Texas was administered as a Foreign Mission from 1838 to 1845, being visited by Bishop Polk of Louisiana and Bishop Freeman of Arkansas. When Texas became a state of the union in 1845, it continued under the care of Bishop Freeman.

The Diocese of Texas was organized in 1849 and continued under Bishop Freeman's care until Bishop Gregg was consecrated. The original diocese, comprising the whole state, was divided in 1874. Since that time, the Diocese of Texas has been made up of the 57 counties of southeast and east Texas, viz: that portion of the State of Texas lying south of the northern line of the counties of Lampasas, Coryell, McLennan, Limestone, Freestone, Anderson, Smith, Gregg, and Marion, and east of the western line of the counties of Matagorda, Colorado, Fayette, Bastrop, Travis, Burnet, and Lampasas.

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COUNCIL MINUTES The 176th ANNUAL COUNCIL OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF TEXAS FEBRUARY 7 & 8, 2025

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 7, 2025 THE HOLY EUCHARIST

The 176th Annual Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas began on Friday evening at 7:00, February 7, 2025, with a celebration of the Holy Eucharist in Ballroom ABC at The Ft. Worth Convention Center. The Right Reverend Héctor F. Monterroso, Bishop Assistant of Texas, was the celebrant of the liturgy. Bishop Monterroso was joined by The Right Reverend C. Andrew Doyle, Bishop of Texas, The Right Reverend Jeff W. Fisher, Bishop Suffragan of Texas, The Right Reverend Brian R. Seage, Assisting Bishop of Texas and The Most Reverend Dr. Josiah Idowu-Fearon, Bishop in Residence, St. John the Divine, Houston. Bishop Monterroso was assisted at the altar by Deacon Cindy Ruiz, preacher at the liturgy was The Right Reverend Kathryn McCrossen Ryan, Bishop Suffragan of Texas. No reception followed the Eucharist.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 2025 BUSINESS SESSION

On Saturday morning, February 8 at 8:30 in Ballroom ABC at the Ft. Worth Convention Center, the 176th Annual Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas Council was called to order by the Bishop Diocesan, the Right Reverend C. Andrew Doyle. The Bishop announced that he had placed a copy of the Bible on the rostrum open to Galatians 6:9-10. The Bishop announced that he had appointed the Reverend Uriel Osnaya-Jimenez as Chaplain of the 176th Council. The Bishop requested Chaplain Osnaya-Jimenez read the selection from Galatians and to lead the Council in prayer.

A review of the computer voting system was undertaken with testing of balloting abilities.

The Bishop called on Secretary Marcea Paul to help organize for business. The Secretary announced that there were 428 lay Delegates, and 251 clergy delegates registered. To establish a quorum, the Secretary asked one delegate from each congregation to stand, all clergy present were then asked to stand. The Secretary then certified that a quorum was present.

Beginning the report of credentials, the Secretary moved that all licensed clergy who function as heads of congregations and those who are licensed as assisting clergy or on the staff of Diocesan institutions,

be admitted to Council with seat and voice but without vote. The motion was seconded. On a voice vote, the Bishop declared the motion adopted.

The Secretary announced that there were no congregations in arrears on their assessments to the Church Pension Fund or on their Diocesan Assessment. The Secretary announced that all congregations in attendance have completed and submitted their Parochial Reports.

The Bishop announced the appointment of the following as Campus Ministry Delegates: Austin Community College/ South Austin Canterbury: Daniel Knox, Alternate: Leela Gómez; Baylor University: Aidon Butler; Rice University: Cecilia Visco, Alternate: Zacary Rubio; The Episcopal

Austin University: Emma DeRise, Alternate: Harrison Brown; Tarleton State University: Kylie Kozloski, Alternate: Ian Wilson; Texas A&M, College Station: Sophia Helbert, Alternate: Jacy Stulsas; The Episcopal Church at Prairie View A&M, Prairie View: Adaeze Amarachi Igwenagu, Alternate: Ifeakandu Moses Nzekwe; University of Texas, Austin: Pearl Morosky, Alternate: Alexander Eagan.

The Bishop announced the appointment of the following as members of the Youth Ministry of the Diocese (and as such, entitled to one Delegate from each Convocation, with seat, voice, and vote): Austin Convocation: Jacob Philbrook, St. Julian of Norwich, Round Rock; Central Convocation: N/A; East Harris Convocation: Maleydy Maradiaga, Grace, Houston; Fort Worth Convocation: Caden Davis, Good Shepherd, Granbury; Galveston Convocation: N/A; Northeast Convocation: Elias Richards, St. Alban's, St. Clare's, Tyler; Northwest Convocation: Thomas Armond, St. Alban's, Waco, Alternate: Jakoby Perez, St. Joseph's, Salado; San Jacinto Convocation: Tessa Soard, Holy Comforter, Spring; Southeast Convocation: Mason Matheny, St. Mark's, Beaumont; Southwest Convocation: MaryEllen Simicek, , St. Mark's, Richmond; West Harris Convocation: Houston Perry, St. Andrew's, Houston, Alternate: Aiden McCormick, St. Andrew's, Houston.

The Secretary announced that the Credentials Report was concluded. The Bishop then announced that the 176th Annual Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas was organized for business.

The Bishop announced that he had appointed Ms. Lee Woodward as Parliamentarian to the 176th Council and that David Harvin was present as Chancellor of the Diocese.

The Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, The Rev. William Fowler, presented the Special Rules of procedure (as printed in the Order of Business booklet) and moved their adoption. There being no discussion or objection, the motion was adopted by a two-thirds standing vote. The Committee Chair

then moved the adoption of the Council's Order of Business (as printed in the Order of Business booklet). There being no discussion or objection, the motion was adopted on a voice vote.

The Secretary announced that there was no unfinished business from the 175th Council and certified the minutes of that Council to be a true and accurate record of the proceedings of the 175th Council. The Bishop attested to the validity of the minutes of the 175th Council.

The Bishop announced that there were no Council Committees with vacancies that needed to be filled.

The Rev. William Fowler introduced Katie Sherrod who offered a special presentation from the North Region.

The Bishop introduced the Most Rev. Dr. Josiah Idowu-Fearon, former Secretary General of the Anglican Consultative Council, now currently serving as Bishop-in-Residence for Evangelism, Mission, and Global Partnerships at St. John the Divine in Houston. The Bishop introduced and welcomed The Right Reverend Brian R. Seage, Assisting Bishop of Texas who is serving half-time in the North Region.

Canon Joann Saylors reported on Diocesan Missions and Parishes (a full copy of her report may be found herein as **Appendix A**). In accordance with Title III, Section 1.4 of the canons of the Diocese of Texas, Bishop Doyle established an Episcopal Fellowship named San Romero Episcopal Church in 2017.

Bishop Doyle has subsequently established ten more fellowships in accordance with that Canon: Good Shepherd Indian Episcopal Church, Stafford; St. Philip the Evangelist Episcopal Church, Houston; St. Joan of Arc Episcopal Church, Pflugerville; Holy Family Episcopal Church, Houston; Northside Episcopal Church, Houston, St. Cecilia's Episcopal Church, Round Top; San Esteban Episcopal Church, Cleveland and Mosaic Episcopal Church, Pearland; Jubilee Episcopal Church, Austin, and St. Cornelius Episcopal Church, Belton.

The motion was made that all eleven established Fellowships be entitled to one Lay Delegate and may be seated at this Council with voice but without vote. The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

Canon Saylors also reported several changes, San Mateo, Bellaire requested and was granted a change in status from parish to mission. Also, in accordance with the votes of their Bishop's Committees or the guidance of the Bishop, Iglesia El Buen Pastor, Waco, SoCo Episcopal Church, Austin and All Saints" Episcopal Church, Stafford, held their final services in 2024. Therefore, upon recommendation of the Bishop, in accordance with Article 6 Section 6.2 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Texas, Canon Saylors moved that the missions named above be dissolved. The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

Finally, Title III, Section 1.1, states that, Finally, Title III, Section 1.1, states that, "A Parish, which has not been previously organized as a Mission, may be organized under any appropriate name by the adoption of Articles of Association and by duly choosing a Vestry and Wardens, at such time as it is capable of meeting all the financial obligations of a Parish, as well as its Assessment." Bishop Doyle has given notice of his approval for the of Resurrection South Austin Episcopal Church, to become a parish of the Diocese of Texas, and this approval has been forwarded to the Secretary of this Council. The Committee on Parishes and Missions has received a certified copy of the congregation's Articles of Association as required. Canon Saylors moved that the parish of Resurrection South Austin Episcopal Church be admitted into union with this Council, and that their lay delegates be seated with voice and vote. The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

Bishop Doyle gave his address to Council (a full copy of his address may be found herein as **Appendix B**).

A short break followed.

Following the break, The Rev. Jason Ingalls, Chair of the Committee on Nominations, presented the report of that Committee. Nominated for Treasurer was Linda Riley Mitchell. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed. Nominated for Secretary of the Diocese was the Rev. Canon Marcea E. Paul. There being no further nominations, nominations were closed. As there were no other candidates for the Office of Treasurer, Linda Riley Mitchell was elected on a voice vote. As there were no other candidates for the Office of Secretary, Marcea E. Paul was elected on a voice vote.

Nominated for the Standing Committee, Clergy Order (elect 1) were: The Rev. Alan Bentrup (St. Martin in the Fields, Keller), The Rev. Whitney (St. Andrew's School, Austin) and The Rev. Mike

Stone (St. Thomas the Apostle, Nassau Bay). There being no further nominations, nominations were closed. Nominated for the Standing Committee, Lay Order (elect 1) were: James Black (St. Mark's Beaumont), and Robert McDonald (All Saints', Austin). There being no further nominations, nominations were closed. Nominated for the Executive Board, Clergy Order (elect 2) were: The Jeremy Bradley (St. Mark's, Richmond) The Rev. Justin Briggle (Good Shepherd, Friendswood) The Rev. David Faulkner (St. Cyprian's, Lufkin) The Rev. Karl Griswold-Kuhn, (Texas A&M University, College Station), The Rev. Bradley Sullivan (Lord of the Streets, Houston) The Rev. Bradley Sullivan (Christ Church Cathedral, Houston)), the Rev. Rohani Weger (Holy Trinity, Port Neches) There being no further nominations, nominations were closed. Nominated for the Executive Board, Lay Order (elect 3) were: Debbie Allensworth (St. Andrew's, Pearland), Abe Campos (St. Joseph's, Salado,) Michael Holder (St. James, Taylor), Jim Johnson (St. Stephen's, Beaumont), Nandini Kandolha (St. John the Divine, Houston) and John Pitts, Jr., (Good Shepherd, Austin) There being no further nominations, nominations were closed. Nominated for Trustee of the Church Corporation (elect 1) were: Mark Browning (St. Andrew's, Bryan), Lisa Burns (Diocese of Texas), Mike Hughes (Trinity, Galveston), Jay Wilson (St. John's, Silsbee) There being no further nominations, nominations were closed. Nominated for Clergy Trustee of the University of the South (elect 1) were: Mary Beth Butler (St. Martin in the Fields, Keller), Alice Nezzar (All Saints', Austin) There being no further nominations, nominations were closed. The report of the Committee was concluded.

A report on the procedure to be followed on balloting was made by the Rev. Korey Wright and the Rev. Jonathan Totty. Before the vote was taken, the Chaplain led the Council in prayer. The first ballot was then taken.

The Bishop thanked Maria Boyce, chair of the Committee for Constitution and Canons and her committee for their work. The Bishop also thanked the Governance Committee of the Executive Board for their work on the Diocesan Canons.

Maria Boyce presented the report of the Committee for Constitution and Canons (a full report of the Committee may be found in volume 1 of the Journal of this Council). Although there were 23 proposed amendments, they were grouped by subject matter areas. The areas were:

Property issues (Constitutional amendment)

The use of inclusive language in our Canons

The updating of outdated practices or language in our Canons

The Constitutional amendment regarding property issues was presented for a first reading and no vote is taken. During the second year, a proposed constitutional amendment is adopted if it is approved by 2/3rds majority vote of each order, lay and clergy. This amendment will go to a second reading.

The remaining 22 proposed canonical amendments were addressed in 3 votes.

Maria Boyce moved that the proposed amendment to Title III, Canon 8, section 8.1 be approved if the Constitutional amendment discussed above is approved following a second reading at Council next year. The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

The Chair made a motion that the proposed amendments related to inclusive language in our Canons be adopted. The motion was approved on a voice vote.

The Chair motioned that the final group of 9 proposed amendments regarding outdated language and practices contained in our Canons be adopted. The motion was approved on a voice vote.

would change the use of the language "men and women" to persons. The Chair moved on behalf of the committee that the proposed amendments be adopted. The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

The Bishop called on the Rev. Patrick Hall, Committee Chair, to make the report of the Committee for Resolutions. The chair expressed his gratitude for the work of the committee members and shared that the Resolutions Committee received three resolutions for consideration at the 176th Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas. The Chair moved that Resolution approving the Amended and Restated Certificate of Formation of the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas. The motion passed on a voice vote.

The Chair of the Resolutions Committee moved that Bishop Doyle's resolution that all members of the Diocese be encouraged to read the Creation Care Task Force Report and consider what steps they might take at a personal, congregational, and diocesan level to better care for creation. Adoption of the resolution carried on a voice vote.

The Chair of the Resolutions Committee shared that the Resolutions Committee had no recommendation on Resolution 2024-C031 "Migration with Dignity." The Chair inquired if there was a motion from the floor to consider the resolution. The Rev. Alyssa Stebbing, the Rev. Josh Kulak and the Rev. Daniel Robayo spoke for consideration of the resolution. After some debate, a motion was made to place the amendment in the Journal. The motion carried on a voice vote.

The "Courtesy Resolutions" were introduced, and a motion was made to adopt them. The resolutions were adopted *in masse* after the following: An amendment was made to the Courtesy Resolution offering greetings to the Diocese of West Texas to include the Rev. Angela Cortiñas, soon to be consecrated as Bishop, and the Rev. Amy Meaux, also to be consecrated as Bishop in West Missouri. The Rev. Gerry Sevick was also added to the list of retired clergy, a correction was made to Joann Starbuck's name adding an 'e' as well as the parish of Ken Jones from St. James' to Trinity, Houston. The complete list of these resolutions may be found in Volume I of this Journal.

The Rev. Korey Wright presented the results of the First Ballot. For the Executive Board, Clergy, there will be a runoff between The Rev. Jeremy Bradley, The Rev. Karl Griswold-Kuhn, The Rev. Bradley Sullivan and The Rev. Rohani Weger. For the Executive Board, Lay, Debbie Allensworth, Abe Campos and Nandini Kandolha were elected. For the Standing Committee, Clergy, there will be a runoff between The Rev. Alan Bentrup and The Rev. Whitby Kirby. For the Standing Committee, Lay, Robert McDonald was elected. For the Church Corporation Trustee, The Rev. Lisa Burns was elected. For Sewanee Trustee, Mary Beth Butler was elected.

The Chaplain led the Council in Noonday Prayers remembering those departed this life since the 175th Council who had been Delegates to previous Councils and those who had served the Diocese as clergy. The complete Necrology lists may be found in **Appendix D**.

The Bishop declared a 1-hour recess for lunch.

Following lunch, Canon Saylors introduced new communities of the Diocese. The Great Commission

Bell is rung at Diocese Councils to celebrate new Fellowships, Missions, and Parishes. Representatives of Resurrection, South Austin were invited to ring the bell. This concluded the report on and celebration of New Communities.

Dr. Anne Barnes, MD, President, and CEO of the Episcopal Health Foundation (EHF) reported

on the work EHF has been involved in.

Allen Kight, President, and CEO of Camp Allen presented a video to bring awareness to Camp Allen's youth program and announced Camp Allen's Rally Day as Sunday, February 23, 2025.

Linda Mitchell, Treasurer of the Diocese, presented the 2024 Treasurer's Report. A full copy of the report may be found in **Appendix C**.

The Treasurer moved that the offerings gathered at this Council's worship service be given to Episcopal Relief and Development for wildfire relief. With no discussion or objection, the motion was passed.

The 2025 Diocesan budget was presented by Bette Lehmberg. On behalf of the Executive Board, the Treasurer then moved the adoption of this budget. The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

The Rev. Canon Kellaura Johnson introduced a video of the clergy new to the Diocese.

The Rev. Korey Wright presented the results of the second ballot. For Executive Board, Clergy, The Rev. Jeremy Bradley, and The Rev. Bradley Sullivan were elected. For Standing Committee, Clergy, The Rev. Whitney Kirby was elected.

The Chaplain led the Council in a prayer of thanksgiving for those elected.

The Bishop announced elections on his Nomination (copies of which had been distributed electronically). There being no objection to the election of those nominated, they were declared elected.

The Rev. Canon Christine Faulstich made housekeeping announcements and extended an invitation to the 177th Council to be held February 27th and 28th in 2026 in the Woodlands, TX.

The Bishop expressed gratitude for the work of Council Committee members and volunteers.

There being no further business before the 176th Council, it was moved to adjourn. The Chaplain offered a closing prayer, and the delegates joined in singing the Doxology. The Bishop gave his benediction.

Diocesan Missions and Parishes Report & Motions Report - Joann Saylors

Thank you, Rt. Reverend Sir.

Right Reverend Sir, Clergy and Delegates, on behalf of the Committee on Missions and Parishes I have three items of business to report and bring before this Council.

First, in 2017, in accordance with Title III, Section 1.4, of the Canons of the Diocese of Texas, Bishop Doyle established an Episcopal Fellowship named San Romero Episcopal Church. Bishop Doyle has subsequently established eleven more fellowships in accordance with that Canon, with ten remaining at fellowship status: Good Shepherd Indian Episcopal Church, Stafford, St. Philip the Evangelist Episcopal Church, Houston, St. Joan of Arc Episcopal Church, Pflugerville, Holy Family Episcopal Church, Houston, Northside Episcopal Church, Houston, St. Cecilia's Episcopal Church, Round Top, San Esteban Episcopal Church, Cleveland, Mosaic Episcopal Church, Pearland, Jubilee Episcopal Church, Austin, and St. Cornelius Episcopal Church, Belton.

Title III, Section 1.4, states that, upon recommendation of the Bishop, and with approval of Council, these Fellowships are each entitled to one Lay Delegate and may be seated with voice but without vote. Therefore, on behalf of the Bishop Diocesan, I move that the lay delegates of their respective Fellowships be approved and be seated with voice, but not vote, at this Council.

Rt. Reverend Sir, I also report several changes. San Mateo, Bellaire, requested and was granted a change in status from parish to mission. Also, in accordance with the votes of their Bishop's Committees or the guidance of the Bishop, Iglesia Episcopal El Buen Pastor, Waco, SoCo Episcopal Church, Austin, and All Saints' Episcopal Church, Stafford, held their final services in 2024. Therefore, upon recommendation of the Bishop, in accordance with Article 6 Section 6.2 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Texas, I move that these missions be dissolved.

APPENDIX B – BISHOP'S COUNCIL ADDRESS SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 2025

Address to Council 2025 C. Andrew Doyle, D.D., IX Bishop of Texas

The Episcopal Church is here in Fort Worth!

1,000 representatives from across Texas from the Red River to the Gulf of the Diocese of Texas. Last night was wonderful. Today we are going to have a bit of fun and get some business done including growing the family a bit with the ringing of the mission bell! Let's whoop it up for Fort Worth.

God is doing miraculous things in the Diocese of Texas. God is doing miraculous work through you and I, we, get to witness it with my fellow bishops and your diocesan staff. The goodness of God and the miraculous things you do are a reason to lean in and work the Gospel into our lives and for the sake of the lives of others.

I can testify that today, we have more people engaged in evangelism and service ministries than at any other time during my tenure as bishop or that of previous bishops. The Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Texas is awake and moving because our God is on the move and we have chosen to join in God's kingdom project.

Let me tell you 3 stories but, as I tell you these 3 stories we are going to need some Bishop Doyle energy.

Some of you may have grown up with this awesome program called Hee-Haw. I loved Charlie Pride and Loretta Lynn. It was the first time I knew who Dolly Parton was. Then there was the cast, Junior Samples, Minnie Pearl, Buck Owens, Grandpa Jones and Roy Clark, and the rest.

As a family we would sing along with the old men feeling gloom, despair and agony on me. But then they would salute wonderful towns and folks all over America. I loved it! They would name the town. They would name the population and then they would all jump out of the corn field and yell "Salute" – but without the "T" at the end. Let's practice that and if you got a hat you gotta wave it.

So, say it with me now: St. Mary's Church Hillsboro, Texas Episcopal population-28 Salute!

In the north Region I got to go to St. Mary's, Hillsboro where I got to meet the fantastic lay leaders and was able to do two confirmations. What stood out though, is that this congregation of 28 or so good folks has outgrown their space and is ready to go to the next house of worship and is working on a deal for a beautiful spot. Here is what I want to say about this congregation.

It is deeply engaged in the community they were present at the new lynching memorial in 20° weather in their town. They feed over 250 kids a week and have gotten Ecumenical Churches to partner with them. They also take lunches to the city offices of folks in the town...first responders and such and they are supporting schoolteachers too, all while they worship in an old bank building and they were asking what else could they be doing! God bless

you Hillsboro! Where are you? We salute you and say thank you for your ministry. You give us hope. God isn't finished with us yet! Praise be to God for you.

Then I got to head East in my Drives across the diocese and stopped for a Sunday at Trinity Church, Jasper. Say it with me. Trinity Church, Jasper, Texas Episcopal population 12. Salute!

Trinity, I love you! Some of them have known me since I was 15. That is a long time to know this. One of those congregations that says when I drive up, "Welcome back Andy. How the hell are ya?"

Trinity Jasper is the center for Head Start in their area, 150 kiddos, 50 babies. The members visit, support and help Head Start be successful. They have helped to build a church in Sierra Leon and they are supportive. A member, Roy James, a veteran and Native American who has started Veterans Village Housing for homeless veterans as part of the Rural Homeless Network. Supporting Roy, they are a part of the wider community's effort, building 20 tiny houses on a 5.6-acre spot, donated to Roy. Here is a church of twelve folks who through their faithfulness is doing amazing work locally, regionally, and abroad. Together, supporting their members, they do God's work in their community. Where are you Trinity, Jasper? You give us hope. God isn't finished with us yet! Praise be to God for you.

Let's go West. Say it with me, St. James Church, Taylor, Texas. Episcopal population 36. Salute!

I love you all St. James. I had such a good time on my last visit. I am so Grateful to Be a part of your Life.

They have a food ministry where volunteers pick up 4 SUV/truckloads of food each week and distribute to boys and girls club which serves 350 kids; Temple College, which serves 50 food-insecure young adults, and the church, where they distribute to 15 families per week. In addition, They are the only provider in Taylor that provides shelter and food to unhoused people when it is freezing. Over 14 days in January they fed 50 people per day with a hot meal and a grocery bag of easy to prepare nonperishable items. They have a Town wide Friend's giving and participate In missional Communities And have A board game night once a month Where people bring friends For board games.

Where are you St. James? Thank you and God bless you for your Ministry!

Every year I want to bring You some real stories of good people doing good work. It illustrates why every church matters and how every church No matter how small or big Is called to fulfill Hebrews 13, to worship God With lips that praise his name, share what we have and do good work.

Together during my tenure, We have over 16 years. In 2023 We saw a 3rd year of increases with it steadying in 2024. We grew the tiniest bit and that is good! All of this gives us a bigger picture of what we are dealing with in terms of aggregate numbers. What is the summary...the take home?

Statistically, despite significant losses due to deaths, cultural shifts, and COVID, we

have maintained resilience and are together not just toward pre-COVID numbers but pre-2008 numbers, thanks to consistent new member growth through baptisms, confirmations, and receptions, demonstrating a steady influx of new commitment and engagement.

The difference of course In this growth versus the growth of The 1960's is that the folks who are going to their heavenly reward and eternal home went to church every weekend! And, that isn't The case anymore so it takes a greater number of members to create Sunday Attendance And stewardship that grows a diocese. You see the figures are not just numbers; they represent stories of faith, sacrifice, loss, death, and renewal.

We have not merely survived the crisis of the past years we have emerged with a renewed vision and commitment to God's mission. What we are seeing across the diocese, And our Texas Episcopalian will report in a month's time are the following trends:

• In urban centers, we are seeing churches partnering with local nonprofits to address food insecurity, ESL, health care and community for the unhoused.

- In suburban communities, new small groups and house churches are forming, bringing people into deeper relationships with Christ and one another.
- In rural areas, congregations are creatively rethinking how they use their buildings, offering spaces for education, health services, and community gatherings.

This is evangelism. This is service. This is what it means to be the Church in our time - in our moment.

I also want to acknowledge the challenges. We know that in some places, it has been hard to rebuild after COVID-19. Congregations have faced financial struggles, leadership transitions, and the lingering effects of isolation. And yet, even in these challenges, I see resilience. I see faithful people who refuse to give up on the Gospel. I see a Church that, rather than retreating, is pressing forward with renewed courage and commitment. As we step into this time together at Council, I invite us to hold this moment with gratitude. Let us give thanks for what God is doing among us. Let us celebrate the faithfulness of our communities. And let us renew our commitment to the work that lies ahead.

In Gratitude we can look to God and we can look to the future. We have Faith In the future and we are interested In Faith In the future. In order to chart our course forward, I engaged in a comprehensive discernment process with others throughout the diocese that culminated in the development of key reports. This work was not done in isolation but was the result of deep listening, data gathering, and theological reflection.

The McKinsey Report

Present Forward - Insights and Implications. The McKinsey Report provided us with critical insights into how we can best structure our diocese for mission effectiveness. Some key takeaways include:

- The necessity of adaptive leadership in times of uncertainty.
- The importance of investing in digital and hybrid models of ministry.
- Strategies for sustaining clergy and lay leadership through formation and support.

This report is not merely a set of recommendations; it is a roadmap that calls us to deeper engagement, innovation, and faithfulness. Our future back work gave us even greater insight into the work towards 2035 and beyond.

The Book of Provocation: A Call to Action

Our reflections have been further shaped by insights from the Book of Provocation, which challenges us to think critically about our role in the world. It compels us to ask:

How do we embody Christ's love in an era of division and fragmentation?

How do we proclaim the Gospel in a culture that is increasingly disillusioned with institutional religion?

This text pushes us toward boldness in mission and clarity in vision. As an organization we must see this text and BANI as opportunities For change. We must counter Brittle With mission and ministry that is Bendable We must counter Anxiety By Attention – attentiveness to our people, context and wider community. We must counter non-linear with minds that are neuro-nimble are both left and right-brain-focused that is creative and see possibilities where roadblocks first appear. Finally, we must counter incomprehensible With Inclusive thinking.

All of you will receive a copy of these two reports in your email at the conclusion of this address. We are already at work Creating a road map based upon the two reports, Creating the structures to support our work, recognizing the scale of our mission, we are taking deliberate steps to adapt our structures within the diocesan office that will enable us to meet the challenges ahead. This includes:

- Strengthening our congregation support teams to provide direct assistance to congregations.
- Enhancing our digital and communication strategies to equip leaders with better tools for engagement.
- Establishing new pathways for lay and clergy formation to prepare the next generation of church leadership.

The Formation of Task Forces for the Future

In order to ensure that our work remains forward-thinking and strategic, we are launching several task forces:

1. All and Ethical Use in Ministry – Exploring the implications of emerging technology on our work and ensuring its alignment with our values.

2. Sustainable Church – Building and Grounds Stewardship (Creation Care II) – Deepening our commitment to environmental stewardship and sustainable use of church properties.

3. School Engagement – Strengthening our partnerships with Episcopal schools and expanding our ministry to young people.

These task forces are not just about problem-solving; they are about setting the course for the next decade and beyond, ensuring that we provide a strong mission platform for future generations to carry forward God's work.

This is our work together and our mission requires our attentiveness to the work. It requires us to be attentive to the forces that will shape us over the next decade and for the decades to come.

All of you will receive a copy of these two reports in your email at the conclusion of this address. But let me say a word about The IFTF work. It is a book of provocation. Some of it is lighthearted. Some of it is true, some of it is based upon statistics. There are fake ads in it. It is a book of provocation to get you thinking so, don't be emailing me saying you were provoked. That is the point.

Now to the end:

I have sat with a parishioner who wept because the drought was so bad that she was having to sell off her calves before they died a horrible death. I have sat with parishioners, both Republican and Democrat who didn't understand what was happening.

I have sat with a farmer in his field, talking about how his crop failed.

I have sat with an unhoused parishioner and listened to how grateful he was for the ministry that gave him a heart home.

I have sat with the mother whose kiddo was trans And who was so afraid.

I have sat with a gay parishioner who feared for his life.

I have sat with a Hispanic parishioner afraid for his church and who was feeling powerless to the powers of the world.

I have sat with the mom and dad who lost their baby.

I have sat with the woman who after 30 years regretted her abortion. And with a woman who was afraid she might die If she didn't have one.

I have given the Eucharist to a billionaire, a millionaire, a host of C suite folks, a ton of lawyers and I have sat with a man dependent upon his social security, living in squalor Who asked if I could bring him Communion.

I have sat with the parishioner who was afraid her church was going to die, And with the parishioner who was so happy to find a new church that was just starting.

I have sat with too many parishioner friends who lost a spouse.

I have sat with a parishioner because they were hurt by a priest, and I have sat with the priest as they signed over their orders.

I have sat with president's families.

And I have sat with a lost boy of Sudan, now a priest.

I have sat with the alcoholic, And the drug addicted, And the broken hearted and, I have rejoiced at the birth of a clergy kiddo, the birthday of a 100-year-old parishioner and I have blessed a pregnant woman and her husband.

I have talked with a rice farmer who is losing his share of water and a parishioner who lost their home in a storm, their church in a tornado, and their neighborhood in a fire.

I have been with you when you were happy with your priest and angry with them.

And over these years, together we have become the B Team.

I have laid my hands on the head of a new deacon, a priest and bishop. I have also been at their bedside to say goodbye and share one last Eucharist with them. The list can go on.

I love you and, I have as your bishop, treated you as kin and Christian family. I have treated every one of those folks I mentioned ...I have treated you with dignity because of my deep love for you...yes and I do that because God loves you and he died for you. You see his cross gives you a dignity nobody can take away no matter what you have done, no matter what road you have traveled upon, or we travel together. And, in the mission work you do, I see you treat others with such dignity out of love of Jesus and out of love from Jesus as I stand before you today, Let me express my deep love for each of you, I have been granted what truly must be the most honored gift In this world... to sit with you for a spell. And I look forward to the time that is yet before us.

May God bless you; may God bless our diocese; may God bless this state and our country. And may God continue to lead us into a future filled with Faith hope, and love. Amen.

APPENDIX C – TREASURER'S REPORT – LINDA RILEY MITCHELL SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 2025

Right Reverend Sir, council delegates, staff and visitors. Hello Fort Worth, I am Linda Mitchell, your Chief Financial Officer, CFO of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas and if you elect me again your treasurer. Lots of titles. I'd like your vote later today.

I began my career with Arthur Andersen and Company in Milwaukee back in 1975. Arthur Andersen, the person, was once the controller for Joseph Schlitz Brewing Company. Schlitz was my client in the 1980s. Arthur died in 1947, so I didn't see him--or Laverne and Shirley. I have been a Chief Financial Officer since 1990 in Media, Hospitality, Education and Real Estate. I was the CFO for the McCormick Place Convention Center in Chicago. This place reminds me of it.

Thank you for the delight of serving as CFO of the Diocese of Texas for nearly the last nine years. Besides the treasury and controller's groups I lead foundations support, technology, human resources, and real estate.

This year we have a new Controller, Tamara Norris, CPA, who joined us in January. She was the Director of Accounting and Reporting for Baylor College of Medicine. She began her career with Deloitte. Jonathan Blaker from Treasury and David Fisher from foundations assist you with investments and property insurance. Technology works on our computer software, hardware and telephone systems. Today, Nina Gaspar and the technology team are supporting council registration and voting. I hope many of you were able to go to the "Building Better Churches" workshop yesterday with Michael Hilfinger our Real Estate Director. Zee Turnbull, Director of Human Resources, serves you in benefits and payroll. Michelle Valdez, Executive Assistant, keeps us all organized.

Before we begin, I wanted to thank all of you for submitting your Parochial Reports. I am sure you noticed that The General Convention of the Episcopal Church has changed the report format a bit. There is no longer a line labeled "Operating Revenue." Instead, we will add the caption TOTAL REVENUE (line 3) to ALL OTHER REVENUE (line 5) to arrive at the total for OPERATING REVENUES. Previously, The Episcopal Church had done the math for us. As in prior years, Total Operating Revenues will be used to calculate the assessments. Information from your submission last week will be used to calculate the assessment for next year--2026.

Thank you for your work on behalf of the churches and institutions. I am here to discuss the work that the Diocese, including the Finance Team, has been doing for the churches and how it is reflected in the financial results. First, we'll begin with the contributions the foundations have made to the churches and institutions. Then we'll move on to the 2024 unaudited financial statements.

Let's start with the contributions that the foundations made in 2024. That's \$33.6 million in support for the year. Please note that in 2024 the churches paid \$8.7 million in assessments. So, the churches got nearly four times back. Since 2019, foundation support has totaled \$175.9

million. Here is another look at that support by types of expenditure. The largest amounts are for mission support, institution support and insurance.

Next let's look at some of the foundations individually.

The Bishop Quin Foundation provided \$12.1 million to the churches. This was the largest contribution from the foundations in 2024. This amount reflects \$6.8 million for health insurance for clergy and lay staff. It also includes Leadership Grants of \$4.2 million which support Campus Missions, IONA school, and the seminary. The President of the Bishop Quin Foundation is Reverend Bill Fowler of St. Mary's Lampasas. He is here today as the chair of the Committee for the Dispatch of Business at Council.

Thanks to the Bishop Quin Foundation. The Episcopal Foundation of Texas has donated a total of \$5.5 million for the reunification effort with the former Diocese of North Texas. Those funds were used for establishing a regional office in Fort Worth, the Four Saints food pantry here on Lancaster Ave, as well as help to churches and the Bishop's transition. We are all so very pleased to welcome the Right Reverend Brian Seage, Assisting Bishop, for the North Region.

The Episcopal Foundation of Texas also supported the institutions of the diocese including the Seminary of the Southwest, St Stephens school in Austin, St Vincent's house in Galveston and Camp Allen. They provided funding for the Coffield Disaster Recovery fund. A balance of \$10 million remains after payments to 60 churches. 13 of those received funds after Hurricane Beryl.

The Great Commission Foundation provided \$6.7 million for real estate and \$1.3 million for campus missions. We completed the purchase and renovation of a wonderful new site for San Romero Houston. The foundation also assisted with negotiating leases including Casa Mateo, a Center for women and children operated by Christ Church Cathedral.

The Church Corporation made a grant to establish USHER, the Unified System for Holistic Engagement and Reporting. The name of the system has nothing to do with Usher, the Super Bowl performer from last year. We are NOT changing the system's name to Kendrick for this year's Super Bowl.

Keeping Episcopalians Noticeably Determined Resourceful Intentional Capable... No we will stick with USHER. We have performed 3,000 safeguarding certifications in USHER. This year, the diocesan council registrations were done in USHER.

Moving on, let's talk about the financial results. At this point, the statements are unaudited. Blazek and Vetterling have already begun their work. They will be with us off and on through May. Please churches be sure to complete your audits this year. Join the fun.

Through December 31, 2024, expenses exceeded revenues by \$267,000. This was \$130,000 favorable to budget. The diocese is financially sound and remains debt free. We are growing the church.

Here's a look at the assets as of December 31st. This schedule is called the Statement of Position or Balance Sheet. You will see that the cash balance is \$800,000 a \$307,000 decrease. We feel that the balance is at a level that's reliable to support operations. The assessments

receivable shown here at the end of the year are at \$92,000. The average overall balance in 2024 was \$217,900.

The Accounts Receivable Related Entities are about the same as at the end of 2023 and 2024--\$5.6 million. This represents amounts owed to EDOT as of the end of the year by the foundations. The foundations have agreed to provide funding for things like COVID-19 and reunification. As we use those funds, we spend that money down.

Let's take a deeper look at the receivables by month from January 2019 through December 2024. You'll see that the green line has the highest numbers. That green line dates back to 2019 so in each successive year we've been reducing the amount of the balance. That means that you in the churches have been paying the assessments even more promptly. We greatly appreciate that. The 2024 year-end balance was only \$92,000. Last year, the end of December 2023, the balance was \$86,000. That was the lowest the receivables have been over this entire five-year period.

Here's a look at the liabilities. You may recall that we began to establish an account for the lease liability. This is due to a relatively new accounting pronouncement that requires us to quantify the value of the leases. We have leases at the diocesan offices in Tyler, Austin and Fort Worth. We own the 1225 Texas office in Houston. We lease the new Fort Worth office for the north region. We also lease space in Tyler and Austin. There is a coordinating asset for this that reflects the fact that we also have value in our right to use those facilities over the next several years.

Looking at Net Assets on this slide you'll see that the net assets have declined by \$837,000 from \$7,411,000 in 2023 to \$6,574,000 at the end of 2024. The decline is because we've been spending down those amounts that have been made available to us for things like COVID-19 and the reunification.

Here's the Statement of Activities. Many of us will call the income statement or P&L. The December assessments came in at \$8,682,000, slightly higher than anticipated, for a variance from budget of \$87,000 or 1%. Program revenues are below budget. This is because the revenues from the IONA school Youth Events now reflected in the Bishop Quin Foundation, we are matching them with the costs that are now part of the Quin Foundation. In other income we are above budget.

The Total Expenses are reported at \$14,260,000 million. We are trending at budget with a \$47,000 variance or 0.3% above budget. Let's take a deeper dive into the expenses.

Here we see that expenses for the Office of the Bishop are \$3,721,000 which is \$270,000 above budget. The Office of the Bishop exceeded budget in 2024. A resettlement payment was made to facilitate and support those costs associated with the Assistant Bishop's return to the diocese. He had been out of the country for much of 2023 and 2024.

Communication Expenses are under budget. A budgeted position for a communications specialist was vacant much of the year.

Canonical Expenses are over budget by \$116,000 primarily due to having a higher cost for Council than we anticipated last year. That is due to the record participation we had in Council in part because of the north region parishes joining us.

Ministry Expenses are at \$1,253,000 for the 12 months. Ministry expenses are at budget \$1,251,000, only \$2,000 off on nearly \$1.3 million.

Mission Amplification is under budget by \$298,000. These costs are significantly lower as there were open positions for much of the year.

Service and Outreach are under budget by \$83,000.

Administration is over budget by \$81,000. That is within 2% of the \$3,716,000 budget. Property insurance costs exceeded the budget by \$38,000. These costs were also higher in the churches.

To recap, the bottom line is that the revenues exceeded expenses by \$267,000 compared to the budget of \$137,000 for a favorable variance of \$130,000. We had a better year than we had anticipated. Revenues came in higher and were more than enough to offset slightly higher costs.

So that's the actual 2024 results. It was a busy year. We came in better than budget. The Reunification is substantially complete.



CANONICAL AMENDMENTS ADOPTED

TITLE III DIOCESAN OFFICERS AND BOARDS

CANON 2 THE VESTRY

Section 2.1 Election at Parish Meetings

In each Parish shall be chosen from the qualified voters not less than three nor more than eighteen communicants to serve as members of the vestry. The number and the manner of electing the same shall be determined from time to time by the Parish at the annual Parish Meeting. The Parish Meeting at which the election takes place may be held no earlier than October 1st nor later than the annual Parish Meeting, as the vestry may determine, public notice of such election in any case to be given during the stated services the two (2) Sundays preceding; provided that, except to fill vacancies, the vestry members so elected shall not take office until the adjournment of the annual Parish Meeting, which shall be held on the first Monday in January or as soon thereafter as convenient, public notice of such annual Parish Meeting in any case to be given during the stated services the Sunday preceding.

Members of the Vestry shall regularly be elected to serve for three years, and shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified, and their terms shall be so arranged that one-third shall go out of office each year. In new Parishes, when the Vestry is first chosen, one-third of the Vestry shall be chosen for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years, the full term thereafter to be three years.

No person shall serve as member of the Vestry until that person shall have subscribed to the following declaration:

"I am persuaded that the Holy Scriptures contain all doctrine required as necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ; and I accede to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church."

In case a vacancy shall occur, the Vestry shall fill the vacancy until the next annual election by electing a communicant from the qualified voters of the Parish, and the Congregation shall then fill the unexpired term. Members of the Vestry chosen to fill unexpired terms, shall, like those elected for full terms, be communicants and qualified voters of the Parish.

No retiring member of the Vestry elected by the Congregation for a fullterm, shall be eligible for re-election until a period of one year shall have elapsed, unless approved in writing by the Bishop.

Section 2.5 Regular and Special Meetings

The Vestry shall meet as may be required by Parochial regulations, and whenever called by the Rector; if the office of Rector is vacant, by the Senior Warden; or by a majority of the members of the Vestry. The Vestry may not meet without notifying the rector unless they are pursuing a process according to Title III.9 Section 14 and have notified the Bishop's office.

CANON 3 THE WARDENS

Section 3.1 Care and Use of Church Building

The Wardens shall have a duty to ensure that the Church building(s) be opened for all service, rites, ceremonies, or other purposes, either authorized or approved by the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United State of America and in this Diocese and be kept in good repair.

CANON 4 PARISH REGISTER AND PAROCHIAL REPORTS

Section 4.1 Parish Register

In the Parish Register required by the Canons of the Episcopal Church to be kept in every Parish and Mission, there shall be recorded by the Head of Congregation of such Parish or Mission the name and date of birth of all persons baptized, with the names of the sponsors and parents; the names of all parties married and two or more witnesses present, and the place where the marriage was solemnized; the names of all persons buried, place of interment, and the date and time when each rite was performed.

The Register shall embrace a list of all communicants in the Parish or Mission as nearly as can be ascertained, a list of all families and adult persons within the Parish or Mission, and the names of persons confirmed, and dates of confirmation by the Bishop.

The Register shall be kept by the Head of Congregation and shall be preserved by the Vestry or Bishop's Committee, as the case may be, as a part of the Records of the Church, and in the absence of a Head of Congregation it shall be kept by the Senior Warden or Bishop's Warden and the Vestry or Bishop's Committee, as applicable.

Old Registers, filled up or no longer in current use, shall be deposited with the Archivist of the Diocese, who shall provide the Parish or Mission with a true copy thereof; provided that, should the Parish or Mission desire to retain the old Registers, the Archivist will make and retain a copy. The same procedure shall be followed with the Minutes Books of the Vestry or Bishop's Committee and Registers of Services.

CANON 5 DIOCESAN MISSIONS

Section 5.4 Organization, Appointments and Elections

Should the Ecclesiastical Authority approve of such organization, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a Bishop's Committee to include a Warden, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall hold their offices until the first Monday in January, or until such day thereafter as shall be convenient for an election. The Treasurer need not be a member of the Bishop's Committee.

Annually on the first Monday in January, or as soon thereafter as convenient, there shall be held a congregational meeting and election for which public notice shall be given during the stated services the Sunday preceding. All members of the Mission shall be eligible to vote who are at least 16 years of age and are confirmed communicants in good standing.

Beginning with the first annual election, or in the event there is no Bishop's Committee, the Clerk and the Treasurer shall be elected by the members of the Mission; and the Warden shall be appointed, subject to the approval of the Bishop, by the Head of Congregation. The Head of Congregation shall have the right to appoint persons to such other positions as are desired. But if there be no Head of Congregation, the Warden shall be appointed by the Bishop; or, if the Bishop makes no appointment, the Warden shall be elected by the members of the Mission; and the other appointments shall rest with the Warden.

Upon approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority, any Mission at its annual election may elect up to fifteen persons to the Bishop's Committee, the number to be determined by Congregational meeting; provided that the terms of office of the Committee members shall be such that one-third of the members shall be elected annually after the first election. After such an election the Warden shall be appointed from those in the Committee, subject to the approval of the Bishop, by the Head of Congregation; and the remaining officers shall be elected by the members of the Mission from those in the Committee, or by the Committee from its own membership, as the members of the Mission may direct by vote at the meeting.

No person shall serve as a member of the Bishop's Committee until that person shall have subscribed to the declaration required of members of a Vestry in Title III.2.1(b).

When the Mission petitions to become a Parish,

the members of the Bishop's Committee elected in accordance with Section 5.4(d) above, shall continue to serve until their respective terms expire;

it shall comply with the requirements set out in Title III.1 above.

At the annual election the members of the Mission shall elect also one delegate and one alternate delegate to the Council of the Diocese as provided in the Constitution (Section 2.2, 2.3, and 2.5), unless, as provided therein, the members of the Mission direct the Bishop's Committee to make suitable choice. However, the delegate and alternate may be elected at a special congregational meeting called for the purpose, if the Bishop's Committee determines that election at the annual meeting will not allow adequate time to prepare for participation in the Council. Public notice of any special meeting must be given during the stated services the Sunday preceding. Except at the time of the Bishop's initial appointment of officers, the members of the Bishop's Committee shall be at least 18 years and confirmed communicants of the Church in good standing.

Section 5.5 Council to Approve Application

At the first Annual Council of the Diocese following the organization of the Mission, the application as prescribed in Section 5.1, 5.2, and 5.3 shall be submitted to the Council, together with the certificate of approval by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Council may act, giving or withholding its consent to the union of the said Mission with the Council as may seem best for the interests of the Church.

Section 5.6 The Bishop's Committee

At all meetings of the congregation or of the Bishop's Committee, the Head of Congregation, the Warden, the Clerk, or the Treasurer, taking precedence in the order named, shall have the right to preside.

A majority of the Committee members, the whole having been notified to meet, shall constitute a quorum; and a majority of the quorum so convened shall be competent to act. If a quorum should repeatedly fail to meet, having been notified, so that the affairs of the Church go unattended, the Head of Congregation as chair, may declare a representative group of the Committee members competent to act.

The Bishop's Committee shall establish rules for and keep a record of its proceedings. It shall meet as required by its own rules, or whenever called by the Bishop, the Head of Congregation, or a majority of its members. It shall be the duty of the Bishop's Committee to administer the temporal concerns of the Church, to collect necessary moneys, to provide for prompt payment of all liabilities incurred and assessments levied by Diocesan Council, to attend to all matters pertaining to Church properties and their maintenance, to provide the Head of Congregation a discretionary fund as required by General Canon, to contribute to the Head of Congregation's salary, to take part in special offerings such as that requested for Theological Education and for other purposes, and, in general, to assist the Head of Congregation in carrying on the work of the Church.

By two-thirds vote of the whole membership, approved by the Head of Congregation of the Mission and the Bishop, the Bishop's Committee may remove any member of the Bishop's Committee whose conduct may tend to bring reproach on the Church.

Section 5.7 Duties of Warden

It shall be the duty of the Warden to secure some room or house to be used as a place of worship, and with the advice of the Head of Congregation, to provide all things necessary for conducting the service decently and in order, and to make provision for the bread and wine of the Holy Communion. The Warden shall have a duty to ensure that the offerings are collected at each service and paid over to the Treasurer of the Mission. It shall also be the Warden's duty to supervise the Bishop's Committee in collecting and forwarding to the proper officers all assessments levied by the Council. With the assistance of the Bishop's Committee, the Warden shall in general carry out the functions of a parish Warden as specified in Title III.3.

In the absence of a resident Head of Congregation, the Warden shall take care of the altarware, also of any linen, service books, or other property belonging to the Mission; and it shall be the Warden's duty, if possible, to provide continuing services of worship. It also shall be the Warden's duty, in the absence of a Head of Congregation, to make for the Mission such reports as the Bishop, Council, or the diocesan officers may from time to time require.

CANON 8 PROPERTY

Section 8.1 Title to Property

Except as permitted by Section 9.1 of the Constitution, the title to all real estate and other property acquired for the use of the Church in this Diocese, including Parishes and Missions, as well as institutions of a Diocesan character, shall be vested in the Protestant Episcopal Church Council of the Diocese of Texas, known as the Church Corporation, to be held in an irrevocable trust for The Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Texas. The existence of this trust, however, shall in no way limit the power and authority of the Parish, Mission or institution existing over the property so long as the particular Parish, Mission, or Diocesan institution remains a part of The Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Texas, and subject to their respective Constitution and Canons.

Section 8.2 Sale, Lease, or Other Disposition

If a particular use for which such property has been conveyed or the purpose of the trust fails and it becomes necessary to sell or lease the property, or otherwise dispose of it, the Church Corporation with the consent of the Bishop or the Standing Committee or a majority of the members of that body, if there by no Bishop, is hereby authorized to execute such legal instruments as may be necessary to convey, lease, or effect such other disposition as is herein authorized.

Section 9.1 Authority to Incorporate

Any Diocesan entity, as defined herein, may incorporate or exist in any corporate form upon and subject to the terms and conditions of the Constitution and Canons.

For the purpose of this Canon, the following terms shall have the meanings set forth below. The term "Diocesan entity" shall mean the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Texas (the "Diocese"), any Parish or Mission of the Diocese, any Episcopal

school of the Diocese, as defined in the Canons, any supporting organization of any Parish, Mission, or Episcopal school, and any other entity expressly identified, singularly or by category, in the Constitution and Canons as an instrumentality or entity of the Diocese. The terms "Constitution" or "Canons" shall mean the existing Constitution or Canons, respectively, of the Diocese, and any amendment thereof. The term "Act" shall mean the Texas Nonprofit Corporation Act and any amendment thereof.

TITLE IV ECCLESIASTICAL DISCIPLINE

CANON 1 DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

Section 1.2 Disciplinary Board

There shall be within and for the Diocese a Disciplinary Board consisting of seven members, four Priests or Deacons, whose actual residence and canonical residence is within this Diocese, and three lay adult confirmed communicants in good standing of the Church in this Diocese. A member of the Standing Committee may serve on the Disciplinary Board. Annually, within two months following each Annual Diocesan Council, the members of the Disciplinary Board shall elect a President from its members. The President shall serve for a term of one year and until a successor is hereby elected and qualified.

Section 1.3 Members

Members of the Disciplinary Board shall be divided into three classes and elected on nomination of the Bishop at the Annual Council of the Diocese. The composition of each class shall be as follows:

Class 1 shall be composed of two Priests or Deacons and one qualified layperson; Class 2 shall be composed of one Priest or Deacon and one qualified layperson; and Class 3 shall be composed of one Priest or Deacon and one qualified layperson.

At the Annual Council of the Diocese held in 2011, the members of all classes

shall be elected on nomination of the Bishop for the following terms:

Class 1 – 3 years

Class 2 – 2 years

Class 3 – 1 year

In each subsequent Annual Council, the member or members of each class whose terms expire shall be elected for a three-year term. No member of the Disciplinary Board who has served a full three-year term shall be eligible for reelection until the lapse of one year from the expiration of such full term.

Section 1.7 Filling A Vacancy

Vacancies occurring in the Disciplinary Board, other than for cause under Section 8 of this Canon, shall be filled by a qualified person from the same order elected on nomination of the Bishop by majority vote of the persons present at the Annual Council meeting immediately following the date on which the vacancy occurred. The person so elected shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term and shall be eligible for reelection when such term expires. A vacancy may be filled temporarily until the next Annual Council by a qualified person of the same order elected on nomination of the Bishop by majority vote of the persons present at a regular or special meeting of the Executive Board following the creation of the vacancy.

Section 1.12 Church Attorney

Within two months after each Annual Diocesan Council, the Bishop, in consultation with the President of the Disciplinary Board, shall appoint a Church Attorney to serve for a term of one year and until a successor is duly appointed and qualified. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Church Attorney, the Bishop, in consultation with the President of the Board, shall appoint a successor to serve the unexpired term of the predecessor in office. The Bishop may remove the Church Attorney for any good and sufficient reason, as determined by the Bishop after consultation with the President of the Board. If, in any particular proceeding, the Church Attorney is unable to represent the Church for any reason, the Bishop, in consultation with the President of the Board any successor or substitute must be an adult confirmed communicant in good standing of the Church in this Diocese and a duly licensed attorney by the State of Texas.

TITLE V ENDOWMENTS, INSTITUTIONS, AND FOUNDATIONS CANON 2

THE BISHOP QUIN FOUNDATION

Section 2.2 Revolving and Permanent Funds

The sum of \$9,000.00 of the funds originally contributed, together with Twenty- five Per Cent of all contributions subsequently made, shall be placed in the revolving fund. The balance of the funds originally contributed, together with Seventy-five Per Cent of all subsequent contributions, shall be placed in the permanent fund. However, any donor may specify the fund or funds in which the contribution shall be placed.

CANON 3 ST. STEPHEN'S SCHOOL

Section 3.2 Trustees and Powers

The management of the affairs of the school shall be conducted by a Board of Trustees consisting of elected members and the following: The Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, any Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese designated by the Bishop, any Assistant Bishop of the Diocese designated by the Bishop, the Head of the school, the President of the Alumni Association, the President of the Parent's Association, and the Chancellor of the school, who shall be ex-officio members. Each of the elected and ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote on all matters to be decided by the Board of Trustees; provided, that any person serving as Chancellor of the school shall not be entitled to vote on any matter unless the Chancellor is an elected member of the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall have power on its own authority to acquire, erect, equip, manage, and operate the school on its own financial responsibility, in accordance with its Charter and bylaws and in accordance with the Canons of the Diocese from time to time adopted.

Section 3.3 Elections – Vacancies

The elected members of the Board of Trustees shall consist of up to twenty-four (24) persons, each elected by the Annual Council on nomination of the Bishop, for initial terms of one (1), two (2), or three (3) years beginning with the commencement of the next fiscal year of the school following such election or to complete the unexpired term of any elected Trustee who has ceased to serve for any reason (with the term of any person elected to complete the unexpired term of a Trustee who has ceased to serve commencing immediately upon the election of such person). Persons shall be eligible for election though they reside outside the Diocese of Texas or are not communicant members of the Episcopal Church. Persons elected to an initial term of one (1) year or two (2) years, or to complete the unexpired term of an elected Trustee who has ceased to serve for any reason, upon renomination by the Bishop, may be elected to serve up to two (2) consecutive additional terms of three (3) years, after which such person may not be renominated for at least one (1) year. Persons elected to serve one (1) additional term of three (3) years, after which such person may not be renomination by the Bishop, may be elected to serve one (1) additional term of three (3) years, after which such person may not be renomination by the Bishop, may be elected to serve one (1) additional term of three (3) years, after which such person may not be renomination by the Bishop, may be elected to serve one (1) additional term of three (3) years, after which such person may not be renomination by the Bishop, may be elected to serve one (1) additional term of three (3) years, after which such person may not be renomination by the Bishop, may be elected to serve one (1) additional term of three (3) years, after which such person may not be

renominated for at least one (1) year. Notwithstanding the above, (a) a Trustee may be removed at any time by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Trustees with the consent of the Bishop of Texas, or (b) shall be removed automatically in the event such removal is provided for in the by-laws of the school with respect to the failure of a Trustee to attend meetings or to contribute to the financial support of the school. Any vacancy occurring on the Board may be filled by the Board until the next Annual Council, at which time a Trustee shall be elected on nomination of the Bishop to serve the unexpired term.

Section 3.4 By-Laws and Officers

The Board of Trustees shall adopt its own by-laws. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be Chair of the Board or in the Bishop's absence or, at the Bishop's request, the Bishop Coadjutor or any Suffragan Bishop shall serve as Chair. The Board shall elect an Executive Chair (who shall be nominated by the Chair), a Vice- Chair, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers and assistants as the by-laws may provide. The officers, other than the Chair, shall be elected by and from the Board of Trustees. Each officer shall hold office for one (1) year or, if earlier, until the expiration of the term of office as a Trustee, provided that any officer other than the Chair may be removed from office at any time by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees, from time to time, may elect a Chancellor, who need not be an elected member of the Board of Trustees.

Section 3.6 St. Stephen's School Chapel

The Board of Trustees shall establish a chapel for St. Stephen's School, which shall be in union with the Council and under the authority of the Bishop. The Head, from time to time, and with the consent of the Bishop, may appoint a person to serve as the Chaplain of the school and the chapel. The Chaplain shall be responsible for the conduct of religious services in the chapel in addition to any other duties that may be assigned by the Head. The chapel shall maintain such records and shall make such reports as are requested by the Bishop. The chapel shall be represented in the Council by the Head of the school and/or the Chaplain, or by a delegate chosen by the Bishop. The chapel shall accept such financial responsibility toward the work of the Diocese as may be designated by Council.

CANON 4 THE EPISCOPAL THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY OF THE SOUTHWEST

Section 4.3 Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees shall consist of not more than twenty-five (25) members, including the Bishop of the Diocese of Texas. Six (6) members, exclusive of the Bishop of the Diocese of Texas, shall be at least 18 years of age, confirmed communicants in good standing, and actually or canonically resident in the Diocese of Texas. Such six

(6) members shall be elected by the Annual Diocesan Council, upon nomination of the Bishop, for a term of three (3) years. Two members shall be elected at the Annual Diocesan Council each year. A member of the Board of Trustees may be elected to no more than three (3) consecutive three-year terms, in addition to any unexpired term to which the member may have been first elected, after which such member may not be renominated for at least one (1) year. All such terms shall begin June 1 of the year of election. The Board of Trustees may fill any vacancy, which occurs on the Board among the elected members from the Diocese of Texas until the next Annual Diocesan Council, when such vacancy shall be filled by election for the remainder of the unexpired term.

CANON 10 CAMP ALLEN

Section 10.3 Selection, Election, and Vacancies

The elective membership of the Board of Trustees shall consist of up to 24 persons, each elected by the Annual Council on nomination of the Bishop, for four- year terms. Up to six elective members shall be elected by the Annual Council each year on nomination of the Bishop. A trustee may be elected to serve a second consecutive four-year term, after which such trustee may not be renominated for at least one year. If a person is elected to complete a trustee's unexpired term, such service shall not count toward the above limitations on the number of consecutive terms such person may serve or toward the limitation on the annual number of members to be elected each year. Notwithstanding the above, a trustee may be removed at any time by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Trustees with the consent of the Bishop of Texas. Any vacancy occurring in the Board may be filled by the Board until the next Annual Council, at which time a trustee shall be elected on nomination of the Bishop to serve the unexpired term.

INDIGENOUS BOARDING SCHOOL REPORT

A General Convention Interim Body, the Boarding School Commission, requested that all dioceses research their historic involvement in the creation and support of Indigenous Boarding Schools. This report was produced and forwarded to the Commission.

Archivist Kathryn Herman read through the diocesan journals from 1849 (EDOT's first council) through 1900. She reviewed the bishop's addresses, committee reports, and financial reports. This research showed that, although the diocese made multiple attempts to begin schools in its early years, they primarily focused on Anglo populations. There were schools for girls, but the early priority in the diocese was to educate young. Anglo males because they hoped the effort would encourage these young men to join the priesthood. Many of the schools were short-lived due to a variety of factors including yellow fever outbreaks, fires, and the overall economic depression after the wars. Other than the St. Paul's School in Brenham, which became St. Paul's College, there were only a handful of short-lived boarding schools mentioned and a few notes that many clergy taught privately to supplement their salary. The only other population specifically discussed as a potential target for schools were the recently freed black slaves, and very little was accomplished in that regard due to lack of funding and leadership. Herman also reviewed volumes I and II of The Episcopal Church in Texas by Lawrence L. Brown looking for any mention of relationships with indigenous populations, schools, boarding schools (both inside or outside the state), and funding associated with this. These topics were not specifically mentioned. Texas state history complicates this research because many indigenous people were forced out of the state.

Herman writes, "When researching the boarding schools in North America, I found several articles that said there were no known schools like this in Texas." The online interactive map shows no schools in Texas, apart from a handful that are just next to the Oklahoma border. No evidence has been found as yet that show a relationship between the Diocese of Texas and those schools.



NOTES:

AT Assessment - The Diocesan Assessments are higher due to operating revenue growth.

HE Health Insurance Costs - Bishop Quin Foundation pledged to cover costs related to providing health insurance for clergy within the Diocese and Diocesan staff. Thanks to the generous pledge, Insurance Assessment has been eliminated as well as group health insurance expense.

PR Allowance for Uncollectible Accounts - This amount is 1% of the Assessments and represents an estimate of amounts potentially to be unpaid. All amounts have been paid in recent years.

LF Leadership Fund - Represents expenditures expected to be absorbed by the newly created Quin Foundation Leadership Fund.

GC General Convention - The General Convention is the governing body of The Episcopal Church. Every three years it meets as a bicameral legislature that includes the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops, composed of deputies and bishops from each diocese.

CC Clergy Conference - Increase is due to expected higher attendance and costs.

DA Diocesan Asking - The Diocese has reached its goal to meet the TEC asking (15% of revenues).

OH Overhead - These amounts represent reimbursement to the Diocese for overhead expenses incurred on behalf of the Foundations.

General Summary of Findings

At Bishop Doyle's direction, the task force has worked though six areas of interest, and developed a set of recommendations for each. The report is structured such that the recommendations are a relatively brief summary document, followed by data and resources in the appendices.

Under the topic of lowering churches' carbon footprint, there are suggestions for how to turn Camp Allen into a showcase for the diocese, as well as large and small recommendations that parishes could begin to implement. In many cases, a relatively small capital investment could save money over time by reducing electricity and water use. In the appendix the potential measures are broken down by ease of implementation and probable cost.

For mitigating natural disasters, 15 different disasters are examined, with various mitigation measures for each, broken down into "must," "should," and "could" categories, recognizing the large disparities in resources between parishes. One appendix provides a risk matrix for each parish, flagging the most important disasters to prepare for, their likelihood, and possible severity.

For sea level rise, under current projections, 10 churches are likely to be affected over the next 125 years, with one likely to be affected in as soon as 20 years. The

options consist generally of insurance, adaptation, and moving. These topics are covered in some detail in the report.

More extensive disruptions to water supplies are likely to be due either to drought or a natural disaster. The church's response is largely limited to assisting government and non-governmental organizations (NGOs), although churches certainly can and should model water conservation behavior.

Formation is a particularly timely topic. Good resources have proliferated in recent years, as science and theology appear complementary. Truly a kairos moment for Creation Care formation. This part of the report considers the sensitivities that might arise, and potential challenges as theology brushes up against politics and the broader culture. But there is great hope that the materials and methods detailed in the report will be transformational.

Finally, a detailed consideration of various potential incentives is presented - these primarily being grants and other financial considerations. Of particular note is a change in the law that allows non-profits to receive financial incentives for solar panels from the Federal government.

Guidelines for Document Use

The primary purpose of this document is for the creation care task force to make recommendations to the diocese about methods to best implement an effective strategy of defining and carrying out environmental goals over the next five to ten years and beyond.

This document is broken up into six different sections based on the six areas of concern defined by the Bishop Diocesan. These areas of concern are as follows:

- 1. lowering CO2 emissions throughout the diocese,
- 2. interruptions to clean drinking water,
- 3. the effects on the diocese of sea-level rise and other flooding events,
- 4. mitigation and response to natural disasters,
- 5. a diocesan strategy for implementing effective "eco-formation," and
- 6. uncovering incentives to support creation care initiatives.

Each area of concern will have its own section. A section will be broken into different parts that will be outlined in a specific way that will help with reference. The first number will refer to the section. The second number will refer to a specific part of the section. Part 4 will always reference the recommendation. And specific recommendations will follow after Part 4 with a letter. So to look up a specific recommendation for CO2 reduction, you would reference Section 1.4.a. of this document.

Each area of concern or section will be broken into the following format:

- 1. **Purpose** This part will contain a general understanding of the area of concern, especially why this is an important consideration for the diocese as it pertains to its overall creation care strategy.
- 2. Framing the Problem This part will inform about the problems that will be faced in implementing strategies to combat this particular area of concern: challenges, roadblocks, and impossibilities.
- **3. Background** This part contains a summary of methods and research conducted to arrive at the specific recommendation(s) of the task force in the given area of concern.
- **4. Recommendation(s)** This will be the bulk of every section. The specific recommendation or a number of recommendations will be outlined here. The number of recommendations is dependent on the area of concern.
 - a. **Specific Recommendation.** A specific recommendation stated clearly in one to two sentences.
 - i. Overview of specific recommendation This part will describe the way in which this recommendation will solve the problem at hand. A solution that is a multitiered (diocesan, parish, and household level) may be discussed.
 - ii. Strategy or Strategies for Implementation Specific plans that the diocese, parish, or households can implement in order to achieve the recommended solution.
 - iii. Considerations and Roadblocks specific to this recommendation - This part will contain a discussion of certain items that the diocese/parish/household should be aware of while carrying out this specific recommendation.
 - iv. *Possible Incentives for Plan(s)* This part will be a place of cross reference to incentives that will directly affect this recommendation.
 - v. Outcomes specific to this Recommendation This part will discuss goals and best case scenarios after implementing this solution. What will happen if the diocese/parish implements this successfully?
 - vi. *Charts, Graphs, Maps, etc.* May be interspersed throughout the recommendation or it may be referenced at the end of the section.
- **5. Summary of Outcomes.** This part will look forward 5, 10, 20, 100 years from now. If these changes are implemented on a whole, an educated prediction of where the diocese will be a few years from now will be made. What are some moonshot ideas?

Below are three overarching suggestions for Diocesan consideration. These don't relate to just one of the six report topics, but rather are intended to enhance the likelihood that any of the sections' recommendations are implemented thoughtfully and successfully. The three considerations are as follows:

1. a) Appoint a person, team, or appropriate *ad hoc* body to oversee implementation of all adopted recommendations and all creation care initiatives of the diocese. A person with special knowledge of green initiatives would be an invaluable asset as congregations attempt to make green changes in their systems and properties. This person or team would help guide parish leaders through the decision making process on what changes to systems or properties would be most impactful and most cost effective for their specific context. The difficulty of parishes attempting to navigate some of the changes on their own is that there is not a set standard of procedure for some green initiatives. A person who is able to help parishes find unique solutions to their green goals will benefit the overall diocesan creation care initiative, collaborating on questions of costs and benefit, as well as how to track data on the impact of green initiatives throughout

the diocese.

b) Designate a **diocesan creation care formation coordinator**. This person or team could help introduce curricula across the diocese, help field questions from parish formation leaders about curricula and other formation activities, track receptivity in the diocese to creation care formation, and facilitate retreats (at Camp Allen) to help train and support parish creation care leaders as they implement curricula and green initiatives. Link to formation Section 5.4

- 2. Create a revolving fund to seed creation care initiatives throughout the diocese. Many green projects with high impact will require money in order to get started. The diocese is in a unique position to make available low- or no-interest loans to parishes with specific green plans that align with diocesan recommendations. This revolving fund could be made available to a set number of parishes over a set amount of time, ensuring timely access to funds for approved green initiatives. See Section 6.4.d.iii for more details.
- 3. Designate diocesan offices and other diocesan properties as green learning spaces. The diocese can lead by example in creation care by implementing the green initiatives it adopts and recommends to its parishes at its own offices and other properties. This action would demonstrate to the diocese and the larger community the importance of responsible creation care, as well as how the improvements were made. One location that would be very effective in this work is Camp Allen, where green initiatives should prominently display on-site information about the changes, including such information as how much energy, water, or

plastic use is being reduced. Continually seeing these changes will help to promote conversation throughout the diocese on the importance of creation care. See Section 5.4

1. HIGH CARBON DEPENDENCE

1.1. Purpose

The purpose of reducing carbon usage resulting from parish operations is fourfold: 1. To reduce energy and water waste to lower utility bills, freeing parish funds to be used for other purposes

2. To reduce air pollution resulting from fossil fuel extraction, utility electricity production, and on-site fossil fuel combustion

3. To reduce greenhouse gases emitted as a result of parish operations

4. To conserve water to share with all Texans

The purpose of reducing carbon embodied in the renovation and construction of parish buildings and constructing and refitting buildings and landscapes to provide shade and use less energy and water is fourfold:

1. To reduce air pollution and greenhouse gasses resulting from material extraction, transport, manufacture, transportation to site, and the rest of the materials' life cycle

2. To reduce waste, thereby lowering utility bills as noted above

- 3. To reduce air pollution and greenhouse gasses as noted above
- 4. To increase the comfort of parishioners when using parish facilities

1.2. Problem Framing – High Carbon Dependence and Energy and Water Waste

Many parishes have high electric and gas bills. Waste of electricity and gas releases carbon into the atmosphere, exacerbating climate change. Higher average summer temperatures increase the need for mechanical cooling.

Parishes may wish to improve buildings, equipment, and operations, AND switch to more efficient all-electric equipment, but staff and other stakeholders often lack the time to research and funds to implement improvements. Parish buildings built or renovated to recent building codes may benefit from switching to efficient heat pumps, but buildings with very leaky or poorly insulated envelopes usually will not benefit from changing from gas furnaces to heat pumps. The preliminary survey revealed that many parishes are dealing with deferred maintenance on parish facilities and systems, including HVAC, indicating that information on up-front planning for equipment upgrades and possible changeouts to heat pumps and/or heat pump water heaters would be useful. Having an up-front changeout plan reduces down-time between old equipment breakdown and new equipment installation and ensures that facilities are ready for a quick changeout.

Factors Leading to Energy Waste and/or Higher Carbon Operational Footprint

Physical and Operational

• Energy waste and high carbon usage result from buildings not being designed for their climate and/or not having good envelopes (insulation, cladding, windows, and sealing of walls, windows, floors, and roofs).

• Older buildings may be designed for their climate but may lack modern insulation and sealing. Inefficient equipment compounds the problems of buildings of all ages.

• Beyond HVAC and water heating, parish operations such as highmaintenance landscaping and use of disposable products can increase parish operation costs and waste fuel and materials.

Specifics:

HVAC equipment selection (gas and electric vs all-electric)

- HVAC control type or lack of controls (manual vs automated vs time-of-usecustomized)

• HVAC equipment condition

• Water heater selection (gas or electric resistance vs heat pump water heater)

- Stove/range selection (gas or electric element vs induction)
- Landscape maintenance equipment selection (gas vs electric)
- · Church commute fuel (gas vs electric)

Church resource usage:

- Styrofoam cups vs ceramic mugs
- · Plastic cutlery vs metal

Financial and Educational:

• Parish staff and vestries often lack the expertise required to make informed decisions related to new buildings and equipment as well as building and equipment repair and maintenance.

Lack or perceived lack of funds may lead to prioritizing low first-cost over long-term durability and efficiency, leading to higher ongoing costs - ultimately "stealing" money from other parish priorities.

Common education gaps:

· Parish staff's lack of knowledge of optimal conditions

• Parish staff's lack of knowledge of ways to reach optimal conditions when known

• Lack of funds to obtain optimal conditions (e.g., heat pumps, heat pump water heaters, solar arrays, and EV charging on site)

Competing priorities:

The huge variety of parish equipment results in a lack of a comprehensive solution for all parishes

Effects of Above-Listed Conditions on Parishes

Suboptimal design, planning, and operations resulting from a lack of knowledge of best practices lead to parishes having less money for programs, less comfortable buildings, and less money for modern upgrades that lower building costs and improve comfort - creating a vicious cycle of undesirable conditions.

Common results of waste:

- Higher energy bills
- Less comfortable indoor environments
- Inability to install higher-performing equipment
- Inability to install solar arrays

Inability to install EV charging

Effects of the Above-Listed Conditions on Communities

• Parishes' waste of resources has a negative effect on the communities surrounding the parish in spite of parishes' desire to make the world a better place.

- Examples of negative effects on communities:
- Higher temperatures
- · Erratic temperatures
- Increased air pollution (particulates and gases)
- · Water scarcity

Quick Projects Requiring Minimal Time and Expense

a. Change out all easily replaceable light bulbs - e.g., desk and table lamp bulbs, chandelier bulbs, exterior flood light bulbs – with LED bulbs – in all parish facilities.

i. Overview – Switching to LEDs will lower energy bills and, when replacing CFLs, improve light quality. LEDs last much longer than other bulbs, reducing maintenance time. LEDs are cooler than other bulbs, reducing fire risk and building cooling loads.

ii. Strategies for implementation - To maintain desired brightness, replace with bulbs with similar lumen levels, and for interior lighting, CRI levels of 80 or above. Bulbs with a CRI of 90 are widely available, may cost a little more, and are worth the cost. To avoid cold blue light, instead of "daylight bulbs," choose bulbs with a warmer color temperature, closer to halogen and incandescent bulb light quality, of 2700 to 3000 Kelvin. Most people are less concerned about the color temperature for exterior lighting, but warmer lighting is better for wildlife. Lumen and CRI levels as well as color temperature are listed on the packaging. Conventional 60w bulb equivalent is 800 lumens; 100w is 1600; 150w is 2600. Energy Star bulbs are rated for lighting quality (minimum CRI of 80) and longevity (minimum life of 15,000 hours).

iii. Possible Incentives – Payback is fast without incentives, but funding is available.

iv. Potential Roadblocks – LEDs have improved significantly since early release, but some parishioners may remember the harsh blue light and frequent early bulb failures common several years ago and be reluctant to try the new superior bulbs.

- v. Outcomes –
- Lower electric bills
- Better light quality
- Reduced maintenance time
- Reduced fire risk.
- vi. Resource

b. Replace two-stroke, gasoline, and diesel landscaping maintenance equipment with electric equipment, or engage contractors using electric equipment. i. Overview - Fossil-fuel combustion landscaping equipment is estimated to produce 4%-5% of U.S. carbon emissions. Two-stroke, gasoline, and diesel equipment is loud and produces fumes harmful to workers and others nearby. Replacing this equipment with electric equipment reduces air pollution around the parish and in the Texas environment as a whole because every year the percentage of clean renewable energy in Texas will increase from current levels of over 33%. An internet search will show several options in large cities.

ii. Strategies for Implementation –

• Replace aging fossil-fuel-powered equipment with cordless or corded electric equipment.

• Retire diesel and two-stroke equipment regardless of condition.

• Encourage the parish' current landscape contractor to switch to electric equipment.

• Engage a landscape contractor using electric equipment.

iii. Possible Incentives –

• Potential IRA 30% tax credit with maximum of \$7,500 per large commercial grade lawn mower (not yet available in Texas)

iv. Potential Roadblocks –

- If large equipment is to be replaced, costs may be significant for some parishes.
- Parishes in some areas may have difficulty finding landscaping contractors using electric equipment.
- It is unknown whether contractors using electric equipment charge more than other contractors.

v. Outcomes –

- Reduced harm to the health of landscaping contractors
- Potential parish fire risk reduction from stored equipment fuel elimination
- Reduced air pollution in the parish and in the neighborhood
- Reduced noise in the parish and on neighboring properties
- Improved perception of the parish as a good neighbor

c. Reduce indoor potable water usage.

i. Overview – Reducing potable water use reduces parish expenses, reduces the energy required to treat water, and extends the contributing capacity of our aquifers, groundwater, rivers, and lakes. Leaky toilets and old toilets using 2.5 gallons per flush (gpf) can waste thousands of gallons of water per month. Water usage audits (see item f below) are not required for these simple changeouts.

ii. Strategies for Implementation -

• If toilets use more than 1.6 gpf, change out for WaterSense labeled toilets or adjust flow-rate to 1.28 gpf or lower. The gpf on two-piece toilets is usually found

printed on the outside of the toilet, the inside of the tank, or the bottom side of the tank cover.

• Test toilets for leaks at least twice per year and repair if necessary. Commercial toilets often have adjustable flows.

• Replace high-flow lavatory faucet aerators with .5 gallons per minute (GPM) or 1.0 gpm aerators. The .5 gpm flow is the current commercial code standard, however some parishes may not have enough water pressure to provide a good flow of water through .5 gpm aerators and may wish to use 1.0 gpm aerators. Aerators are inexpensive and available in bulk online and at hardware stores. Be sure to note whether male or female connections are required. Flows are often marked in tiny letters on the side of aerators. See online for methods of measuring flows with a measuring cup if aerators are not marked.

• Insulate ALL hot water lines, not just water lines in exterior walls, with R-3 or higher insulation.

iii. Possible Incentives

• PACE funding

Local water utility programs

iv. Potential Roadblocks –

• Parishioners may have had bad experiences with .5 gpm aerators in public restrooms with poor water pressure or faucets that cut off water after a few seconds of flow, hence the directive to try 5 gpm aerators on one or two faucets to gage effectiveness and determine whether 1.0 gpm aerators will be more effective and thus acceptable to parishioners.

• Existing wastewater plumbing may not be designed/sloped to handle solid waste with current federal maximum toilet flows.

V. Outcomes –

• Parish water bills will decrease.

• Stress on local and regional water resources will decrease.

vi. Resource -

WaterSense Labeled Toilets

d. Reduce disposable tableware waste.

i. Overview – Disposable plastic and paper tableware increases the amount of fossil fuels and trees required for ongoing parish operations. While some parishes may have functional or semi-functional recycling and composting programs, a large portion of recyclables are never recycled either because of contamination or a lack of a market for a given material at the time of sorting. Styrofoam is not picked up by many recycling contractors.

ii. Strategies for Implementation –

• Hold a mug, glassware, cutlery, and plate/bowl drive. Everyone has extra mugs. Start with those.

• Make a mug tree or tray for easy access.

• Either hold a drive by asking parishioners to donate the other items from their own unused stock or purchase.

iii. Possible Incentives – Unknown.

iv. Potential Roadblocks -

• While it may be easy to find parishioners willing to load mugs into a dishwasher, parishes without organized hospitality ministries or commercial dishwashers may find loading dishes and cutlery in a dishwasher or washing dishes and cutlery by hand to be burdensome.

v. Outcomes –

• Parishes will produce less plastic and paper landfill waste.

• Parishes may save money by reducing disposable tableware outlays.

e. Plant native trees on parish property. See also Disaster Mitigation Appendix A

i. Overview – Strategic fall tree planting reduces the heat island effect,

provides animal habitat, stores carbon, and beautifies parish grounds.

- ii. Strategies for Implementation -
- Plant native trees to shade parish parking lots.
- Plant native trees to shade sidewalks on parish property.
- Plant native trees to shade public sidewalks adjacent to parish property.
- Plant native trees to shade open areas.
- Plant native trees to shade parish buildings.

• Follow the guidelines for obtaining National Wildlife Federation's Certified Wildlife Habitat designation or go further and obtain the certification.

• Engage a landscape architect to choose species and locations and integrate new trees into an overall landscaping plan.

iii. Possible Incentives –

Municipal programs

Local tree-planting organizations

Local youth organizations

iv. Potential Roadblocks –

Parishes must locate utilities before planting trees. Large tree plantings are best accomplished with skilled labor. Trees need regular watering to become established, and hand irrigation may be required where automatic irrigation is not available. Planting trees may change the type of grass or groundcover appropriate for a given area. When planting is extensive and overall landscape planning is required, parishes will need to obtain the services of a landscape architect and may be reluctant to pay for this critical service.

v. Outcomes –

Parish property will be cooler, improving comfort at outdoor events

- A cooler property heats parish buildings less, reducing electric bills.
- Parish neighborhoods will be cooler, improving outdoor comfort for neighbors.

• The appearance of the parish property will improve, making the parish a better neighborhood asset.

• Wildlife habitat and perhaps wildlife food sources will increase.

vi. Resources -

Projects Requiring More Time and/or Expense:

f. Evaluate parish energy and water usage and potential for solar power production
i. Overview – Performing audits is the first step in performing a gap analysis
to evaluate the current state of parish operations and utility bills to understand
which projects can improve operations to reduce utility bills and improve comfort in
parish buildings.

ii. Strategies for implementation -

• Obtain an energy audit – Electric utilities and commercial energy services providers/engineers may provide audits. Auditors will inspect the building, evaluate appliances and HVAC equipment, test for HVAC duct leakage, perform a blower door test to find the leaks in the building envelope (walls, windows, ceilings, roofs, and floors over unconditioned space) in order to deal with the leaks. They may also audit energy bills..

• Obtain audits of indoor and outdoor water usage - Water utilities and commercial plumbing/water services providers/engineers may provide audits. They will assess equipment, find leaks, perhaps audit utility bills, and deal with other issues. Simply regulating (usually lowering) the pressure on irrigation systems and programming them to operate only at night and only once per week can save tens and even hundreds of thousands of gallons of water per year.

• Obtain a solar assessment – Assessments, usually free, determine how much area (usually roof) is available for panels and how much energy the panels should produce. Solar installers will be able to estimate annual savings and payback based on your utility's electric rate structure and their value of solar payments (price per kilowatt hour that the utility pays for solar-generated electricity). The payback period may be short, and it is often possible to obtain

pricing and financing allowing projects to be cash-positive from the date of installation. If enough funds are available, parishes may also consider shading parking areas with solar arrays.

iii. Possible Incentives –

PACE funding

- Local utility programs
- IRA funding (not yet available in Texas as of November 2024)

iv. Potential Roadblocks –

• Obtaining audits requires parish staff to be on site on weekdays to tour the building with auditors.

• Some parishes may be in areas where free audits are not available.

v. Outcomes –

• Parishes understand baseline (current) parish conditions.

• Parishes understand desired or possible future conditions.

• Parishes understand the gaps between the current and desired future conditions.

• Parishes can determine the priority and feasibility of different projects and different options for projects

• Parishes can compare project costs to return-on-investment or benefits to the parish.

vi. Resource

g. After audits, fix the energy and water issues that can be dealt with using minimal time and money. See items a and c above.

h. Make a list of the energy and water projects that can be accomplished with more time and money or should occur when equipment needs to be replaced.

i. Overview – Many energy and water projects require more planning and expertise than the easier items listed in the first section. It may be possible for parishes to obtain funding for such projects without using parish funds for initial outlays. It is also possible for monthly utility bill savings to exceed monthly loan payments. Comfort and indoor air quality improvements may be just as important to parishes as utility bill reductions.

- ii. Strategies for implementation After audits have been completed:
- List the appliances and/or systems that can/should be replaced immediately.
- List the appliances and/or systems that can/should be replaced upon failure.

List the equipment types and/or model numbers for replacement. Model numbers will probably change before replacement, but knowing the type of

equipment beforehand is important. Ensure that the person responsible for replacement has a list with specific equipment models or specifications (e.g., 240v 50-gallon hybrid heat pump water heater, 5-ton VRF heat pump, 30" induction range, Energy Star dishwasher).

• Ensure that parish staff or other responsible parties know where equipment replacement information is kept and that information is provided to new staff or other responsible parties. Having a physical notebook in addition to a digital file may be one strategy for ensuring that information is not lost.

- Strategies by equipment type in order of importance:
- o Heating and Cooling Systems

If using package systems (not cooling towers), consult with your contractor to replace AC + gas furnaces with heat pumps. Note that if the building envelope is leaky (scores over 5 ACH 50 (5 air changes per hour @ 50 Pascals) on the blower door test of building leakage), improve the envelope first. If the building cannot get close to 5 ACH 50, then continuing with a gas furnace for heating back-up but switching to an efficient heat pump for cooling - and in some cases the base heating load - may be a better option.

If using single-stage heat pumps, consider replacing with 2-stage or VRF (variable refrigerant) systems. Systems with more than one speed remove humidity better than single-speed systems, reducing the possibility for a cold, clammy feeling and/or mustiness.

o Water Heaters

If using gas or electric resistance water heaters, consider replacing with heat pump water heaters. Heat pump water heaters use significantly less energy (1/3 or less) than electric resistance and gas water heaters (with tank or tankless.) There are both 240v and 120v models. If there is already an electric resistance water heater, it uses 240 volts. The main consideration for the change-out will then be having a space for the heat pump to draw air from –

generally around 450 to 700 cubic feet. A louver on a closet door is sufficient to add an adjacent room or corridor for the HPWH to draw from. <u>Super-Efficient</u> <u>Water Heater | ENERGY STAR</u>

o Lighting

See Quick Projects above. Lighting retrofits have a very short payback, often less than two years, so it is not necessary to wait until fixtures break or bulbs need to be replaced to change out. Replace halogen, incandescent, fluorescent, and other inefficient bulbs and fixtures with LEDs.

o Dishwashers

Replace broken models with an Energy Star model. There is rarely a price premium. Energy Star models use less energy and less water than standard models and are widely available.

o Ranges

Replace electric coil and gas ranges with induction ranges. If necessary purchase one or two disks to place under non-induction-friendly cookware (e.g., aluminum and copper pans). Induction ranges are more efficient than electric coil ranges, produce less heat in the kitchen, and do not release harmful combustion gasses. Electric Cooking Products | ENERGY STAR

• For best results, combine energy and water upgrades with building envelope upgrades.

iii. Possible Incentives –

- PACE Funding
- Local utility programs
- IRA funds
- iv. Potential Roadblocks -

• PACE funding is the most likely path for accomplishing significant projects. Some parishes are not in areas yet served by PACE and will need to contact PACE staff (currently Dub Taylor) to work with county commissioners to set up PACE in their counties.

• Parishioners may disagree on whether to replace gas appliances with electric appliances.

v. Outcomes –

- Lower energy bills
- Lower water bills
- More comfortable parish buildings
- Healthier parish building interiors from indoor combustion elimination

i. Install a solar array that meets all or a portion of the annual parish energy needs.

i. Overview – While the environmental value of installing a solar array is significant in all parishes, the economic value of installing a solar array varies with utility pricing called "the value of solar." Some utilities pay customers more for a kilowatt hour produced by a solar array than they charge for a kilowatt hour delivered from the grid. Some utilities pay the same amount, and many pay less. Combining solar arrays with battery storage may be a viable strategy to enhance resilience during power outages. See <u>Disaster Mitigation Appendix A</u>

- ii. Strategies for implementation -
- · Obtain a solar assessment
- · Obtain an energy audit
- Determine pricing program from electric utility

• Determine estimated parish energy needs AFTER improvements are made even if the array is installed before improvements are made.

• It is generally advisable to provide an array producing up to 90% to 100% of annual parish electricity needs, not more. Utilities may roll over the value of excess production to following months but currently do not pay cash for excess production.

• Obtain funding. Funders will often assist parishes to navigate the process.

iii. Possible Incentives –

· IRA funding

iv. Potential Roadblocks -

• If roofs need replacing or structure is in some other way unsound, then repairs must be made before array installation

• Some parishioners may consider arrays unsightly, especially on historic structures, and parishes may need to consider placing arrays on newer structures, creating an outdoor shade structure with arrays, or shading parking areas with arrays.

• Trees may block the sun's rays.

• Buildings may be poorly oriented for solar production.

• Some parishes may initially find the starting the process of planning and obtaining bids for solar arrays daunting.

v. Outcomes –

• Lower or no energy bills

• Improved image of parish in the community

• Improved resilience of parish (if array paired with battery storage)

• Less pollution in areas near power plants burning fossil fuels

j. Replace irrigated landscaping with native and adapted plants that require no irrigation to survive drought or can thrive with bi-weekly to monthly watering.

i. Overview – The majority of parish water use may be irrigation. Using treated water for irrigation and pumping water for irrigation requires considerable energy usage and often high costs for parishes. Reducing or eliminating landscape water use may save parishes hundreds or even thousands of dollars per year.

ii. Strategies for implementation -

• Obtain a water audit and review utility bills to determine annual irrigation water use.

• Engage a landscape architect to provide a new landscape plan or new planting plan and estimate water requirements.

· Install native and adapted plants.

• Repair the irrigation system and/or adjust pressure if necessary.

• Adjust irrigation to establish plants and reduce or eliminate watering after plants are established.

• If budget allows, install a rainwater cistern or greywater system for minimal landscape watering needs.

• Some municipalities may offer reclaimed water for private use. Consult your local government.

iii. Possible Incentives -

iv. Potential Roadblocks -

• Parishioners may have sentimental attachments to current landscaping. Often gardens are planted in memory of parishioners.

• Irrigation systems are difficult and expensive to maintain, but eliminating them may seem a stretch to many. Parishioners may fear having to resort to hand watering during prolonged droughts.

v. Outcomes -

- Lower water bills
- Potential elimination of irrigation maintenance
- Native plantings supporting local wildlife

• Native plantings thriving and beautifying the parish by replacing struggling non-native water hogs

Improved image of the parish as a good neighbor

k. Install EV chargers.

i. Overview – EV chargers are a great community asset, a convenience for long-distance travelers, and a potential source of revenue for the parish. If your parish has the space and means to install chargers, they are likely to be well used. Level 2 chargers (requiring 240 volts) are the most common type of public EV charger.

ii. Strategies for implementation -

• Obtain bids from several installers. Your installer will walk you through the entire process. For a complete list of process steps, see Carbon Appendix B.

I. Plan ahead: Buildings –

i. Overview – Up-front planning to engage in an integrated design and construction process is the most important indicator of success in all building endeavors - whether new construction, renovations, or additions. During the entire planning, design, specification, and construction process, the parish team should remain focused on the reasons for decisions to avoid disaster via so-called value engineering. When project teams carefully decide on high-performance building goals, the architect incorporates those goals into plans and specifications, and the builder constructs according to those goals, success is most likely. The most common pitfall is making changes right before or during construction, usually with the hope of saving money, without considering all of the short-term and long-term consequences of the change.

This type of value engineering typically results in construction delays, cost INCREASES, and poor building performance.

- ii. Strategies for implementation -
 - Engage an architect with experience delivering sustainably designed buildings and campuses and experience working with churches or nonprofits. LEED credentialed professionals have a knowledge of sustainable building practices but are not essential for project success. New buildings are highly complex endeavors and require a design team to assist congregations to navigate through myriad options. LEED and Austin Energy Green Building rating processes assist project teams in defining and executing goals, but working with architects, engineers, and builders enthusiastic about rather than resistant to assisting in achieving environmental goals is essential for success.
 - Engage a landscape architect experienced in climate-appropriate low-water design. Note that low-water design, often referred to as xeriscaping, does not mean designing for Phoenix, rather designing for our area of Texas.
 - For new construction, renovations, and additions, obtain expert guidance on the following as appropriate:
 - Building orientation, window and door location, and shading to reduce heat gain and glare, reduce energy waste, and improve overall comfort
 - Durable, climate-appropriate construction materials, especially roofing, windows, and doors
 - Quality insulation and sealing
 - High-efficiency HVAC systems and automated control selection
 - LED Lighting and automatic daylight control systems
 - Healthier building materials, paints, and coatings
 - Integration of solar arrays with buildings and landscaping
 - Reduction of hardscape usually parking and sidewalks or using high albedo (heat reflecting, usually lighter colored) materials to reduce the heat island effect
 - Landscaping to promote water insoak, reduce potable water use, and provide shade for buildings and hardscapes. Also, Pine and Live Oak are species known to have among the highest carbon capture potential.
 - Landscaping to eliminate chemical fertilization and, where appropriate, provide wildlife habitat
 - Rainwater collection systems to reduce potable water use for irrigation

- Education of parish staff on operations and maintenance
- For a new church, consider the possibility of converting an older structure to a new use.
- iii. Possible Incentives -
- PACE Funding
- Local
- IRA funding
- iv. Potential Roadblocks -

• Parishioners, as in any project, may have conflicting goals, and setting goals may be a lengthy process.

• An integrated design and construction process requires more up-front planning time but should reduce overall project implementation time and improve outcomes

• High performance buildings and landscapes may often cost more up-front than "conventional" construction even though increases are often nominal. Often strategic building programming can reduce the size of the building, making budgeting easier.

m. Plan Ahead: Cleaning and Maintenance for Improved Indoor Environments –
 i. Overview – Toxic chemicals are often present in cleaning and maintenance products. It is often difficult to evaluate claims that one product is healthier than others.

ii. Strategies for implementation -

- Do not use chemical "air fresheners," especially plug-in air fresheners. Many are known asthma triggers.
- Choose products with third-party certifications outside the certifying industry.

 - UL Spot Sustainable Product Database (CDPH/Greenguard Gold)
 - <u>Cradle to Cradle Certified®</u>
 - Health Product Declaration® (HPD) Collaborative Public Repository

- Your architect or interior designer may have lists of healthier products they have already vetted.
- Ask your architect to ensure that safe storage for cleaning products is provided in new construction and renovation projects.

iii. Possible Incentives –

• None known, but a healthier cleaning regimen does not necessarily cost more than a current regimen.

iv. Potential Roadblocks –

• Many people like the fragrances of plug-in air fresheners and may be reluctant to give them up.

1.5 Summary of Outcomes

While reducing dependence on carbon is the focus of this section, implementing projects that reduce carbon dependence yields positive outcomes sought by parishes long before awareness of the need to reduce carbon dependence:

- Improved comfort in parish facilities and on parish grounds
- Improved parish image as a good neighbor in the community
- Improved planning processes promoting wiser and less-stressful decision making
- Reduced energy waste and energy bills
- Reduced water waste and water bills
- Reduced parish building maintenance intervals and costs
- Reduced air pollution on parish grounds and in the community
- Reduced material waste and costs

1.6 Conclusion

Framing projects related to this section in terms of the above-stated outcomes will promote enthusiasm from all parishioners, even so-called climate-skeptics.

Up-front planning for everything from replacing suddenly defunct or underperforming appliances to constructing a new building is the most important tool for success in reducing utility bills and increasing the comfort and durability of parish facilities. While many projects require outside expertise, many small but significant projects can be accomplished with the leadership of one or two or a few dedicated parishioners. Parish staff, vestry members, or other parishioners already interested in creation care can most likely review the list of projects in the matrix and find two or three easy wins before engaging in the audit, design, budget, funding, and implementation process required for larger projects.

2. MITIGATION FOR NATURAL DISASTERS

2.1 Purpose:


Climate change has led to a notable increase, and is predicted to continue causing a significant rise, in the frequency and/or scale of various natural disasters. While the diocese already has a disaster coordinator and a comprehensive set of published guidelines for parishes on disaster preparedness and response, this report will take a different approach. Its primary focus will be on risk mitigation and understanding, aiming to minimize potential damage. Additionally, it will identify the most critical disasters that each parish should prioritize preparing for, thus minimizing overlap with the existing valuable work.

2.2 Problem Framing:

Texas is prone to a diverse range of natural disasters, including wildfires, hurricanes, tornadoes, heatwaves, and others. Some of these disasters impact entire regions, while others are localized or concentrated in specific areas. Addressing all of these would be a significant undertaking for a parish, so we will provide an estimate of their relative likelihood and consequences to help parishes and the diocese prioritize mitigation efforts. In some cases, the surrounding community will be the primary focus, while in others, the church property itself will require attention. The diocese may also be able to provide assistance in certain situations.

There are also related potential crises that will make adapting to climate change more challenging. Insurance rates have been rising and are likely to continue to do so as reinsurers begin to account for climate change in their actuarial models. Tropical diseases may start making their way north into Texas, creating new medical challenges. Some are predicting that there will be a migration of people away from disaster-prone areas like the Gulf Coast as insurance soars and damages mount.

The greatest risks to church properties are flooding (primarily from hurricanes), wind (also primarily from hurricanes), and wildfire. Linked to all of these is the very real possibility that insurance will be dropped from some areas of the state particularly at risk. There are 26 churches in the diocese that have a 50% or greater likelihood of six inches of flooding over the next 30 years. There are 15 churches where the maximum possible flood (at low probability) over the next 30 years could be from 5 to 17 feet in depth. A flood of over 5 feet is likely to result in the total loss of the building (the chart does not show the churches with zero probability).



There are 15 churches that have a greater than 50% probability of seeing 100 mph winds from hurricanes over the next 30 years, and five churches that have a probability from 10% to 25% of being in a wildfire during that same period.

In terms of community impact, perhaps the greatest danger is from heat waves. As climate change continues, there will be more days of extreme heat, which will primarily endanger the poor, prisoners, the elderly, the very young, and the infirm. Air conditioning will be a true necessity simply for survival, and paying electricity bills will be an increasing problem. The First Street Foundation has estimated the number of days with a dangerous heat index (taking humidity into account), and it is truly frightening.

Challenges

The main challenge is that these issues often fall into the "important but not urgent" category, making it crucial to find the right incentives to elevate their priority. Financial and consulting assistance from the Diocese could help overcome some of the inertia that is likely to be seen.

Additionally, limited budgets and time constraints faced by rectors and church leaders can further complicate the situation. In the recommendations I have tried to keep the financial and time burdens of the "Must" recommendations low, so that they should be attainable by all parishes.

2.3 Background:

To begin defining what disasters should be considered, I leaned heavily on FEMA documents, with some modifications. Where possible, I have used FEMA and other government sources (NOAA, CDC, NWS, Texas A&M, etc.) to estimate the likelihood and seriousness of the various disasters by parish. That said, there are a multitude of other sources, often academic papers, but also when possible the excellent work being done by the First Street Foundation. In the detailed notes (see appendix), I try to highlight the strengths and weaknesses of the data I found. In particular, most government data does not yet incorporate climate change in a consistent fashion, or sometimes not at all. There are also many disaster types that remain difficult to predict and for which it is not clear what effects climate change will have, if any. Probably the best understood disasters are hurricanes, floods, and wildfires.

In the recommendations themselves, I have broken them out into **musts**, **shoulds**, and **coulds**. I have no reference for these categories - these are based on my own impressions about the importance and costs of the various measures. The "must" items should be within the time and monetary budgets of every parish, while the "could" items will typically require a substantial expenditure in time and/or money, and so are not appropriate for every parish.

Part of the recommendations come from my own experience in the corporate world. I had to create disaster plans for my business unit several times, and we did a number of drills and actual disaster responses.

There is an extensive appendix containing detailed information and source references for all the material.

2.4 Recommendations:

Since each parish is unique in its vulnerability to various disasters, these recommendations as a whole will not apply to any single parish. Rather, I will supply a table of likelihood and seriousness for each disaster by parish, which will allow each parish to prioritize what are the most important disasters to be prepared for.

Note that the risks fall into two categories. The risks from wind, wildfire, flood, and hail are risks to the church property (as well as the properties of people in the community), but the risks from heat waves, cold waves, smoke, and power outages have little effect on the church property itself, but are primarily a community issue. The property issues also offer proactive mitigation measures, where the community issues primarily only offer reactive measures.

For all disasters the churches can support the community, and set examples for community action. Some special cases for community action are those living in mobile homes who are especially vulnerable to wind and heat wave risks (a mobile home - even properly secured - is only safe up to about 70 mph winds). For those unable to afford to run an A/C, they will be especially vulnerable to heat and smoke risks. Notable too is that Texas law does not require landlords to supply air conditioning, which is becoming a necessity, especially for the ill and aged.

In this section, much detail that is in the appendix will be left out - only the most important items will be noted. However, for actual implementation, the detailed lists in the appendix should be used.

General Recommendations

There are certain essential elements that are crucial for effective disaster preparedness across all hazards. Without these core elements, it is challenging to mount a successful response. For instance, a robust communication plan is paramount because it facilitates the smooth operation of other aspects. Additionally, having a written plan and a designated person in charge ensures prompt and efficient preparation and response. Testing key aspects of the plan is also vital, as many well-formulated plans have failed due to lack of testing, which can lead to overlooked or malfunctioning elements. Much of this information is also covered in the <u>Emergency Preparedness Workbook</u>.

It's important to note that these core elements are predominantly focused on disaster response rather than mitigation. Mitigation strategies will be addressed in the sections specific to each disaster type.

The most significant hurdle in implementing these elements, especially in creating a plan using The Workbook, is the time and effort required. Providing incentives can be a crucial factor in motivating individuals to overcome this challenge.

Must Once

- Work through the Congregation Emergency Preparedness Workbook¹
- Create a written plan for the most likely disasters

Annually

- Verify and update the plan as needed
- Appoint a disaster coordinator (preferably not the rector)
- Verify that utilities (water, gas, electricity) can be turned off in an emergency and that the tools needed are available.
- Have trees near the buildings trimmed to minimize danger from falling limbs.

Diocesan Role

- Provide a single, recommended communication platform, with support for implementation.
- Provide recommendations and implementation support for cloud storage of key parish records.
- Provide plan templates/examples for each parish to reduce the parish planning workload.

Should

Annually

• Run annual education sessions to provide parishioners with help for emergency preparedness

Diocesan Role

• Annual audit of parish plans and preparations with a focus on where assistance is needed.

Could

Once

- Coordinate within the parish and with other parishes evacuation plans for people lacking resources (transportation, shelter, etc.) (update annually)
- Establish a relationship with the local emergency response organization²
- Offer parish resources to the local emergency response organization (parish hall as a heating or cooling center, supply distribution center, etc.)
- Establish plans for assisting people in need (elderly, infirm) get help in a crisis (to a cooling center in a heat wave, to a warm place in a cold wave, to safety when evacuating, to a place with electricity during an extended power failure)

Diocesan Role

- Coordinate regional plans across parishes and convocations for evacuation assistance.
- Develop resources for helping parishes and congregants deal with government agencies and insurance when trying to recover from a disaster.

• Develop a framework for parishes to develop post-disaster counseling programs.

Specific Recommendations

a. Disaster Response

Churches generally have a large parking lot and a large parish hall. Both could be offered for use in an emergency, though significant preparation and coordination with local authorities should be done prior to an incident.

Churches could be distribution centers for water, food, sandbags, and other items needed before or after a disaster. Parish halls could act as cooling or warming centers during heat waves or cold waves. This is also discussed in Disruptions to Water Supplies, Recommendations 4.4.a.

Organizations like "Mosaic in Action" could also be promoted to get help to those affected by a disaster. It should be noted that the Diocesan Disaster Coordinator has documented a number of these measures - the after disaster response.

b. Evacuation

For many disasters, there will be a number of people that will need to be evacuated out of harm's way. For hurricanes, this would be the likely storm-surge zone. For river flooding, the 500-year floodplain surrounding the river in question. Wildfires will also precipitate evacuations. Finally, extended power failures will create a need to evacuate those most vulnerable to someplace with power.

Even for storm-surge, the areas evacuating are limited in extent, and the evacuation does not have to be very far. For example, in the worst case scenario, an evacuation might be required from all of Galveston county and the east third of Harris county, somewhat over 500,000 people.

But moving only 10-20 miles away, to West Houston say, would suffice to avoid the flooding danger.

There are 3 key aspects to evacuating vulnerable people.

- 1. Access to a vehicle
- 2. Lodging that allows pets
- 3. Lodging that has backup power

If each parish kept an ever-green list of people in the parish who needed help evacuating, or had special needs like electricity for a medical device, as well as people who could take someone in, and people with generators or batteries who could also keep their lights on, then the diocese could coordinate between parishes to evacuate and lodge the most vulnerable.

c. Mitigating the Effects of Cold Waves

The primary danger to church property during severe cold weather is water damage resulting from frozen and broken pipes. To prevent this, exterior pipes should be insulated and, in extreme cold, the water supply should be turned off at the meter and the pipes drained. Additionally, annual heater maintenance is essential. Trimming trees around the

church to mitigate damage during an ice storm is another crucial task.

Regarding community preparedness, individuals unable to afford heat or who lose heat are most vulnerable. Collaborating with local agencies to establish a heating center or potentially reaching out to parishioners with spare bedrooms are potential solutions. See also the section below on housing people during an evacuation.

Furthermore, severe cold weather can cause widespread power outages, so preparations must be made for this scenario as well. (see power outages, below)

d. Mitigating the Effects of Hail

Hail primarily poses a financial risk, causing damage mainly to roofs and trees and, in some cases, vehicles. To lessen the chances of hail damage, especially in regions prone to large hailstones, it's advisable to invest in a sturdy roof, potentially a metal roof. This approach can reduce the likelihood of damage and possibly result in lower insurance premiums. It's important to note that solar panels are generally resistant to damage from most hailstones, except for extremely large ones.

e. Mitigating the Effects of Heat Waves

Heat waves cause more fatalities each year than any other weather-related event in the United States. In Europe, in 2022, over 70,000 perished in a heat wave. In Texas, over 300 died in 2023 from heat. A key learning from these numbers is that very few people in Europe have air conditioning. If we normalize by the population and account for air conditioning, the numbers look very similar. According to the census, 98% of homes in Texas have air conditioning, so our concerns are primarily for those without air conditioning - the poor, those who can't afford their bill, prisoners, and those who must work outside.

Our involvement could begin with knowing who in the parish may be at risk and working with local agencies to help ensure that they have an A/C and can afford to stay cool. Since this is certain to be a growing issue throughout the entire diocese, it seems like a good candidate for a diocesan-level group to come up with creative ways for the diocese and local parishes to work to alleviate this problem. Lobbying at the state level for prisoners would also be an appropriate response.

Due to the longer and increasing periods of extreme heat, there are significant financial risks to parishes as well.

For church property, well-maintained air conditioning, good insulation (which may be challenging to retrofit), drapes on windows, intelligent thermostats, weatherstripping, and heat-reflective shingles are strategies to control cooling costs. Shutting off the air-conditioning to save money is often not a viable option, as this can damage buildings and contents. Note that there is considerable overlap with the section on reducing carbon footprints, especially section 1.4.h.

For vulnerable community members, the church or parishioners with extra space could provide cooling centers. Just as severe cold increases the risk of power grid failure, so does extreme heat. Additionally, low-cost solutions like shade sails for mobile homes can significantly reduce indoor heat levels. A key issue with heat is that the most dangerous time is at night, so while daytime cooling centers are useful, people with health issues really need a cool place to sleep.

Heat Islands

A recent study indicated that the lack of tree cover across neighborhoods leads to hundreds more deaths and 30,000 more doctors' visits in neighborhoods inhabited predominantly by people of color. A seemingly simple way to counteract the heat island effect - plant a lot of trees. This seems like a relatively uncontroversial way that the church could mitigate some of the heating effects of climate change, and improve the lives of those living in poorer neighborhoods. Of course it goes beyond just planting trees locations would have to be developed, the trees would require watering for the first few years, proper varieties would need to be chosen, and local governments would need to be partnered with.

Most people believe that climate change is happening. But most also feel frightened and helpless - paralyzed, not knowing what they can do. A project like this could help people out of their climate crisis paralysis, and provide some real benefit at the same time.

f. Mitigating the Effects of Flooding

Flooding can occur due to various factors, such as storm surges during hurricanes, river flooding after heavy rainfall, or sheet flooding in extreme rain events. For highly vulnerable parishes, a cost-benefit analysis of relocating to higher ground should be conducted using available flood frequency and severity estimates. In less vulnerable parishes, several mitigating actions can be taken, including elevating electrical equipment, sandbagging doors when flooding is imminent, or constructing levees or ditches to divert water around buildings. Choosing flood-resistant building materials, like terrazzo floors, can also minimize the impact of flooding.

From a community perspective, floods are usually predictable, with advance warning ranging from hours to days. For individuals at high risk, the church can provide assistance with evacuation, discussed above.

g. Lightning Safety

When planning outdoor summer activities, churches should prioritize lightning safety. Educating staff about lightning safety fundamentals is crucial. Having a backup plan in case of impending storms is essential. Investing in a lightning detector should also be considered to enhance safety measures during church events.

h. Responding to Power Outages

As a general rule, any power outage lasting over 8 hours should be a cause for concern. This is because most medical devices, such as oxygen concentrators, typically have battery backups that last around 8 hours. Additionally, power outages during extreme hot or cold weather can pose risks for individuals in poorly insulated homes or those susceptible to temperature extremes. The *Evacuation* section above is very relevant.

i. Mitigating Smoke Exposure

In recent years, there has been an increased awareness of the health risks associated with inhaling PM_{2.5} particles. Smoke from distant fires in Mexico or Louisiana, or local wildfires can contribute to these particles. Upgrading the air conditioning in churches, particularly in offices, to a MERV 13 or higher filtration system can effectively remove most smoke particles and even pollen as an added benefit. Additionally, providing relatively affordable and accessible filtration options to community members with respiratory problems can be beneficial. Similar to precautions taken during lightning storms, outdoor activities may need to be limited during periods of significant smoke.

A pretty simple project that a youth group or similar organization could take on would be to build simple cheap filtration systems using a box fan and a MERV 13 filter (there are plans available online) for people in the community who are especially vulnerable to smoke.

j. Mitigating Wildfire Risks

In fire-prone areas, implementing relatively straightforward and affordable mitigation strategies can significantly enhance the chances of surviving a wildfire. Measures such as installing fire-resistant roofing, clearing combustible vegetation away from buildings, and establishing an evacuation plan and drills can collectively increase the odds of emerging from a fire unscathed by several fold. While there is usually some advance notice before an evacuation becomes necessary, the time frame can be severely limited, underscoring the importance of preparedness. Preplanning and drills are crucial to executing a successful evacuation.

k. Mitigating Wind Risks

When winds from any source (tornado, derecho, hurricane) are below approximately 110 mph, straightforward precautions can shield property. These include installing hurricane straps, regularly trimming trees, keeping shingles in good condition, and securing loose outdoor items. This scenario corresponds to an EF-0 or EF-1 tornado, a Category 1 or 2 hurricane, and most derechos. However, for winds exceeding that speed, the main objective shifts to solely avoiding injury or death. Buildings are much less likely to withstand such winds intact, making people the top priority. In these situations, knowing where and how to find safe shelter becomes paramount. Every church should have a plan and signage for how to protect the people in the buildings when a tornado threatens. For the community, mobile homes are the most vulnerable to winds, even when properly secured with tie-downs. In Texas, the rules are somewhat lax with Wind Zone 2 certified homes required only in coastal counties (good up to about 100 mph winds). In all other counties, Wind Zone 1 rules apply, which allow for winds up to 70 mph - easily exceeded by derechos, thunderstorms, tornadoes, and hurricanes coming onshore. 2.5 Summary of Outcomes

a. Insurance

Insurance rates have started a marked increase in the past few years as reinsurance companies begin to take the consequences of climate change seriously and adjust their rates accordingly. Last year insurance rates in the diocese rose 22%, which is bound to have a serious impact on budgets. It is all but certain that as the effects of climate change continue to become more obvious, that rates will continue to increase - or companies may simply drop out of the market, as has happened in Florida and California and is beginning to occur in Texas. Insurance should be viewed as a partnership between the diocese and the Church Insurance Corporation. Working with them to develop mitigation measures that will allow them to slow the rate of increase in premiums would be a win-win.

b. Migration

An increasing number of people are predicting that the increasing frequency and severity of natural disasters, more days of unbearable heat, and increasing insurance costs will start driving a migration of people out of the most affected areas, like the Gulf Coast. This is clearly something the church cannot influence, but should be aware of and factor into planning. One criterion to be considered before making major investments in an area should be how likely that area is to suffer abandonment in the near future. A question to be considered is how the church may be able to help the poor during an abandonment? Episcopal Relief and Development is studying ways to relocate people affected by disasters as a community, and that work may apply in the future to these areas.

c. Climate Refugees

Just as people in the Gulf Coast may move to safer areas to escape the effects of climate change, we can expect increasing numbers of refugees from other countries - primarily Central America - to be showing up and needing assistance. This is already happening, and is certain to accelerate. The diocese can be involved in many areas - from physically assisting refugees to lobbying the government to provide humane treatment.

d. Agriculture

It is predicted that over most of the state, by 2050, agriculture yields of corn and soybeans will fall by up to 70%. While these are not major crops in Texas, the number one cash crop is cotton, which is very sensitive to drought conditions. A decline of this level will devastate rural Texas - likely sparking an exodus not unlike the Oklahoma dust bowl.

2.6 Conclusion

Mitigate, adapt, and suffer. That is what the future holds. Church properties and the communities they support both face increasing challenges that will require some of all three. In some cases, adaptation may mean abandonment of properties as whole communities become unsustainable. In other cases the church can play a role in helping

to mitigate the inevitable challenges, through direct action, setting an example, and lobbying. And certainly the church will need to be there when people are suffering.

2.7 Appendices

<u>Disaster Mitigation Appendix A</u> contains details on mitigation strategies, as well as details on the sources of the data, and how that data was utilized to reach the conclusions.

<u>Disaster Mitigation Appendix B</u> contains risk matrices for every parish in the diocese, to help

parishes prioritize efforts to mitigate the most likely and most potentially damaging disasters.

3 - SEA LEVEL RISE

3.1 Purpose.

The purpose of this section is to identify parish properties most likely to experience adverse effects from relative sea level rise under current conditions and to propose recommendations for mitigating the effects of sea level rise.

3.2 Problem Framing.

Global annual maxima sea levels (AMSLs) have been increasing in magnitude over the last decades, due primarily to an upward shift in mean sea level (MSL). (Boumis, Georgios; Moftakhari, Hamed; Moradkhani, Hamid. *Coevolution of Extreme Sea Levels and Sea-Level Rise Under Global Warming*, 11 Earth's Future 7 (July 2023))

Under MSL projections, most coastal areas will experience a 6 to 11-fold increase in the frequency of their present-day 100-year flooding event, even under a moderate concentration scenario. (*Id.*) Sea level measured relative to land is called "relative" sea level. Subsidence, or sinking land, throughout coastal areas leads to higher relative sea levels and increased flood risks.

(NASA Sea Level Change Observations from Space available at: <u>Subsidence | Regional Sea Level</u> – <u>NASA Sea Level Change Portal</u>.)

The increasing AMSL, MSL, and relative seal levels suggests that properties currently unaffected by tides may experience tidal flooding or be consistently underwater in the future.

3.3 Background.

Texas A&M University has modeled the impacts of sea level rise along the Texas Gulf Coast.

According to these projections, 10 parishes or their communities will be directly impacted by sea level rise over the next 125 years. These parishes, in order of urgency, are as follows, with a more detailed description of the impacts set out in the Appendix.

- 1. Holy Trinity, Dickinson
- 2. St. Paul's, Freeport
- 3. Trinity, Galveston
- 4. Grace, Galveston
- 5. Saint Augustine of Hippo, Galveston
- 6. St. Paul's, Orange
- 7. St. Tlmothy's, Lake Jackson
- 8. St. Thomas the Apostle, Houston
- 9. St. John's, Palacios
- 10. St. Michael's, La Marque

With projects, such as the Coastal Texas Project, designed to mitigate the impacts of sea level rise over time, today's predictions are likely to be different in the future. The recommendations in this section rely on information available from organizations and agencies dedicated to understanding and mitigating sea level rise and should be reevaluated periodically.

3.4 Recommendation(s).

Commonly recommended strategies for mitigating the impacts of sea level rise on properties fall into four general categories: (1) Protect people, property, and infrastructure; (2) Accommodate the natural and constructed environment to the rising sea; (3) Retreat from the rising sea; and (4) Avoid areas impacted by rising sea levels. Most recommended strategies require local, state, or even federal involvement. However, there are near term, mid-term, and long-term strategies parishes and the diocese can take to mitigate the effects of rising sea levels

a. Purchase Flood Insurance (Protect: Near-Term, Mid-Term, and Long-Term)

I. Overview

All parishes, not just those at greatest risk of flooding, should consider purchasing flood insurance through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), if the

community participates in the program. This program may provide for repairing, elevating, and potentially replacing part or all of structures if they are flooded. Of the ten parishes at greatest risk, all communities participate in NFIP.

Strategies for Implementation

Strategies for purchasing flood insurance may include:

- 1. Each parish continues to locate and purchase flood insurance on its own.
- 2. Diocesean representative identifies the properties most at risk of flooding and most in need of flood insurance and negotiates a program of insurance for all properties with the goal of procuring better terms and rates.
- 3. Diocese provides financial support to purchase flood insurance to struggling communities.

Challenges

Flood insurance is becoming increasingly difficult to procure due to limited carriers, and, once procured, increasingly difficult to afford due to rising rates. In addition, the limits of a non-residential flood insurance policy through the NFIP program are \$500,000 for the building and \$500,000 for contents.

Outcomes

In the event of flooding due to a natural disaster (versus broken water pipes or equipment) an insurance policy through NFIP's insurance program may provide funding (up to \$500,000 for the building and \$500,000 for contents) for rehabilitation, and possibly for a portion of raising a property after it has flooded.

b. Raise Expensive Equipment (Protect / Accommodate)

Overview

Parishes should be encouraged to consider raising HVAC systems, plumbing, air conditioning equipment, and electric meters, which are currently at or below ground level, to above flood levels. If a parish structure floods, the parish should consider raising the structure or, per recommendation number 3.4.d, participating in a buyout program, if one is available.

Strategies for Implementation

Strategies for raising expensive equipment include:

- 1. Creating an inventory of equipment to elevate.
- 2. Incorporating elevation activities into routine maintenance, repair, and replacement activities.
- 3. Incorporating elevation activities into the parish's capital improvement plan.

- 4. Once equipment has been elevated, inform the insurance carrier and seek a reduction in insurance premiums.
- 5. Take advantage of available incentives.

Challenges

The biggest challenges to elevating structures are likely: (1) funding; and (2) space.

Potential Outcomes

Raising equipment can prevent future damage to expensive systems and may reduce flood insurance premiums as well. According to the Congressional Research Service, policyholders can receive mitigation credits for elevating a property, elevating machinery and equipment above the lowest floor, and installing flood openings below the base flood elevation.

c. Install Berms / Trenches (Accommodate)

Overview

Parishes prone to recurring flooding from sea level rise (or from any other cause), are encouraged to consider illustalling berms or trenches around properties. High tides (and many flooding events) are often predicted in advance. For properties impacted less frequently, using sand bags at vulnerable points may be sufficient.

Strategies for Implementation

- Create an inventory of areas in need of protection, urgency of the need for protection, the level of protection needed (e.g., permanent protection, periodic protection; immediate, near-term, or long range action needed), and the expected cost for undertaking such protective activities.
- 2. Incorporate low-cost or urgent protective activities into routine landscaping and maintenance activities.
- 3. Incorporate more expensive or large scale activities into the parish's capital improvement plan.
- 4. Once protective barriers are in place, inform the insurance carrier and seek a reduction in insurance premiums.

Challenges

- 1. Expertise. Identifying a safe and appropriate protective barrier may require the expertise of an engineer.
- 2. Cost of construction. In addition to the costs of an engineer, the costs of construction can be difficult for many parishes to cover.

Potential Outcomes

Once installed properly, berms and trenches can protect against relatively minor / repeated impacts from high tides and storms by diverting flood waters. These features may also decrease flood insurance premiums.

d. Establish Standards (Accommodate / Avoid)

Overview

In areas known to experience recurring flooding from sea level rise (and other recurring causes), it may become economically and ecologically prohibitive to continue repairing, replacing, rebuilding, or undertaking new construction. The diocese is encouraged to consider articulating standards or a policy for: (1) determining when to sell or relocate a parish or other property and (2) determining when and how new construction or rehabilitation of structures is appropriate when a property is subject to flooding from sea level rise.

Strategies for Implementation

When articulating standards or a policy governing a decision to sell or relocate a parish away from an area subject to flooding consider the following, non-exclusive list of factors:

- 1. Parish strength: how strong are the parish members' involvement, stability, and long-term viability. A parish with diminishing involvement, instability, or other indicators of low viability may be candidates for sale and/or relocation.
- 2. Community strength: are residences and businesses in the area relocating rather than accommodating? Where households and businesses are moving and closing, it may make sense to prioritize selling or relocating a parish.
- Available incentives: are government agencies incentivizing relocations or focusing their flood control efforts in other areas? Similarly, where a buyout program has been established, selling and relocating a parish may be prioritized.

If a determination has been made to maintain a parish within an area subject to sea level rise, standards or a policy governing a decision to construct or reconstruct a structure within such an area should incorporate or exceed local community standards and FEMA standards. References are available in the appendix.

Challenges

A decision to sell and relocate a parish carries political, financial, and community challenges. These challenges may be addressed by establishing a set of standards ahead of time to help guide the decision. Articulating these standards, however, may be challenging to complete in the abstract. For these reasons, it would be helpful to consult an expert and existing standards referenced in the appendix.

Potential Outcomes

Standards may help with administration of a pooled insurance program if one is established and articulates uniform criteria for decision making.

3.5 Summary of Outcomes

Flood insurance is a basic necessity for parishes preparing for the effects of sea level rise. Insurance, however, is insufficient, in part, due to policy limits.

If the recommendations in this section are implemented successfully, parishes subject to flooding and other effects of sea level rise should experience more resilient infrastructure and lower insurance premiums. Further, if Incentive 6.4.d.iii, revolving fund, is implemented in conjunction with the recommendations in this section, funding may be available for parishes to implement the needed capital improvements that lower risk and insurance costs and to relocate a parish, if needed.

3.6 Conclusion

This section includes recommendations to mitigate the effects of sea level rise. These recommendations are:

- 1. Maintain flood insurance and reduce insurance premiums by undertaking capital improvements.
- 2. Implement capital improvements:
 - Raise equipment and install flood openings
 - Install permits and/or trenches
- 3. Articulate standards at the diocesean level for:
 - construction and rehabilitation of structures at locations with known vulnerabilities to sea level rise; and
 - If and when to relocate a parish community to a less vulnerable location.

The recommendations in this section, if implemented together, should result in communities with infrastructure more resilient to flooding from sea level rise.

4. DISRUPTIONS TO WATER SUPPLY

4.1 Purpose.

This section considers what might the future of our communities look like with more frequent interruptions to clean drinking water, and what steps can the diocese/churches take now to alleviate some of that fallout.

4.2 Problem Framing.

Parishes and parishioners in the Diocese of Texas are expected to see increasing interruptions to clean drinking water supplies over the next 50 years. These interruptions are acute and chronic in nature and are driven by at least two key factors. Respondents to the survey conducted by the Creation Care Task Force ranked high water bills and disruptions to water supply as second-tier concerns today at 63/100 and 60/100. It is expected these concerns will grow without a plan for addressing them.

4.3 Background.

A healthy and consistent water supply is a regional concern. Ensuring a consistent and healthy water supply is a government function. As a result, while the effects of an unhealthy or inconsistent water supply are felt at an individual level, individuals have very little control over the water supply. Multiple factors are influencing a trending threat to consistent, clean water supply. This section examines a few key factors and the following sections examine steps that individuals, churches, and the diocese may take to ameliorate the causes and effects of interruptions to our water supplies.

Climate Change - Increasing Temperatures

First, global temperatures are rising. In Texas, this means the number of days per year above 100°F will increase dramatically. Longer, hotter summers mean more water evaporates from drinking water sources and from soils. As a result, humans, animals, and the environment need more water to survive just as the water they need is evaporating. In times of prolonged dry weather, the State can experience a chronic drought.

During dry weather / droughts, dry soils can also damage water supply lines running through the ground. As soils contract, the pipelines can bend, crack, and break, leading to leaks in supply lines and short-term interruptions to drinking water.

(Id.)

In addition to drought, climate change can also interrupt water supplies through the occurrence of natural disasters such as hurricanes and prolonged freezing weather.

Population Growth

Second, Texas' population is anticipated to increase 73 percent between 2020 and 2070, from 29.7 million to 51.5 million. It is estimated that approximately half of this growth will occur in the Dallas / Fort Worth and Houston areas. With this population growth, water supplies, including those supplies essential to surviving a drought, are expected to decline by 18% over this same time. (Texas Water Development Board, 2022 State Water Plan, available at: <u>State Water Plan | Texas</u> Water Development Board)

Effect of Interruptions to Clean Water on Diocese and Parishes In a situation of chronic loss of water supply, such as during a drought or a severe impairment to water quality that cannot be mitigated by regional water supply agencies, the immediate effects will be felt by humans and animals. Individuals, including diocesean employees, parish priests, and parishioners will need to identify alternative, possibly non-public ways to obtain clean water. The diocese (and its parishes and parishioners) may also experience damage to infrastructure and property, such as broken water lines and dead trees and landscaping.

In a situation of acute loss of water supply, such as during a weather event or broken water main, the effects on the diocese, parishes, and parishioners are typically focused on humans and animals. People need to find alternative sources of clean water, but usually for shorter periods of time.

A major challenge for addressing this issue is that water is managed by public agencies on a regional basis with complicated water rights and transportation issues. This makes it almost impossible for a private party or parties, such as the diocese or individual parishes, to implement a comprehensive solution to interruptions to the water supply. There are, however, a number of steps the diocese can take to protect its parishes and parishioners from these chronic and acute interruptions to clean water supplies.

4.4 Recommendations.

a. Parishes as Water Supply Hubs.

Overview - Parishes are encouraged to consider contracting with a local disaster response agency or food bank to serve as a location for water distribution in the event of a natural or supply disaster.

Strategies for Implementation - There are two potential strategies for implementation. First is a decentralized approach where each parish contacts the local agency and/or food bank each year to discuss the availability of the parish property if a need for water distribution arises. Second is a centralized approach where a diocesean representative works with a regional or national group to identify all or particular properties that the group can use if a need for water distribution arises.

Incentives

- a. Diocese to negotiate standard contract with Red Cross or similar agency that adequately protects diocesean interests.
- b. Diocese to offer to review the parish's property insurance policy to ensure this type of activity is covered in the event a person enters the property and is injured.

Challenges - Potential issues to consider when implementing this recommendation are (1) repetitive contracting; and (2) risk management.

- a. Repetitive Contracting. It is likely that a parish will need to reconsider its agreement to serve as an emergency staging location on an annual basis. In a decentralized approach, it is possible that this annual task may be neglected over time.
- b. Risk Management. The risk of harm to people and property from the use of the parish property as an emergency staging location will likely be allocated in the contract between the parish and agency. It will be important that the contract is carefully reviewed to protect the parishes and diocese against this risk.

Anticipated Outcomes - If implemented successfully, parish property can serve as a staging location for agencies with expertise in responding to water supply disruptions to supply and distribute water without any financial (and hopefully legal) risk to the diocese and parishes.

Example - The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has a standing Facility Use Agreement with the Red Cross that provides a broad framework for cooperation and engagement during times of disaster.

(Memorandum of Understanding between The American National Red Cross and Corporation of the Presiding Bishop of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, available: <u>Facility Use</u> Agreement (Red Cross) (churchofjesuschrist.org).)

This contract provides an example of a centralized contracting approach that may mitigate risk and repetitive contracting by enabling individual parishes to benefit from the terms negotiated by the dioceses. Cities routinely enter into similar agreements directly with the Red Cross, food banks, and similar aid agencies. (See, e.g., Facility Use Agreement (El Paso available at: <u>6.1.pdf (elpasotexas.gov)</u>).)

b. Water Use Audit.

Overview -Encourage parishes to obtain a water use audit of the property's interior and exterior water use.

Strategies for Implementation -

- a. Agency Audit. Water supply agencies often offer a free or reduced cost audit of water use and provide recommendations for upgrades or operational changes to save water. These audits may provide a good starting point for identifying ways parishes and other discosean properties can reduce water use.
- **b. Private audit**. Parishes have non-traditional water use habits and a traditional audit conducted by a water supply agency may not identify the most effective ways of reducing water use. A private audit may provide more individualized recommendations.

Challenges - Challenges to undertaking a water use audit include:

- 1. A parish's water supply agency may not offer a water use audit service.
- 2. Difficulty identifying a qualified company to conduct a private water use audit.
- 3. Paying for a private water use audit.
- 4. Implementing recommendations of the water use auditor.

These challenges may be mitigated, in part, through funding or the provision of expertise by the diocese, such as the Program Manager's role in acting as an expert or connection to resources and through a revolving fund.

Potential Outcomes - If implemented successfully, a water use study may lead to: (1) a reduction in wasted water; (2) a reduction in water bills; and (3) protection of the region's water supplies.

c. Reduce Water Use.

Overview - Encourage parishes to reduce water use at all times, not just during times of water supply challenges. The most important steps individuals and property owners can take to protect against drought-induced interruptions to water supply are conservation and demand reduction.

Strategies - Effective strategies for reducing water use depend largely on the manner in which water is used at a particular location. The strategies recommended here are general, non-exclusive, and non-exhaustive.

- 1. Obtain a water use audit as described above and implement recommendations from the audit.
- 2. Replace leaking infrastructure.
- 3. Install high-efficiency fixtures and appliances.
- 4. Install rain barrels.
- 5. Install native or drought-resistant landscaping.
- 6. Increase ground permeability during construction or rehabilitation activities.

Challenges - Potential issues to consider when implementing this recommendation are:

- 1. Availability of water use auditor. See Recommendation 4.4.b, above.
- 2. Cost of replacing infrastructure, landscaping, and permeable pavers, etc.

3. Regulations that may prevent installation of rain barrels and an increased need to maintain barrels to prevent the barrels from becoming vectors for mosquitoes.

These challenges may be mitigated, in part, through:

- Diocese provides funding for a water use auditor, see Recommendation 4.4.b, above.
- 2. Diocese provides funding (grant or loans) for facility improvements, see Recommendation 6.4.d.iii, below.
- 3. Diocese or consultant identifies opportunities for parishes to take advantage of through water supply agencies.

Potential Outcomes - If implemented successfully, a water use study may lead to: (1) a reduction in wasted water; (2) a reduction in water bills; and (3) protection of the region's water supplies. In addition to the direct outcomes of implementing this recommendation, parishes can amplify their actions by undertaking an educational program within the parish and the larger community, using press to publicize the progress made, or host a community event featuring the improvements.

4.5 Summary of Outcomes

If implemented successfully, the recommendations in this section can lead to the following:

- 1. parish property can serve as a staging location for agencies with expertise in responding to water supply disruptions to supply and distribute water without any financial (and hopefully legal) risk to the diocese and parishes.
- 2. a reduction in wasted water;
- 3. a reduction in water bills; and
- 4. protection of the region's water supplies.

In addition to the direct outcomes of implementing these recommendations, parishes can amplify their actions by undertaking an educational program within the parish and the larger community, using press to publicize the progress made, or host a community event featuring the improvements.

4.6 Conclusion

Local parishes can act as partners to the governmental agencies responsible for securing and distributing a clean and reliable supply of drinking water by taking responsibility for water conservation at an individual level and serving an important community role of education, message amplification, and resource provider during emergencies. The recommendations in this section are intended to recognize that, while no individual can solve the issue of interruptions to our water supplies, there are concrete steps each person and parish can take to make a significant difference.

5. CREATION CARE FORMATION

"I used to think the top environmental problems were biodiversity loss, ecosystems collapse and climate change. I thought that with 30 years of good science we could address those problems. But I was wrong. The top environmental problems are selfishness, greed and apathy... and to deal with those we need a spiritual and cultural transformation and we, (Lawyers) and scientists, don't know how to do that."

5.1 Purpose:

In keeping with both contemporary theological understanding and scientific consensus, this section of the task force report considers how Episcopal parishes in the Diocese of Texas can offer ongoing formation to encourage all Texas Episcopalians to develop a more loving relationship with all of Creation, thus enriching their spiritual lives and working to mitigate the effects of climate change and environmental degradation.

5.2 Framing the Task:

Formation is generally understood as a process of individual growth that promotes (1) self-examination leading to inner or spiritual transformation, and (2) action or behavior congruent with this change or with pre-existing commitments—in this case, to a spiritually rich and responsible relationship with Creation. A comprehensive formation program focused on individual transformation and related to Creation Care might include more Creation-informed worship and prayer; general education such as reading and attending lectures, sermons and films; opportunities for participation in "field trips" or rallies; instruction in care for Creation such as gardening, composting, or park trail maintenance; and guidance about engaging in advocacy. Such contemplative and experiential activities are compatible with Loving Formation, Liberating Advocacy, and Life-Giving Conservation, elements of the Episcopal Church's Creation Care Ministry. (https://www.episcopalchurch.org/ministries/creation-care/)

While individual actions like eating less meat, gardening with native plants, driving an electric vehicle, and adding lamentations to worship practice may add awareness and spiritual depth to one's relationship with the natural world, such actions taken in isolation will not diminish climate change or biodiversity loss, or the human suffering that accompanies them. Diocesan and parish leadership can both model visible Creation care and actively encourage parishioners to support one another's spiritual development as members of a loving community. As Bill McKibbon notes, "...the most important thing an individual can do, is be a little less of an individual and join together with others in movements large enough to make change."

An additional benefit to being part of a group may be to help manage climate anxiety, a condition currently the focus of psychological and communication studies. Yale researcher Anthony Lieserowitz notes that "[T]aking action on climate change is really one of the most powerful ways to combat hopelessness and helplessness. Go do something—not as an individual, but as part of a group." (https://sustainability.yale.edu/explainers/yale-experts-explain-climate-anxiety)

The church has an important role to play in nurturing resilient communities and addressing the human suffering that comes with climate change and biodiversity

loss. At both the national and diocesan levels, the Episcopal Church has recently developed curricula to facilitate both individual spiritual development and group action as parts of a comprehensive formation program. Other religious groups also offer useful formation guidance. These will be described further in the Recommendations section.

5.3 Background:

a. The Diocese of Texas

The diocese of Texas is large and diverse. Its approximately 164 parishes and missions, with ASAs from 7 to more than 1,100, are located in rural areas, small towns, suburbs, and large cities.

There is diversity in how faith is understood and practiced, and in demographics such as age, education, income, race, ethnicity, political affiliation, and employment. Any of these factors may color parish or congregant understanding of issues related to Creation or the natural environment. Some parishioners may subscribe to a stewardship model of humanity's relation to the earth, while some may find a more egalitarian, relational model persuasive. Others may not acknowledge the science of challenges such as global climate change, or may use the language of "dominion" or believe that God would not allow humans to destroy the earth.

Absent data specific to the diocese, it may be reasonable to think that its membership reflects general divisions in the United States on environmental issues such as climate change and worldwide loss of biodiversity. In ongoing research begun in 2009, the Yale Program on Climate Change Communication has identified "Six Americas" regarding climate opinion, ranging from "alarmed" to "dismissive."

Texas Episcopalians may represent a similar range. It's important that any formation effort in Texas take into account these differences and endeavor to understand with love and respect the parish "audience," while not minimizing the theological underpinnings or urgent, practical demands of transformative Creation Care. This may be especially important in geographic areas where employment in fossil fuels industries is significant.

Although not specific to Episcopalians, a study of Texas voters in 2019 found that majorities recognize the impact climate change is having throughout the state. Two-thirds noted that climate change is having an effect on agriculture and extreme weather in the state. Nearly six in ten (59%) said climate change is affecting the health of Texans; 54% said climate change is affecting the state's economy. In addition, respondents expressed support for government action on climate change at the federal (69%) and state (70%) levels, and 68% wanted their member of Congress to do more about climate change

Specific to Episopalians, a task force survey of parish priests in the Diocese of Texas makes clear the interest of parish priests in Creation Care. Of nine areas of concern, the top three (in descending order) were (1) education and formation, (2) energy bills and energy resilience, and (3) general maintenance and system upgrades. Most respondents expressed high interest in receiving educational resources about Creation Care, and several offered summaries of their congregation's current work in this area.

As also noted below, Creation Care is a pastoral care issue, one which will become more important as extreme weather events contribute to the anxiety, sadness, and grief associated with change and loss.

b. Beyond Texas: Where Churches Are

If scientific consensus and legal actions aren't adequate to address environmental problems, and since the Episcopal Church has committed to Creation Care as a manifestation of love for God, our church has an important role in nurturing a fuller understanding of the human place in the natural world.

This might seem challenging, considering research suggesting that members of non-Christian religions and those who identify with no religion express the most concern about climate change.

It's tempting to wonder if this is in part because nearly half of those regularly attending religious services report never hearing climate change brought up from the pulpit.

This avoidance in turn may be related to political polarization; Pew Research Center senior researcher Becky Alper notes that the main driver of U.S. public opinion about climate change is "political party, not religion." (ibid., Pew Research, 2022.)

A non-religious but widespread belief about climate change and others' concern about it may also be relevant to a lack of discussion in churches and elsewhere; in what is sometimes called a "false social reality," while some 72% of Americans say they are concerned about climate change, the same respondents think that only 52% of those around them share this concern.

Among others who have written about spiritual correlates of climate change, Hannah Malcolm, an Anglican deacon and environmentalist, has pointed out a tendency in the church to attend to large issues like Creation Care in a piecemeal or one-off manner–e.g., with occasional references to "bits" of Scripture, designating a parish Earth Day for community clean-up, or committing to reducing campus energy use–and then to lose interest or momentum.

While this may be a natural part of the life of churches concerned with numerous needs, this approach likely will not contribute to meaningful change for individual Episcopalians or for Creation. A structured curriculum that is flexible and grounded in clear, current theology and science, and that envisions Creation Care as ongoing and as an integral part of Christian identity may offer a way to effect more lasting change.

c. A Curriculum for Change

As testament to the theological respectability of rethinking humanity's place with Creation, a number of religious groups have developed curricula to promote greater awareness of and responses to the current crises. The Episcopal Church, as a part of its core ministry of Creation Care, in June of 2024 issued a curriculum, "Love God, Love God's World" for use in parishes. The Diocese of Western Massachusetts offers "An Episcopal Path to Creation Justice." The SALT project, a production company that creates thoughtful tools for use in churches, has developed a seven-week program, "Climate and Faith: How We Can Help Meet the Greatest Challenge in Human History". Any of these curricula is adaptable and flexible enough to be appropriate for a variety of participants, can serve as a basis for formation in at least some Texas parishes, and will be described more fully in the Recommendations section.

A number of dioceses and parishes in different parts of the country also have active programs related to Creation Care, e.g., The Diocese of Kansas, The Diocese of Massachusetts, The Diocese of Western Massachusetts, and St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle. Some of these have full-time or part-time staff, lay or clergy, to coordinate these programs. (It should be noted that at least one other mission of the Church, Social Justice and Engagement, is strongly related to the mission of Creation Care and is an integral component of the three curricula mentioned in the Recommendations section).

Whether or not a parish is implementing a formal curriculum, social science research about climate and other environmental concerns offers some general guidance for communicating about these issues. In her 2024 book, *Not the End of the World*, Hannah Ritchie with the Programme on Global Development at the University of Oxford notes that effective communication on the issue of climate change requires "understand[ing] what different people care about and tailoring the message, and the message needs to be true."

Katharine Hayhoe, climate scientist and evangelical Christian, frequently makes a similar point, noting that for many Americans, including Christians, opinions about topics like climate change reflect political affiliation rather than consideration of theology or science. She cites social science research and her own experience to emphasize the importance of avoiding argument and political discussion in favor of finding commonalities in what people love and care about, and to focus on local concerns such as water scarcity rather than what can seem like remote and abstract challenges.

Hayhoe's work consulting with communities throughout Texas makes her a particularly compelling resource.

In addition to effective communication, robust social psychology research suggests that change can be facilitated by social influence. Essentially this means that individuals are moved to act in ways that they see others act, especially respected or valued others. Exposure to climate-positive actions such as installing solar panels or supporting responsible public policy can move less committed relatives, friends and neighbors to follow suit.

In addition, empirically validated models of change in psychology strongly support the need to understand where on the continuum of change individuals are, and to meet them there with appropriate information and ways to engage. This, as well as the diversity in the diocese and especially parishioners' different locations on the "six Americas" continuum, means that a single curriculum is unlikely to be appropriate for all parishes, and must be adaptable. At the same time, consistency in basic areas covered, such as the following, is important for creating a common basis for conversation and understanding, regardless of whether a curriculum or a less structured approach is followed.

• A **theological** understanding of the spiritual relationship between humans and the rest of Creation. In part this is to normalize the process of *change* in the way the Church understands the world, or to recognize that the church has not been static in its view of important issues such as slavery, human sexuality, and women's place in the church. As Malcolm notes, "Good theology rewrites the stories we tell about ourselves."

Moreover, a consideration of current scholarship in this area may prompt deeper questioning as well as action about a Christian approach to Creation Care. (see, for example, Armstrong, K (2022), *Sacred Nature: Restoring our Ancient Bond with the Natural World*. New York: Alfred A Knopf; Bauckham, R. In July, 2018, Bishop Michael Curry summarized his understanding of the human relationship to the natural world. In remarks at the National Cathedral on the fiftieth anniversary of the Apollo 8 mission, he noted, "Deep in the fabric of this creation, we are a part of it. Not the sum total of it. To put it another way, it's not all about us....We were made for God, each other and this creation." As an adolescent might say, we aren't the boss of it.

This more expansive, less human-centered understanding may not have reached all the pews. As noted above, a 2022 study found that nearly half of regular church attendees never hear climate changes raised in preaching.

This may suggest that clergy feel inadequately informed or perhaps just reluctant to raise a potentially divisive topic. It may also suggest the need for an expanded definition of pastoral care. "Ecological chaplain" Jason Brown sees his role as including both pastoral and action-oriented elements, noting that " 'I believe we need to sit with places that are being transformed by climate change, seek the contemplative depths of our relationship with the world, learn spiritual practices, and do whatever we can with whoever we can to act, defend, and transform the planet'."

Clergy from other faith traditions make similar points. For example, Rabbi Dean Shapiro observes that "It is our sacred duty [as clergy] to help people process complicated feelings and choices through informed pastoral counseling and thoughtful ritual. When we do, we help light the way forward."

Episcopal priest Margaret Bullitt-Jonas observes that effective preaching about climate justice can "push back against helplessness,...make space for grief,...connect deeply with Christian faith ... by convey[ing] God's unbounded love for God's people and for the whole Creation, ...and include at least one thing to do."

Episcopal priest Fletcher Harper notes that religious leaders have an obligation to address head-on the suffering caused by climate change and to make the case for an appropriately compassionate response.

• The **science** of a changing earth. As Hayhoe repeatedly notes, "Climate is changing, humans are responsible, the impacts are serious, and there are solutions—if we act now."

While focusing only on the facts of environmental challenges-extreme weather events, loss of biodiversity, and implications for all life forms and the human role in these changes- is not the best way to promote changed hearts and minds or useful action, familiarity with the data that undergirds the scientific consensus is useful in a cultural environment of "zombie arguments"--those that "just won't die, no matter how thoroughly they're debunked." (Hayhoe, p.38). The Yale group in 2013 found that while 70% of Texans believed that the earth was warming, only 44% of those believed human action to be the primary cause.

In addition, some Christians may be reassured to consider that climate science is an area where theology and science are complementary rather than contradictory.

• The **emotional** correlates of poor Creation Care. Climate writer Eve Andrews notes that there is "both a mental toll and an emotional reckoning" that come with realizing the impacts of the human transformation of the plant and the limited time left to mitigate the damage.

Growing psychological research confirms both the emotional value of time spent in the natural world, and the emotional distress related to its degradation.

As noted above, clergy experience and observe this distress, too. Hannah Malcolm makes the point that climate or ecological grief may not only call for a pastoral response, but may also serve as a "form of knowledge" about ourselves and our relation to the world and to God; there may be a deeply spiritual reason that we grieve the loss of a dying natural world, or what David Attenborough calls the "garden of Eden" of the Holocene.

Psychologist Wendy Greenspun, a board member of the Climate Psychology Alliance – North America, suggests that addressing mental health issues must go beyond individual therapy to include collective forms of care. "Clinicians will probably need to get more involved with building community sources of resilience," she said on a recent Alliance podcast, "empowering people within communities who are already the natural leaders, who know the culture of that community, to be able to apply some of their skills to emergent crises that are coming up." (cited in Randall, R. ibid.)

This echoes the observation of Bill McKibbon noted earlier. Churches are well suited to lead and participate in these community endeavors.

The practical implications of a deeper theological, scientific, and emotional understanding. With greater awareness of the preceding topics, parishioners may ask how we are to live more lovingly, hopefully, and responsibly with Creation: as Christian individuals, as citizens, and in community. How should we eat, dress, travel, design and inhabit our living spaces, raise our children, invest our money, exercise political influence, understand and care for our emotions and each other's? How should we work to influence institutions such as our churches, neighborhoods, workplaces and governments to act with appropriate, effective attention to the Creation crises we face? Encouraging discernment about such questions is to invite both spiritual growth and the healing of Creation, and should be a part of any effective approach to formation.

The formation recommendations that follow, while not exhaustive, attempt to incorporate the above elements from both an individual and community perspective, offering suggestions for the Diocese as well as parishes.

5.4 Recommendations

As Episcopalians, we believe that our relationship with God's creation is sacred, and that what we do to "the least of these" is felt in the heart of God.

The love of our neighbor in all its fullness simply means being able to say to him, 'What are you going through?''

With respect to what follows, it's important to note that individual parishioners can take many actions, large and small, to support Creation Care, and through that, add to their spiritual growth and the well-being of the natural world. Rather than enumerating specifics like shunning meat or gas-powered cars, recommendations in this report focus on ways in which the diocesan office and its parishes can provide leadership and foster engagement that ultimately contributes to climate justice and the greater health of God's world.

a. For the diocese

The following recommendations suggest how the Diocese of Texas can offer broad support of Christian formation related to Creation. These include direct

encouragement and funding of programs specifically intended for the formation and education of individuals, as well as ways to model or set a visible example of love for Creation in the diocese and beyond.

a: Invite implementation of a Creation Care curriculum of sufficient breadth and depth to be adaptable by a wide variety of parishes in the diocese.

As mentioned earlier in this section, SALT, the Episcopal Church, and the Diocese of Western Massachusetts offer curricula that may be usable by many Texas parishes. Summaries of these three curricula follow:

a. "Climate and Faith: How We Can Help Meet the Greatest Challenge in Human History": Summary

Perhaps the most broadly usable curriculum that best embodies the four elements mentioned in the preceding section was developed by SALT, a not-for-profit production company cofounded by Matthew Myer Boulton, a teacher of theology at Harvard Divinity School. It offers a number of devotionals on a broad range of topics for use throughout the Church year. "Climate and Faith" is a comprehensive but blessedly succinct "love-and-act" devotional that can be completed over a seven-week period or adapted for a one-or two-day retreat. Each of the seven sections follows a structure of Read (a brief piece of scripture), Reflect (on the scripture, using the suggested commentary), Pray, Practice (using journaling and discussion), and Plan (moving with concrete steps into a time-sensitive action plan created by each participant by the end of the seven weeks). These steps are taken with the support of a group, and easily could be used in a very small parish or, by forming multiple groups, a very large one. In addition, a youth group or family could easily use the material.

Several features distinguish this curriculum from the other two described below: It's immediately quite engaging, both in its clear language and expressive graphics; there isn't too much introductory material to wade through, as the writing embodies the virtues of clarity and brevity. Mirroring the thoughts of Gus Speth, cofounder of the Natural Resources Defense Council quoted at the beginning of this section, it gives explicit attention to the big picture of needed change in the culture and what the authors call "big systems." It's unique in offering practice items specifically for families, which may make it more broadly appealing and ultimately more effective. There is a judicious mix of theology, science, practical considerations, thoughtful discussion questions, and links to additional resources, offering enough material to inform and stimulate but not to overwhelm. And while the devotional relies on scripture as its starting point, it is also undergirded by familiarity with social science research about change.

A digital copy for personal use is available for \$10, and the maximum cost is a modest \$60 for use in a congregation of more than 500.

b. "Love God, Love God's World": Summary

This curriculum became available following the 2024 General Convention. It comprises three sections, (1) What is God's Dream, (2) Truth-Telling, and (2) Restoring the Covenant, Repairing the Earth. Each topic is covered in three sessions with a discrete emphasis, but all are broadly oriented to fleshing out the framework of the Creation Care Covenant adopted by the church in 2019. Rather than the single-voice approach of Sacred Ground, this curriculum features a different author for each session; there is diversity in the writers' geographic location, as well as their theological background and role in the church.

Each session of 75-90 minutes is to be hosted as a small group or "circle" of 8-12 members, and there is an expectation that participants will familiarize themselves with the suggested background resources to prepare for each meeting. The sessions have the same structure, moving from prayer and scripture to group check-in, a reflection by the author, questions for discussion, check-out and closing prayer. Most session guides conclude with "action opportunities" related to the session focus. The suggestions are varied enough in breadth for participants at any stage of understanding, resources, or commitment. A few examples of suggested action are: additional reading, using self-assessment tools to help discern a direction for action, exploring an unfamiliar aspect of the natural world, and meeting with public officials about policy. Each session guide includes material such as films and readings, prayers from various liturgies, and reflections to enrich members' intellectual and affective understanding. These offer what for some will be novel ways in which to consider and experience relations among God, the individual and the broader natural world.

In addition to this focused content, guidance on establishing group norms is offered in Session One, and there is a separate facilitator's guide to help group hosts prepare for the sessions. The Episcopal Church also offers thorough and very helpful guidance on the group process, in "Building Intentional Small Groups." (https://www.episcopalchurch.org/way-of-love/building-intentional-small-groups/.)

Observations: With respect to **content**, there is no discussion of whether the world faces environmental crises, though there is occasional acknowledgement

that it does. The emphasis of the curriculum is not on reviewing the science, but on contemplating how as Christians we are called to live as a part of Creation, how well we are listening to that call, and how we might shift in order better to heed it. In addition, the materials try to raise awareness of non-human aspects of nature, and encourage consideration of God-given resources as something other than commodities.

While there is no overtly political content, attention to such topics as indigenous understandings of humans' place in the natural world, environmental justice, and the needs of climate refugees may sound political to some. When in Session 6 Rev. Acosta observes that "[f]or the first time, humanity finds itself compelled to stop, or at least decrease, its consumerist, predatory race that has been unleashed mainly since the Industrial Revolution and that has led the planet, in less than 300 years, to a brink of a new cataclysm," some Texans may applaud his clarity, while others may be put off by a questioning of some traditional Western cultural values. As with any teaching endeavor, knowing one's "audience" and being prepared for a variety of reactions are crucial for a successful group experience.

With respect to content quantity, this curriculum is not for the faint of heart. There is in each session far more material than can be meaningfully covered or discussed. In one sense this is useful, giving the group host latitude to choose what may fit for that group. In another way, though, the inclusion of so much demonstrates the overwhelming nature of today's information culture, and the host should take care not to contribute to what participants may already experience as a need to master more facts or a sense that the challenges are too big to address.

With respect to **process**, the curriculum favors a story-telling emphasis intended to foster relationships. This can contribute to a sense of commonality and community, stimulate introspection, and nurture the courage required for action. All of these are positive effects. However, this approach also requires a skillful host attentive to common group process issues such as "oversharing," a particularly negative voice, or strong reactions to some session materials. Parishioners with a more academic orientation might appreciate supplementing the story approach with more reading and discussion related to current theological thinking about the human place in Creation.

c. "An Episcopal Path to Creation Justice":

This curriculum ("The Path") was developed by the Creation Care Justice Network of the Dioceses of Massachusetts and Western Massachusetts. Designed to be a six-month program, ideally beginning in October, it was piloted in 2023 with 12 parishes in Massachusetts, Vermont, and Maine. The response was uniformly positive. In the fall of 2024 the program was opened to parishes in Province 1, and there are plans to make it more widely available in 2025. Rev. Rachel Field, who coordinates the program, was kind enough to share materials from the program, some of which are included in the Appendix.

The program is guided by Four Pillars: Pray, Learn, Act, Advocate, indicating a dual focus on both formation and action in the service of creation justice. Each of the four areas is featured on a grid with descriptions of four levels of commitment and space to determine current parish participation in creation-related activities. A trained "companion" meets monthly with a small core group from the parish, guiding them through the grid, helping to identify strengths, troubleshoot barriers, and providing resources as appropriate. The companion could be a lay person or clergy and need not be a member of the parish. This six-month process of working through the grid is basically a guided self-study of a parish's understanding and intention regarding creation care. It emphasizes being thorough (acknowledging even small steps being taken and all available resources), identifying any "charism" or area of particular gift and interest in the parish, and determining future commitments.

Though similar to "Love God, Love God's World" in its assumption that potential participants will be at different levels of commitment to change, The Path does assume some initial level of understanding of and engagement in Creation Care issues, and a commitment to meaningful action. Therefore, in an effort to avoid distraction or a sense of being overwhelmed, The Path's creators purposely avoided including too much information to master or discuss. (The Companion has access to extensive resources that can be shared as appropriate). In addition, The Path is clear in its intention to help parishes create a space where creation care is not just occasional programming, but a way of life and a fundamental aspect of a parish's identity. It also explicitly uses a "train-the-trainers" model, to avoid adding another expectation to the already-busy job of parish priests.

Implementation:

Because the purpose of formation is change, and change is difficult, implementation of a curriculum should be sensitive to how an invitation to Creation Care may be received. One initial approach is for the Diocese to support interested parishes in piloting one of the curricula and then gathering feedback about the process. Another approach would be similar to that used with Unity in Mission, with the Diocese inviting parishes individually to consider how or even whether to offer a curriculum to parishioners, perhaps via the vestry or an *ad hoc* group. With either of these (or with another approach), positive communication about the purpose and scope of the invitation should be clear. Projects described in other sections of this report also offer logical opportunities for formation, even if not defined as such. For example, publicized opportunities to help prepare buildings for more extreme climate events, or the appearance of EV chargers on parish grounds may prompt curiosity about why we're doing these things. Social influence theory suggests that such curiosity may pave the way to openness to more explicit formation activities.

As with any curriculum, it's crucial to bear in mind that implementation is not an end in itself. In keeping with what Hannah Malcolm has suggested, it's possible to "check the box" of curriculum or class completion without making meaningful change. Creating accountability groups may be one way to encourage continuous engagement in the Creation Care process.

Summary of Outcomes:

Although the three curricula summarized above feature some clear differences in focus, the desired outcomes and possible challenges of implementing either are likely to be similar. Broadly put, a richer spiritual understanding of the human place in creation, greater awareness of current environmental challenges, and effective action to mitigate these are desired outcomes of a formation program.

Measuring the impact of interventions and programs for changing hearts and minds or increasing spiritual growth is notoriously difficult. It is possible, though, to assess interest in a Creation Care curriculum by tracking the number of participants, especially over time, assuming the program is offered as an ongoing activity. A simple evaluation tool could be constructed for use at the completion of either curriculum. More difficult to measure, and perhaps more important, is the spiritual growth of parishioners and their active engagement in Creation Care in daily life. The appearance of more initiatives at the parish level and more inquiries to the diocesan office may be indirect measures of increased commitment. Assessing outcomes potentially is more concrete with The Path, since the sixmonth process is documented on the grid as work progresses. Similarly, "Climate and Faith" concludes with each participant having an action plan, the implementation of which could be reviewed over time.

Possible Roadblocks:

Roadblocks may include the resistance to change that usually accompanies a shift in institutional priorities or the perceived expectation that attitudes or behavior *should* shift. In addition, ambivalence about church involvement in what some see only as a political or "culture war" issue may be a source of resistance. Some may believe that better Creation Care is insufficient to address the urgency of climate change, while others may perceive no urgency. Further, if materials are not thoughtfully chosen to meet participants more or less where they are, there is a risk of losing those primed for action, as well as the more skeptical or reluctant. Another possible difficulty is the expectation in the curricula that the primary work is done by lay people rather than clergy. Choosing appropriate leaders, either hosts or companions, is crucial; sensitive listening, genuine curiosity, and familiarity with group processes are necessary. Ongoing communication and evaluation with parish clergy leaders are also important for successful implementation of either curriculum.

Observations from individuals in and outside of Texas, as well as research from climate scientists and environmentalists who are also Christians, suggest that thoughtful, evidence-based strategies mentioned in the Introduction can help to work effectively with those resistant to or ambivalent about change.

b: Provide regular continuing education and other resources for parish priests on Creation Care.

As mentioned in the introduction to this section of the report, surveyed priests in the Diocese of Texas expressed high interest in receiving educational resources about Creation Care. A possible response to this interest could be provided by offering what is basically eco-formation for priests. One approach to this is to make Creation Care the theme of the annual Clergy Conferences at Camp Allen, offering not only relevant information, but also opportunities for sharing parish progress and challenge, and demonstrating that Creation Care is a priority for the Diocese. Topics to address might include:

a. Explanation of what the Diocese of Texas is offering to support parish priests in their Creation Care goals, e.g., access to curricula, ongoing communication, and consultation from Diocese personnel such as the Canon for Formation; and an explanation of recommendations in this report and the incentives available to help implement them;

b. How to establish or work with existing parish Creation Care teams or environmental guilds, including consideration of difficulties that might arise;

c. How to understand and address ecological anxiety/grief or other climate trauma—their own and that of parishioners;

d. Encouragement, through funding and publicizing, of training in eco-preaching and other pastoral activities related to creation. Groups offering such training include Creation Justice Ministries, Lexington Seminary, The BTS Center, and Deep Green Faith. There are also examples in the Episcopal Church podcast, "Prophetic Voices": Preaching And Teaching Beloved Community." (<u>https://media.episcopalchurch.org/podcasts/show/prophetic-voices-preaching-and-teaching-beloved-community/</u>)

Implementation: Education could include programing speakers such as clinician and writer Thomas Doherty or other psychologists who engage in clinical work and research on the emotional correlates of environmental disruption; Hannah Malcolm, Anglican theologian; Margaret Bullitt-Jonas, Episcipal priest and environmental leader; Tony Baker, theologian at Seminary of the Southwest; Katharine Hayhoe, Christian climate scientist and tireless communicator; and clergy from various traditions who have made Creation Care a priority in their ministries. Speakers might also be identified through a number of organizations dedicated to interfaith work on environmental justice, including The National Religious Partnership for the Environment. Experts on topics relevant to parishes, such as solar panels, more efficient use of water and energy, electric car charging stations, and green grounds maintenance might also be included.

Desired outcomes:

Parish priests who are knowledgeable about appropriate resources and confident about working effectively with a range of concerns and priorities among parishioners can make a substantive contribution to parishioners' spiritual development and resilience and to effective climate engagement. Their commitment can change the experience of those who note little reference to environmental issues from the pulpit, deepening parishioners' spiritual understandings and actions, and leading by example.

Possible roadblocks:

Simply put, parish priests are busy, and some may not feel able to take on another task. Others may struggle to share formation tasks with laity, or be reluctant to lead on an issue that was largely absent from their training. That this issue may stir disagreement within a parish could make it even less appealing. These legitimate concerns make clear the need for diocesan support, encouragement, and education as priests face new pastoral care tasks in a shifting natural and cultural environment.

c. Establish Camp Allen as an example of loving Creation Care for the diocese and beyond. Establish a timeframe and priorities for the work.

Overview: Camp Allen is a remarkable and loved resource for the Diocese, with its 1,100 acres of forests and the ability to host more than 60,000 guests per year. During research for this report, one task force member heard positive accounts

and fond memories from Texas Episcopalians, as well as from nature-lovers from Vermont to California (literally).

In recent years, Camp Allen has made a number of upgrades to its air conditioning and irrigation systems, and its education offerings. Infusing such improvements in the future with a more explicit commitment to efficient use of energy and water, land management, food production and consumption, green building, and spiritual development could declare the Diocese's commitment to responsible Creation Care and provide visitors with an even richer spiritual and educational experience.

Implementation: This is a project with broad scope, requiring expertise and thoughtful planning in areas as disparate as agriculture, architecture, water conservation, land management and landscape design, food preparation, environmental regulation, waste management, communication, and spiritual development. While this may seem daunting, it also provides numerous opportunities, large and small, for action. A detailed plan is beyond the scope of this report; however, a sense of what might be involved in an ecological site assessment to guide the work is included in a section of the Formation Appendix, Blackland Collaborative Draft Proposal. Other sections of this report also contain valuable information about actions that Camp Allen could consider, such as water and energy audits, and exploration of incentives for improvements such as those in the Inflation Reduction Act. Regardless of the scope of any changes, the executive director and board of directors of Camp Allen will need to be actively involved from the outset.

Desired Outcomes:

Successful implementation of more deliberately sound ecological practices, in addition to those already being pursued, would (a) demonstrate to the Episcopal community in Texas and beyond a spiritual and financial commitment to Creation Care; (b) offer all visitors to Camp Allen, through example and didactic and experiential offerings, encouragement to deepen their engagement with Creation and move toward a more loving interaction with it; (c) ensure, through improvements to the landscape and buildings, that Camp Allen operates as efficiently and economically as possible as it moves toward greater sustainability; (d) provide opportunities for members of parishes throughout the diocese to learn about and contribute to the development of Camp Allen, and to share their experiences with their parish communities.

<u>Possible Roadblocks</u>: A comprehensive plan for ecological design will be expensive and time-consuming to implement, and require thoughtful consideration of priorities. Leadership from the Diocese and Camp Allen, and a supportive board will be essential, as will strong diocesan commitment. Similar major urban

projects such as the Houston Arboretum and Nature Center and the Dell Medical District at UT Austin may demonstrate what can be done with much less property than Camp Allen has, as does the Alice L. Walton School of Medicine in Bentonville, Arkansas; "field trips" to such sites may offer inspiration to planners.

d. Develop the courtyard outside the diocesan offices to reflect loving, responsible urban green space planning.

Another opportunity for a public diocesan commitment to Creation Care lies just outside the Houston diocesan office. Currently most of the area is planted in nonnative grass that provides no support for insects, birds, or native plants and pollinators. A plan to improve this, developed by aHouston landscape architect, already exists. In 2021 as part of its own process to research campus "greening," Christ Church Cathedral, located across the street from the diocesan office, examined the viability of an urban garden. Though the space was insufficient for that, a parish task force commissioned a plan for gardening changes in parts of the space, emphasizing native plants and pollinators.

Desired Outcomes: This is "low-hanging fruit." It's a project that should not take long to implement or require a large financial commitment, given that planning wouldn't have to start from scratch, so it offers the chance to make a statement that could coincide with the beginning of other recommendations in this report. It would enhance the visual appeal of the space, continue to provide seating for downtown workers and residents, and create a space for beneficial plants and insects. It can also serve as an educational tool for students in nearby schools and churches.

Possible Roadblocks and Implementation: The Cathedral would need to share its plan (not likely to be a problem), and there probably would need to be a small committee formed, with diocesan and parish representation, to recommend how best to develop the space not covered in the landscaping plan, how or whether to divide the costs, and how to maintain the space. It's possible that some Cathedral members or diocesan staff initially might not welcome a space less tailored or traditional looking.

e. Authorize the use of "The Season of Creation Celebration Guide for Episcopal Parishes."

This guide was developed for use in 2024 by the Rev. John Elliott Lein and the Rev. Dr. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas to offer special liturgies for the Season of Creation that is celebrated internationally, and to suggest how Sunday liturgies and prayers might more fully reflect what the guide calls "the whole Gospel for the whole world."

It was authorized for use in at least forty-two diocesan jurisdictions for the fall of 2024. Parts of the liturgy are included in the Formation Appendix.

Desired Outcomes: Including more explicit references to the created world in liturgy may be especially useful in helping to preclude what Hannah Malcolm calls the "piecemeal" approach often taken by the church to Creation Care, and to keeping the focus on the theological rather than cultural or political considerations.

Possible Roadblocks: While some parishioners enjoy the experience of a broader liturgy, others resist the introduction of the new. It may be helpful to offer a Creation liturgy at some rather than all services, and to educate congregations about the rationale for changes.

For Parishes:

1. After careful preparation and selection of lay leaders, and with clergy support, implement one of the curricula described above, adapting as appropriate.

Desired Outcomes: For parishes, the result of successful and possibly ongoing use of an appropriate creation care curriculum would be similar to what is described in the diocesan section. Both the spiritual growth of parishioners and their active engagement in an array of earth-nurturing activities would be notable.

Possible Roadblocks: These also would be similar to those described in the diocesan section. Given the possibility of disagreement in a parish, thorough preparation by both clergy and lay leaders, including a clear rationale, will be important.

2. Develop classes or other projects specific to parish interests.

Formation efforts for interested parishioners needn't require the use of a formal curriculum. Course material is available from a wide variety of religious and secular sources. One example: St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle, with its Creation Care program begun and developed by lay leaders, has done an admirable job of developing a wide variety of ways to engage parishioners, including regular newsletters, monthly "climate conversations" that focus on practical ways to live with a reduced environmental impact on topics such as fashion and food waste, and working with the vestry to create a plan for a net zero campus by 2030. The communication with parishioners is regular and engaging.

3. Consider adopting the practice of a Green Sabbath.

Both secular and religious sources have pointed out the appeal and benefits of truly resting one day a week, a practice that at minimum could curb emissions and consumption.

(This practice could also be appropriate for a parish using a curriculum, as could many other additions).

5.5 Summary of Outcomes

Successful implementation of recommendations in this section can move the Diocese of Texas toward a greater spiritual maturity of its parishioners and clergy, a more visible leadership role in responsible Creation Care, and a more loving relationship with one another and with the rest of Creation. The last of these may be both the most important and the most difficult. Implementing an ambitious Creation Care program requires an atmosphere or culture of curiosity and trust, often in short supply in our very polarized times, so implicit in all the recommendations is the nurturing creation of that counter-culture within the Church. But completing recommendations is not the desired outcome. Adopting a curriculum, for example, is not an end in itself, as that risks relegating Creation Care to exercises done once and perhaps resurrected on Earth Day. Rather, the recommendations are intended to invite continuous creation of both a process and a product that reflect loving and theologically informed action with one another and the rest of the natural world. The ultimate outcome is a changed way of life, in which we embody a loving, hopeful, and sustainable relationship to the human and non-human in creation, and creation care is an integral part of our diocesan identity.

5.6 Conclusion

Scientific consensus and recent theological scholarship support a reconsideration of the human place in the created world. The church, with its commitment to community, social justice, and caring for "the least," is well suited to nurture its members and the larger society toward a more loving and just relation with one another and our common home, and to do this with appropriate haste. Visible steps that the Diocese of Texas can take to promote this eco-formation include encouraging parishes to adopt an existing formation curriculum to encourage parishioners' spiritual growth and practical action, providing ongoing training and other resources to priests to strengthen their ability to deal with the spiritual and emotional challenges of parishioners, and implementing thoughtful plans for the loving care of diocesan natural resources such as Camp Allen.

6. INCENTIVES AND PROGRAMS

6.1 Purpose.

This section will highlight the need for and potential opportunities for incentivizing and funding the activities proposed in the previous sections. In order for many of these activities to be achieved, financial incentives, tools, programs, and partnerships are necessary such that we may continue to make use of available resources both inside and outside the Diocese.

6.2 Framing the Problem.

As we adapt to changing climate conditions and aim to mitigate both cause and effect - behavioral and technological considerations working in tandem will carve paths of resiliency. In order for this to succeed, two things (generally speaking) must be true: 1) there is a desire to participate in this work of Creation Care and 2) there are sufficient resources of support (either internally or externally) to finance and manage such projects. The presence of this document speaks to the first point, and this section of the document hopes to provide insights for the second. Several of the roadblocks that are presented previously may be overcome with appropriate access to professional and financial resources.

Many of the projects undertaken by the diocese and individual congregations will require significant financial contributions either upfront or over the lifespan of the activity. In addition to the financial need, there is a need for some form of a project manager or dedicated staff to oversee and help guide projects and funding. There is a vast expanse of opportunities at various levels - with programs, grants, and incentives being created and closing on a constant rolling basis. As an example, while researching incentives, there were at least 5 relevant program submissions that had just recently closed or would be closing by the time this document is submitted. Some of these are hopefully going to reopen in the next fiscal year - but there is no set date or season that Funding Opportunity Announcements (FOAs) are made or due. This challenge of locating opportunities is large enough on its own. Major challenges come even after opportunities have been identified particularly when considering the work that goes into writing grants, managing paperwork, organizing deliverables, and ensuring projects are actually completed. This seems to be one of the largest challenges facing the diocese in the roll out of activities aligned with the topics presented earlier in this document.

6.3 Background.

Herein, a resource catalog of financial incentives is provided. The incentives are organized in "tiers" based on the institutional level they are offered from - Federal, State, Private, or Diocesean. This organizational methodology was selected as it quickly became clear that several incentive programs would/could apply to multiple of the topics addressed in this document. Rather than organize by topical incentive and have redundancy of programs, incentive summaries are presented by at which level they are available. This also streamlined research, as focusing on one level

(such as Federal) allowed for connected programs and government organizations to be more easily identified and cataloged together.

In the catalog below, only currently active or relatively active incentives were included. In the Appendices, there is a longer list of websites that provide links to information on previous opportunities that have either closed or will close by the time this document is completed. As stated earlier, there is not a formal season or date range of FOAs. So it does not make sense to include programs that are providing funding for 2025, as the applications are all either closed or closing before December 2024. Additionally, funding opportunities for late 2025 and 2026 will not likely post FOAs until after the start of 2025. Because of this constant turnover, and the desire for this resource to be useful past a single granting year, the focus of provided incentives was limited to long term active programs with a history of annual funding or are established programs with an end date well into the future. However, in order to maintain the resources collected during the research, the Appendix will also provide links to all found resources, current and expired, as well as general repositories that provide up to date lists of funding opportunities or specifically relevant websites that host their own current updates of funding announcements.

Each incentive will be named within its tier and provide high level information that is useful in helping the audience identify the applicability of the incentive, as well as a brief summary of what it can/would provide to participants. Additionally, they will have a classification of "Parish" or "Diocese" or both to indicate if the incentive is accessible to individual congregations or is something the larger diocese would need to pursue itself. The relevant topics and key dates will be provided as well. Please see the attached Appendices for links to information as well.

6.4 Incentives

a. Federal Support

Currently, most federal opportunities are present in the Inflation Reduction Act and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. These laws have allocated funding either directly to individuals, businesses, and nonprofit entities, or have allocated funds to existing agencies in the federal government to dispense as grants. Majority of the funds currently available to dispense as grants are targeted towards state, local, and tribal governments. In some occasions, nonprofits or other community groups may apply to a state, local, or tribal recipient as a subaward after they have initially received their own funds. This may be an opportunity for partnerships where others have received fundings (such as a research institution or local government). The grants that are eligible for nonprofits are typically part of a funding cycle, which at present (Summer 2024) is closed. In the fall of 2024, more funding opportunities may be announced for FY25. Another key role of a Diocese staff position may be following federal Notice of Funding Opportunities (NOFOs). The appendices also will provide resources for where to look for NOFOs, particularly ones that have had previous year funding in relevant topics and eligibility.

Between 2022 and 2035, the main source of federal incentive seems to be present in the Inflation Reduction Act

i. Inflation Reduction Act of 2022

- 1. Summary: As quoted from a White House release, "The Inflation Reduction Act is a transformative law that is helping the United States meet its climate goals and strengthen energy security, investing in America to create good-paying jobs, reducing energy and health care costs for families, and making the tax code fairer." More specifically within this document's context, the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) provides financial incentives to help individuals and organizations pursuing clean energy projects as well as energy efficiency upgrades. A major component of the IRA is the Direct Pay Provision which allows nonprofits to also benefit from the incentives despite being tax exempt. Nonprofits are eligible for a direct "cash" payment from the IRS when they complete their annual filing and report their activities. Projects such as solar installations, energy storage, upgrades to more energy efficient appliances, building efficiency, heat pumps, electrical panels, water efficiency, and many others are all within the umbrella of the IRA incentives and rebates program. There may be additional "stacking" incentives available for projects in areas that qualify as an "Energy Community" or a "Low Income Community", or for projects utilizing American Made products.
- Available to: Parish/Diocese These incentives (thanks to the Direct Pay Provision) are available to nonprofits. Individual parishes may benefit directly from the IRA in their own projects. The Diocese itself is also eligible to apply the IRA to projects funded directly through the diocese.
- **3.** *Related Topics:* Carbon Dependence, Disaster Preparedness, Water Supply
- 4. *Relevant timeline:* The Direct Pay Provision may take anywhere from 8 months - 18 months (depending on promptness of registering and reporting) to receive cash payment back. Additionally, some incentives in

the IRA are planned to be scaled down in the coming years. Specifically, the tax credit of 30% (such as seen with solar installations) will decrease to 26% for 2032-2033, then to 22% from 2033-2034, and then expire completely in 2035. As such - these incentives under the IRA are best pursued and completed prior to 2032.

ii. Community Change Grant

- 1. Summary: According the the EPA and the funding announcement - "EPA's new Environmental and Climate Justice Community Change Grants program (Community Change Grants) has announced a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for approximately \$2 billion dollars in Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) funds in environmental and climate justice activities to benefit disadvantaged communities through projects that reduce pollution, increase community climate resilience, and build community capacity to address environmental and climate justice challenges. These place-based investments will be focused on community-driven initiatives to be responsive to community and stakeholder input. They are designed to deliver on the transformative potential of the IRA for communities most adversely and disproportionately impacted by climate change, legacy pollution, and historical disinvestments". These Community Change Grants are specifically aimed at developing partnerships in communities to aim at resiliency opportunities in underserved areas. The focus areas include climate change and environmental issues, as related to the task force areas of focus. Rather than an incentive, this would be a grant application for a specific project, such as energy development, water access/distribution, pollution measures, community involvement, developing resilience hubs, community centers using solar, etc.
- 2. Available to: Parish/Diocese The eligible entities to apply must be two partnering community based nonprofits or a community based nonprofit partnering with a local government, Tribe, or higher education institution.

- **3.** *Related Topics:* Carbon Dependence, Disaster Preparedness, Water Supply, Sea level rise
- 4. *Relevant Timeline:* Currently (June 2024) this grant is on a rolling basis of applications with the final deadline being in late November 2024. However, following this grant lead past November 2024 may lead to notice of additional funding from the same pool or related grant opportunities. This is the first funding year of the Community Change Grants Program - and other grant programs of similar structure have additional announcements for new fiscal years of new application openings.
- iii. Emergency Management Baseline Assessment Grant Program
 - Summary: This is non disaster funding through FEMA to support the development, maintenance, and assessment of standards for emergency management. This grant program is to support voluntary national level standards and peer review processes to help communities identify capacity and shortfalls of emergency management programs. To be eligible: recipients must carry out Emergency Management Accreditation Program (EMAP) or Certified Emergency Manager Program (CEMP).
 - 2. Available to: Parish/Diocese technically available to nonprofits. The scale is likely more relevant to the Diocese as a whole. This also requires that the applicant have prior training under EMAP or CEMP.
 - 3. Related Topics: Disaster Preparedness
 - **4.** Relevant Timeline: Appears to be on an annual cycle. The program is 2 years long. The NOFO typically seems to be announced in the late spring/early summer of that FY.

iv. Public Assistance Program

 Summary: FEMA has added nonprofits (including houses of worship) to qualify for grant applications to the Public Assistance Program. This program provides grant aid in response to disasters to help with community recovery and response. This includes things such as restoring community services, debris removal, emergency protective measures, and hazard mitigation during recovery in preparation for future events. Organizations providing shelter during emergencies may be eligible for reimbursement from the federal government.

- 2. Available to: Diocese/Parish
- 3. Related Topics: Disaster Preparedness, Sea level rise
- **4.** Related Timeline: After a disaster event initial application usually must be within 30 days of the event

b. State of Texas Support

As states in the Federal Tier - many funding/incentive opportunities originate at federally and trickle down to states to dispense should they apply and receive these funds. As such - the availability of State resources is often very linked to federal programming. There are some such programs that have manifested in the State of Texas, in addition to other state initiatives. However, just as with federal - once funds go to the state level many are then further dispensed to cities/local communities. There are several ongoing programs in the State of Texas that do apply to nonprofits at large, however many cities have their own sources of funding. Some of the repositories for these opportunities are included below, although providing city level specific details is outside the scope of this document. Case by case bases may allow for further research using these initially present resources.

- i. Property Assessed Clean Energy Texas
 - 1. Summary: Property Assessed Clean Energy (TX-PACE) is a tool used to incentivize property owners to take on improvements to their buildings or facility infrastructure with little or no initial upfront capital. The main goal of these improvements is to improve energy efficiency and water conservation, as well as decrease energy consumption/demand. PACE is largely a financial tool to overcome the initial capital burden through loans that cover the useful life of the projects installed such that the utility savings typically exceeds the cost of the repayment.

- 2. Available to: Parish/Diocese this program has a "Commercial Real Property" level that applies to nonprofits and churches. Many regions of Texas already participate in the program. For regions that do not, an email is provided on the website to request the region be added to the program.
- 3. Related Topics: Carbon Dependence, Water Supply
- **4.** *Relevant Timeline:* There does not appear to be an initial timeline or application or availability. Loans are on a long term basis to repay the upgrades to facilities.
- ii. Texas Emissions Reduction Plan
 - 1. Summary: The Texas Emissions Reduction Plan (TERP) sets its main goals to reduce NOx emissions and improve air quality. Many of these activities ultimately also address carbon - as NOx emissions are typically from combustion of fossil fuels which also generate CO2. The TERP is focused (currently) on upgrades to vehicles and heavy duty equipment to reduce emissions. Some of the granting programs available in TERP address options for electric vehicle charging stations or fleet replacement to electric/hybrid models. None of the current programs are applicable to the diocese or parishes, but other programs or opportunities may arise out of TERP in the coming years.
 - 2. Available to: Currently not available to diocese or parish level may have availability in the future as program and grant offers continue to expand outside the county level.
 - 3. Related Topic: Carbon Dependence
 - **4.** Relevant Timeline: These grants seem to be available on a rolling basis. Check in or subscription to NOFOs may be beneficial

iii. Water Rebates - Texas Rebates and Incentives

- 1. Summary: This is a repository of various cities in Texas who offer or have offered some form of water conservation rebates/incentive programs. This is a resource that may be used on a case by case basis for the diocese or parishes to see what their immediate city has to offer programming wise. Although this is not a state level program, the cities often have received these funds from the state level initially. Many of the activities included are conservation programs, irrigation system check ups, indoor water surveys, and educational opportunities. Additional links to larger city specific programs have also been included in Appendix A.
- 2. Available to: Parish/Diocese generally related to the city in which the church or office resides in and receives its water. For cities not on this list a search independently of these cities may yield similar results.
- **3.** *Related Topics:* Water Supply
- **4.** *Relevant Timeline:* There does not appear to be any related timeframes.

c. Private Support

There are an abundance of private groups - both for profit and nonprofit - that have their own specific niches of service. Many are more known regionally, state specific, or even largely city specific resources. Those included here are from either initial research or from personnels networks of knowledge. This list likely could grow quite extensively - and for congregations it is likely to be in their best interest to contact or have help engaging with local community and grassroot organizations who are participating in similar efforts for the most contextualized and financially relevant support mechanisms. Additionally, some organizations that are non-state/federal but still widely known (such as Red Cross) have regional offices and representatives for dispersing information and partnership within their communities. This model makes it difficult to fully encapsulate these type resources herein. However, pursuing these relationships locally would likely result in increased resources for parishes and new opportunities for support and programming.

i. Ideal Impact

1. *Summary:* Ideal Impact is an organization whose mission is to increase energy savings for schools and

ministries. They conduct commercial energy audits/site analysis free of charge and nonbinding with the goal of finding low cost and no cost solutions without requiring major capital purchases for the clients to improve energy savings. Major upfront purchases are funded through Ideal Impact and paid back over term of use from the difference in energy savings.

- Available to: Diocese/Parish it is likely that a partnership could form for assessing diocesean buildings, offices, and parishes. Ideal Impact is based out of the DFW area but services Texas and Oklahoma.
- 3. Relevant Topics: Carbon Dependence
- **4.** Relevant Timeline: There seems to be no major timeline associated. Projects are aimed at short term returns.
- ii. Interfaith Power and Light
 - 1. Summary: This organization is well known and involved in the space of faith communities participating in Creation Care - specifically through energy efficiency and carbon reduction. In addition to their vast network of resources and information, they also offer incentive programs such as the Cool Congregations Program. This program challenges congregations to make energy improvements to decrease carbon footprint, improve community education, and save money. There are prizes for participants, certification processes, and start up kits for joining. This is one specific opportunity within Interfaith Power and Light, but this organization in general is highly involved in helping support congregations in decreasing their carbon footprint. They also have informational programs for other federal or private incentives and opportunities.
 - 2. Available to: Diocese/Parish
 - 3. Related Topic: Carbon Dependence

- **4.** *Relevant Timeline:* There does not seem to be time limitations for involvement in the Cool Congregations Program.
- iii. Green Business Certifications
 - 1. Summary: There are some cities that either within the city programming offices or in partnership with other community groups offer "Green Business" Certifications. This is a resource that is going to be city specific in availability - but one that congregations and the Diocesean offices can seek out within their communities for if the opportunity exists. These programs typically help you assess your current environmental impact from energy, water, and general sustainability practices and also offer various levels of certification that may be advertised or used to endorse a group to the community. They also typically supply local resources for improving sustainability practices, other partnerships, and support mechanisms. Examples within the Diocese of Texas include - Green Business Alliance (Waco), Green Business Leaders (Austin), Austin Energy Small Business Program (Austin), Green Business Partners (Fort Worth). Not all cities have a separate program from the City Sustainability Offices, which may house similar programs.
 - **2.** Available to: Diocese/Parish likely available in larger cities with programs for this nature of support.
 - **3.** *Related Topics*: Carbon Dependence, Water Supply, Formation, Disaster Preparedness
 - **4.** *Relevant Timeline:* City specific for any timeline considerations

iv. Texas Wellspring Fund

 Summary: This program offers funding to help address systematic water issues in communities and ecosystems within Texas. There is emphasis on collaboration and knowledge sharing with their network of parties to find effective water solutions in communities. The background of the funds comes from the Water Foundation and efforts to address Texas' increasing population, droughts, floods, and water quality/infrastructure issues.

- **2.** Available to: Unknown information on receiving funding/partnership seems to require direct solicitation
- 3. Related Topics: Water Supply
- 4. Relevant Timeline: Unknown

v. Capacity Building Program

- 1. Summary: This program is also supported through the Water Foundation, and seeks to help nonprofits with capacity building and resources for addressing water issues. There are two main components to this program, including The Capacity Strengthening Small Grants Project and The Organizational Capacity Building Project. The Small Grants Project is funding for a wide range of topics that can be applied under including training, strategic planning, professional development, organizational infrastructure, event support. The Organization projects include items largely centered around resource access and organizational material.
- 2. Available to: Diocese although available to nonprofits in general, the diocesean level of involvement is a more likely scenario in terms of resource distribution.
- 3. Related Topics: Water Supply, Formation
- **4.** Relevant Timeline: Programs are young and likely to have additional years of funding. Current date posted for applications and funding availability is through October 2025

vi. Resilience Hubs

1. Summary: The Urban Sustainability Directors Network offers resources for how to become a "Resiliency Hub".

There are already some federal funding programs that are available for cities to apply to in partnerships. This resource/program however provides roadmaps and information on being a "Community of Practice". These resources cover all forms of resilience, including energy, water, disasters, and education. These "Hubs" are all community specific in the needs and application, and there appears to be a robust programming process for becoming involved. After planning stages of involvement and once a plan has been selected for a Resilience Hub there do appear to be resources for funding these implementations.

- 2. Available to: Diocese/Parish
- **3.** *Related Topics:* Carbon Dependence, Water Supply, Disaster Preparedness, Sea level rise, Formation
- **4.** *Relevant Timeline:* There does not appear to be a noted timeline for involvement.

d. Diocesan Support

In the Diocesan Tier, it is assumed that there are dedicated funds within the Diocese to provide incentives and support to congregations. Although the value of these dedicated funds is not yet known, support from the Diocese is known. Additionally, the National Episcopal Church provided a set of resources of existing partnerships and programs related to creation care. The subsequent "Incentives" are to help imagine how the Diocese may be uniquely situated to support parishes in managing and funding implementation of other incentive programs.

- i. The National Episcopal Church
 - 1. Summary: The National Episcopal Church hosts a robust and vetted set of resources regarding creation care. The Diocese of Texas may be able to connect directly with existing partnerships and programs. There are numerous resources available for Formation regarding creation care, including liturgy, literature, formation sequences, leadership training, and other activities. There are also tools designed for calculating carbon footprint for houses of worship specifically, as well as guides for houses of worship on reducing water and energy usage. Other partnerships include

Episcopal Relief and Development, Anglican Communion Environmental Network, Creation Justice Ministries, EcoAmerica, Green Anglicans, GreenFaith, Interfaith Power & Light (4.c.ii), and more. More information on these groups can be found in Appendix B. Resources. It would be wise to leverage the existing resources and partnerships where relevant to our own efforts. The support of the National Episcopal Church and collaboration with these programs likely will bolster participation and resources for and within the Diocese of Texas.

- 2. Available to: Diocese/Parish
- 3. Relevant Topics: Carbon Dependence, Disaster Preparedness, Water Quality, Sea level rise, Formation
- **4.** *Related Timeline:* Opportune to connect and establish partnership early on in formalizing Diocesean tasks.
- ii. Incentive/Project Manager:
 - 1. Summary: There is a need for some form of Project Manager to help coordinate and oversee the implementation of not only Diocesan support, but the external support identified herein. Many congregations may not have the personnel resources or expertise to coordinate and manage these projects themselves - so the presence of a diocesean project manager in some form is an additional resource that - if made available would significantly increase the efficacy of this initiative. This may evolve into a team of people - each with a topical speciality, or a team of people focused on the different Convocations within the Diocese (or some other spatial scale). This would help to provide localized and/or specialized support to parishes. This person/persons would also continue to research incentives and opportunities relevant to the goals of the Diocese. This could also aid in connecting parishes to localized incentives programs (such as those mentioned in Section 4.c.iii). This position would also be able to help coordinate with resources and

opportunities provided by the National Episcopal Church.

- 2. Available to: Diocese held position(s)
- **3.** Related Topics: Carbon Dependence, Disaster Preparedness, Water Quality, Sea level rise, Formation
- **4.** *Relevant Timeline:* Hiring for this lead position is likely the next major step in ensuring the work from this effort is catalyzed.

iii. Revolving Fund:

- Summary: It is possible that a structure from the Diocese as a Revolving Fund may be strategic for helping with the upfront costs of projects that many parishes may not be able to generate - but would be able to contribute back to the Fund from either the rebates or cost savings associated with the projects. This could aid parishes in mobilizing the incentives mentioned previously in this section. There is also a possibility for the structure to have funds dedicated to accounts related to each of the topics within this report, or as general funds.
- 2. Available to: Parishes from Diocese
- RelatedTopics: Carbon Dependence, Disaster Preparedness, Water supplyQuality, Sea level rise, Formation
- **4.** *Relevant Timeline:* This formal fund would likely require some time to develop. This likely would also be a high priority to establish with the aid of an Incentives Manager.

iv. Insurance

 Summary: As insurance rates continue to rise with increased understanding of the risks climate change poses to both people and property - a collaboration with the Church Insurance Corporation may become a winwin scenario for the Diocese and Parishes as mitigation plans can be developed together and hopefully can slow the rise of rates. There may also be opportunities for insurance audits (covered by/supported by the Diocese) for Parishes interested in hosting/becoming disaster centers or water supply stations as a service to the community. These audits may be necessary to ensure such activities are covered under current policy - and perhaps open avenues to include this type of coverage.

- **3.** *Related Topics*: Water Supply, Sea level rise, Disaster Preparedness
- **4.** *Relevant Timeline:* Prior to hosting third party relief groups. Possible to implement on a rolling basis.
- v. Bulk Eco-friendly Consumables
 - 1. Summary: In finding the balance of decreasing single use waste and also the desire to limit water consumption, eco-friendly single use consumables (plates, cups, napkins, etc.) have become more desirable. Many of these products are biodegradable/compostable and offer a potential solution to both waste and water consumption. However, the main barrier for many congregations interested in these items is cost. The scale of switching to these items routinely would require budgetary shifts that may not be possible. However, if the Diocese were to establish a relationship with an eco-product vendor and solicit whole-sale or bulk discounted rates for parishes this could lower the financial entry point to integrating these alternatives.
 - 2. Available to: Diocese/Parish
 - 3. Related Topics: Water supply, Carbon Dependence
 - **4.** Related Timeline: Possible on a rolling transitional basis
- 6.5 Summary of Outcomes

There are many Federal programs available to nonprofits/houses of worship and it is becoming more common to include Direct Pay provisions in tax incentive programs. Where Federal funds are directed to state governments, there is not often opportunity directly for the Diocese. From state generated programs, the majority seem to be directed at cities and municipalities for funding applications. There are several instances of state granting programs soliciting applications from partnerships in cities that often include community stakeholders such as nonprofits. The Diocese of Texas may be able to establish themselves as one such community partner for these type applications. Private funding/support programs are extensive as well - and the Diocesean body is likely able to help with partnerships for larger and well established entities where opportunities of scale make the most sense (ie. insurance partnerships, Energy Audit programs, bulk sale consumables). Additionally, existing relationships with the National Episcopal Church and Episcopal Relief and Development host opportunities for deepening our connections and integration of existing resources within the broader Episcopal Church.

Many funding programs are offered on annual cycles, with new ones coming online as others wind down. The challenges faced in accessing incentives programming is timeliness - as some of these resources may be obsolete from the time research started to the time this document enters the hands of those who would pursue such opportunities. This leaves the impression that in order to remain up to date of programs and opportunities, dedicated personnel/volunteers/consulting options are critical.

6.6 Conclusion

Across the various tiers, there are extensive opportunities for incentives, funding, programming, and education as it relates to the goals of the Diocese and parishes seeking to improve their resiliency and decrease their environmental footprint. Projects undertaken for these means often require significant financial contributions, and as good stewards of our resources it is good to pursue these activities through leverage the existing channels of support accessible to us.




GIFTS AND BEQUESTS
