) The Secretary of the Diocese shall prepare the minutes of Council which minutes shall be attested by the Bishop. It shall also be the duty of the Secretary to see that every committee, board, or person whose duty it is to report to Council does report. It is further the duty of the Secretary to see that every action of Council requiring a report be satisfied or held over to the next session of Council.
- (f) The Bishop, or in the Bishop's absence, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, otherwise the Bishop Suffragan having seniority if there be one, otherwise the oldest canonically senior member of the Clergy present shall preside at all Council meetings. The presiding officer of Council shall be known as the President of Council.

Section 2.3 Annual Council Proceedings

- (a) Subject to such changes recommended by the Committee for Dispatch of Business and approved by Council, the business of each Annual Council shall include the following:
 - (1) The Order for The Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion
 - (2) Opening Prayer and Reading of Scripture
 - (3) Declaration of a Quorum and Certification of Credentials by the Secretary
 - (4) Declaration that the Council is organized for business and Appointment of a Parliamentarian
 - (5) Report of the Committee for Dispatch of Business
 - (6) Report by the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of the Minutes
 - (7) The President shall appoint new members for the regular committees of Council to fill any vacancies on said committees appointed at the preceding Council
 - (8) Report of the Department of Evangelism and Congregational Development
 - (9) The address of the Bishop, if not presented at the opening service of Council before the First Session, shall be given preference whenever presented. The address of the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, or the Bishop Suffragan, shall be given preference whenever presented, or may be presented by title and printed in the *Journal*.
 - (10) Report of the Nominating Committee and elections
 - (11) Report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons

- (12) Report of the Committee for Resolutions
- (13) Report of the Treasurer of the Diocese and Treasurer of the Executive Board
- (14) Additional Reports may be received at any time during Council that the Committee on Dispatch of Business and the President determine convenient and appropriate.
- (b) The following business must be transacted before adjournment:
 - (1) Report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons
 - (2) Report of the Committee for Resolutions
 - (3) Elections on appointment of the Bishop
 - (4) Appointment of members to the Regular Committees for the next Council
 - (5) Report of the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes.
- (c) Council shall adjourn by motion and with the Doxology and Benediction.

Section 2.4 Special Sessions of Council

- (a) The following procedure shall open the Special Session:
 - (1) Roll Call by the Secretary
 - (2) Declaration of Quorum present
 - (3) Report of the Secretary on Credentials
 - (4) Declaration that the Session is ready for business
 - (5) Report of the Committee for Dispatch of Business
 - (6) Report of the Committee for the Special Session
- (b) The business conducted during this Session shall follow the direction of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas.
- (c) The following procedure shall close the Special Session:
 - (1) Report of the Committee for Resolutions
 - (2) Report of the Secretary on Unfinished Business and Certification of Minutes
 - (3) Motion, Adjournment, Doxology, and Benediction

Section 2.5 General Rules for Order and Procedure

- (a) At all Council meetings the Council may take recess at its option.
- (b) Members of Council, officers of the Diocese, and representatives of the news media are the only ones to be admitted to the Council Floor. Boundaries of the Council Floor shall be clearly defined. All visitors may sit outside of this boundary as the space will permit.
- (c) Members desiring to speak shall rise, respectfully address the Chair, identify themselves by name and parish or mission, and confine themselves to the subject

under discussion. They are to avoid personalities, irreverences, personal feelings, and experiences. Members shall not speak more than twice on the same proposition.

- (d) Written reports shall be submitted with a signed original, and one copy and accompanied by resolution when action by the Council is recommended.
 - (1) All reports to Council shall be given to the Secretary of the Diocese and shall become the property of the Diocese. When directed by the Executive Board, reports shall be sent by the Chair of each Committee, Commission, Board, or person responsible for preparing same to the Secretary of the Diocese, on or before a date not less than forty-five days prior to the next regular meeting of the Council, such date to be specified in a written notice which shall be given by the Secretary of the Diocese to each such person. These reports shall be published in a pre-Council booklet and copies made available, at least two weeks before the opening of Council, to all Members of the Clergy, Officers of the Diocese, and Delegates and Alternates who are to attend the next regular meeting of the Council. All such reports having been so published shall be presented to the Council by title. Any member of Council shall have the privilege of questioning the person responsible for such report.
- (e) Every motion or resolution shall be seconded and stated by the Chair or the Secretary before it can be considered, and if required by the Chair, it shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover.
 - (1) Any motion or resolution, withdrawn without action thereon by the Council, need not be noted on the record. The Council may exclude from the record any motion or resolution which has been negatived by the Council or which has been ruled out of order.
 - (2) A motion to adjourn shall always be in order when no member is speaking, and shall be decided without debate; but if negatived, it shall not be renewed until some other business has intervened.
- (f) When a proposition is under consideration, no motion shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone, to commit, to amend, or to divide said motions taking precedence in the order named. The motion to lay on the table is not debatable.
 - (1) A proposition once decided or indefinitely postponed shall not be considered by the same Council unless a motion to reconsider is made by a delegate who voted on the prevailing side and can show the same by three witnesses, and provided a quorum is present. If adopted, the vote must be by two-thirds of the members present.
- (g) Subject to the foregoing, the Rules of Order of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, where applicable, shall obtain in all deliberations of the Council, and shall be enforced by the President without debate, subject to an appeal from the President's decision to the Council.

- (h) Additional matters may be presented to the Council at such time as determined by the Committee for Dispatch of Business, consistent with the other provisions of this Canon. The Committee may limit the time for consideration of such matters. It shall be the privilege of this Committee to evaluate these matters and recommend the acceptance or rejection of them in the order of Business.
- (i) Any of these rules may be suspended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Canon 4 DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS OF THE DIOCESE

Section 4.9 Certain Bishop Delegations

With respect to the Diocesan entities identified below, the Bishop shall have the power and authority to designate the Bishop Coadjutor or any Bishop Suffragan or Assistant Bishop to be an ex-officio member of the Board of such entity, to take the Bishop's place as Chair of such entity, and to exercise all rights and powers of such Chair. Such delegation shall expire at the end of each calendar year subject to the Bishop's right to terminate such delegated authority prior thereto or to extend such delegated authority for successive one-year periods. In the event of any such delegation of authority, the Bishop may elect to continue or to discontinue serving on such Board during the period of such delegation.

The Diocesan entities to which this Canon applies are: The Bishop Quin Foundation, St. Stephen's Episcopal School, Episcopal Health Foundation, Great Commission Foundation, Episcopal High School, El Buen Samaritano Episcopal Mission, Community of the Streets Outreach Corporation, and such other Diocesan entities as may provide for such delegation of authority by reference to this Canon. If any inconsistency between this Canon and the Canon establishing any of the above referenced Diocesan entities exists, this Canon shall control.

Canon 5 THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE DIOCESE

Section 5.2 *Powers – Authority*

The Executive Board shall exercise all powers of the Diocesan Council, between meetings thereof, in connection with the unification, long range planning, development, and prosecution of the work of Missions, Church Growth, Christian Formation, the Church and the Community, Communication, and the Church Pension Fund; and in supervision and direction of the acts of the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church Council in the Diocese of Texas, the Trustees of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, the Trustees of The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Directors of the Episcopal Health Foundation, and the Directors of the Great Commission Foundation for the performance of such work as may be committed to such diocesan institutions by the Council; and in the initiation and development of such new work between said meetings as the

Executive Board may deem necessary; subject, however, to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, and other directions of the Council.

Section 5.3 *Membership – Elections – Vacancies*

- (a) The Executive Board shall be comprised of the following persons:
 - (1) The Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chair.
 - (2) The following persons will serve, ex-officio:
 - (a) The Coadjutor Bishop, if there be one.
 - (b) The Suffragan Bishops, if there be any.
 - (c) The Assistant Bishop, if there be one.
 - (d) The President of the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas.
 - (e) The Treasurer of the Diocese.
 - (f) The President of the Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Texas, with voice but without vote unless an elected member of the Executive Board as defined in Section 5.3(a)(3).
 - (3) Fifteen elected members, of whom six shall be members of the Clergy and nine shall be lay persons who are at least 18 years of age and are confirmed communicants in good standing of the Church in this Diocese. At each Annual Council there shall be elected five members, who shall serve for a term of three years thereafter. Two of the members so elected shall be members of the Clergy and the remaining three shall be lay persons; no retiring members elected by Council or by the Executive Board, either for a full term or to fill an unexpired term, shall be eligible for re-election until a period of one year shall have elapsed.
 - (4) The Secretary and Treasurer of the Executive Board with voice, but without vote if either be elected from outside the elected membership of the Board, as hereinafter provided in Section 5.3(a)(3).
- (b) In addition to the members, the following persons shall attend the meetings of the Executive Board from time to time, as the Board shall require and for such purpose as the Board shall specify: the Convocational Deans, the Division Chairs, the Chancellor, the President of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, the President of The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Executive Chair of the Episcopal Health Foundation, the President of the Great Commission Foundation, the Canon to the Ordinary, the Canon for Missions and Program, and the Canon for Hispanic Ministry.
- (c) The members of the Board shall remain in office until their successors are duly elected. Provided, however, that should a member of the Board fail to attend one-half of the meetings of the Board in a calendar year, a vacancy shall be declared to exist and the vacancy shall be filled by the Board. The Board shall have the power to fill such other vacancy in its membership that may occur through death, resignation, or removal of any member elected by the Council.

Canon 27 EPISCOPAL HEALTH FOUNDATION

Section 27.1 An Instrumentality of the Diocese

The Episcopal Health Foundation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Foundation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to promote human health (including, without limitation, complete physical, mental, and social well-being and not just merely the absence of disease and infirmity), healthcare excellence, advances in health science, and improvements in community health services, all of the foregoing to benefit the areas served by the healing and healthcare ministries of the Diocese of Texas.

Section 27.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

The management of the affairs of the Foundation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and fourteen other Directors, at least three of whom shall be Episcopal clergy canonically resident and in good standing in the Diocese. At least two-thirds of the remaining Directors shall be lay persons at least eighteen years of age and confirmed communicants in good standing of some Parish or Mission of the Diocese. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Foundation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Foundation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Foundation's Certificate of Formation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Foundation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Foundation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Foundation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Foundation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the **Executive Board.**

Section 27.3 Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

The terms of office of the elected Board members shall be staggered so that onethird of the elected members shall be elected at each Annual Council. All elections shall be upon nomination by the Bishop. Reasonable effort shall be made to ensure that the Board includes reasonable representation from each of the West, East and South regions of the Diocese. Except as set forth below for the initial full Board, each elected Director shall serve for a term of three years, and may serve for two successive three-year terms, after which a person shall not be allowed to serve as an elected Director until such person has been off the Board for one full year. At the first Annual Council following the organization of the Foundation, three Directors each shall be elected to serve for initial terms of one year, two years, and three years. Persons elected to initial terms of one year and two years or thereafter appointed to fill an unexpired term may be elected to serve up to two consecutive additional terms of three years each, after which they shall not be renominated until after they have been off the Board for one full year. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term by appointment by the Bishop with the concurrence of the Board.

Section 27.4 Bylaws and Officers

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Foundation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Chair shall appoint from the members of the Board who are Episcopalians an Executive Chair, whose duties and responsibilities shall be as set forth in the Bylaws. The Board shall also elect an Executive Director, who shall be the president and chief executive officer of the Foundation, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as the Foundation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers, other than the Chair, shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 27.5 Properties and Funds

The Foundation shall establish an endowment fund, which shall be held, preserved, managed, and invested for the sole use and benefit of the Foundation in carrying out its purposes. Such endowment shall consist of all assets, properties, income, and appreciation in value that may be contributed to the Foundation with the direction that the same be, or with the agreement or upon the representation that the same will be, placed in such an endowment fund. The Board of Directors may disburse funds from the endowment in accordance with such spending policy as the Board may establish from time to time consistent with the long term mission of the Foundation. All property and funds received by the Foundation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Foundation.

Section 27.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Foundation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Foundation.

Canon 49 THE GREAT COMMISSION FOUNDATION

Section 49.1 An Instrumentality of the Diocese

The Great Commission Foundation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Foundation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to support the missionary and church-planting strategy of the Diocese.

Section 49.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

The management of the affairs of the Foundation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and nine other Directors, at least three of whom shall be Episcopal clergy canonically resident and in good standing in the Diocese and the remainder shall be lay persons at least eighteen years of age and

confirmed communicants in good standing of some Parish or Mission of the Diocese. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Foundation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Foundation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Foundation's Certificate of Formation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Foundation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Foundation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Foundation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Foundation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

Section 49.3 Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

The terms of office of the elected Board members shall be staggered so that one-third of the elected members shall be elected at each Annual Council. All elections shall be upon nomination by the Bishop. Except as set forth below for the initial full Board, each elected Director shall serve for a term of three years, and may serve for two successive three-year terms, after which a person shall not be allowed to serve as an elected Director until such person has been off the Board for one full year. At the first Annual Council following the organization of the Foundation, three Directors each shall be elected to serve for initial terms of one year, two years, and three years. Persons elected to initial terms of one year and two years or thereafter appointed to fill an unexpired term may be elected to serve up to two consecutive additional terms of three years each, after which they shall not be renominated until after they have been off the Board for one full year. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term by appointment by the Bishop.

Section 49.4 Bylaws and Officers

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Foundation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Board shall elect a President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as the Foundation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers, other than the Chair, shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 49.5 Properties and Funds

The Foundation shall establish an endowment fund, which shall be held, preserved, managed and invested for the long term use and benefit of the Foundation in carrying out its purposes. Such endowment shall consist of all funds, income, and appreciation in value that may be contributed to the Foundation with the direction that the same be, or with the agreement or upon the representation that the same will be, placed in such an endowment fund. The Board of Directors may disburse funds from the endowment in accordance with such spending policy as the Board may establish from time to time consistent with the long term mission of the Foundation. The Foundation shall also have the authority to acquire, sell, or trade real property; provided, however, that at the time any real property is turned over to a mission or parish for its use title to the real property shall be transferred to, and held in the name of, the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas as provided in Article 9 of the Constitution. All

property and funds received by the Foundation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Foundation.

Section 49.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Foundation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Foundation.

Canon 50 EDOT FINANCIAL SERVICES CORPORATION

Section 50.1 An Instrumentality of the Diocese

EDOT Financial Services Corporation, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Texas (the "Corporation"), is hereby designated as an instrumentality of the Diocese of Texas to provide the Diocese and its foundations with accounting, financial, administrative, and investment management services support.

Section 50.2 Directors – Powers and Duties

The management of the affairs of the Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese and five other Directors. The Board of Directors may increase or decrease the number of directors from time to time by amending the Corporation's Bylaws, subject to approval of the amendment by the Bishop. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to manage, operate, and conduct the affairs of the Corporation on its own financial responsibility in accordance with the Corporation's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Texas; provided, however, that (a) any merger of the Corporation with any other organization or entity, (b) any conversion of the Corporation, (c) any sale, transfer, assignment, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the Corporation, and (d) the dissolution, winding up, and termination of the Corporation shall also require the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

Section 50.3 Selection of Board – Election – Vacancy

The Directors, in addition to the Bishop, shall be the Presidents of the Episcopal Foundation of Texas, The Bishop Quin Foundation, the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas, and the Great Commission Foundation and the Executive Chair of the Episcopal Health Foundation. Each such Director shall serve for so long as that person is the incumbent of the office that entitles that person to serve as a Director. Any vacancy occurring in any of these Director positions shall be filled automatically by the successor incumbent of the office that entitled the person vacating the position to serve as a Director of the Corporation. At their option these Directors may designate another member of their respective foundation boards to take their

places as Directors of the Corporation. Such delegation shall expire at the end of each calendar year.

Section 50.4 Bylaws and Officers

The Board of Directors shall adopt Bylaws for the Corporation. Subject to the provisions of Canon 4.9, the Bishop shall be Chair of the Board of Directors. The Board shall elect a President, a Secretary, and such other officers as the Corporation's Bylaws may authorize. The officers other than the Chair shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected.

Section 50.5 Administration and Use of Funds

The Directors shall have full charge of the administration and use of all funds received by the Corporation. All funds received by the Corporation shall be used solely in the furtherance of the purposes of the Corporation.

Section 50.6 Reports and Records

The Board of Directors shall file a written report at each Annual Council covering the operation of the Corporation for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Board of Directors shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. A complete record shall be made of all funds and moneys received and disbursed in the operation of the Corporation. The books and records of the Corporation shall at all times be open for examination and inspection by the Executive Board or its designee.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

A COVENANT OF COMPANION RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF NORTH
DAKOTA AND THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF TEXAS

Whereas, the Diocese of Texas joined the Companion Diocese program of the Anglican Communion when the program was founded and has been richly blessed by this relationship; and

Whereas, God has given the Church in our two Dioceses a variety of complementary gifts for the glory of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and it is an honor for Christians to assist one another in God's work; and

Whereas, both Dioceses share a missionary vision including expansion through church planting, ministry to the vulnerable, a deep respect for the variety of cultural heritages of our people, an openness to learn from one another, a heart for joining with one another in Christian testimony through service, and a hope to develop a mutually transformative relationship between our people;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Diocese of Texas adopt a Covenant of Companion Relationship between the Episcopal Diocese of North Dakota and the Episcopal Diocese of Texas.

A COVENANT OF COMPANION RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF COSTA RICA, ANGLICAN CHURCH OF CENTRAL AMERICAN REGION AND THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF TEXAS Whereas, the Diocese of Texas joined the Companion Diocese program of the Anglican Communion when the program was founded and has been richly blessed by this relationship; and

Whereas, God has given the Church in our two Dioceses a variety of complementary gifts for the glory of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and it is an honor for Christians to assist one another in God's work; and

Whereas, both Dioceses share a missionary vision including expansion through church planting, ministry to the vulnerable, theological reflection and Christian education, a desire to minister more fully in the languages of our people, a heart for our respective immigrants, a focus on Christian testimony through service, and a hope to have a mutually transformative relationship that is first and foremost based on *amistad*, friendship;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Diocese of Texas adopt a Covenant of Companion Relationship between the Episcopal Diocese of Costa Rica, Anglican Church of Central American Region, and the Episcopal Diocese of Texas.





Independent Auditors' Report

To the Board of Trustees of The Bishop Quin Foundation:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Bishop Quin Foundation (an instrumentality of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Texas), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2012 and 2011 and the related statements of activities and of cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Notes to Financial Statements for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011

NOTE 1 – ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization – The Bishop Quin Foundation (the Foundation) is a Texas nonprofit corporation, created in 1943 to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the consecration of the Right Reverend Clinton S. Quin as Bishop. It was incorporated in 1955 and organized under Canon 17, as amended, of the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Texas (the Diocese). The Diocese is an ecclesiastical territory that extends from the Louisiana border to portions of central, eastern, and southeastern Texas. The authority of the Diocese is vested in the Bishop, the Council of the Diocese, and a standing committee. The broad objectives of the Foundation include such religious, charitable, and educational activities as determined by the Bishop and the Board of Trustees to be in furtherance of the spiritual and physical welfare of the Diocese. Members of the Board of Trustees are elected by the Council of the Diocese of Texas on nomination by the Bishop and include the Bishop as an ex-officio member and Chair of the Board of Trustees.

<u>Related entities</u> – The Executive Board of the Diocese is composed of the Bishop and fifteen members elected by the Council of the Diocese. The Executive Board is responsible for the governance of the Board of Trustees of the Foundation and the following related Diocesan operating entities:

- Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas (Church Corporation) receives, holds, manages, and administers funds and properties acquired by gift or purchase for the use and benefit of the Diocese and any Diocesan institution. Additionally, it may also receive, hold, and manage funds held for the use and benefit of any parish or mission in the Diocese.
- Episcopal Diocese of Texas is an operating unit of special accounts used to carry out the ministry of the Diocese and is supported by parish and mission assessments and missionary commitments.
- Episcopal Foundation of Texas (EFT) was created to hold and administer certain assets for the purpose of providing grants and loans for religious, educational, and charitable purposes to designated Diocesan entities.

Additionally, the Foundation routinely engages in transactions with related entities that are directly or indirectly governed by the Council of the Diocese. These entities include parishes, missions, and other Diocesan entities.

<u>Basis of presentation</u> – These financial statements include only the assets, liabilities, net assets, and activities of the Foundation. The accompanying financial statements do not include the assets, liabilities, net assets, and activities of the Diocesan operating entities, parishes, missions, or other Diocesan entities. Each of these related entities is an operating entity distinct from the Foundation, maintains separate financial records, and administers its own services and programs.

Federal income tax status – The Foundation is exempt from federal income tax under \$501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a religious organization and is classified as a public charity under \$170(b)(1)(A)(i) under the group exemption of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

<u>Cash equivalents</u> are invested in money market mutual funds that are readily convertible to cash. Cash equivalents that are invested for long-term purposes are grouped with investments.

Notes receivable are reported at estimated net realizable value. Allowances for notes receivable are provided when it is believed they may not be collected in full and is adjusted annually to reflect changes in the expected future cash flows from impaired notes. The amount of bad debt expense recognized each period and the resulting adequacy of the allowance at the end of each period are determined using a specific analysis of each receivable balance. A note receivable is considered impaired when it is considered probable that the Foundation will not collect all principal and interest amounts due under the terms of the agreement. No interest is accrued on impaired notes. It is possible that management's estimate regarding the collectability of these balances will change in the near term resulting in a change in the carrying value of receivables. At December 31, 2012, all known impaired loans have been reserved in the allowance for loan losses.

<u>Investments</u> in marketable securities and land held for sale are reported at fair value. Mineral interests are reported at lower of cost or fair value. Investment return includes interest, dividends, and realized and unrealized gains and losses and mineral interest royalties. Investment return is reported in the statement of activities as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless the use of income is limited by donor-imposed restrictions.

<u>Land</u> is reported at cost.

<u>Unrestricted net assets</u> include those net assets whose use is not restricted by donor-imposed stipulations, even though their use may be limited in other respects, such as by contract or board designation. The board designations are described as follows:

- Revolving fund receives a transfer of income from the permanent fund and interest and other income related to non-investment assets. These funds may be loaned or granted for any purposes that the Bishop and Board of Trustees may determine to be in furtherance of the spiritual and physical welfare of the Diocese.
- *Permanent fund* receives revenue from investments and royalties after the transfer of income to the revolving fund. By the Board of Trustees' action, income transfers are made from the permanent fund to the revolving fund based on 2½% of the average fair market value of the fund for the prior three years. The investment return may be used at the discretion of the Board of Trustees.

<u>Contributions</u> are recognized as revenue at fair value when an unconditional commitment is received from the donor. Contributions received with donor stipulations that limit their use are classified as restricted support. Conditional contributions are recognized in the same manner when the conditions are substantially met.

<u>Grants made</u> are recognized as expense at fair value when the Foundation approves an unconditional commitment to a grant recipient. Conditional grants are recognized in the same manner when the conditions are substantially met by the recipient or when the possibility that the conditions will not be met is deemed remote. Grants payable in more than one year are reported at the present value of their future cash out flows using a risk-free rate-of-return, if material. Commitments made but not yet funded are reported as grants payable.

<u>Estimates</u> – Management must make estimates and assumptions to prepare financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. These estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, the amounts reported as revenue and expenses, and the allocation of expenses among various functions. Actual results could vary from the estimates that were used.

NOTE 3 – NOTES RECEIVABLE

Diocesan operating entities

The Foundation entered into three notes receivable agreements with Church Corporation totaling approximately \$2,400,000. Under the terms of these agreements, principal and interest are to be repaid through 2017. Additionally, the Foundation entered into a note payable agreement held by Church Corporation totaling \$250,000 at an interest rate of 6% secured by liens against property that will not be repaid until the related property is sold. Notes receivable include principal plus accrued interest.

Related entities

The Foundation provides loans to Diocesan institutions to finance Diocesan projects. Repayment terms and interest rates vary and are flexible to meet the needs of the related entities. Interest rates range from 4% to 6% and repayment terms require periodic payments of principal and interest over periods ranging from 2 to 30 years.

NOTE 4 – INVESTMENTS AND FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Generally accepted accounting principles require that certain assets and liabilities be reported at fair value and establish a hierarchy that prioritizes inputs used to measure fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

• Level 1 – Inputs are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the reporting date.

- Level 2 Inputs are other than quoted prices included in Level 1, which are either directly observable or can be derived from or corroborated by observable market data at the reporting date.
- Level 3 Inputs are not observable and are based on the reporting entity's assumptions about the inputs market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability.

Valuation methods used for assets measured at fair value are as follows:

- Mutual funds are valued at the reported net asset value of shares held at year end.
- Land held for sale is valued on appraised fair value based upon the currently pending sales contract.

These valuation methods may produce a fair value that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Foundation believes its valuation methods are appropriate, the use of different methods or assumptions could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Because of these risks, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statement of financial position and statement of activities.

The Foundation has made approximately \$396,000 in grants to related entities that are conditional and have not been recognized as liabilities at December 31, 2012.

NOTE 7 – NOTES PAYABLE

In 2011, the Foundation entered into an unsecured promissory note with the seller to finance the outstanding balance of the purchase of certain real property. The note bears interest at 4% and is payable at \$6,130 per month through 2016.

In 2012, the Foundation entered into a \$2,000,000 loan agreement with EFT. The note bears interest at rates of 2.5% to 3.5% and is payable in annual installments of \$250,000 with final payment due in 2017.

NOTE 8 – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent to year end, the Foundation entered into an agreement to purchase land for \$1,250,000. The land is to be used for church development.

Management has evaluated subsequent events through May 30, 2013, which is the date that the financial statements were available for issuance. As a result of this evaluation, no additional events were identified that are required to be disclosed or would have a material impact on reported net assets or changes in net assets.

Notes to Financial Statements for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011

NOTE 1 – ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization – Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas (Church Corporation) is a Texas nonprofit corporation created by the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese in Texas (the Diocese), which was organized in Texas in 1836 and is a part of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. The Diocese is an ecclesiastical territory that extends from the Louisiana border to portions of central, eastern, and southeastern Texas. The authority of the Diocese is vested in the Bishop, the Council of the Diocese, and a standing committee.

The Church Corporation, created in 1886, is authorized to receive, hold, manage, and administer funds and properties acquired by gift or purchase for the use and benefit of the Diocese and any Diocesan institution. Additionally it receives, holds, and manages funds held for the use and benefit of any parish or mission in the Diocese. The Church Corporation is composed of the following funds:

- Participating Funds is an investment pool managed by the Church Corporation. The Church Corporation holds and manages portfolios of investments that are comprised of its own assets as well as custodial assets held on behalf of related parishes and schools and other related Diocesan entities.
- Episcopal Housing Trust provides residential housing or housing allowances for the Bishops of the Diocese and other clergy on the Diocesan staff.
- Clergy Housing Trust assists in providing residential housing loans or housing allowances for clergy canonically resident and engaged in full-time work within the Diocese.
- *Diocesan Properties Fund* holds property not being used by a constituent of the Diocese and facilitates the purchase and sale of real property within the Diocese.

<u>Related entities</u> – The Executive Board of the Diocese is composed of the Bishop and fifteen members elected annually by the Council of the Diocese. The Executive Board is responsible for the supervision and direction of the Church Corporation and the following related Diocesan operating entities:

- Episcopal Diocese of Texas (EDOT) is an operating unit of special accounts used to carry out the ministry of the Diocese and is supported by parish and mission assessments and missionary commitments.
- The Bishop Quin Foundation (Bishop Quin) was created in 1943 to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the consecration of the Right Reverend Clinton S. Quin as Bishop. The broad objectives of Bishop Quin include such religious, charitable, and educational activities as determined by the Bishop and the Board of Trustees to be in furtherance of the spiritual and physical welfare of the Diocese.
- Episcopal Foundation of Texas (EFT) was created to hold and administer certain assets for the purpose of providing grants and loans for religious, educational, and charitable purposes to designated entities of the Diocese.

Church Corporation routinely engages in transactions with related entities that are directly or indirectly governed by the Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas. These entities include parishes, schools, missions, and other Diocesan entities.

<u>Basis of presentation</u> – These financial statements include only the assets, liabilities, net assets and financial activities of Church Corporation. The accompanying financial statements do not include the assets, liabilities, net assets, and financial activities of parishes, schools, or other Diocesan entities. Each of these related entities is an operating entity distinct from Church Corporation, maintains separate financial records, and administers its own services and programs.

<u>Federal income tax status</u> – Church Corporation is exempt from federal income tax under §501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a religious organization and is classified as a public charity under §170(b)(1)(A)(i) under the group exemption of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

Cash – Bank deposits exceed the federally insured limit per depositor per institution.

Notes receivable are reported at estimated net realizable value. Allowances for notes receivable are provided when it is believed they may not be collected in full and is adjusted annually to reflect changes in the expected future cash flows from impaired notes. The amount of bad debt expense recognized each period and the resulting adequacy of the allowance at the end of each period are determined using a specific analysis of each receivable balance. A note receivable is considered impaired when it is considered probable that Church Corporation will not collect all principal and interest amounts due under the terms of the agreement. No interest is accrued on impaired notes. It is possible that management's estimate regarding the collectability of these balances will change in the near term resulting in a change in the carrying value of receivables. At December 31, 2012, one note from a third party and one note from a clergy have been deemed impaired and have been fully allowed.

<u>Land and buildings held for sale</u> are reported at fair value.

Beneficial interest in a trust is reported at the fair value of Church Corporation's estimated share of the trust assets. Church Corporation is the beneficiary of a charitable remainder unitrust and its share of the trust has been estimated using life expectancies and discount rates established by the Internal Revenue Service for the other beneficiaries benefiting from the trust. The change in the value of the trust from year to year is recognized as an increase or decrease in net assets in the statement of activities. Distributions received from the trust are classified as investment return.

<u>Investments</u> in marketable securities are reported at fair value. Mineral rights are reported at the lower of cost or fair value. Purchases and sales of investments are reported on a trade-date basis. Interest and dividends are recognized as earned. Investment return includes interest, dividends, net realized and unrealized gains and losses and mineral interest royalties. Investment return is reported in the statement of activities as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless the use of the income is limited by donor-imposed restrictions.

<u>Property</u> is reported at cost if purchased and at fair value at the date of gift if donated. The title of all real property acquired or contributed to the Diocese is held by Church Corporation except for real property whose title is held by EFT, Bishop Quin, and St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital. These financial statements include only property used for the Diocesan Center, future parishes, schools, college ministries, and housing for bishops and clergy of the Diocese. Land held for future parishes is transferred to that parish when the congregation accepts the responsibility for construction of a new church on the property. Property transferred to Church Corporation by a parish no longer functioning as a church is reported at fair value at the time it is transferred from the congregation. Land and buildings for housing not utilized for Diocesan operations are not depreciated and are reported at cost.

<u>Funds held for related entities</u> consist of amounts collected on behalf of related entities where Church Corporation acts as an agent in collecting, disbursing, and investing funds. The transactions for these custodial accounts are not reflected as revenue or expenses in the statement of activities.

<u>Net asset classification</u> – Revenue, investment return, and the related net assets are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions, as follows:

- *Unrestricted net assets* include those net assets whose use is not restricted by donor-imposed stipulations, even though their use may be limited in other respects, such as by contract or board designation.
- *Temporarily restricted net assets* include contributions and related revenue restricted by the donor for specific purposes or time periods. When a purpose restriction is accomplished or a time restriction ends, temporarily restricted net assets are released to unrestricted net assets.
- *Permanently restricted net assets* include revenue that donors have restricted in perpetuity. The investment return from these assets may be used to fund specific activities of Church Corporation.

<u>Contributions</u> are recognized as revenue at fair value when an unconditional commitment is received from the donor. Contributions received with donor stipulations that limit their use are classified as restricted support. Conditional contributions are recognized in the same manner when the conditions are substantially met.

<u>Donated materials</u>, use of facilities, and services – Donated materials and use of facilities are recognized at fair value as unrestricted contributions when an unconditional commitment is received from the donor. The related expense is recognized as the item is used. Contributions of services are recognized when services received (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. A substantial number of volunteers have contributed significant amounts of time in connection with programs, administration and fundraising for which no amount has been recorded in the financial statements because the services did not meet the criteria for recognition under generally accepted accounting principles.

<u>Grants approved</u> are recognized as expense when Church Corporation approves an unconditional commitment to a grant recipient. Conditional grants are recognized in the same manner when the conditions are substantially met by the recipient or when the possibility that the conditions will not be met is deemed remote. Commitments made but not yet funded are reported as grants payable. Grants payable in more than one year are reported at the present value of their future cash flows.

<u>Estimates</u> – Management must make estimates and assumptions to prepare financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. These estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, the amounts reported as revenue and expenses, and the allocation of expenses among various functions. Actual results could vary from the estimates that were used.

<u>Reclassifications</u> – Certain reclassifications have been made to the prior year financial statements to conform with the current presentation.

NOTE 2 – NOTES RECEIVABLE

Church Corporation provides housing loans to bishops of the Diocese, clergy on Diocesan staff, and clergy working within the Diocese. Interest rates are 6% and repayment terms require periodic payments of principal and interest over periods ranging from 3 to 25 years. These notes receivable are secured by land and houses. Additionally, Church Corporation provides property loans to parishes and missions within the Diocese. Interest rates are 2.5% to 6% and repayment terms require periodic payments of principal and interest ranging from 1 to 6 years.

Notes receivable from others are from three external organizations for the purchase of property with interest rates ranging from 7% to 7.25%. Payment terms require periodic payments of principal and interest ranging from 2 to 5 years. The notes are secured by land and buildings.

NOTE 3 – INVESTMENTS AND FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Generally accepted accounting principles require that certain assets and liabilities be reported at fair value and establish a hierarchy that prioritizes inputs used to measure fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

- Level 1 Inputs are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the reporting date.
- Level 2 Inputs are other than quoted prices included in Level 1, which are either directly observable or can be derived from or corroborated by observable market data at the reporting date.
- Level 3 Inputs are not observable and are based on the reporting entity's assumptions about the inputs market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability.

- (a) Directional long/short hedge fund is a group of hedge funds that seeks attractive long-term returns with low volatility to relevant equity indices with an emphasis on preservation of capital. This involves exposure to strategies, sub-strategies, styles, geographies, market and security types that may capture gains in strong markets while preserving capital in challenging environments. Investments would include, but are not limited to: U. S. long/short, Japan long/short, Europe long/short, event driven, global macro, global equity long and emerging growth. Fund investments are subject to gated restrictions upon liquidation requests. The provision of these restrictions is based upon the discretion of the investment manager and surrounding circumstances of market and economic events at the time of liquidation. As of the end of the reporting period, there were no fund investments subject to gated restrictions. Redemption of shares is allowed at the end of each quarter with 61 days prior written notice. There are no unfunded commitments at December 31, 2012.
- (b) Managed futures fund focus on managed futures and foreign exchange, offering daily liquidity and full transparency through a segregated managed account structure. Investors are offered diversification across trading styles and market sectors, allocating to over 20 managers who vary in size and in trend or non-trend-following strategies. The funds are active in 150 futures markets and 100 foreign exchange pairs daily. The portfolio strategy is structured to give positive correlation in bull and negative correlation in bear markets. Fund investments are not subject to gated restrictions upon liquidation requests. Redemption of shares is allowed daily if the request is made by 5:00 p.m. Dublin, Ireland time. There are no unfunded commitments at December 31, 2012.
- (c) Absolute return hedge fund invests primarily in relative value, event driven, long/short credit, and distressed securities strategies. The fund is designed to have low sensitivity to broad equity market returns. The fund's strategy is to invest in market-neutral and market-uncorrelated investment strategies in a combination that may deliver consistently positive and uncorrelated (to broad equity and fixed-income market indices) monthly returns. Fund investments are subject to gated restrictions upon liquidation requests. The provision of these restrictions is based upon the discretion of the investment manager and surrounding circumstances of market and economic events at the time of liquidation. As of the end of the reporting period, there were no fund investments subject to gated restrictions. Redemption of shares is allowed semi-annually based on the anniversary date of the investment with 95 days written notice. There are no unfunded commitments at December 31, 2012.

Valuation methods used for assets measured at fair value are as follows:

- Equity securities are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.
- Alternative investments The Church Corporation uses net asset value per share (or its equivalent) to determine the fair value of investments in partnerships and corporations that do not have a readily determinable fair value. The fair value of these investments is based on information provided by the general partners and corporate directors of each fund. Management takes into consideration consultation with fund investment managers and audited financial information to determine overall reasonableness of the reported fair values.
- Corporate bonds and notes, U. S. Treasury securities, and mortgage-backed securities are valued using prices
 obtained from independent quotation bureaus that use computerized valuation formulas which may include
 market-corroborated inputs for credit risk factors, interest rate, yield curves and broker quotes, to calculate fair
 values.
- Mutual funds are valued at the reported net asset value.
- Beneficial interest in a trust is valued based upon an actuarial formula that is predictive of the future value of the trust and the life expectancy of the other beneficiary to the trust.
- Land and buildings held for sale are valued on appraised fair value or currently pending sales contracts.

Church Corporation is invested in certain partnerships and corporations which qualify as alternative investments. The various alternative categories include domestic, international, and opportunistic equity securities, real estate, natural resources, private equity, fixed-income and enhanced fixed-income securities, and cash and may involve contractual commitments involving forward settlements including future contracts, forward foreign currency contracts, short sales of securities, swap contracts, and the writing of option contracts. These investments are domestic and international in nature, may be illiquid or have limited periods available for redemption, and may not be realized for a period of several years after the investments have been made.

These valuation methods may produce a fair value that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while Church Corporation believes its valuation methods are appropriate, the use of different methods or assumptions could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 7 – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Church Corporation, as well as the related Diocesan operating entities of the Diocese, purchase professional and general liability insurance to cover losses that may result from asserted claims, as well as claims from unknown incidents that may be asserted in the future. Management does not expect such losses to have a material adverse effect on the financial position of Church Corporation.

Church Corporation is the guarantor on a \$1,000,000 line of credit for the Diocese. At December 31, 2012, there is no outstanding balance on this line of credit. Additionally, Church Corporation assists related entities such as parishes and schools in obtaining construction loans and acts as a guarantor on approximately \$7,250,000 of such loans with loan maturities through 2030.

NOTE 11 – ENDOWMENT FUNDS

Participating Funds of Church Corporation includes approximately 20 individual funds that are established for a variety of purposes. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that Church Corporation must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period as well as board-designated funds. The Board of Trustees of Church Corporation has interpreted the Texas Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (TUPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair market value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Church Corporation classifies the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment as permanently restricted net

assets. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified as permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by Church Corporation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by TUPMIFA. In accordance with TUPMIFA, Church Corporation considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- The duration and preservation of the funds
- The purposes of Church Corporation and the donor-restricted endowment funds
- General economic conditions
- The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- Other resources of Church Corporation
- The investment policies of Church Corporation

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

Church Corporation has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs and entities supported by its endowments while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Trustees, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that exceed the price and yield results of a portfolio that is invested 60% in the S&P 500 index and 40% in the Barclays Intermediate Bond Index while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. Church Corporation expects its endowment funds, over time, to provide an average rate-of-return of approximately 5% annually. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, Church Corporation relies on a total return strategy in which investment return is achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). Church Corporation targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

The Church Corporation has a policy of not appropriating more than 3% of the Participating Funds' market value as of the end of the calendar year prior to the year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Church Corporation considered the long-term expected return and the effects of inflation on its endowments. Accordingly, over the long-term, Church Corporation expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment to grow at an average rate of 2% annually. This is consistent with the Church Corporation's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment return.

Funds with Deficiencies

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or TUPMIFA requires Church Corporation to retain the fund as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, deficiencies of this nature are reported in unrestricted net assets. There were no such deficiencies at December 31, 2012.

NOTE 12 – RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

A member of the Church Corporation Board of Trustees is a partner in a law firm which provides legal services to the Diocese. In 2012 and 2011, legal fees totaling \$71,000 and \$43,000, respectively, were paid.

NOTE 13 – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management has evaluated subsequent events through May 30, 2013, which is the date that the financial statements were available for issuance. As a result of this evaluation, no events were identified that are required to be disclosed or would have a material impact on reported net assets or changes in net assets.

Independent Auditors' Report

To the Board of Trustees of Episcopal Foundation of Texas:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Episcopal Foundation of Texas (an instrumentality of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Texas), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2012 and 2011 and the related statements of activities and of cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform our audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011

NOTE 1 – ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization – Episcopal Foundation of Texas (the Foundation), a Texas nonprofit corporation, is an instrumentality of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Texas (the Diocese). The Diocese is an ecclesiastical territory that extends from the Louisiana border to portions of central, eastern, and southeastern Texas. The authority of the Diocese is vested in the Bishop, the Council of the Diocese and a standing committee. The Foundation was designated by the Diocese to hold and administer certain assets for the purpose of providing grants and loans for religious, educational, and charitable purposes to eight specific entities connected with the Diocese as established by Canon. The Foundation is governed by a Board of Trustees that is elected by the Council of the Diocese upon nomination of the Diocesan Bishop.

<u>Related entities</u> – The Executive Board (the Board) of the Diocese is composed of the Bishop and fifteen members elected annually by the Council of the Diocese. The Board is responsible for the governance of the Trustees of the Foundation and the following related Diocesan operating entities:

- Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas (Church Corporation) receives, holds, manages, and administers funds and properties acquired by gift or purchase for the use and benefit of the Diocese and any Diocesan institution. Additionally, it may also receive, hold, and manage funds held for the use and benefit of any parish or mission in the Diocese.
- Episcopal Diocese of Texas (EDOT) is an operating unit of special accounts used to carry out the ministry of the Diocese and is supported by parish and mission assessments and missionary commitments.
- Bishop Quin Foundation (Bishop Quin) was created in 1943 to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the consecration of the Right Reverend Clinton S. Quin as Bishop. The broad objectives of Bishop Quin include such religious, charitable, and educational activities as determined by the Bishop and the Board of Trustees to be in furtherance of the spiritual and physical welfare of the Diocese.

Additionally, the Foundation engages in transactions with several other related entities that are directly or indirectly governed by Council of the Diocese.

<u>Basis of presentation</u> – These financial statements include only the assets, liabilities, net assets and activities of the Foundation. The accompanying financial statements do not include the assets, liabilities, net assets, and financial activities of the Diocesan operating entities, parishes, missions or other Diocesan entities. Each of these related entities is an operating entity distinct from the Foundation, maintains separate financial records, and administers its own services and programs.

<u>Federal income tax status</u> – The Foundation is exempt from federal income tax under §501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a religious organization and is classified as a religious organization under §170(b)(1)(A)(i) under the group exemption of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

<u>Cash equivalents</u> are invested in money market mutual funds that are readily convertible to cash. Cash equivalents that are invested for long-term purposes are grouped with investments.

<u>Notes receivable</u> are reported at estimated net realizable value. Allowances for notes receivable are provided when it is believed they may not be collected in full and is adjusted annually to reflect changes in the expected future cash flows from impaired notes. The amount of bad debt expense recognized each

period and the resulting adequacy of the allowance at the end of each period are determined using a specific analysis of each receivable balance. A note receivable is considered impaired when it is considered probable that the Foundation will not collect all principal and interest amounts due under the terms of the agreement. No interest is accrued on impaired notes. It is possible that management's estimate regarding the collectability of these balances will change in the near term resulting in a change in the carrying value of receivables.

<u>Investments</u> in marketable securities and mining interests are reported at fair value. Mineral rights are valued at lower of cost or fair value. Purchases and sales of investments are reported on a trade-date basis. Interest, dividends and Royalty income are recognized as earned. Investment return is reported in the statement of activities as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless the use of the income is limited by donor-imposed restrictions.

<u>Leasehold improvements</u> are reported at cost. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis over the life of the associated lease for periods of 5 to 20 years.

<u>Net asset classification</u> – Revenue and the related net assets are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets include those net assets whose use is not restricted by donor-imposed stipulations, even though their use may be limited in other respects, such as by contract or board designation.

The Board has designated its unrestricted net assets for the following purposes:

- Coffield income fund is designated to support the operating costs of the Foundation as well as for gifts, grants and loans to eight entities designated by Canon and other charitable trusts, nonprofit organizations and national organizations affiliated with the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and other Anglican and charitable organizations throughout the world.
- Coffield principal fund is comprised of all assets received from the Estate of H. H. Coffield, net of investment gains and losses and net oil and gas and lignite royalties. These funds are designated for loans to Bishop Quin and for gifts, grants, loans, or advances for the purpose of establishing memorials to H. H. Coffield. By the Board's action, income transfers are made from the principal fund to the income fund based on a percentage of the average fair market value of the fund for the prior twelve months. The percentage used in this calculation was 4.50% for 2012 and 2011. In addition, the Board has elected to transfer one-half of the annual net oil and gas royalties from the principal fund to the income fund.
- *Memorial fund* is comprised of assets other than those received from the Estate of H. H. Coffield and income from this fund is to be used to support seminarians, clergy and other charitable entities within the Diocese. This fund is allocated income from the Coffield principal fund with the same percentage adopted by the Board for the principal fund.

<u>Contributions</u> received are recognized as revenue at fair value when an unconditional commitment is received from the donor. Contributions received with donor stipulations that limit their use are classified as restricted support. Conditional contributions are recognized in the same manner when the conditions are substantially met.

<u>Program grants made</u> are recognized as expense at fair value when the Foundation approves an unconditional commitment to a grant recipient. Conditional grants are recognized in the same manner when the conditions are substantially met by the recipient or when the possibility that the conditions will not be met is deemed remote. Commitments made but not yet funded are reported as grants payable. Grants payable in more than one year are reported at the present value of their future cash out flows using a risk-free, rate-of-return.

<u>Estimates</u> – Management must make estimates and assumptions to prepare financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. These estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, the amounts

of reported revenue and expenses, and the allocation of expenses among various functions. Actual results could vary from the estimates that were used.

NOTE 2 - NOTE RECEIVABLE FROM DIOCESAN OPERATING ENTITY

In 2012, the Foundation loaned \$2,000,000 to Bishop Quin to be used to reduce outside bank debt related to a parish property. The note bears interest of 2.5% to 3.5% and is expected to be repaid in annual installments through 2017.

NOTE 3 – INVESTMENTS AND FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Generally accepted accounting principles require that certain assets and liabilities be reported at fair value and establish a hierarchy that prioritizes inputs used to measure fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

- Level 1 Inputs are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the reporting date.
- Level 2 Inputs are other than quoted prices included in Level 1, which are either directly observable or can be derived from or corroborated by observable market data at the reporting date.
- Level 3 Inputs are not observable and are based on the reporting entity's assumptions about the inputs market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability.

Valuation methods used for assets measured at fair value are as follows:

- Equity securities, exchange-traded funds and real estate investment trust funds are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.
- Mutual funds are valued at the net asset value of shares held at year end.
- *Mining interests* are valued at a contracted rate per ton applied to the estimated production plans for certain units of the mine provided by the mining company.
- Asset-backed securities and U. S. Treasury securities are valued using prices obtained from independent quotation bureaus that use computerized valuation formulas to calculate fair values.

These valuation methods may produce a fair value that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Foundation believes its valuation methods are appropriate, the use of different methods or assumptions could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Because of these risks, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statement of financial position and statement of activities.

In 2008, the Foundation entered into a 20-year lease agreement with the Episcopal Theological Seminary of the Southwest (the Seminary). In lieu of rental payments, approximately \$1,300,000 in renovations were made by the Foundation. Subsequent to the renovation, the building was subleased through 2029 to the Diocese for use as the Diocesan Center in Austin for annual rent of approximately \$60,000. Rental income recognized in 2012 and 2011 from the Diocese was approximately \$60,000.

REPORTS RECEIVED LATE Commission on Schools

Transition:

In February, 2013, the Rev. Dean Calcote retired from his position as founding Chairman of the Commission on Schools. When he was still a Head of School over 30 years ago, Dean began to bring increased awareness of our schools to the Diocese and design systems to ensure excellence in every aspect of their operations. Over the years, he has seen unprecedented changes in our schools, from a shift in simple administrative issues to complicated governance challenges, from discussions about financial aid for students to financial incentives for employees through mandated benefits. Serving our 58 schools and their nearly 11,000 students and 2,000 educators, Episcopal schools are recognized as a significant ministry in this Diocese, and we thank Dean for his work on behalf of all of them.

Commission Goals:

The Commission set four main goals for the year. First, the <u>Handbook for Schools</u> was updated, specifically addressing the Standards for Schools and adding information for school administrators to clarify the schools' relationship with the Diocese. Second, the committee considered the unique challenges experienced by the smallest schools in the Diocese, whether new start-ups or modest enrollment institutions and proposed an adjustment to the required Standards for these schools. Third, the committee wanted to provide information for newly assigned rectors, whether they had a school or might contemplate adding one, and offer resources to support their unique situations. And last, the committee wanted to begin building an understanding of the value-added collaboration that schools can offer to parishes and the Diocese.

Standards for Schools; Certification of Schools:

Schools comprehend the authority of Standards in their operations. The previous Standards were reviewed and updated where clarity improved meaning. Additionally, several Standards were designated as Major Standards to emphasize essential importance. The Standards are published in both the Handbook for Schools and on the Diocesan website.

With the support of the Executive Committee our smallest schools, with enrollment of less than 50 students, may claim exemption from the requirement of accreditation. These schools are still required to be in compliance with the remaining Standards set by the Commission.

Additionally, the process for schools to become certified by the Commission, and subsequently approved by the Bishop, is now published in The Handbook. Schools must earn certification in one of three categories – Full Certification, Basic Certification (for the smallest schools), or Recognition (for non-traditional schools), depending on their status with the Commission.

School Structure:

School structure was re-visited as many schools are adding programs for newborns and infants. These programs for children under one year of age are now recognized as *Early Preschool* and need unique attention to fulfill their mission. Currently, 40% of our schools offer programs for these young children.

Preschool which includes children from age two years through kindergarten is found in 52% of our schools. Unique situations with curriculum, staffing, and licensing challenge these programs.

Nearly 40% of Episcopal schools in this Diocese also include elementary, middle, and/or high school. In total, half of our schools experienced consistent enrollment from the previous year, and the other half experienced slight increases.

Communications:

Information was collected this year about the service projects sponsored by schools, especially those organized with their home parish. This was done to highlight the value of a working partnership with these two institutions to achieve complementary mission objectives. *General Statistics:*

INSURANCE AND DIOCESAN BUDGETS STATEMENTS OF REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

Explanatory Notes

- Payments on Insurance Assessments were better than had been anticipated when the budget was created. Collections are expected to leave only a small gap.
- The census of covered individuals ended the year at approximately 215; this expense was estimated at 199. This variance is due to the elimination of numerous vacant clergy throughout 2013.
- 3 The Diocese received \$25,000 to assist Bishop Doyle with his 2014 sabbatical.
- 4 Unrealized gains on the Great Commission Fund, held in Church Corp's Participating Funds. Investment gains and losses are accounted for on a gross basis, rather than net.
- 5 "The Conference" held in May was new in 2013 and registration was higher than expected at \$37,000.
- From approximately 2007 to 2010, funds were deposited into the postage meter held at the Diocesan office in excess of usage, creating a large "prepaid postage" balance within the meter. The Diocese requested a refund of the unused balance from the USPS and finally received payment in June.
- 7 Increased overtime due to weekend events, increased hours due to new Foundation activities and one additional FTE added in the second quarter all contributed to this overage.
- 8 Travel and entertainment expenses related to the sale of St. Luke's Hospital and the formation of the Episcopal Health Foundation.
- 9 Canon Normand was in the parishes to fill more than 20 vacancies during 2013.
- Primarily due to increased travel to parishes within the Diocese and to the Diocese of Fort Worth by financial and congregational development staff assisting and consulting with that Diocese.
- 11 During 2013, legal fees for employment cases were higher than previous years.
- 12 The 164th Diocesan Council expenses were higher than expected in Houston and there were fewer registrants than in previous years.
- 13 The use of a unified budget in 2014 eliminated costs of producing and distributing the Mission Funding Catalogue.
- 14 New Mission work exceeded budget due to increased church planting activities as opportunities arose.
- 15 Calling and Moving expense includes moving costs for more curates in 2013 than anticipated. It also includes the final moving costs associated with Bishop High's Fort Worth residence and moving Bishop Fisher to Tyler.
- The Finance Committee has approved the transfer of this Fund to the Great Commission Foundation. This transfer is in process at year-end.
- 17 Utilities exceeded budget due to increases in rates and usage in the summer.
- These special revenue and expense accounts represent the Bastrop fire relief program, which is a temporary program managed by the Diocesan Disaster Relief department. In April 2013, Episcopal Relief & Development granted the Diocese \$75,000 to continue the work in Bastrop that began in the fall of 2011. Excess revenue from 2012 in the amount of \$28,000 will be applied to the expense overage in the current year and is included in the "Net Assets Special Accounts" amount on the Combined Balance Sheet.
- Special accounts also include revenue and expenses related to the new Bayou City Service Corp project, which will run from August 1, 2013 to July 31, 2014. Revenues include grant funds from the Bishop Quin Foundation and from the four "host sites" that are receiving the benefit of the four interns' volunteer employment. Expenses for the program consist of room and board for the four interns, as well as a monthly grocery budget and a minimal monthly stipend. Revenues in excess of expenses will be utilized in 2014.

- 1 Some congregations paid more than they committed to the Asking during 2013.
- 2 Revenues are in excess of budget but are offset by increased expenses reported elsewhere.
- Addiction Recovery Mission received a large grant (\$20,000) from Texas House Foundation in February of 2013 for the program, and expenses are higher than budgeted as a result of that grant.
- 4 The Seafarer's Mission solicited contributions to offset their expenses while working towards self-sufficiency.
- 5 Christ the King is moving out of the Missionary Budget. This amount represents compensation for the Vicar. Christ the King's financial condition does not allow them to pay as much compensation as had been budgeted.
- The Vicar for SFA was hired after the budget was completed in 2012 at a higher level than anticipated.
- 7 Mission Funding for A & M University in College Station will be over budget this year due to an overlap in staff in January 2013.
- 8 No meetings of ECOM were held in 2013.
- 9 Multicultural expenses include approximately \$7,000 for the Kaleidoscope Holy Currencies Workshop, which had previously been accounted for by Camp Allen.
- 10 Bishop's Contingency expenses are over budget due to grants to churches for one-time expenses related to problems within their congregations.

- **OH** These amounts represent allocations of overhead to and from the Diocese. In the case of revenues they represent overhead expenses paid by the Diocese and allocated among the Foundations. In the case of expense they represent expenses paid by EDOT Financial Services Corp. and allocated to the Diocese.
- GCF These amounts will be paid to/for the Great Commission Foundation in the 2014 Budget.
- **COU** The revenue from and the expense of Diocesan Council will be included in the Diocesan Budget starting in 2014.
- **SAB** Bishop Doyle will be on sabbatical for 4 months in 2014. Therefore, amounts have been provided for Episcopal visitations during that time period.
- **CTO** Canon Normand will retire effective March 31, 2014. Thus, one-fourth of year has been provided for Canon Normand and a full year for Canon Ryan.
- **SCM** Rev. Cecilia Smith will retire effective April 30, 2014. Thus, one-third of a year has been provided for her and a full year for Rev. Carol Petty.
- **INC** Clergy and Staff received a 5% Cost of Living increase for 2014. One and one-half FTE's were added to the Diocesan staff to assist in meeting the needs of the new Foundations of the Diocese.
- **TTH** Represents a tithe to the Episcopal Church on the revenues of the Diocese.
- ACC Amount represents assistance to the Anglican Communion for their institutions, ministries and costs.
- **EFT** The Episcopal Foundation of Texas will be making grants to assist with the Children at Risk Program.
- **EHF** These amounts will be funded primarily with grants from the Episcopal Health Foundation.
- **CMM** The Commissions of the Diocese will share one budget item starting in 2014. All expenses will be funded from the single line item.

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

The name of the corporation is PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF TEXAS.

Bequests made to the Church Corporation, whether unrestricted or limited to some specific purpose within the Diocese, are deductible in computing federal estate and Texas inheritance taxes. In addition, contributions of such nature made during a donor's lifetime are deductible for federal income tax purposes.

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
