

The Rev. Robert Flick, MS, MDiv, MBA, LPC

Bob is currently a retired priest of the Diocese of Texas where he has served for almost 20 years. He is married to Sarah, a retired psychiatrist, active spiritual director, and author. In retirement Bob continues in the Spiritual Direction ministry and serves as a faculty member for the Iona School for Ministry where he supervises field education. The Rev. Harvey Clemons, Jr.

Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, Houston

At the helm of the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church of Houston since 1983, Pastor Clemons is instrumental in the comprehensive neighborhood revitalization movement of the Fifth Ward community and founded the Fifth Ward Community Redevelopment Corporation in 1989 and later the Pleasant Hill Community Development Corporation (1998). Under his leadership, the Fifth Ward and the City of Houston has improved by the construction of over 200+ single-family homes, construction and acquisition of over 2,300 multi-family housing units, and thousands of square feet of commercial space.

Reverend Clemons is a recipient of countless awards and honors including the NAACP Mickey Leland Humanitarian Award and the College of Biblical Studies Neighborhood Builders Award. A continuing student and expositor of God's Word, Reverend Clemons studied in England at Oxford University, Regents Park College. He is a contributing author of *The African American Devotional Bible* and contributing author of the publication, *Oxford Sermons 2007*. He serves on various other Boards and Advisory Councils including Buffalo Bayou Partnership, Chairman of the Board for the Center for Urban Transformation, BioLogos Advisory Council, Faith Leaders for Ending Gun Violence, Rice University's Religion and Public Life Program and the Racial, Justice and Religion Collective for the Aspen Institute.

He is married to Dianne Clemons and the father of three sons (Keitrick, Harvey III and Jonathan) and two daughters (Kristy and Harvetta) and grandfather to nine.

Theodicy Jazz Collective

The Theodicy Jazz Collective was formed at Oberlin Conservatory in 2006 and grew during residency at the Yale Institute of Sacred Music from 2008 to 2012.

The band creates and leads services for a multitude of churches and cathedrals from Los Angeles to London and Minnesota to Mississippi, offering lectures and workshops at high schools and colleges. Incorporating sounds from the traditions of jazz and gospel music and rhythms from Latin America and Africa, the music is a constant prayer, sometimes a shout of joy, sometimes a call to action, and even sometimes a cry for hope.

Theodicy has provided music for conferences and in communities such as the National Council of Churches, the Washington National Cathedral, The House of Bishops and General Convention of the Episcopal Church, and Canterbury Cathedral.

The Rev. A. Katherine Grieb, J.D., Ph.D., L.L.M.

Director, Center for Anglican Studies
Virginia Theological Seminary,
and Adjunct Faculty in New Testament

The Rev. A. Katherine Grieb, Ph.D. became the Director of the Center for Anglican Communion Studies (CACCS) on July 1, 2021. She has served the Anglican Communion for some twenty years in many roles, including on the Inter-Anglican Theological and Doctrinal Commission (IATDC) and the Inter-Anglican Standing Committee on Unity, Faith, and Order (IASCUFO), among others.

Dr. Grieb received a B.A. in Philosophy and Religion at Hollins University, a J.D. from Columbus School of Law at the Catholic University of America, an M.Div. at Virginia Theological Seminary, a Ph.D. with Distinction in Theology at Yale University, and an L.L.M. with distinction in Canon Law at the Cardiff University in Wales.

She has taught at Virginia Theological Seminary as Professor of Biblical Interpretation and New Testament since 1994 and now combines her duties at CACCS with teaching Biblical Greek and New Testament Interpretation.


Her book, *The Story of Romans: A Narrative Defense of God's Righteousness* (Westminster John Knox, 2002) is widely used in seminaries. Dr. Grieb is one of the Six Preachers, chosen by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Dean of Canterbury Cathedral. She has written extensively about preaching and has preached at Canterbury Cathedral, Westminster Abbey, and many Episcopal parishes in the United States.

The Very Rev. Dr. Mark Oakley

Dean of Southwark

The Very Rev. Dr. Mark Oakley is Dean of Southwark Cathedral, on the south bank of the Thames in London. Over thirty years as a priest he has been Chaplain to the Bishop of London, the Rector of the Actors' Church, the Chancellor of St Paul's Cathedral, and the Dean of St John's College in Cambridge University. He was also Deputy Priest in Ordinary to the late Queen Elizabeth II. He is the author of several books on poetry and literature's relationship to faith, including *The Splash of Words: Believing in Poetry*, which won the international Michael Ramsey Prize for theological writing. Last year the Archbishop of Canterbury awarded him the Lanfranc Award for Scholarship and Education. Mark has a PhD in English Literature and has recently been awarded an Honorary doctorate in Education by the University of Chester. Mark is also a respected public speaker and communicator, as well as a strong advocate for human rights. He was awarded the first national 'upstander against Hate Crime' award in the UK for his work with victims of hate crime.

The Rev. A. Katherine Grieb, J.D., Ph.D., L.L.M. is the Director of the Center for Anglican Communion Studies at the Virginia Theological Seminary. She has served the Anglican Communion for some twenty years in many roles, including the Inter-Anglican Theological and Doctrinal Commission, the Inter-Anglican Standing Commission on Unity, faith, and Order, the Covenant Design Group, and the Canterbury Scholars Program.

She has taught at VTS as Professor of Biblical Interpretation and New Testament since 1994 and now combines her duties as Director of CACS with her teaching.

Her book, *The Story of Romans: A Narrative Defense of God's Righteousness*, is widely used in seminaries. She has published numerous articles about the New Testament and preaching. Dr. Grieb is one of the Six Preachers, chosen by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Dean of Canterbury Cathedral. She has preached and taught many places and particularly enjoys leading pre-ordination retreats.

Regicide and the Rule of Law: Macbeth and November 5

November 5, 2024 will be Election Day in the United States and in England it is Guy Fawkes Day, a reminder of the treasonous Gunpowder Plot of 1605. This coincidence provides an opportunity to reflect on the importance of "the rule of law" in history and in literature, especially concerning the orderly transition of power in the highest office of the land. Most literary critics of Shakespeare believe that "Macbeth," written shortly after this treason was discovered and prevented, deals with these questions, as well as "equivocation" and the seal of the confessional, predestination and freedom, and gender fluidity, among other matters, making it especially timely for religious leaders this fall.



The Very Rev. Dr. Mark Oakley

Dean of Southwark

Mark Oakley is Dean of Southwark in London, England. Formerly Chancellor of St Paul's Cathedral, Dean of St John's College, Cambridge, and a Deputy Priest in Ordinary to Queen Elizabeth II, Mark is admired for his preaching, public speaking and his writings on poetry, literature and spirituality. The Archbishop of Canterbury recently presented him with the Lanfranc Award for education and scholarship, and he was also awarded the Michael Ramsey Prize for theological writing, for his book *'The Splash of Words: Believing in Poetry'*. The University of Chester honored Mark last year with an honorary doctorate for his contribution to the arts and human rights.

'Our unemployed love': back to the Christian heart with George Herbert and Mother Julian

Mark Oakley will explore the poetry of English poet George Herbert, and the writings of Mother Julian of Norwich, to reorient us back to the heart of Christian life at a time when so much rhetoric is pushing us into places we shouldn't be in. Faithfully Sharing. Being With: The Method is the Message.

Description:

Quote from a Priest in 2024: "A high sacramental theology fundamentally comes down to meeting Christ in ordinary things, and in each other, as the corporate body of Christ. That is also what Being With sets out to do."

Being With is an innovative Christian Enquirer's Course, designed to help individuals articulate and value their own spiritual journey. The course helps people consider faith in new and refreshing ways, without needing to study or memorize theological texts or to seek correction or judgement. The course is immersive, offering time and space for participants to discover and trust that the Holy Spirit has been at work in their life since the beginning.

The course introduces (or reintroduces) people to formal church communities.

Each course runs over ten weeks, online or in person, and is free to participants. Participation is open to everyone from all walks of life and range in age from 18-80 years old. This session particularly focuses on one of the key principles of Being With: the Method is the Message. You will also be hearing from a member of the clergy of the Diocese about their experience of running Being With just down the road from you.



James Fawcett

Director, Being With

James has 25 years of experience in various ministry context and has established several projects and charitable organizations. He is Founder and Director of CONCRETE, a platform connecting, thinking and amplifying Christians working with young people. He is also the Founder and Director of WITH a new religious community in an old convent. He is well-known throughout the UK and beyond for his innovative thinking in enabling discipleship and outreach among young people.

As well as the projects he has founded and developed, James has also served on the faculty of centers to train others in youth ministry and taken on governance roles for various charities. He has been connecting with St. Martin-in-the-Fields, London and its Being With theological vision for several years and has spent the past three exploring what this theology could mean within a welcoming Christian community.

2025: The Year When East and West Meet

Description:

Rudyard Kipling famously said “Oh, East is East and West is West and never the Twain shall meet, Till Earth and Sky stand presently at God’s great Judgement Seat.” He wasn’t talking about the Eastern and Western parts of the Body of Christ, which have been divided for many centuries, but his words are an apt description of the difficulties of confessing our faith in “One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church.”

2025 is a rare opportunity for us: It is the 1700th anniversary of the First Council of Nicaea in 325 and it is one of the few years when both Eastern Orthodox and the Catholic West celebrate Easter on the same date.

This workshop will review the overall history, summarize the key achievements of the Anglican-Orthodox dialogue which produced “The Church of the Triune God” of 2006, and suggest ways to teach church members about this and to partner with Orthodox clergy in 2025.

The Rev. Dr. Andrew K. Barnett

Founding Director, Theodicy Jazz Collective

The Rev. Dr. Andrew K. Barnett is the Senior Associate Rector for Program. Hailing from Minnesota, he attended Oberlin College and Conservatory, Yale University's Environment and Divinity Schools, and Luther Seminary, where he earned a D. Min. in congregational mission and leadership. Andy led Washington National Cathedral's strategic priority to broaden their liturgical music, expanding the beauty of Anglican tradition while honoring the power of what has come before. He is a trustee of the Berkeley Divinity School at Yale.

As founding director of the Theodicy Jazz Collective, he has performed broadly across the United States and England, including a commissioned jazz mass (with William Cleary) for Canterbury Cathedral, and a choral suite of freedom songs, funded by the National Endowment for the Arts, the Doris Duke Foundation, and the Mellon Foundation.

In his environmental work, he researched and wrote for the Presidential Climate Action Project – a menu of policy options that was presented to President Obama and informed that administration's climate action. He also built an Environmental Justice curriculum for the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles and served on the presiding bishop's delegation to the UN climate summits in France, Morocco, and Germany.

As a teacher, Andy is passionate about local and global partnerships, aiming to love God, love our neighbors, and change the world. Beyond work, he loves running, dogs, tennis, cooking, and rooting for the Minnesota Twins.





The Rt. Rev. Héctor F. Monterroso


Bishop Assistant, Diocese of Texas

Mixed Metaphors - Navigating Conflict Through Effective Lay/Clergy Partnerships

Description:

Every local faith community, of whatever size and shape, is facing significant transition and change which often leads to conflict among members and, more typically, between the clergy and the congregation. Political polarization and the fallout from the November election will only exacerbate this tension. While conflict is not inherently bad, it needs to be managed and focused. Clergy often feel overwhelmed and isolated in these circumstances and have the misconception that they alone are responsible for bringing the congregation together. But it's not just about you. You need to acknowledge and appreciate that we're all in this together and consider church leaders and members as partners and not just congregants.

Using the Baptismal Covenant and Ordination Vows as a theological framework, Donald V. Romanik will offer some ideas and facilitate a lively and provocative discussion on how clergy can forge, nurture, and sustain effective lay-clergy partnerships to navigate transitions and change, manage conflict, and redirect the congregation from internal personal clashes to outwardly focused mission.

New rectors and long serving parish or mission leaders will be encouraged to think first about their mission and then about the resources needed to fulfill their objectives. The models discussed will be useful for the annual stewardship campaign as well as a capital campaign.

The Rev. Patrick J. Miller

Rector, St. Mark's, Houston



Patrick received his BA in Communication and Philosophy from Austin College in 1990. He received his MDiv from Seminary of the Southwest (SSW) in 2000. In February 2008, Patrick became the rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church and School (in Houston). Interim Rector - What You Don't Know


Description:

The Rev. Jim Liberatore

Interim Rector, St. Stephen's, Beaumont

The Rev. Jim Liberatore retired as the rector of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Pearland where he served for 27 years. 
The Rev. Karen J. Pettit
